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6	WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, Mayor London Breed proclaimed a state of
7	emergency in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and on March 3, 2020, the Board of
8	Supervisors concurred in the February 25 Proclamation; and
9	WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the County Health Officer issued Order No. C19-07,
10	replaced by Order No. C19-07b on March 31, 2020, extended and replaced by Order No.
11	C19-07c on April 29, 2020, directing San Franciscans to stay in their homes and follow social
12	distancing requirements when outside the home; and
13	WHEREAS, On April 30, 2020, Mayor London N. Breed issued the Eighth Supplement
14	to the Emergency Proclamation, providing that City policy bodies may not hold public
15	meetings from March 18 through May 31, 2020 unless the Board of Supervisors, acting by
16	written motion, or the Mayor or the Mayor's designee directs otherwise, based on a
17	determination that a policy body has an urgent need to take action to ensure public health,
18	safety, or essential government operations; and
19	WHEREAS, The Police Commission performs multiple essential governmental
20	operations, including setting policy for the Police Department, conducting disciplinary hearings
21	on charges of police misconduct filed by the Chief of Police or Director of the Office of Citizen
22	Complaints, imposing discipline in such cases as warranted and hearing police officers'
23	appeals from discipline imposed by the Chief of Police; and
24	WHEREAS, Since the issuance of the Eighth Supplement to the Emergency
25	Proclamation, several incidents involving the San Francisco Police Department and posing

	potential dangers to public health and safety have occurred that, were the Police Commission
2	permitted to continue meeting on a consistent weekly basis, would have been addressed in
3	the commission's regular course of dealings; and

WHEREAS, These incidents include but are not limited to (1) the release of a study, requested by Board of Supervisors President Norman Yee and performed by Matrix Consulting Group regarding police staffing; (2) the controversial use of "Thin Blue Line" masks, featuring a black and white American flag with a blue line across the middle and associated with the "Blue Lives Matter" counter-protest movement, by officers responding to a housing protest in the Castro; (3) the shooting of an individual by multiple officers including an as of yet unnamed off-duty officer; and (4) the arrest of an SFPD officer on suspicion of two felony counts of rape and domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, Amidst a state of emergency due to COVID-19, many San Francisco residents have questions and concerns regarding public safety, emergency rules, resources, response times and any changes to police protocols, and the opportunity to raise such questions and concerns at a public hearing is essential; now, therefore, be it

MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors determines that the Police Commission has an urgent need to resume meetings to ensure public health, safety, or essential government operations; and, be it

FURTHER MOVED, That the Police Commission is authorized to hold public meetings on a regular weekly basis, provided that such meetings occur by teleconference or other electronic means without providing a physical meeting place, and the Commission complies with all applicable rules under the Sunshine Ordinance and the Brown Act governing meetings of policy bodies, as those rules may be amended by Mayoral or Executive Order during the COVID-19 emergency.
