## Introduction to Amendment

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Municipal Elections Code Section 510 is to allow the City to opt out of printing the names of supporters and opponents with local ballot measures if doing so avoids a ballot exceeding six cards.

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## Ordinance amending the Municipal Elections Code to provide that the names of

## supporters and opponents of a local ballot measure submitted to the voters be listed in

the ballot statement or question for each local measure except when including such
names will cause there to be more than six ballot cards for that election.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Background and Findings.
(a) The Municipal Elections Code requires the City Attorney to prepare a general statement or question to appear on the ballot for each local ballot measure submitted to the voters. Such statements are limited to 30 words, except for unusually complex measures or bond measures, where the general statement or question may be up to 100 words long. (b) In 2022 , with the enactment of Assembly Bill 1416 (AB 1416), the State established new requirements for ballot statements or questions for state and local ballot measures. $A B$ 1416 requires the ballot statement or question for statewide measures and local measures to include a list of supporters and opponents of each measure and authorizes counties to opt out of the requirement for local measures. The list of supporters and the list of opponents may each be up to 125 characters in length. The names of the supporters and opponents must be

## 貫 Introduction to Amendment

## Underlying this MEC amendment is Assembly Bill (AB) 1416 which requires the printing of the names of supporters and opponents on ballot labels for local measures unless a county's Board of Supervisors opts out.

- The San Francisco Board of Supervisors previously opted out of AB 1416 via ordinance for any election conducted in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24, including the March 5, 2024, election.
- The Department's current request to the Board to opt out is related to the expected large number of local measures that will appear on the November 2024 ballot.

| Number of cards | 2.5 | 3.75 |

The Department estimates that listing Supporters and Opponents on the ballot would decrease the number of measures that can fit on a card by $33 \%$.

## Operational Considerations

While a six-card ballot will slow the processing of ballots, a ballot greater than six cards will significantly impact many election-related operations.

- The Department's ballot printing vendor would need to modify and slow its processes for assembling vote-by-mail ballots.
- The United States Postal Service (USPS) would need to modify how it processes outgoing and returned vote-by-mail ballots due to the weight and size of envelopes.
- The Department would need to manually process the possible 400,000 returned vote-by-mail ballots, including hand-opening each envelope due to the limitations of the Department's ballot processing equipment.


## 山 Results Reporting Considerations

## The Department is preparing for high turnout in the November 5, 2024, election.

- Even if the ballot is limited to a six-card ballot for the November election, the Department still expects needing at least one extra week to process and count ballots, compared to the time needed to process ballots for the recent March primary election.
- Every incremental one-card increase greater than six cards will significantly impact and slow the counting of ballots and the release of election results.
- However, if opting out would still result in a ballot with more than six cards, the Department will then print the names of supporters and opponents of local measures on the ballots.
