URGING THE PENINSULA CORRIDOR JOINT POWERS BOARD TO DESIGN ANY IMPROVEMENT OR ALTERATIONS TO THE CALTRAIN RIGHT-OF-WAY SO AS TO RETAIN THE ABILITY TO ADD OR MAINTAIN EXPRESS TRACKS NECESSARY TO PROVIDE FLEXIBLE, FREQUENT AND RELIABLE SERVICE OF LOCAL, EXPRESS, INTERCITY, AND HIGH SPEED TRAINS AND TO ALLOW FOR THE MOST ECONOMICAL ADDITION OF EXTRA TRACKS IN THE FUTURE.

WHEREAS, San Francisco, San Mateo, and Santa Clara Counties have in recent years experienced substantial growth in both population and employment, which have resulted in unprecedented levels of traffic congestion in the three counties; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Board of Supervisors has declared that the City has a transit first policy and that future growth in commuting into the city be accommodated by expansion of the regional transit network, rather than increases in automobile traffic; and

WHEREAS, In 1992, the City and County of San Francisco, together with San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties, formed the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board, in order to preserve the former Southern Pacific Railroad right of way and to assume responsibility for operating and administering the Caltrain commuter rail line; and

WHEREAS, The geography of the San Francisco Peninsula and the historical development of its cities place the Caltrain rail line at the center of one of the region's most congested transportation corridors and in the heart of one of the nation's most important economies; and

WHEREAS, The California High Speed Rail Authority has identified the Caltrain corridor as its preferred alignment for a high speed rail service between San Francisco and the major cities of the state, including San Jose, Sacramento, Los Angeles, and San Diego; and

WHEREAS, The High Speed Rail services which have been started world-wide have proven an effective, efficient and environmentally sound alternative to many medium-distance airline routes and to thus provide a solution to airport and airspace congestion; and

WHEREAS, Ridership on Caltrain has in recent years increased dramatically, and has reached its highest level since 1958, including an even higher percentage growth in trips by San Franciscans to jobs in San Mateo and Santa Clara counties; and

WHEREAS, Study of the passenger market demand for Caltrain services has shown that significant increase in the number of time-saving express will provide greatly increased train ridership; and

WHEREAS, The Caltrain right of way is for most of its length wide enough to accommodate three or more tracks, which allows for frequent express and local services, together with inter-city and high speed trains, to use the corridor simultaneously; and

WHEREAS, The Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board is presently engaged in the Caltrain Rapid Rail Study, a comprehensive approach for improving and expanding the railroad's physical infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, The Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board has asked the cities and counties served by Caltrain for comments regarding the Rapid Rail Study; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board to design any improvement or alterations to the Caltrain right-of-way so as to retain the ability to add or maintain express tracks necessary to provide flexible, frequent and reliable service of local, express, inter-city, and high speed trains; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board to design any station rehabilitation, parking lot construction, grade separation, or other improvement or alteration to

the tracks and adjacent structures so as to allow for the most economical addition of extra tracks in the future.
