19	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:	
20	Section 1. The San Francisco Park Code is hereby amended by adding Article 5A to	
21	read as follows:	
22	Article 5A DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREAS	
23	SEC. 5A.01 PURPOSE.	
24	(a) Dogs on leash are permitted in all areas of parks with the exception of athletic fields,	
25	tennis, basketball and volleyball courts, Sensitive Habitat Areas from which humans have also	

1	been barred, either seasonally or permanently, and those areas identified in Section 5.02 of the
2	Park Code, which include children's play areas, buildings, the Zoological Gardens and the Arboretum,
3	Japanese Tea Garden and Conservatory Valley in Golden Gate Park. Pursuant to Section 41.12 of
4	the San Francisco Health Code, dogs are permitted off-leash only in those areas of parks that
5	have been designated by the Recreation and Park Commission as animal exercise areas.
6	The purpose of this section is to provide rules and guidelines to allow the Recreation and Park
7	Department to support the on-going off-leash use of parks by dogs and their guardians. The
8	Department must also ensure that all citizens can share our scarce urban parks and open spaces
9	without adversely affecting one another or the natural environment.
10	(b) On July 1, 2003, Voice Control Areas shall become the default situation in any park
11	for which an alternative proposal has not been submitted by the community and approved by
12	the Dog Advisory Committee and the Recreation and Park Department. Between adoption of
13	this Article and July 1, 2003, enforcement of dog-related laws and regulations will follow the
14	policies in effect prior to May 8, 2002.
15	SEC. 5A.02 DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this Article, the following definitions will
16	apply:
17	(a) Dog Play Voice-Control Area [VCA] shall mean those parks or spaces within parks
18	designated by the Recreation and Park Department for off-leash dog use. Types of VCA shall
19	<u>include:</u>
20	(1) Shared Use: The default situation, whereby parks, or parts of parks, are designated
21	as accessible for off-leash dog use. Notice shall be properly given that these areas are to be
22	shared by all responsible park users.
23	(2) Timed Use: Areas where off-leash dog recreation is permitted during certain hours
24	of the day. Notice shall be properly given that such areas are to be shared or used solely by
25	dogs and their owners during the designated hours.

1	(3) Single Use: A designated, enclosed or defined park space for off-leash recreation
2	<u>only.</u>
3	(b) Owner/Guardian shall mean any person who possesses, has title to, has an interest in,
4	harbors an animal, or has control, custody or possession of an animal. The word "own" shall include
5	all these shades of meaning.
6	(c) Community Partner shall mean an active volunteer group that assists the
7	Department in monitoring and maintaining a Dog Play Area. RPD shall mean San Francisco
8	Recreation and Park Department.
9	(d) Dog Advisory Committee shall mean the committee formed by the General Manager
10	of the Recreation and Park Department to create, monitor, and mediate the community process
11	surrounding Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. Its membership shall be consistent with other
12	recreation-related committees, including the Tennis Advisory Committee and the Ground
13	Sports Advisory Committee.
14	(e) Athletic Fields shall mean any field under the jurisdiction of the Recreation and Park
15	Department and for which it issues permits or accepts reservations.
16	(f) Children's Play Area shall mean any area that is in immediate proximity to a children's
17	play structure, apparatus or sandbox.
18	(g) Significant Natural Resource Area shall mean an area designated in the Recreation and
19	Park Commission's Significant Natural Resources Management Plan, which, in 1995, listed over 30
20	open spaces that are generally remnants of San Francisco's original landscape and support important
21	plant and animal populations and habitats. The Department's Natural Areas Program shall conduct
22	a scientific study and a thorough neighborhood public process in order to more clearly designate
23	and define these areas.
24	(h) Sensitive Habitat Area shall mean those areas within Significant Natural Resource
25	Areas that support or are likely to support locally important, rare, threatened or endangered

1	species. Of the approximately 500 acres of Natural Areas available for recreational use,
2	approximately 20% would be considered Sensitive Habitat Areas. Sensitive Habitat Areas
3	include sensitive wildlife areas such as breeding habitat for birds, sensitive remnant native
4	plant communities such as wetlands, sensitive plant populations such as locally rare
5	wildflower species, high erosion prone areas, active restoration areas (temporary designation
6	only). The Recreation and Park Department shall conduct a scientific study and a thorough
7	neighborhood public process in order to more clearly designate and define these areas, subject to
8	public review and comment.
9	SEC. 5A.03 SITE CRITERIA FOR DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREAS. The Recreation
10	and Park Department, in partnership with the Dog Advisory Committee, shall use the following
11	criteria to evaluate existing and potential new Dog Play Voice-Control Areas.
12	(a) Location.
13	(1) The Recreation and Park Department will consider the amount of available park land,
14	the size of the dog population, the proximity to significant natural areas, traditional and
15	established park-use patterns, and community interest and input and the proximity to other
16	Dog Play Areas and other existing park uses in making its determination of the size and nature of
17	each Dog Play Voice-Control Area. The Recreation and Park Department shall attempt to place
18	Dog Play Voice-Control Areas in all neighborhoods with adequate park space and shall work
19	closely with the Dog Advisory Committee and Community Partners the community to identify
20	suitable spaces for additional Dog Play Voice-Control Areas.
21	(2) Dog Play Voice-Control Areas should be neighborhood friendly and, at a minimum,
22	shall be located where they will not adversely impact the surrounding neighborhood and open
23	space by causing ongoing conflicts due to overcrowding, detriment to the surrounding
24	environment due to digging or trampling, displacement of established recreational activities,
25	including passive recreation, or interference with the City's goal of allowing dogs and owners

to exercise and socialize in a safe area best address the needs and concerns of the
neighborhood and of park users.
(3) Although some noise is expected and will not preclude the establishment of a Dog Play
<u>Voice-Control Area, in siting</u> <u>Dog Play</u> <u>Voice-Control Areas the Recreation and Park Department</u>
shall take into account the distance from residences so that noise and activity levels are no more
disruptive to neighbors than typical park uses. If the VCA is to be of the Single Use variety, the
Department shall also consider whether the site is in a well drained area of the park, and whether the
Department has the financial resources to install the infrastructure necessary for the Dog Play Voice-
Control Area and to maintain said area. The Department must ensure that all Dog Play Voice-
Control Areas meet applicable disability access laws and regulations, including but not limited to the
Americans with Disabilities Act and the requirements of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.
(b) Size. Where the Voice-Control Area is a section of the park, rather than the
entire park, the size of a Dog Play Area the Voice-Control Area shall reflect the amount of
available land, the size of the dog population, other uses of the park and the park size. Wherever
possible, Dog Play Voice-Control Areas shall be at least 30,000 square feet. The minimum size of
a Dog Play Area shall be 10,000 square feet.
(c) <u>Signage</u> , <u>Boundaries and Barriers</u> .
The Recreation and Park Department shall ensure that all Dog Play Voice-Control Areas
have adequate signage, informing dog owners/guardians of the location, rules and
responsibilities of the off-leash area and informing park users of the presence of off-leash
dogs. include adequate delineation, natural or man-made, to protect dogs from vehicles, steep
cliffs, and other hazards, as well as to prevent conflicts with other park users. The boundaries
of Dog Play Areas will be identified with physical enclosures. Although some fencing will be
required to separate adjacent land uses, Barriers will not be necessary in Shared Use and
Timed Use areas. Where community consensus calls for physical barriers to be part of the

1	VCA design, the Recreation and Park Department shall, to the extent possible, utilize non-fence
2	alternatives. The Department shall endeavor to create physical enclosures barriers that are
3	aesthetically pleasing and utilize landscape features such as shrubs and vines. The Department shall
4	determine the necessity, type, size and location of the physical enclosure barriers on a case-by-case
5	basis, with extensive input from the community and the Dog Advisory Committee. In evaluating
6	the type of enclosure, the Department shall consider the adjacent site, size of the Dog Play Voice-
7	<u>Control Area, existing active park uses, proximity to Significant Natural Resource Areas, and</u>
8	historic use patterns.
9	(d) Surfacing of Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. Surfacing in Shared Use and Timed
10	Use areas will be consistent with, and appropriate to, general use of the park (e.g., turf in
11	fields and meadows, pavement on pathways and fire roads, dirt or wood chips on trails).
12	Whenever possible, Single Use VCAs will be surfaced with turf. The Recreation and Park
13	<u>Department may, in accordance with its turf management practices, close Dog Play Voice-Control</u>
14	Areas with turf surfaces during inclement weather and routine maintenance. In these circumstances
15	the Recreation and Park Department shall post signs directing users to the nearest alternate Dog Play
16	Voice-Control Area. If no alternate Voice-Control Area exists within reasonable walking
17	distance of the area closed for maintenance, RPD will designate a temporary Dog Play Voice-
18	Control area nearby. If the Recreation and Park Department and the Dog Play Area Community
19	Partners, with help from community volunteers, cannot maintain a reasonable turf planting, the
20	Recreation and Park Department and the community shall evaluate alternate materials Or Size
21	adjustments for these specific sites. Where maintaining turf is shown to be impossible, the policy
22	of the City and County shall be to favor the use of alternate materials such as sand, gravel,
23	decomposed granite, synthetic turf, or a combination of these materials in smaller Dog Play Voice-
24	Control Areas to allow for regular and appropriate maintenance.
25	

1	(e) Dog Play Voice-Control Area Amenities. The Recreation and Park Department shall
2	provide the following amenities at all Dog Play Voice-Control Areas:
3	(1) Bag dispensers.
4	(2) Signs.
5	(3) Bench(s).
6	(4) Surface material.
7	(5) Barriers (if necessary).
8	(6) Trash cans.
9	(7) For safety, all fully enclosed Voice-Control Areas shall include double gates in at
10	<u>least two locations.</u>
11	(8) Lighting. If it is physically possible, and will not adversely affect surrounding areas, the
12	Recreation and Park Department shall install lighting at Dog Play in Voice-Control Areas.
13	(9) The Recreation and Park Department shall work closely with Community Partners the
14	community and the Dog Advisory Committee to identify funding sources for additional amenities such
15	as lighting, water fountains, or informational kiosks.
16	SEC. 5A.04 NEW DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREAS. A VCA may be established
17	by request of the community, of RPD or of the Neighborhood Services & Recreation
18	Committee of the Board of Supervisors in response to expressed community interest. Based
19	on the criteria outlined in section 5A.03(a) and the data gathered through the community
20	process, the new VCA shall conform to one of the following types. Where space or
21	landscaping allows, or need dictates, a single park may also contain more than one type of
22	<u>VCA.</u> In accordance with the following guidelines, the Recreation and Park Department shall
23	initiate a new Dog Play Area if the criteria listed in section 5A.03(a) are met and the Advisory
24	Committee supports the Dog Play Area:

(a) Regional Parks Larger than 35 Acres. The boundaries used shall be soft
barriers such as language posts or field markers delineating approved areas, except when in
close proximity to conflicting uses such as streams or Sensitive Habitat Areas. The overall
park size and topography shall determine the size of the Dog Play Area. The Department will
choose the surface materials based on the existing conditions, i.e. turf in meadows and dirt on
trails. In addition, all park users must be able to access the facility without encountering off-
leash dogs, dogs must not be able to directly access prohibited areas such as Sensitive
Habitat Areas, and the necessary signage must be installed to designate which areas are
open to off-leash use and which are not. The public must be able to use the Dog Play Area at
its discretion for other purposes. Finally, the Department may impose additional restrictions in
some accessible Natural Areas on a case-by-case basis such as requiring dogs to stay on-
trail, under voice control, or on-leash. Some areas may require seasonal restrictions.

(b) Large Parks and Squares Between 10 and 35 Acres. The Department may decide to utilize unfenced Dog Play Areas if paths, boundaries, signs, topographic features, landscaping and/or other use separation features can reasonably define the Dog Play Area. However, partial physical barriers may be required to delineate various uses. These areas will be a minimum of 30,000 square feet. The majority of these Dog Play Areas will be turf surfaces. The Recreation and Park Department shall consider use of mixed surface materials as required to meet optimum maintenance levels. A Dog Play Area in a large park or square shall not be adjacent to a Significant Habitat Area or a playground unless it is enclosed within a hard barrier. The Dog Play Area should include direct access to at least one edge of the park to help facilitate access. A major access path or trail may be used for this purpose, but dogs must be leashed on the path or trail. The public must be permitted to use these Dog Play Areas at its discretion for other purposes. Finally, the Department may impose additional restrictions in some accessible Natural Areas on a case-by-case basis, such as requiring dogs

1	to stay on-trail, under voice control, or on-leash	. Some areas may require seasonal
2	restrictions.	

(c) Smaller Parks and Playgrounds Between 0 and 10 Acres. Dog Play Areas shall have physical enclosures. The Recreation and Park Department shall use other measures to the extent possible to screen the effects of the enclosures. These areas will be a minimum of 10,000 square feet. The Department shall endeavor to use surfaces other than turf, or shall consider combinations of turf and more sustainable surfaces. For safety, Dog Play Areas shall include double gates in at least two locations. Finally, the Department may impose additional restrictions in some accessible Natural Areas on a case-by-case basis, such as requiring dogs to stay on-trail, under voice control, or on-leash. Some areas may require seasonal restrictions. If the community cannot reach a reasonable compromise regarding a Dog Play Area in a small park or playground, the Recreation and Park Department shall make a recommendation to the Recreation and Park Commission for final approval.

(a) Shared-Use Areas

Shared-Use Areas shall be neighborhood and park-user friendly. There shall be proper notice to other park users that such areas are to be shared with responsible dog caretakers who have their dogs under voice control. All forms of unstructured recreation, including off-leash dog play, shall be permitted at all times when the park is open, with fences/barriers only as deemed necessary by the community. Shared use shall include trails within such parks, and between contiguous parks.

(b) Timed-Use Areas

Timed-Use Areas shall be neighborhood and park-user friendly. There shall be proper notice
to other park users that such areas are to be shared during posted hours with responsible dog
caretakers who have their dogs under voice control, or that the area is reserved for off-leash

1	dog recreation during those hours. Designated hours for off-leash recreation shall be guided
2	by logical use patterns and may be adjusted for daylight savings time.
3	(c) Single-Use Areas
4	Single-Use Areas shall be neighborhood friendly and located and designed so that they
5	will not compromise the intent of the single-use area to allow dogs and owners to exercise
6	and socialize safely and pleasantly. Single-use, fenced (or otherwise separated) areas shall
7	be made safe, attractive and comfortable for users both canine and human. Barriers shall be
8	maintained and proper gates installed [see Section 5A.03(e)(7)], foxtails and other hazards
9	removed, surface options (including hardy turf) researched and implemented, and signage
10	installed to educate users regarding the rules and regulations of the space.
11	SEC. 5A.05 RPD STAFFING AND COMMUNITY INPUT PARTNERSHIPS. Dog Play
12	Areas require an active volunteer or partner program. The Recreation and Park Department
13	must have an identifiable responsible partner for each new and existing Dog Play Area to
14	assist with monitoring and maintenance. A current "Friends of" group or a smaller subset or
15	committee of a larger park advocacy group would be sufficient. Community Partners must
16	demonstrate their commitment, organizational skills and willingness to support and promote
17	the Dog Play Area standards.
18	As with other programs within RPD (such as the Natural Areas Program), funding shall
19	be secured and dedicated staff hired to manage off-leash recreation in San Francisco parks.
20	This additional staff shall include a Volunteer Coordinator who shall seek the assistance of
21	active park advocacy and volunteer groups in establishing and maintaining VCAs. "Best
22	Friends" groups (dog owner park advocacy groups) shall be encouraged and supported. Such
23	partnerships shall augment, not replace, the efforts of RPD employees and staff. Ultimately,
24	the maintenance of the parks and the enforcement of rules for off-leash dog recreation shall be the
25	responsibility of the city and county of San Francisco.

1	SEC. 5A.06 MAINTENANCE AND MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES. While the
2	Recreation and Park Department has jurisdiction over Dog Play Areas on Recreation and
3	Park Department property, and shall contribute to both the capital and operating expenses,
4	the success of any Dog Play Area is based on the ability of its users to help establish, fund,
5	operate, maintain and monitor the Dog Play Area site. The Recreation and Park Department
6	shall encourage and welcome partnerships in many forms, and shall enter into written
7	agreements with all Community Partners.
8	[following text moved from SEC. 5A.08] Recreation and Park Department and
9	community Partner Responsibilities. Community partners (e.g., "Best Friend" groups, "Friends
10	of" groups), individual users and the Recreation and Park Department shall share the responsibility
11	for maintaining and monitoring Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. The following are general guidelines
12	that the Department shall adhere to in deciding which tasks will be performed by the Community
13	Partner can be reasonably expected of members of the community and which will be performed
14	by the Recreation and Park Department:
15	(a) The Recreation and Park Department shall:
16	(1) Maintain and repair surface (subject to available resources);
17	(2) Maintain surrounding landscape;
18	(3) Repair or replace barriers/boundaries and other basic amenities;
19	(4) Maintain informational signs;
20	(5) Empty waste receptacles;
21	(6) Act as liaison with the Department of Animal Care and Control;
22	(7) Post hours of operation for Dog Play Voice-Control Areas;
23	(8) Regulate hours of Dog Play Voice-Control Areas to best serve maintenance needs;
24	(9) Provide cost estimates for new or renovated Dog Play Voice-Control Areas;
25	(10) Process necessary regulatory permits;

1	(11) Provide and manage permits for Professional Dog-Walkers;
2	(12) Monitor Dog Play Voice-Control Area to determine general compliance and
3	effectiveness;
4	(13) Report findings to the Advisory Committee and community;
5	(14) Work with the community and Advisory Committee to remedy any flaws in Dog Play
6	Voice-Control Area design, location, or infrastructure;
7	(15) Publish VCA rules and other educational materials to be distributed to community:
8	(16) Manage off-leash recreation as they do other types of recreation, to ensure
9	equitable, courteous, safe sharing of the parks.
10	(b) The Community Partners members and volunteer groups shall:
11	(1) Provide stewardship of Dog Play Voice-Control Areas to uphold policy standards,
12	ensure that users are courteous, responsible and fair, and foster a safe shared environment;
13	(2) Distribute Dog Play Voice-Control Area rules and other educational materials to park
14	<u>users.</u>
15	(3) Serve as good role models;
16	(4) Ensure Dog Play Voice-Control Areas are kept free of animal feces;
17	(5) Alert Recreation and Park Department and Advisory Committee to maintenance needs;
18	(6) Help establish priorities for repair and renovation;
19	(7) Schedule routine cleanup and work days as necessary;
20	(8) Raise funds to support additional amenities based on Dog Play Voice-Control Area needs.
21	Such fundraising shall be administered by an appropriate 501(c)(3) charitable organization.
22	(9) Enter into an agreement with the Recreation and Park Department under the
23	auspices of the Advisory Committee. If the Community Partner fails to meet the standards
24	and responsibilities set forth in the agreement, the Recreation and Park Department will
25	review the situation and my terminate the agreement with the Community Partner.

1	SEC. 5A.07 DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREA RULES AND SIGNAGE. The Advisory
2	Committee and the Recreation and Park Department shall develop standard signage adequate to
3	inform the public of the rules governing Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. The Recreation and Park
4	<u>Department shall consider the following language for inclusion on signs in Dog Play Voice-Control</u>
5	<u>Areas:</u>
6	(a) Your neighbors and the Recreation and Park Department appreciate responsible dog
7	<u>ownership.</u>
8	(b) All dogs must be licensed and fully vaccinated before entering the Dog Play Voice-
9	<u>Control</u> <u>Area.</u>
10	(c) No dog less than 4 months old shall be permitted in the Dog Play Area.
11	(d)(c) Female dogs in heat are not allowed. should be kept on-leash.
12	(e) No more than three dogs per owner are allowed in the Dog Play Area at one time.
13	(f)(d) Professional dog walkers may not use a Dog Play Voice-Control Area for the conduct
14	of their business, unless they have obtained a permit from the Recreation and Park Department.
15	(g)(e) Animals must be leashed when entering and exiting the Dog Play Voice-Control Area.
16	(h)(f) Owners shall be in possession of a leash for each dog at all times.
17	(i)(g) Dogs must be under control of their owners at all times.
18	(i)(h) Owners must control excessive barking and noise.
19	(k)(i) Owners must pick up and dispose of dog waste in a proper manner.
20	(1)(j) Aggressive dogs (e.g., snarling, unwanted jumping) must be leashed immediately.
21	(k) Owners must fill holes dug by their dogs prior to leaving the Dog Play Area. not
22	allow their dogs to dig (except in areas set aside for this purpose) or engage in destructive
23	behavior. If a dog does dig, the owner must fill the hole before leaving the VCA.
24	[Text moved to 5A.06] -SEC. 5A.08 Recreation and Park Department and community
25	Partner Responsibilities. Community Partners and the Recreation and Park Department shall

1	share the responsibility for maintaining and monitoring Dog Play Areas. The following are
2	general guidelines that the Department shall adhere to in deciding which tasks will be
3	performed by the Community Partner and which will be performed by the Recreation and Park
4	Department:
5	(a) The Recreation and Park Department shall:
6	(1) Maintain and repair surface (subject to available resources).
7	(2) Maintain surrounding landscape.
8	(3) Repair or replace barriers/boundaries and other basic amenities.
9	(4) Maintain informational signs.
10	(5) Empty waste receptacles.
11	(6) Act as liaison with the Department of Animal Care and Control.
12	(7) Post hours of operation for Dog Play Areas.
13	(8) Regulate hours of Dog Play Areas to best serve maintenance needs.
14	(9) Provide cost estimates for new or renovated Dog Play Areas.

21	(b) The Community Partners shall:
22	(1) Provide stewardship of Dog Play Area to uphold policy standards.
23	(2) Distribute Dog Play Area rules and other educational materials to park users.
24	(3) Serve as good role models.
25	(4) Ensure Dog Play Area is kept free of animal feces.

1	(5) Alert Recreation and Park Department and Advisory Committee to maintenance
2	needs.
3	(6) Help establish priorities for repair and renovation.
4	(7) Schedule routine cleanup and work days as necessary.
5	(8) Raise funds to support additional amenities based on Dog Play Area needs.
6	(9) Enter into an agreement with the Recreation and Park Department under the
7	auspices of the Advisory Committee. If the Community Partner fails to meet the standards
8	and responsibilities set forth in the agreement, the Recreation and Park Department will
9	review the situation and my terminate the agreement with the Community Partner.
10	SEC. 5A.09. 5A.08 ADVISORY COMMITTEE.
11	(a) Membership. The Recreation and Park Department shall form an official Dog
12	Advisory Committee with balanced representation from the Dog Play Area community,
13	children's groups, environmental groups, other park users, and interested government
14	agencies. The General Manager of the Recreation and Park Department shall appoint the
15	members and the chairperson of the Advisory Committee and shall provide staff to moderate
16	the Committee's meetings and support its work. The Advisory Committee shall consist of 11
17	members, eight of whom will be selected from Citywide park advocacy organizations, and
18	three of whom will represent Citywide government institutions. A partial list of organizations
19	and institutions from whom representatives may be selected includes, but is not limited to: Ar
20	advisory committee shall be formed of representatives of various non-governmental
21	stakeholder groups promoting canine welfare and responsible dog ownership and activities.
22	Organizations of recognized accreditation and standing will be invited to nominate
23	representatives to this body. These may include, but are not limited to:
24	(1) SFSPCA.
25	(2) SFDOG.

1	(3) Coleman Advocates.
2	(4) Audubon Society.
3	(5) Sierra Club.
4	(6) Department of the Environment.
5	(7) Neighborhood Parks Council.
6	(8) SF Animal Care & Control.
7	(9) SF Police Department
8	(10) (3) Friends of ACC.
9	(11) (4) PAWS (Pets are Wonderful Support).
10	(12) Fund for Animals.
11	(13) Native Plant Society.
12	(14) Environmental Quality for Urban Parks.
13	(5) Green Friends
14	Members will be appointed by the Board of Supervisors Neighborhood Services and Recreation
15	Committee. A Chair and Secretary for the body shall be chosen by the advisory committee from within
16	the committee.
17	Non-voting members shall be invited to attend from the following city organizations:
18	(1) SF Police Department:
19	(2) SF Animal Care & Control;
20	(3) Animal Welfare Commission.
21	Members shall serve for a term of one year, which may be extended for an additional
22	<u>vear.</u>
23	(b) Responsibilities. The Advisory Committee, which shall establish its own rules of
24	procedure and the length of its members' terms of office, shall perform the following duties for
25	the Recreation and Park Department:

1	(1) Consider community requests for new off-leash areas or new amenities and ensure
2	that a thorough community process is followed.
3	(1) (2) Help identify volunteer opportunities.
4	(2) (3) Organize educational and recreational events such as obedience classes, and canine
5	good citizen tests, programming for kids with dogs,
6	(3) (4) Assist in developing and distributing educational information.
7	(4) (5) Organize collaborative events throughout the City such as vaccination and licensing
8	<u>days.</u>
9	(5) (6) Assist in the mediation of neighborhood park disputes related to Dog Play Voice-
10	Control Areas.
11	(6) (7) Recommend community guidelines.
12	(7) (8) Promote good community relations.
13	(8) (9) Solicit and identify funding for amenities and improvements not provided by the
14	Recreation and Park Department.
15	(9) (10) Assist in review and evaluation of Dog Play Voice-Control Areas and Community
16	Partnerships.
17	(10) (11) Establish a formal complaint evaluation system and Dog Play Voice-Control Area
18	evaluation instrument.
19	(11) (12) Act as liaison between users, local residents, and relevant citizen associations.
20	(12) Identify three Dog Play Area trail or meadow experiences (in regional parks).
21	(13) Draft language for Dog Play Voice-Control Area signs.
22	(14) Report to the Recreation and Park Department Commission two or three times per year to
23	provide an update on Dog Play Voice-Control Area issues.
24	(15) Present a recommendation to the Recreation and Park Department on timed use
25	of parks. The Department, with input from the Advisory Committee, shall prepare and deliver

1	a report to the Recreation and Park Commission no later than October, 2002 on timed use.
2	Make recommendations to RPD, the Supervisors Neighborhood Services & Parks Committee
3	and the Recreation & Parks Commission, as appropriate.
4	(16) Consider community requests for changes in off-leash use, such as changes in
5	timing.
6	(17) Meet every other month, unless deemed otherwise.
7	(18) Conduct meetings in accordance with all City and State public meeting laws.
8	SEC. 5A.10 5A.09 HOURS OF OPERATION. Shared-Use and Single-Use Dog Play
9	<u>Voice-Control</u> <u>Areas shall be open seven days per week, within the posted or legal hours for the park.</u>
10	Timed-Use VCAs shall have morning and afternoon/evening hours posted. These hours shall
11	be determined through community input and shall take into account established park use
12	patterns. The Recreation and Park Department, in association with the Dog Advisory Committee.
13	shall consult with affected neighbors and residents regarding the hours that Dog Play Voice-Control
14	Area facilities may be lighted. The Recreation and Park Department shall restrict the operating hours
15	of any Dog Play Voice-Control Area as necessary to comport with neighborhood input and for
16	maintenance requirements or as recommended by the Dog Advisory Committee to answer
17	neighborhood concerns.
18	SEC. 5A.11 5A.10 EVALUATION OF DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREAS. The
19	Recreation and Park Department, in partnership with the Dog Advisory Committee, shall conduct
20	an evaluation of a each Dog Play Voice-Control Area one year after it is sited, established, and/or
21	significant renovation has been completed. Existing Dog Play Voice-Control Areas shall be
22	evaluated within one year of effective date of this Article. Thereafter, the Department shall conduct
23	evaluations shall be conducted every three years, unless The Department should conduct
24	evaluations in the interim when conditions warrant reconsideration interim evaluation. Dog
25	Play Voice-Control Area evaluations shall be conducted by a committee comprised of representatives

1	from the Recreation and Park Department, the Advisory Committee, the neighborhood, Animal Care
2	and Control, and relevant local citizen associations. The Advisory Committee and Recreation and
3	Park Department shall develop the evaluation instrument. The evaluations should cover utilization of
4	the Dog Play Voice-Control Area, compliance with rules and regulations, effectiveness of the
5	barriers, and community and fiscal impacts. The evaluations should also include a survey of user and
6	neighborhood satisfaction, conducted by an impartial party, and consider the number, severity, and
7	resolution of complaints raised during the evaluation period as well as positive responses to the
8	<u>VCA.</u>
9	SEC. 5A.12 5A.11 COMPLAINTS. The Recreation and Park Department shall attempt to
10	resolve any complaints involving Dog Play Voice-Control Areas within 30 days of the date the
11	complaint is made. The Recreation and Park Department shall report to the Advisory Committee on
12	the status of all complaints. Any complaints that are not resolved within 30 days will be referred to the
13	Advisory Committee. The Advisory Committee shall work with the complainant and the Recreation and
14	Park Department to determine an appropriate resolution within 60 days. Final resolution of the
15	complaint is the responsibility of the Recreation and Park Department. The Dog Advisory
16	Committee will keep a detailed database of complaints, both to identify repeat offenders and
17	to identify repeat complainants.
18	Complaints that will be considered by the Committee will include but not be limited to:
19	(a) Excessive or inappropriate noise on the part of dogs and their guardians (as with any
20	recreational activity, some noise is expected);
21	(b) Destruction of park resources by digging in places not set aside for this activity;
22	(c) Unchecked entry of dogs into tot-lot areas:
23	(d) <u>Unscooped dog feces;</u>
24	(e) Abandonment of hazardous trash in off-leash parks (including, but not limited to,
25	chicken bones and other picnic trash, broken glass, dirty diapers, etc.);

1	(f) Maintenance issues of concern to dog owners or specific to off-leash use, which have
2	been brought to the attention of RPD but remain unresolved after a reasonable period
3	of time (e.g. foxtail removal, broken fountains, turf maintenance, trash-can emptying).
4	Complaints that shall not be considered:
5	(a) Those that are unsubstantiated or constitute harassment;
6	(b) Those that are better left to Animal Care & Control (e.g. vicious dogs, organized dog-
7	fighting, stray dogs);
8	(c) Those that are better left to the police (e.g. vandalism of dog-related amenities,
9	conflicts between human park users);
10	(d) Those that are not related to dogs or off-leash recreation.
11	SEC. 5A.13 5A.12 SIGNS FOR DOG PLAY VOICE-CONTROL AREAS. The Recreation
12	and Park Department shall provide and install signs at all Dog Play Voice-Control Areas that outline
13	the rules and regulations for these spaces. The signs will outline current San Francisco regulations
14	and ordinances regarding off-leash dogs, and information that has proven effective in managing off-
15	leash facilities in other cities. When appropriate, the Recreation and Park Department shall also
16	install directional signs to the Dog Play Voice-Control Area. In addition, the Department shall
17	install informational signs, which shall be placed next to bag dispensers at on-leash sites. The
18	Department shall consider including the following language on those signs: "Your neighbors and the
19	Recreation and Park Department appreciate responsible dog ownership. Please pick up and remove
20	dog waste, leash your dog(s), don't leave your dog unattended, control excessive barking and noise,
21	prevent digging and destructive behavior, and keep your dog's vaccinations and license current. For
22	information regarding dogs in parks, please contact the Recreation and Park Department @ (415) 831
23	2700 or Animal Care and Control @ (415) 554-6364. See Health Code Sections 40 (a) – (b); 41.12 (a)
24	- (d); 41.15; Park Code Section 3.02 and 5.02."

1	SEC. 5A.14 5A.13 ENFORCEMENT. The Recreation and Park Department shall pursue
2	enforcement of all state and municipal laws regarding dogs in parks. dog feces removal, stray or
3	unattended dogs, vicious and dangerous dogs, and dogs in areas where they are prohibited
4	by Section 5.02 of the Park Code. Pursuant to San Francisco Health Code Section 41.15, all
5	dogs in VCAs must have current dog licenses. After July 1, 2003, the fine for not possessing a
6	current dog license will increase to \$100. The Police Department and the Department of Animal
7	Care and Control shall assist the Recreation and Park Department in this effort. Additional staff
8	positions shall be funded for Animal Care and Control, to facilitate this targeted enforcement.
9	Formal redesignation of the status for any park or relevant section of park (Shared-Use,
10	Timed-Use, Single-Use Area, On-Leash Only, No Dogs Allowed) shall be followed by a public
11	education period of not less than 45 days (during which proper signage shall be installed),
12	which shall be followed by enforcement as applicable in that park. For a period of 90 days
13	after the effective date of this Ordinance the Recreation and Park Department shall provide
14	extensive public education and shall, at the end of that 90-day period, present a joint
15	enforcement policy to the Recreation and Park Commission, for approval. The Recreation
16	and Park Department shall then commence strict and consistent enforcement in accordance
17	with the approved policy. During the 90-day period the Recreation and Park Department shall
18	install informational signs, appoint the Advisory Committee, and distribute educational
19	materials to support a isofti enforcement period that will consist of warnings to violators. The
20	Recreation and Park Department will try to designate additional Dog Play Areas during this
21	90-day period and prior to strict enforcement.
22	<u>SEC.</u> 5A.15 5A.14 <u>PROPOSALS FOR NEW DOG PLAY VOICE CONTROL AREAS.</u> The
23	Recreation and Park Department and the Dog Advisory Committee shall consider all written
24	requests from users, neighbors, and Community Partners community groups regarding the
25	establishment of new Dog Play Voice-Control Areas, and adding or repairing amenities at existing

1	Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. The Recreation and Park Department shall evaluate the
2	request and make a recommendation to the Advisory Committee within 60 days of receiving
3	the request. If the request is for establishment of a new Dog Play Voice-Control Area, a
4	change of hours or boundaries in an existing Voice-Control Area or addition of a major
5	amenity such as lighting, the Advisory Committee shall manage the public process for consideration
6	of the request. The public process shall comport with the Recreation and Park Department's
7	accepted community-wide planning process, which includes public notification and opportunity
8	for input from users and neighbors, the Recreation and Park Department, and relevant civic
9	associations.
10	(a) An impartial firm or party shall be contracted to perform a survey of the park. The
11	survey shall look at park use at all times of day on both week days and weekends and shall
12	be conducted during a logical time of year (e.g., not during the rainy season). The surveyors
13	shall be discreet and the survey schedule shall be undisclosed to ensure an accurate reading
14	of park use. The survey shall also note the number, proximity and adequacy of off-leash
15	opportunities in the neighborhood. Surveys shall be made available under the applicable
16	Sunshine laws and ordinances.
17	(b) Facilitated community meetings shall be conducted in each neighborhood to discuss
18	the results of the surveys on that neighborhood's parks and to gather input from residents as
19	to how each park should be designated. No fewer than two (2) meetings shall be held, and
20	they will be in a location and at times convenient to local residents. Relevant experts (e.g. in
21	dog behavior, landscape architecture, native habitats, child development) shall be on hand to
22	answer questions. Failing that, questions shall be gathered at the first meeting and relayed to
23	experts so that answers can be provided at the follow-up meeting. Childcare shall be
24	provided. Community input requires public notification and opportunities for input for users
25	and neighbors, RPD and relevant civic associations.

1	(c) Based on input from the community process, RPD and the Dog Advisory Committee
2	will decide on a course of action. If RPD and the Dog Advisory Committee cannot reach
3	consensus, the matter will go before the Board of Supervisors for a hearing and
4	determination.
5	(d) By December 1, 2002, the Recreation and Park Department shall provide a report for
6	the Dog Advisory Committee detailing the availability of funding for off-leash spaces, related
7	amenities, staff, educational materials, and other related items so that the Dog Advisory
8	Committee can determine which projects can be funded in the next fiscal year.
9	(e) The Recreation and Park Department shall not implement any policy related to off-
10	leash or on-leash activities as specified in this ordinance without first obtaining comment and
11	review from the Dog Advisory Committee.
12	SEC. 5A.16 5A.15 MODIFICATION OR ELIMINATION OF VOICE-CONTROL AREAS. If
13	the Recreation and Park Department concludes, after evaluation by the Advisory Committee, relevant
14	park groups and the Department, that a Voice-Control Area is not functioning appropriately, the
15	Department shall develop and implement potential solutions, with input from the Dog Advisory
16	Committee and members of the community. If the Department cannot implement a satisfactory
17	solution, the Recreation and Park Department shall discontinue the Dog Play Area in question
18	matter will be brought before the Neighborhood Services & Recreation Committee of the
19	Board of Supervisors for a hearing and determination.
20	SEC. 5A.17 5A.16 FUNDING. Prior to establishing a Dog Play Area, the Recreation
21	and Park Department, the Advisory Committee and/or the Community Partners shall identify
22	adequate funding for the project. The Recreation and Park Department has the primary
23	responsibility for providing the resources necessary for the establishment, maintenance and
24	management of basic Dog Play Voice-Control Areas. The Recreation and Park Department shall
25	work with Dog Play Area Community Partners community and park groups, the Dog Advisory

1	Committee and other governmental agencies to identify funding available through additional City
2	monies, grants, private and corporate funding, and agency partnerships, and pro-bono
3	contributions of goods and services (such as advertising space or landscaping supplies).
4	In addition to basic amenities and maintenance, Items that require funding shall include,
5	but not be limited to:
6	(a) Park-use surveys and facilitated meetings:
7	(b) Elements of public education (see Section 5A.18);
8	(c) Additional or upgraded amenities.
9	SEC. 5A.18 5A.17 PROFESSIONAL DOG WALKERS. The Recreation and Park
10	Department shall require all professional dog walkers utilizing park property to obtain a Recreation
11	and Park Department Permit and an Animal Care and Control agreement. Dog walkers must have a
12	maximum 8-foot leash in their possession for each dog being walked. Animal Care and Control
13	recommends that professional dog walkers not have more than six dogs in their control at any time. No
14	person may have more than six dogs off-leash at the same time in a Dog Play Voice-Control Area.
15	Professional Dog Walkers may use Dog Play Areas between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00
16	p.m. The Recreation and Park Department shall adopt a sliding scale fee schedule for Professional
17	Dog Walkers so that this Article does not unduly impact their livelihood. Funds raised by the
18	issuance of permits shall go to establishment and maintenance of off-leash areas and to city-
19	sponsored programs for animal welfare, education and training. These funds shall not be
20	placed in the general fund.
21	SEC. 5A.19 5A.18 PUBLIC INFORMATION AND EDUCATION. The Recreation and
22	Park Department shall provide outreach information concerning this Ordinance by producing signage
23	and brochures that shall be distributed through a number of means, including veterinary offices, the
24	SFSPCA, pet stores, community groups (such as SFDOG, "Best Friends" and "Friends of"
25	groups) and Recreation and Park Department facilities as well as the Recreation and Park

1	Department's WEB page, which has links to other support organizations. All Recreation and Park
2	Department facilities that are staffed shall provide information to the public on the closest available
3	official Dog Play Voice-Control Area. In addition, RPD, along with the Dog Advisory
4	Committee will develop an on-going public education campaign around "petiquette," tolerance
5	and other topics essential to successful sharing of our urban parks. To reach the largest
6	number of people possible, the public education effort shall be multi-pronged, including
7	different types of media and combining outreach with readily available information for those
8	who are seeking it.
