Dear Mayor and Members of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors,

I am writing to urge the City to confront San Francisco's long-term structural budget deficit, which could grow to over \$1 billion by 2030, with a clear-eyed, responsible approach that restores fiscal stability and public trust.

As the City's own financial projections make clear, San Francisco is facing a persistent spending problem. Our City is simply spending money it does not have. The deficit is a serious structural problem that if not solved, will harm our quality of life and lead to cuts to services that we cherish such as our libraries and parks.

Critically, this deficit cannot be solved by relying on strategies that merely delay hard decisions. San Francisco must address its budget gap while following the below principles:

- Do not use reserves, which exist to protect the City during true emergencies and economic shocks and not to paper over recurring imbalances.
- Do not use one-time fixes and shortcuts, which provide temporary relief while worsening the long-term outlook.
- Do not increase taxes, which would further burden residents and businesses already struggling with affordability and economic uncertainty.

Using reserves, one-time fixes, or new taxes may appear expedient in the short run, but each approach ultimately weakens the City's fiscal foundation and compounds the problem in future budget cycles.

Instead, the City should focus on sustainable solutions that align recurring spending with recurring revenues. That means taking a hard look at baseline costs, staffing levels, and program effectiveness including roughly \$1.6 billion in annual nonprofit spending, where repeated audits and scandals have revealed weak oversight, misuse of funds, and poor accountability for results.

It also means confronting the City's own irresponsible spending practices. San Francisco has poured billions into homelessness programs with little improvement in outcomes and even raided a dedicated healthcare fund to paper over short-term budget gaps. These practices reflect a broader failure to track spending, measure performance, and enforce accountability.

San Franciscans expect and deserve a budget strategy that is honest about the scale of the challenge and disciplined in how it is addressed. Tackling the structural deficit

responsibly is essential not only to the City's financial health, but to its credibility, economic recovery, and ability to deliver on its commitments to residents.

I respectfully urge you to prioritize long-term fiscal sustainability and to commit to solutions that solve the problem at its root rather than passing it forward to future leaders, future taxpayers, and future budgets.

Thank you for your leadership and consideration.

Meanwhile, we are told by Connie Chan herself, that there is no money left to cut.

I demand the following immediately:

1. A full public audit of every nonprofit receiving city funds, including the compensation of all executives and senior staff.
2. An immediate cap on city-funded compensation. No executive at any organization receiving San Francisco taxpayer dollars should be collecting more than the salary of the Mayor himself. Make them work the minimal wage, in the true sense of public service and the so-called non-profit values they so much aspire to.
3. Termination of any contract with organizations that cannot demonstrate clear, measurable outcomes for the communities they claim to serve.
4. Full public disclosure of all nonprofit grant recipients, contract amounts, and executive pay — posted online in plain language for every resident to see.

This is not about punishing legitimate charitable work. It is about ending the abuse of a system that has allowed connected insiders to profit handsomely while the city bleeds red

ink.

The gravy train stops here. Do your jobs.

Dear Supervisors,

I hope you are doing well. My name is Yesenia Lacayo, and I am writing with appreciation for your continued support of San Francisco's immigrant communities, community-based organizations, and sanctuary values.

I am reaching out to respectfully ask the Board of Supervisors to support baselining the additional \$3.8 million for SFILEN and the San Francisco Rapid Response Network in the FY 2026–27 budget.

Through my work with SFILEN and SFRRN, I have seen how deeply immigrant families rely on this network. This funding supports critical services such as legal consultations, deportation defense, Know Your Rights education, rapid response, dispatch coordination, multilingual outreach, and trusted community-based support.

I also want to highlight that we are meeting the deliverables tied to the supplemental funding. These dollars are not sitting unused — they are directly supporting services, staffing, coordination, and response capacity across the city. The issue is not whether the work is happening or whether the networks are accountable. The issue is stability.

Without baselining this additional funding, the infrastructure San Francisco already relies on remains temporary and vulnerable year to year. At a time when immigrant families are experiencing fear, uncertainty, and increased federal threats, we need to be able to sustain the work, retain staff, and continue showing up for our communities.

I am grateful for the Board's leadership and for the ways many of you have continued to stand with immigrant communities. I respectfully ask that you champion a budget add-back or amendment to baseline the full additional \$3.8 million for SFILEN and SFRRN in the final budget.

Thank you for your time, your leadership, and your continued commitment to San Francisco's immigrant families.
