

Theater companies holding a license under this subdivision may, subject to 25631, sell and serve alcoholic beverages to ticketholders only during, and two hours prior to and one hour after, a bona fide theater performance of the company.

Proposed Conditions:

- 1) Bona fide theater performances shall be limited to the hours of 12:00 noon to Midnight each day of the week. There shall be no sales, service or consumption of alcoholic beverages after 12 midnight.
- 2) The sales, service and consumption of alcoholic beverages shall include gallery showings, receptions (e.g. weddings, graduation, parties, dances, etc., or anything other than a bona fide theater performance under the control of the theater company.
- 3) The sale of alcoholic beverages off-premises is strictly prohibited.
- 4) Loitering (loitering is defined as "to stand idly about; linger aimlessly without lawful business") is prohibited on any sidewalks or property adjacent to the licensed premises under the control of the licensee.

5) The petitioner shall be responsible for maintaining free of litter the area adjacent to the premises over which they have control.

6) Graffiti shall be removed from the premises and all parking lots under the control of the licensee within seventy-two (72) hours of application. If the graffiti occurs on a Friday or weekend day, or on a holiday, the licensee shall remove the graffiti within seventy-two (72) hours following the beginning of the next weekday.

7) At no time shall the licensee allow a third party promoter to have any control over the marketing, management, operation, or staffing of this theater.

8) No person under the age of 21 shall sell or deliver alcoholic beverages.

Sale of distilled spirits at that hour is not conducive to ^{safe} residential neighborhood. Sale of distilled spirits at 12 am. does not fit with the ^{current} use of the space, performances that generally begin at 8pm and end around 10pm. The application implies a change of use of the space, with increased alcohol consumption later at night.

The residential neighborhood has previously and recently endured extreme disruptions of the peace on a regular basis due to a club, named Whisper, located in the immediate vicinity (500 block of Florida street). Police dealt with continual complaints of disturbance of the peace and vandalism until a shooting finally became the catalyst for its closure. (see attached sfgate.com article).

The density of living spaces in this neighborhood does not fit with a performance space that sells distilled spirits until midnight. The applicant has not proven that the operation will not interfere with the quiet enjoyment of our property. The recent evidence indicates strongly that it would. The previous operator of the facility, Project Artave, Check here if additional sheets attached never applied for a liquor license.

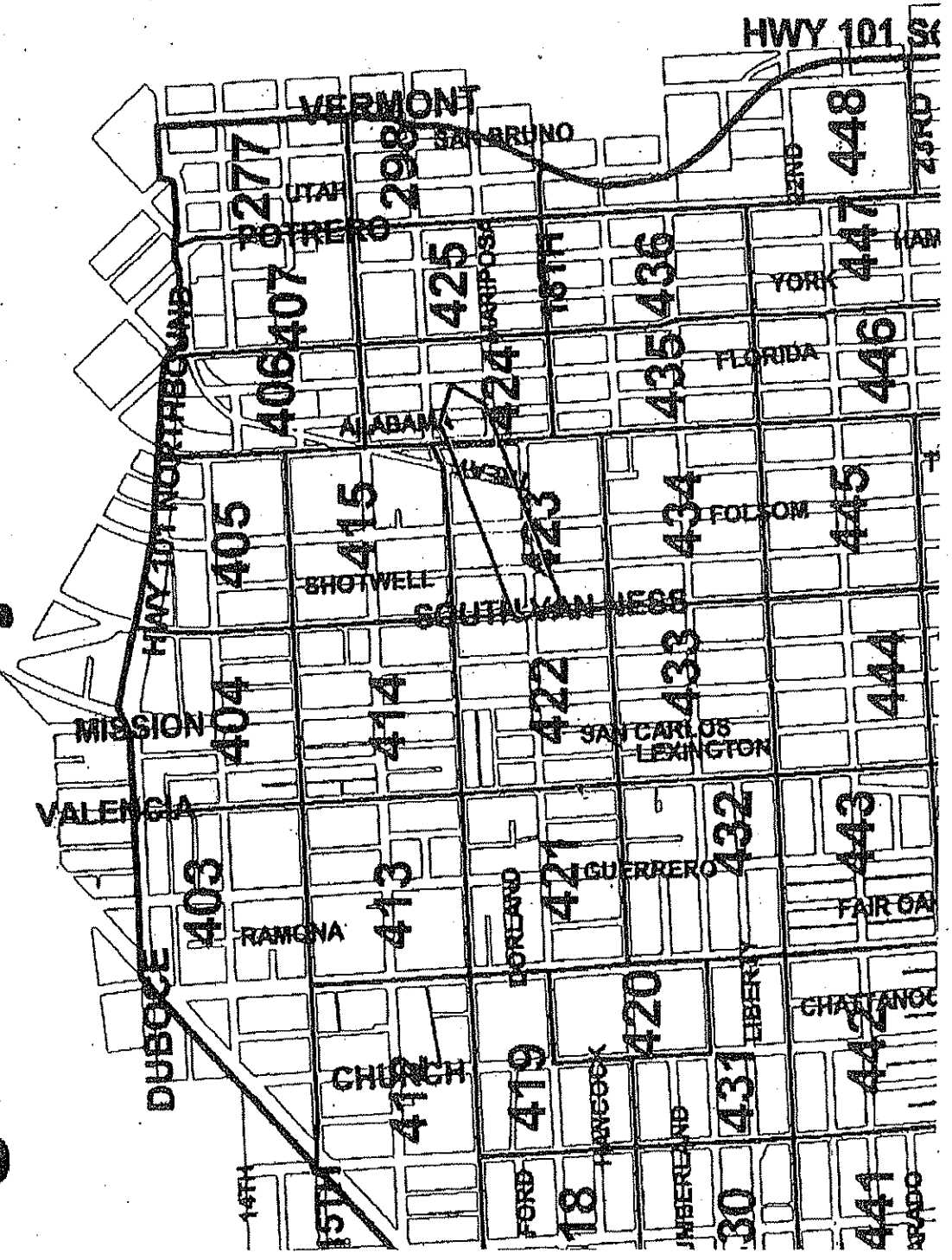

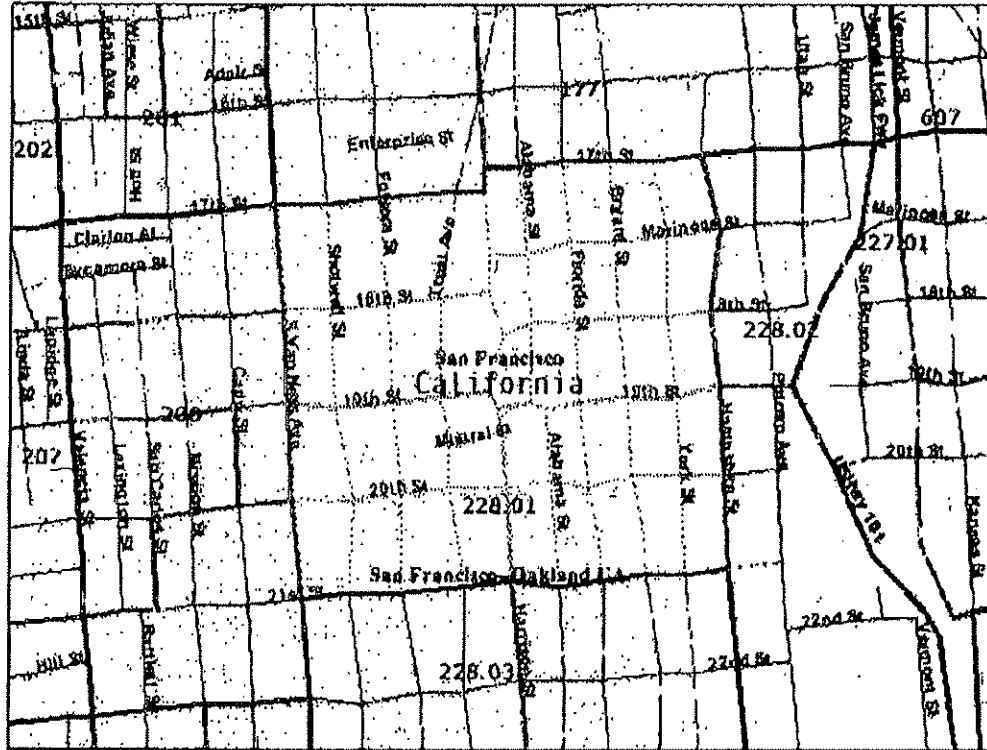
MISSION DISTRICT Major Plots & Major Streets

Dear Board of Supervisors and Public Officials,

I am pleased to write this letter explaining Z Space's application for a **Type 64 General Theater ABC License** and articulating why a license will not only be a public convenience, but also an opportunity for our community to thrive. After over 15 years of developing award-winning theatre in San Francisco, Z Space recently secured a long-term lease at the historic Project Artaud Theatre, where it is now busy reviving the venue as a bustling arts hub; a center that performing artists, visual artists, and patrons can call their home. Our goal is to bring the vibrancy of new voices and new works to the local community and Bay Area by cultivating audiences and artists alike. By enhancing the audience experience with a selection of beverages, Z Space not only secures critical revenue, it contributes to making this community an arts destination.

The Artaud Theatre has a rich thirty-year history of high quality, diverse, and community-enhancing programming that Z Space is proud to carry on. The Artaud Theatre space has hosted performances by high profile performers such as Kronos Quartet and the SFMOMA's presentation of William Kentridge's *The Return of Ulysses*. Z Space not only plans to continue such high quality programming, but also hopes to reach out to local families with our Youth Arts, an arts education program of Z Space that currently engages students of all ages at multiple schools all over the city. Our value to the community is also in our uniquely flexible and affordable venue, which is a highly desired destination for dance, performance art, theatre, and film. With a recently renovated stage and a 268-seat house, Z Space is one of the very few mid sized venues available to the Bay Area's immense number of performing arts groups. To continue and improve the vital programming at this

venue and the opportunities it offers local audiences and performers, Z Space is enthusiastically exploring ways to secure critical revenue.

It is reasonable to ask why an additional ABC license is necessary. After all, our neighborhood is no stranger to crime. However, the audience that Z Space attracts is an economy stimulating audience, not a criminal one. Arts patrons are known to spend money near their intended venues, thereby infusing local businesses with new income. Arts destinations raise the desirability of a neighborhood. We also plan to directly reach out to several local businesses, such as CoffeeBar, Slow Club, and the Bay Area Video Coalition to directly create mutually beneficial alliances.

Z Space is not a bar, it's an arts destination, and it will not generate any more noise or any greater nuisance to the community than the Artaud Theatre has for the last thirty years. Z Space makes explicit limitations with all performances that the building is to be empty by midnight, and most performances end by 10pm. Because our theatre is connected to a building full of live/work spaces, each performance must operate under a strict decibel level limit. These regulations and more demonstrate that we are a community conscious organization.

At Z Space, we believe that art enables a community to thrive. Therefore our job is to maximize the satisfaction of our patrons and provide the highest quality art to as many people as possible. Though lofty in our goals, Z Space is still a non-profit business that must support itself. Selling alcoholic beverages at our performances would not only enhance the experience of our patrons, but could become a critical source of revenue for space maintenance and improvement.

For these reasons, Z Space requests that the Board of Supervisors give their approval of our request for an ABC license. We would be happy to discuss any community concerns or conditions by law enforcement officials. In fact, I would be happy to provide an intimate tour of our facilities at request, and would like to formally invite each Supervisor to the fantastic performances coming soon to our space.

Students Act Out

Any performance can be challenging, but performing a poem or short story exactly as it is written, including narration and description, can be even more difficult. Regardless, MVMS eighth graders participating in this year's Word for Word workshop seemed to be having a great time.

Every year since 2002, instructors from Word for Word have been bringing their unique style of acting to MVMS students. "Word for Word believes in the power of the short story to provide solace, compassion, and insight into our daily lives," said Valerie Weak, Administrator for the Word for Word Youth Arts Program. "Our goal is to excite students about reading and about literature."

Started in 1993, the San Francisco-based theater company uses every word originally written by the author in its performances, rather than just the dialogue. About ten schools take part in the workshops. Two-to-three schools perform a full production each year. "We work with students as young as third grade, and also go to high schools, and sometimes colleges such as Stanford University with our programs," said Weak.

"I like Word for Word," said eighth-grader Paula Venables. "It's fun. We get to do it in class with people that maybe we wouldn't normally be acting with."

Eighth-grade teacher Ms. Manwaring pointed out the academic benefits of the program. "Reading and interpreting literature is often such a stationary endeavor; it's all in our brains," she said. "This program is exciting because it calls upon our

MVMS Dances into 2010

Dance fever struck Mill Valley Middle School this year as students learned to dance the electric slide, swing and other dances, all leading up to a big finale.

The school began using the dance program in June 2009. Students were taught several dances by Cynthia Glinka, a dance coach, choreographer and founder of both ReJuve Dance and Manners in Motion. She began her career tap dancing through the streets of San Francisco with a group known as Rosy Radiator and the Pushrods. She is now a private dance coach, teaching people how to get active in fun ways, sticking to her slogan, "If you can walk, you can dance."

In a typical session, students play a game or two, participate in acting exercises, and run through different aspects of the scripts. The scripts are poems or short stories that have been selected by Word for Word. "We look for pieces that have enough roles for the group of students that are do-

ing the workshop, pieces that tell a whole story in a very short period of time, and pieces that are at an appropriate reading level for the students we're working with," said Weak.

Assign Yourself Makes the Grade

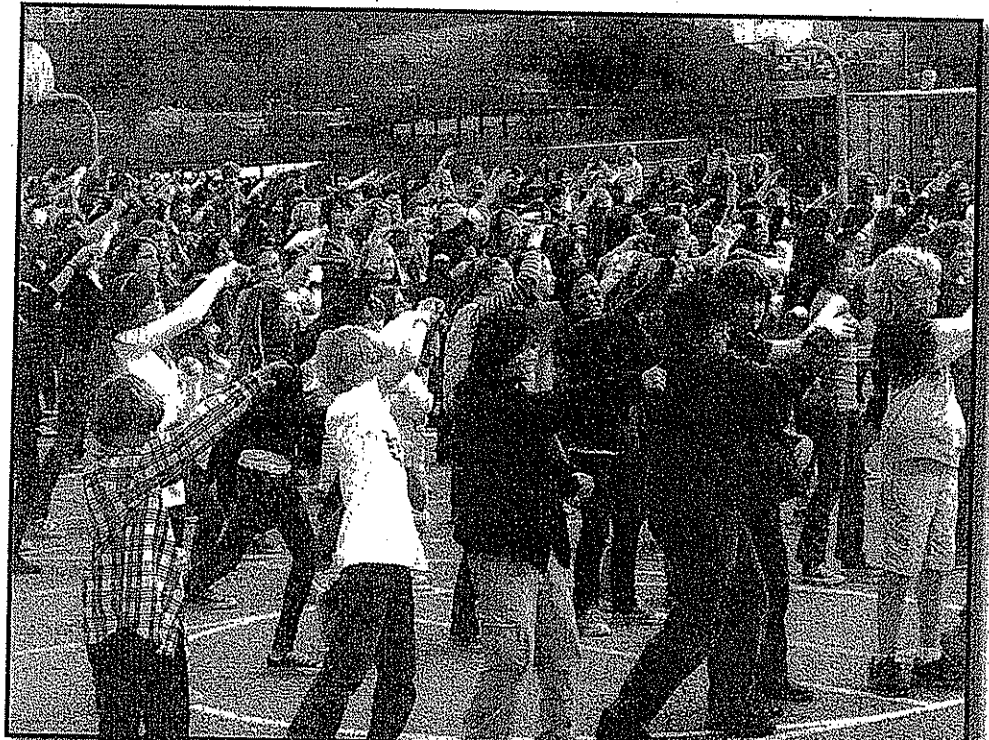

Who says homework can't be fun, especially when you get to assign it to yourself?

Each trimester, eighth grade students complete an Assign Yourself project in science. Students get to pick a topic related to science that interests them, then conduct an experiment or engineer something. They get the whole trimester to work on it and eventually, they bring it to school and do a presentation.

All the hard work pays off when students get to show off their projects. According to science teacher Ms. Downing, these projects let kids research things that they are passionate about. They also get to see the relevance of science and have fun while doing it.

John used his trebuchet to launch tennis balls. At first, the trebuchet could only launch the tennis balls about 50 feet. After making some changes, John got it to shoot 200 feet. John said the "natural high you get when you watch the trebuchet launch" inspired him to push himself to make it shoot farther.

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Z Space takes over Artaud

Theater Artaud, one of San Francisco's primary if now under-used venues for alternative performances, is about to become a more active site once again. So says **Lisa Steindler**, artistic director of **Z Space**, who announced Tuesday that Z, a major developer of new plays and playwrights, has signed a 10-year-lease for the iconic 286-seat theater.

The agreement will not only give Z its first home in its two-decade history, for its own productions and those of its noted **Word for Word** performance company, but also will allow it "to curate a multidisciplinary presenting program" of theater, dance and multimedia arts, the announcement says. Upcoming events already scheduled include a program of Word for Word staged readings Aug. 31 and a full production of **Anne Galjour's** new play, "You Can't Get There From Here," Sept. 10-27.

new lease that runs through the end of 2013. "So we are very well situated, and quite relieved," she adds.

Thick House: Thick Description is giving up the lease on Thick House at the end of 2009, and the company officially went on hiatus after its August revival of Octavio Solis's *El Otro*. Asian American Theater Company, Black Box Theatre and Golden Thread Productions have shows in the Thick House for the rest of the year, but any company looking to rent the House in 2010 should talk to ArtHouse, the landlord.

New Langton Arts: The small white box on Folsom Street in San Francisco closed its doors in August. Thunderbird Theatre Company seemed to be the only theatre company that rented the space consistently, but even it moved up to Exit Theatre this year.

Exit Theatre: With demand high for its other three spaces—and with Cutting Ball in residence at the fourth space—Exit Theatre has signed a low-cost, 30-year lease on the space across the hall from Exit Café with plans to turn it into Exit Studio (49 seats) and Exit Green Room for classes, rehearsals and receptions. It will also create a new administrative office, converting the existing office into a tech workroom. At press time, it was already renting the space for rehearsals.

Theatre Rhinoceros: The

lack of a lease plus skyrocketing rent was finally enough for Theatre Rhino. In August the company left its 16th Street space and is looking for a permanent home. It's moved its offices to ArtHouse and will perform some of its

shows at Eureka Theatre and other locations.

Intersection for the Arts:

The Mission District-based Intersection for the Arts received roughly \$1 million from The Hewlett Founda-

tion to seek a new space. While unconfirmed reports suggested it was looking at the now-vacant New College space on Valencia Street, at press time the company had nothing specific to report. ■

Z Space

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN ITS 16-YEAR HISTORY, Z SPACE HAS ITS OWN THEATRE SPACE, specifically the 286-seat Theater Artaud. In August, the company signed a 10-year lease on the iconic space. I stopped by the theatre one August afternoon just a couple of weeks after the company moved in, and it was bustling. Staffers were painting the lobby walls white to create a gallery space with thoughts of partnering with California College of Arts and other schools to curate art. Anne Galjour was sitting onstage reading aloud from her new play that opened in September. Word for Word as well as Golden Thread had set up office space. Just a week before, Kronos Quartet was onstage doing some recording, and playwrights Peter Nachtrieb and Steve Yockey had stopped by to do some writing.

"Z Space is where the real cross-pollination of the disciplines happen," says artistic director Lisa Steindler. "We're focusing on new work and emerging artists. The word 'incubator' comes up a lot."

She plans on programming 25 weeks of the year and filling in the rest with outside curating handled by managing director David Szlasa, who will work closely with the artistic community. Among the some 10 projects in the pipeline are a Mark Jackson/Adam Bock

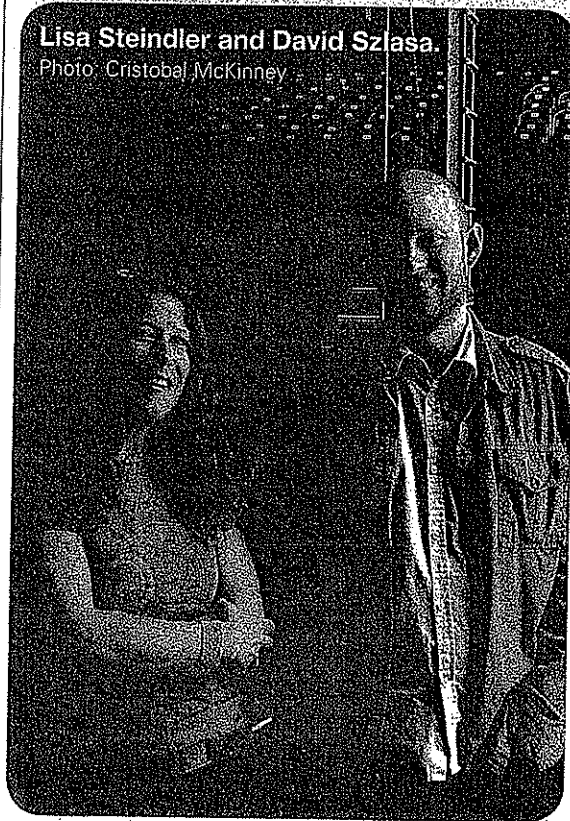
collaboration that will involve dancers from San Francisco Ballet, a new Steve Yockey play, as well as new plays by Lucy Thurber, Mando Alvarado and Annie Baker. She's also working on a "sister theatre" arrangement with New York's Rattlestick Playwrights Theater. Jane Prowse's *Round-Heeled Woman* hits the boards in January featuring Emmy Award winner Sharon Gless, directed by Chris Smith.

"I'm not into the pressure of presenting a season," says Steindler. "I'd rather do two good plays than eight mediocre ones."

Steindler came to Z Space in 2005 and took over the executive director role two years ago. Today the company is nearly debt-free and ready to expand its mission and operations to fill its new home. She says, "I feel like I worked my whole life to be in this moment in this place." —Karen McKevitt
