I am writing as a resident of SOMA Grand, a 250 unit condo building between 7th & 8th, and also a member of the Mid Market CBD, Better Market Street CAC 7 Mayor's DMACC.

Our neighborhood has been transformed from a vibrant, centrally located, walkable place in 2007 to a nightmare of sick people passed out on our sidewalks, where we have to step around bodies and human waste and are afraid to walk alone in 2022.

One thing that has improved our personal safety and well being is the presence of Urban Alchemy practitioners. I cannot express strongly enough how important the presence of strong, focused, well organized and trained men and women are to our quality of life. I am a Senior female who walks everywhere and I fell confident when I see an Urban Alchemy presence on every corner.

I am writing to express urgent concern and request that you please place the following item before the Budget and Finance Committee no later than November 20th. This item, which was introduced to the Board of Supervisors and recommended to the committee on October 8th, is critical for the continued success of vital services in our community.

The contract amendment in question pertains to funds that were:

1. **Already approved** by the Budget and Appropriations Committee in June 2024 as part of the city's budget process to maintain the core deployment of this program.
2. **Additional funding** provided by city departments (HSH/DPH/HSA/OEWD) for program expansions, including efforts on the 600 block of Ellis, Willow Alley, and Market Street evening hours between 5th and 7th Streets.

In good faith, the Mid Market Foundation and Urban Alchemy have maintained the core deployment since July 2024 and began the noted expansions in October 2024.

Failure to hear and approve this item by November 20th will cause significant delays in funding and will force the Mid Market Foundation to immediately cut the program by more than half. This will lead to the layoff of up to **150 Urban Alchemy ambassadors**, who play an integral role in maintaining safety and services within our community.

This program has had an overwhelmingly positive impact on the Mid Market neighborhood, supporting the safety and well-being of residents and businesses alike. A sudden withdrawal of funding would be devastating, especially to the predominantly African American workforce of Urban Alchemy, whose members are dedicated to saving lives and supporting our community every day.

Furthermore, this budget cut will not only affect Urban Alchemy but also have a direct impact on **Code Tenderloins ambassadors**, who work in and around the Mid Market area through a subcontract with Urban Alchemy. This collaboration enables **Code Tenderloin** to serve as a daytime, real-time extension of our **Night**

Navigator program, which helps connect individuals to critical resources which can save lives such as Suboxone and Buprenorphine for folks who are in a pre-contemplative and contemplation stage(s) of recovery yet still finding themselves subject to Substance Use Disorder. We also work towards getting residents to sober living situations such as **Positive Directions**. Without continued funding, our ability to provide these essential services will be severely compromised.

We implore you to prioritize the timely review and approval of this contract amendment to prevent these cuts and protect the vital services that are keeping our community safe and supported.

Thank you for your attention to this urgent matter. I look forward to your prompt action and support.

Just weeks before Urban Alchemy was allowed to send staff into Mint Plaza, a vagrant stabbed a member of the cleaning crew from a neighboring agency: that workers blood soaked the pavement just a few feet from the entrance of my residence in Mint Plaza Just a few weeks ago, the police chased and killed a man who flashed a gun at passersby near Mint Plaza and as he made his escape, he terrorized guest at a restaurant in the Plaza before being pursued in the nearby train station on 5th & Market.

Since the Supreme Court decision regarding homelessness & the Governor & former Mayors actions to criminalize homelessness, there has been an influx of unhoused persons living on Jessie & Stevenson Streets. The issue is so significant that the owners of the old 5th Avenue building on 5th & Market utilize a bull horn to discourage vagrants from standing near their property. They use this bull horn all hours of the day and night disturbing the peace of the neighbors in Mint Plaza.

SFPD has been helpful and appears to be present more often during the overnight hours when Urban Alchemy's contracted hours end. At night the police horns can be heard in the late hours of the evening and overnight hours moving the unhoused from Stevenson and Jessie.

We certainly need the city to devise a longer term plan to house the homeless and increase treatment facilities for the severely mentally ill and substance users but until then, the city has an obligation to keep tax payers safe. I'm

respectfully asking the city to fund Urban Alchemy and the other teams that help keep the neighborhood safe and clean.

While I have not received a reply — disappointing as a resident and tax payer and property owner in the city affected by the issue I've described, as I live at 960 Market, a residential condo of over 200 units — I wanted to follow up to emphasize the significance of this issue to many residents and nearby businesses.

The downtown and mid market story has been long discussed. It's has deteriorated in the two years that I and others have lived and invested in this community as home owners, and as businesses - new and established - seek to thrive.

One bright spot has been the recent change that brought Ambassadors to Market between 5th and 6th, including - crucially - at night. This has created greater support for residents and businesses, enhanced perceptions of safety and wellness (and those perceptions are reinforced by tangible changes since early October).

Just as these changes are taking root, we have learned that the rug is potentially being pulled out. This is beyond dispiriting and creates an impression that leaders with the ability to affect or just sustain positive change are simply unwilling to do so or don't care about the neighborhoods at issue.

Budgets and finances are challenging. But when a relatively modest cost is showing actual impact and progress in a part of the city that is all too often the poster child of what is wrong with the city, stomping out the impact and positive directional change for bureaucratic reasons is beyond what reasonable residents and businesses should have to bear. The effect on the actual ambassador is also a material consequence — firing people getting a second chance in many cases who are doing important on the ground work

Please do the right thing and invest in something that is actually doing good for the people trying to invest in and safely live in this city and for businesses that are trying to thrive.

I and many in the community who are aware of my outreach look forward to hearing from you and learning that you'll be doing the right thing by constituents. I also would expect the recent supervisors for this immediate area to weigh in as well (Dorsey, Preston); Sup Dorsey has in particular been previously helpfully engaged on this

I am writing as a representative of UC Law San Francisco and a Board member of the Mid-Market Business Association to express my deep concern that the Budget and Finance Committee has not yet heard the Urban Alchemy (“UA”) contract amendment. I am writing today to request that you agendize this item for the next Budget & Finance Committee meeting on December 4th to ensure the continued safety of the Tenderloin/Mid-Market neighborhoods while also preventing the unnecessary termination of UA practitioners.

My understanding is that this item was introduced to the Board of Supervisors and recommended to the committee on October 8th. This contract amendment represents funds that were already approved at the budget and appropriations committee in June of 2024 during the city's budget process to maintain the program at its core deployment along with additional funding by city departments (HSH/DPH/HSA/OEWD) for expansions to the program on the 600 block of Ellis and Willow Alley and Market Street evening hours between 5th and 7th Streets. The Mid-Market Foundation and Urban Alchemy have maintained the core deployment since July of 2024 and began the noted expansion areas in October 2024 in reliance upon these understandings from the City.



Dear Supervisors,

Urban Alchemy practitioners are an integral part of the public safety network we have built in the downtown core. Their contribution is working and the City should move quickly to preserve it. Downtown is the current face of San Francisco.

Without a high level of support from Urban Alchemy the current multi-agency network providing a 'proactive' approach to public safety for our downtown will suffer. While the number of ambassador groups working downtown to achieve shared goals may seem excessive, each has different mandates and capabilities, and we still need more.

A compelling example of this was when an elderly Asian woman was attacked at 8th and Market Street. It took personnel from three different public safety teams to provide the assistance needed before City personnel could respond:

- A **CBD Ambassador** first witnessed a man violently confronting a woman, but did not have the training or authority to intervene.
- He quickly alerted a nearby **Urban Alchemy Practitioner** who was trained and permitted to engage in volatile situations in need of de-escalation.
- Unfortunately, the man attacked the woman and the Urban Alchemy practitioner had reached his permitted level of engagement; he then turned to a nearby **Private Security Guard** who had the training, authority, and equipment to physically restrain the assailant.
- While the Private Security Guard physically restrained the assailant, the CBD Ambassador called 911 and stayed with the victim; the Urban Alchemy Practitioner calmed the large and agitated group of witnesses that had formed, keeping them away from both victim and assailant until paramedics and law enforcement officers arrived on the scene.

Neither public or private public safety personnel can, nor should, go it alone. Hence the herculean effort organizations like ours and Urban Alchemy have made to partner with and support our fellow public safety providers.

Transit portals are also safer with Urban Alchemy's presence. This improves the use of public transportation by all, including theater patrons arriving downtown via MUNI and BART, hotel guests arriving from nearby airports, and downtown workers – many of whom work at City, State and Federal office buildings in and around City Hall.

Urban Alchemy Practitioners also manage the beloved dog park in UN Plaza, the Heart of the City Farmers' Market, and the playgrounds in Civic Center Plaza.

Please keep our current public safety network whole by supporting Urban Alchemy staffing to the greatest extent possible.

To ensure public transparency, we wanted to provide the following corrections to statements made by District One Supervisor Connie Chan and reported in the press about the Mid-Market/Tenderloin Community Based Safety Program and Urban Alchemy.

Budget Allocation Claims

FALSE: Board of Supervisors budget chair Connie Chan argues that Urban Alchemy was allocated \$16 million in June for the year; she doesn't want to "give more money without seeing performance metrics or hearing an explanation of why it is overspending."

- **This required an amendment to the Mid-Market Foundation's contract with the City**

My brother, Chip, and I have owned and managed the Phoenix Hotel and its various restaurants at Larkin & Eddy Streets since the mid-1980's. I worked at the front desk from 1991-1993, often manning the 3-11pm shift with no other hotel staff members on site in the evenings. No doubt, the neighborhood was gritty even then, but I never felt unsafe and I always recommended that my friends visiting the City stay at the Phoenix Hotel. Cut to the past 5-7 years, and the issues of the TL have made running a hotel and restaurant at this location untenable. It is no longer a secure neighborhood and I NEVER recommend the hotel to friends/family, out of concern for their safety. Despite many creative efforts to breathe life into these iconic businesses by our partners Isabel Manchester and Jamie Flanagan (and our amazing staff), both the hotel and restaurant continue to lose money because tourists have no interest in staying and locals have no interest in dining in the Tenderloin. We are seriously considering walking away from the businesses when the lease expires in less than a year.

But we have very recently begun seeing signs of hope in the neighborhood. Over the past decade, when the sidewalk in front of the hotel was occasionally cleaned up, it was always just a matter of a short time before it filled up again with tents, dealers, needles and human feces. But over the past 6-10 months, the sidewalks have been cleaned up and have generally remained clean. The area looks and feels safer on a consistent basis. I've noticed when walking in the TL and Civic Center areas that the extreme sense of doom has lifted and I have a number of friends and co-workers who've told me they've experienced the same thing.

These recent improvements aren't a coincidence and they aren't luck. No neighborhood as challenged as the Tenderloin makes marked improvement without intention and resources. This is how I know that the Mid-Market/Tenderloin Community Based Safety Program is working. To pull or even decrease the funding for this program will have devastating consequences to the thousands of people who live, work and visit the area.

Dear Honorable Supervisors Chan, Mandelman, Melgar, Walton, and Peskin,

I am writing to both urge the allocation of the previously approved additional funding for Urban Alchemy and to counter claims made by Supervisor and Budget Committee Chair Chan that question the effectiveness of Urban Alchemy in addressing the profound social challenges playing out in the streets of the Tenderloin and Mid Market. Compromising Urban Alchemy's ability to operate in this area would be a an act of reckless negligence. More importantly, it ignores a clear and recent precedent of the negative social, economic and political implications of reducing Urban Alchemy's oversight of our challenged public spaces.

Who Am I and Why Should My Opinion Matter?

I am a fourth-generation SF-native and purchased 537 Stevenson Street in 1999. I have been deeply engaged in efforts to elevate the neighborhood and have worked with a wide variety of city agencies over the past 25 years, including the SFPD, SFPW, SPUR, SFPUC, DPH, SF Aids Foundation, OEWD, the MMBA, Five Keys, the MMCBD & CCCBD, SF HOT, MOHCD and various non-profit organizations in the neighborhood. I founded the Stevenson Street 500 Block Health & Safety Group, The Friends of Stevenson Street, authored a monthly neighborhood newsletter and washed a large swath of the block's sidewalks and streets daily with my 300 foot hose. I was instrumental in getting the lanterns hung between the skybridge and 6th and ran lunchtime and night concerts on the block for five years, heavily attended during Covid and known as the 'Skybridge on Stevenson' hip hop dance and music series. I earned the moniker 'The Mayor of Stevenson Street' for my tireless advocacy in the neighborhood. This experience has given me unique insight into the challenges we face and has allowed me to work with nearly every organization and agency in the area that is actively trying to address them.

Mid Market and the TL are where the horrors of economic inequality, racism and a new wave lethally-addictive drugs intersect and the implications play out with particular effect on the 500 block of Stevenson. I have found people dead at 10am from fentanyl overdoses. I and many I work with have been randomly attacked in broad daylight. I have lost many tenants due to the street conditions and repeated robberies. I have watched local residents struggle to find any respite outdoors. Due to the unique concentration of drug use and loitering on the 500 block of Stevenson, it was used as an early test-case to determine if UA could have the same impact on the general urban landscape as they had in areas designated for a specific use, such as a school, playground, landmark or other specific use. The impact was dramatic and

immediate. I watched their ambassadors skillfully approach, engage and diffuse a variety of highly disruptive and potentially violent individuals. Having done this work informally for years, I know how stressful, difficult and dangerous it can be, but the level of deep presence and effective communication displayed by the UA Ambassadors was unlike anything I have witnessed from other community engagement organizations. Having worked with every community ambassador program, law enforcement effort and harm-reduction group in the area, I seriously question Supervisor Chan's motivation and source of data to question UA's effectiveness.

In my 25 years working in this community, Urban Alchemy is the only agency or organization in the city with the vision, mandate, skill, culture and training to effectively address these complex issues.

My lived experience aside, to my knowledge, no other program has been studied as rigorously as Urban Alchemy was in Stanford's recent research effort, lead by Dr. Forrest Stuart, Professor of Sociology and Director of the Ethnography Lab at Stanford. Dr. Stuart was embedded with UA staff for six months and used **city data** to show that the presence of UA has a significant and positive impact on virtually every measurable factor relevant to improving street experience. What data or study is Supervisor Chan citing? What group or organization has the leadership, culture, vision and results that have been repeatedly demonstrated by Urban Alchemy and its founder, Dr. Lena Miller? As an engaged member of this community with decades of hands-on experience working to elevate the experience for everyone here, I am simply baffled by the Supervisor's false and misleading statements aimed to discredit the only demonstrably effective resource available to the city.

What The Budget Committee Can Learn from Emily Cohen

Luckily, Supervisor Chan's uninformed efforts have a recent precedent in Emily Cohen of the Office of Homelessness and Supportive Housing. Cohen, clearly influenced by the Coalition On Homelessness, chose to transfer the city clinic management contract on our block from UA to Five Keys to appease COH interests. Conditions collapsed immediately under Five Keys and we saw stabbings, robberies, dealing, drug use, loitering and encampments return over night. After a year of sustained neighborhood outcry of residents, businesses and upper management at ECS itself, Ms. Cohen was compelled to rehire UA, who immediately reestablished safe conditions on the block.

The neighborhood outcry on our block sparked by the damaging effect of reducing UA's coverage should serve as clear warnings of the social and economic impacts and political backlash for Budget Committee members who follow Supervisor Chan's misguided lead.

If you understand the complexity of what's happening on our neighborhood streets and you understand the critical roles that the Tenderloin and Mid Market play in people's experience of the city, you will vote with urgency to continue to fund and support Urban Alchemy. The city's ability to navigate this massive civic challenge rests largely on the abilities of this organization. Defunding Urban Alchemy is

defunding our hope for a better San Francisco.



Dear Honorable Supervisors Chan, Mandelman, Melgar, Walton, and Peskin,

I am writing to both urge the allocation of the previously approved additional funding for Urban Alchemy and to counter claims made by Supervisor and Budget Committee Chair Chan that question the effectiveness of Urban Alchemy in addressing the profound social challenges playing out in the streets of the Tenderloin and Mid Market. Compromising Urban Alchemy's ability to operate in this area would be a an act of reckless negligence. More importantly, it ignores a clear and recent precedent of the negative social, economic and political implications of reducing Urban Alchemy's oversight of our challenged public spaces.

Who Am I and Why Should My Opinion Matter?

I am a fourth-generation SF-native and purchased 537 Stevenson Street in 1999. I have been deeply engaged in efforts to elevate the neighborhood and have worked with a wide variety of city agencies over the past 25 years, including the SFPD, SFPW, SPUR, SFPUC, DPH, SF Aids Foundation, OEWD, the MMBA, Five Keys, the MMCBD & CCCBD, SF HOT, MOHCD and various non-profit organizations in the neighborhood. I founded the Stevenson Street 500 Block Health & Safety Group, The Friends of Stevenson Street, authored a monthly neighborhood newsletter and washed a large swath of the block's sidewalks and streets daily with my 300 foot hose. I was instrumental in getting the lanterns hung between the skybridge and 6th and ran lunchtime and night concerts on the block for five years, heavily attended during Covid and known as the 'Skybridge on Stevenson' hip hop dance and music series. I earned the moniker 'The Mayor of Stevenson Street' for my tireless advocacy in the neighborhood. This experience has given me unique insight into the challenges we face and has allowed me to work with nearly every organization and agency in the area that is actively trying to address them.

Mid Market and the TL are where the horrors of economic inequality, racism and a new wave lethally-addictive drugs intersect and the implications play out with particular effect on the 500 block of Stevenson. I have found people dead at 10am from fentanyl overdoses. I and many I work with have been randomly attacked in broad daylight. I have lost many tenants due to the street conditions and repeated robberies. I have watched local residents struggle to find any respite outdoors. Due to the unique concentration of drug use and loitering on the 500 block of Stevenson, it was used as an early test-case to determine if UA could have the same impact on the general urban landscape as they had in areas designated for a specific use, such as a school, playground, landmark or other specific use. The impact was dramatic and

immediate. I watched their ambassadors skillfully approach, engage and diffuse a variety of highly disruptive and potentially violent individuals. Having done this work informally for years, I know how stressful, difficult and dangerous it can be, but the level of deep presence and effective communication displayed by the UA Ambassadors was unlike anything I have witnessed from other community engagement organizations. Having worked with every community ambassador program, law enforcement effort and harm-reduction group in the area, I seriously question Supervisor Chan's motivation and source of data to question UA's effectiveness.

In my 25 years working in this community, Urban Alchemy is the only agency or organization in the city with the vision, mandate, skill, culture and training to effectively address these complex issues.

My lived experience aside, to my knowledge, no other program has been studied as rigorously as Urban Alchemy was in Stanford's recent research effort, lead by Dr. Forrest Stuart, Professor of Sociology and Director of the Ethnography Lab at Stanford. Dr. Stuart was embedded with UA staff for six months and used **city data** to show that the presence of UA has a significant and positive impact on virtually every measurable factor relevant to improving street experience. What data or study is Supervisor Chan citing? What group or organization has the leadership, culture, vision and results that have been repeatedly demonstrated by Urban Alchemy and its founder, Dr. Lena Miller? As an engaged member of this community with decades of hands-on experience working to elevate the experience for everyone here, I am simply baffled by the Supervisor's false and misleading statements aimed to discredit the only demonstrably effective resource available to the city.

What The Budget Committee Can Learn from Emily Cohen

Luckily, Supervisor Chan's uninformed efforts have a recent precedent in Emily Cohen of the Office of Homelessness and Supportive Housing. Cohen, clearly influenced by the Coalition On Homelessness, chose to transfer the city clinic management contract on our block from UA to Five Keys to appease COH interests. Conditions collapsed immediately under Five Keys and we saw stabbings, robberies, dealing, drug use, loitering and encampments return over night. After a year of sustained neighborhood outcry of residents, businesses and upper management at ECS itself, Ms. Cohen was compelled to rehire UA, who immediately reestablished safe conditions on the block.

The neighborhood outcry on our block sparked by the damaging effect of reducing UA's coverage should serve as clear warnings of the social and economic impacts and political backlash for Budget Committee members who follow Supervisor Chan's misguided lead.

If you understand the complexity of what's happening on our neighborhood streets and you understand the critical roles that the Tenderloin and Mid Market play in people's experience of the city, you will vote with urgency to continue to fund and support Urban Alchemy. The city's ability to navigate this massive civic challenge rests largely on the abilities of this organization. Defunding Urban Alchemy is

defunding our hope for a better San Francisco.

My brother, Chip, and I have owned and managed the Phoenix Hotel and its various restaurants at Larkin & Eddy Streets since the mid-1980's. I worked at the front desk from 1991-1993, often manning the 3-11pm shift with no other hotel staff members on site in the evenings. No doubt, the neighborhood was gritty even then, but I never felt unsafe and I always recommended that my friends visiting the City stay at the Phoenix Hotel. Cut to the past 5-7 years, and the issues of the TL have made running a hotel and restaurant at this location untenable. It is no longer a secure neighborhood and I NEVER recommend the hotel to friends/family, out of concern for their safety. Despite many creative efforts to breathe life into these iconic businesses by our partners Isabel Manchester and Jamie Flanagan (and our amazing staff), both the hotel and restaurant continue to lose money because tourists have no interest in staying and locals have no interest in dining in the Tenderloin. We are seriously considering walking away from the businesses when the lease expires in less than a year.

But we have very recently begun seeing signs of hope in the neighborhood. Over the past decade, when the sidewalk in front of the hotel was occasionally cleaned up, it was always just a matter of a short time before it filled up again with tents, dealers, needles and human feces. But over the past 6-10 months, the sidewalks have been cleaned up and have generally remained clean. The area looks and feels safer on a consistent basis. This is how I know that the Mid-Market/Tenderloin Community Based Safety Program is working. To pull or even decrease the funding for this program will have devastating consequences to the thousands of people who live, work and visit the area.

Please don't allow these improvements to lose momentum at this critical time. The

innovative approaches of this program have created a model of community safety that works.
