1	[Department of Public Works – Bayview Transportation Improvement Project Fiscal
2	Feasibility]

Resolution adopting findings that the Bayview Transportation Improvement Project is fiscally feasible and responsible under Administrative Code Chapter 29.

WHEREAS, Chapter 29 of the Administrative Code requires the Board of Supervisors to determine whether certain project plans proposed by a City department or other entity are fiscally feasible and responsible prior to initiating environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), or, if as of January 27, 2004, environmental review had commenced already and has not been completed, a City department or other entity must submit to the Board of Supervisors the required information under Section 29.3 for a determination of fiscal feasibility; and

WHEREAS, The Bayview Transportation Improvements Project would establish officially designated truck routes between northbound U.S. Highway 101 to the existing South Basin industrial area and from northbound and southbound US 101 to the north and south gates of the redeveloped Hunters Point Shipyard, and the Department of Public Works and the Department of City Planning, in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA"), the California Department of Transportation ("Caltrans"), San Francisco Redevelopment Agency, other regulatory agencies, and the public will evaluate alternatives that may require the reconstruction of existing infrastructure, construction of new surface roadways, and/or construction of a new bridge over Yosemite Slough on the east side of the project area; and

WHEREAS, The purpose of the Bayview Transportation Improvements Project is to develop a more direct truck route between U.S. Highway 101 and the existing industrial areas

as well as the north and south gates of the redeveloped Hunters Point Shipyard and to reduce truck traffic on Third Street and other residential streets in the Bayview and Hunters Point area; and

WHEREAS, Expenditures for the Bayview Transportation Improvement Project as of August 6, 2007, totaled \$6,0186,911 and included environmental consultant fees, City project management costs, and public outreach costs as follows: \$1,914,357 was paid to the consultant hired for the environmental review phase of this project, who was selected by the Department of Public Works through a competitive process; \$4,142,940 was expended on City staff costs for performing civil engineering, traffic planning, landscape architecture, and project management duties; and \$29,614 was spent on reproduction, mailing, newspaper notices, and facility rentals for public outreach meetings; and

WHEREAS, A total of \$10,505,535 has been budgeted for Environmental Studies, 80 percent of which will be paid for with an existing TEA-21 federal earmark. Construction costs, including right-of-way acquisition, utility relocation and reconstruction, and mitigation costs, are estimated in current dollars at between \$70 and \$120 million, excluding land acquisition, depending on which set of alternatives is selected. Design and construction management costs are estimated to be \$22 to \$32 million, depending on which set of alternatives is selected. Total project costs in 2012 dollars are estimated to be \$180 to \$300 million dollars; and

WHEREAS, Most of the improvements are within existing road rights of way. Any planned improvements would be done to City standards and designed to minimize any maintenance costs and appropriate City departments would maintain all improvements; and

1	WHEREAS, On November 15, 2002, the Mayor signed Board of Supervisors
2	Resolution Number 773-02 to accept and expend \$9,375,000 in federal grant funds to
3	undertake environmental studies for the Bayview Transportation Improvement Project; and
4	WHEREAS, Environmental review began on the Bayview Transportation Improvements
5	Project on November 13, 2003 and expenditures to date are itemized in a letter to the Board
6	from the Department of Public Works dated August 6, 2007, which information is incorporated
7	herein by reference; and,
8	WHEREAS, an Ad Hoc Community Advisory Committee ("BTIP Ad Hoc CAC") was
9	formed to review the project plan, selection criteria and alternatives as well as the outreach
10	plan. The BTIP Ad Hoc CAC membership consists of the Bayview Hunters Point Project Area
11	Committee ("BVHP PAC") Land Use and Transportation Subcommittee, the chair of the BVHP
12	PAC Environment Subcommittee, the chair of the Hunters Point Shipyard Citizens Advisory
13	Committee ("HPS CAC") Planning Committee, and the chair of the HPS CAC Environment
14	and Reuse Committee and has met with the project team over 15 times to date and will
15	continue to meet with project team for review and input on the project; and,
16	WHEREAS, Notices for the project scoping meeting and prescreening workshop were
17	mailed to over 6,500 addresses and were well attended by residents, businesses, youth, and
18	governmental entities; and,
19	WHEREAS, The project team has met with the following individuals and organizations
20	to solicit input, which has been reflected in the development of the project plan and

23	WHEREAS, At the present time, technical studies for traffic, biology, hazardous
24	material, biology, air quality, diesel health risk, noise, water quality, parkland, geotechnical,

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1	community impacts, cultural resources, visual effects, hydraulics, and utility relocations, are
2	complete; and,
3	WHEREAS, These studies need to be reviewed by the Planning Department's Major
4	Environmental Analysis unit in preparation for the consultant's writing of the Draft
5	Environmental Impact Report/Draft Environmental Impact Statement; and,
6	WHEREAS, The project has sufficient budget for the Planning Department to complete
7	this work; and
8	WHEREAS, Funding for the Bayview Transportation Improvement Project's design and
9	construction, including potential business relocation, if required, is expected to be provided
10	through a combination of state and federal sources and from various development projects in
11	the area that will benefit from the Bayview Transportation Improvement Project, including,
12	possibly, the redevelopment of the Hunters Point Shipyard and Candlestick Point.; and
13	WHEREAS, The Bayview Transportation Improvements Project will minimize truck
14	travel time to the planned industrial portion of the redeveloped Hunters Point Shipyard and to
15	the existing South Basin industrial area; and
16	WHEREAS, The Bayview Transportation Improvements Project will reduce conflicts
17	between truck traffic and residential uses and between truck traffic and the new T-Third Street
18	Light Rail Line; and
19	WHEREAS, The Bayview Transportation Improvements project will aid in the economic
20	revitalization of Candlestick Point and Hunters Point Shipyard as well as enhance the
21	economic vitality of the existing industrial areas of the Bayview and will result in job creation;
22	and,
23	WHEREAS, These transportation improvements would help provide access to the
24	integrated development site of Candlestick Point and Hunters Point Shipyard and would be a
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1	part of a game day transportation solution should the San Francisco 49ers lootball transfers
2	choose to build its new stadium in the Shipyard; and,
3	WHEREAS, The project will reduce traffic accidents and injuries, help in reducing
4	diesel emissions and noise in residential neighborhoods, and, through street lighting, improve
5	personal safety; now, therefore, be it
6	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby declare the plan to undertake
7	and implement the Bayview Transportation Improvements Project to be fiscally feasible for the
8	purposes of environmental review under CEQA pursuant to Chapter 29 of the Administrative
9	Code.
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
