

The Code of Hammurabi, known for its "eye for an eye" directive, is also one of the earliest examples of the presumption of innocence, a radical idea in 1772 BC. The Babylonian law code also suggests that both the accused and the accuser have the opportunity to provide evidence.

Client German, who faced life in prison under California's three-strikes law, was acquitted after his public defender, Megan Burns, proved he was confused and manipulated by police investigators' leading questions.







Since the 15th century, Lady Justice has frequently been depicted wearing a blindfold. The blindfold symbolizes the idea that justice should be meted out objectively, regardless of the status, power, or wealth of the accused.

he concept of justice is part of our common cultural heritage as human beings. Symbolic representations of justice can be found in the artifacts of every civilization. One such symbol is the Nkondi, depicted on the cover of this report. The Knogo people of West Africa believed that the spirits contained in the Nkondi had the power to protect the innocent, punish the guilty, and enforce contracts. Community members involved in a conflict would appear before the Nkondi while a religious specialist investigated the problem. Upon reaching an agreement, both sides took an oath and sealed it by driving a nail into the figure, activating its power.

In our 2013 Annual Report and 2014 Calendar, we explore how symbols of justice throughout history and across the world relate to the work we do as public defenders. Every day, public defenders and support staff go to court to fight for just and fair outcomes for our clients. Whether a case is

resolved by a jury trial, dismissal, or a plea agreement, our goal is to ensure that each of the 20,000 people we represent each year receives effective and vigorous legal representation as guaranteed by the Constitution. We have expanded our work outside the courtroom to help clients obtain mental health and substance abuse treatment, clear their criminal records, and fulfill their educational and career goals.

In 2013, public defenders across America celebrated the 50th anniversary of the high court's Gideon decision, which granted everyone, regardless of income, the right to an attorney. In San Francisco, we honored the spirit of Gideon with the following achievements:

- Securing successful outcomes in 72 percent of felony trials and 42 percent of misdemeanor trials.
- Ensuring that no juveniles were sent to state lockup or transferred to adult court.
- Allowing 6,387 law-abiding people to fulfill their career and educational goals by clearing their old criminal convictions through our Clean Slate program, which celebrated its 15th anniversary in 2013.

- Linking 95 percent of our social work clients to treatment, housing or vocational services.
- Distributing more than 4,000 backpacks and school supplies to children and providing health and literacy support to low income families throughout San Francisco through our community-based MAGIC programs.
- Sponsoring the 2013 Justice Summit, broadcast year-round through SFGovTV to educate the public on equal justice for the poor, bail reform, forced treatment and constitutional rights.
- Bringing famed death penalty abolitionist Sister Helen Prejean to San Francisco for a free talk and book signing, attended by more than 1,000 people and broadcast on SFGovTV.
- Preserving our Volunteer Attorney Program, which has improved the quality of representation for more than 30 years while giving young attorneys and seasoned civil lawyers valuable trial experience.
- Receiving a \$400,000 Department of Justice grant to create the first locally and nationally applicable

checklist system to guide attorneys through critical moments in cases and prevent wrongful convictions.

• Successfully advocating on behalf of Due Process for All, a local ordinance which protects undocumented San Franciscans against improper detentions and deportations.

We are honored to protect the constitutional rights of all San Franciscans, and to continue to guard against wrongful convictions, racial profiling and unconstitutional arrests. In 2014 and beyond, we will continue the fight to ensure that "justice for all" is not just a symbolic phrase, but is a reality for everyone.



For the first time in a decade, world class violin player Kim has been reunited with her music. BHC provides intense psychiatric and substance abuse help and case management to clients living with serious mental illnesses.
