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3	Resolution Urging the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission to Study
4	Opportunities to Restore the Yosemite Creek Watershed.
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6	WHEREAS, The Yosemite Creek Watershed, whose headwaters are located in the
7	heights of McClaren Park and lower catchment is in Yosemite Slough, was once the largest
8	wetland watershed on the eastern shoreline of San Francisco; and
9	WHEREAS, The lower catchment of this watershed is the only site along San
10	Francisco's southern Bayside waterfront with substantial wetland and watershed restoration
11	opportunities; and
12	WHEREAS, The opportunity for wetland and watershed restoration is enhanced by the
13	expression of interest on the part of San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) staff
14	interest in exploring the possibility of daylighting and restoring portions of the culverted stream
15	to the northwest of Yosemite Slough; and
16	WHEREAS, The area around the lower catchment has been included in the Bayview
17	Hunters Point Redevelopment Plan area and the Hunters Point Shipyard Redevelopment Plan
18	area and these areas are expected to undergo new development over the next several years;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, Development of a long-term restoration program for the watershed could
21	complement these redevelopment efforts; now, therefore, be it
22	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the SFPUC to prepare a study that
23	evaluates the watershed and wetlands restoration opportunities for this important ecological
24	area, identifies how the restoration of this watershed can enhanced redevelopment efforts in
25	the area, identifies possible locations for wetland restoration and other waterfront features,

1	determines the feasibility of using living shorelines instead of rip rap and other forms of
2	armoring not conducive to habitat production and establishes criteria for this purpose; and, be
3	it
4	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board urges the SFPUC to provide the study to the
5	Board of Supervisors and the public for comment and consideration in time to coordinate any
6	desired restoration efforts with the redevelopment activities planned for this area.
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
