[Urging Training and Promotion of the Right to Breastfeed in Public]

Resolution urging the Human Services Agency and San Francisco Police Department to train city employees and contractors on the rights of women to breastfeed in public and urging any city department with a public waiting room to post a sign welcoming breastfeeding in public waiting areas.

WHEREAS, Mildred Musni was recently shamed and harassed by a security guard for breastfeeding her 4-month-old son in the waiting room of the Human Services Agency office where she was waiting to apply for the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKS); and

WHEREAS, When Ms. Musni called the San Francisco Police Department for assistance because she felt intimidated by the security officer, the Officer who arrived on the scene was dismissive of her complaint and told her if she nursed in public she might be charged with indecent exposure; and

WHEREAS, California Civil Code, Section 43.3 gives mothers the right to publically breastfeed in any location, public or private, where a mother and child are permitted; and

WHEREAS, Breastfeeding has some of the most positive and long lasting effects on a baby's health and development, including lower risk of gastroenteritis, respiratory infections, sudden infant death syndrome, obesity, type 1 & 2 diabetes, and allergies; and

WHEREAS, Breastfeeding also has positive health impacts for mothers including protections against ovarian and breast cancer and hip fractures; and

WHEREAS, With the introduction of bottle feeding in the beginning of the 20th Century, breastfeeding declined dramatically in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Because of the enormous health benefits of breastfeeding, health advocates and officials at the local, state, and federal levels have embarked on campaigns and policies to encourage mothers to nurse their children; and

WHEREAS, Mothers in San Francisco regularly report being shamed or ridiculed for nursing in public; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors wants to encourage mothers to breastfeed in public without fear or shame; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That to create an atmosphere where mothers feel welcome to nurse in public, the Board urges every city department, including, the Human Services

Agency, to post a sign in any public waiting room that welcomes breastfeeding; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board urges the Human Services Agency and the San Francisco Police Department to train all staff regarding the right of mothers to breastfeed in public.
