



RESOLUTION 2011-01

RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AUTHORIZE THE SAN FRANCISCO FIRE DEPARTMENT TO RETROACTIVELY ACCEPT AND EXPEND A GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$107,296 FROM THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY TO PURCHASE AND INSTALL SEVEN COMMERCIAL WASHER EXTRACTORS.

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) responds to over 100,000 incidents each year, including fires, vehicle accidents, and medical and other emergencies; and,

WHEREAS, SFFD employees wear protective clothing and equipment when responding to incidents to protect against potential exposure to toxins, contaminants, poisons, biohazards, and fluids; and

WHEREAS, At fires and other emergency scenes, SFFD employees' protective clothing may be soiled and may contain toxins, contaminants, poisons, biohazards, and fluids; and,

WHEREAS, Effectively decontaminating SFFD employees' protective clothing may protect employees from possible exposure to those toxins, contaminants, poisons, biohazards, and fluids; and,

WHEREAS, The addition of seven washer extractors would compliment the San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation gift to SFFD of five washer extractors in August of 2010; and,

WHEREAS, The SFFD applied for and was awarded a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant in the amount of \$107,296 for the purchase and installation of seven washer extractors at SFFD fire stations ; and,

WHEREAS, The grant requires the City to provide matching funds worth 20 percent of the total award, or \$26,824; and,

WHEREAS, the FEMA grant requires SFFD to purchase the seven commercial washer extractors by January 16, 2012; and

WHEREAS, The SFFD wishes to accept and expend the grant, to support and promote the health and safety of its members; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Fire Commission recommends that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Fire Department to retroactively accept and expend a grant from FEMA in the amount of \$107,296 to purchase seven washer-extractors and to have them installed in Department fire stations.

Project Description and Budget

San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) Firefighter Larry Murray died of bladder cancer. He committed 30 years of service working for the SFFD. Firefighter Murray was the pump operator of SFFD's Engine 3, the busiest engine company in San Francisco. He stood at the pump panel many hours throughout his career unknowingly inhaling diesel fumes while pumping water to his fellow Firefighters. Firefighter Murray did not die a heroic death in a fire, but silently – and as a hero dedicated to saving the lives of others.

This heartbreaking story is becoming all too common among Firefighters who chose to pursue a career serving the public. Firefighters are exposed to many compounds designated as carcinogens by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) – including benzene, cyanide, chloroform, soot, styrene, formaldehyde and diesel engine exhaust. These substances are absorbed in the Firefighter's personal protective equipment both at the scene of a fire and in the firehouse, where idling diesel fire trucks produce diesel exhaust. A study conducted by the University of Cincinnati's Environmental Health Researchers and published in the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine (November, 2006) stated that Firefighters are more likely to develop cancer than workers in others fields. Their findings suggest that the protective equipment Firefighters have used in the past did not adequately provide protection against cancer-causing agents they had encountered over the years while working in this profession. The Researchers found that Firefighters are twice as likely to develop testicular cancer and have significantly higher rates of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma and prostate cancer than non-firefighters. The Researchers also confirmed that Firefighters are, in particular, at greater risk for multiple myeloma. The study went on to report that UC Epidemiologist found that half of studied cancers – including prostate, skin, brain, rectum, stomach and colon cancer, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, multiple myeloma and malignant melanoma – were associated with firefighting to varying levels of increased risks.

SFFD Faces New Risks

Although it is clear that the types of fire fighting environments and their hazards vary with each individual incident, the nature of fires has significantly changed over the last 50 years, in particular, from the greater use of synthetic materials in building construction. Firefighters are inherently exposed to various types of carcinogens and contaminants in their line of work. San Francisco is ranked one of the top seven Tier 1 Urban Area Cities and the Port of San Francisco is identified as a Group 1 Port at highest risk for terrorist attack. With the on-going threat of new types of chemical, biological, and neurological agents, the SFFD's work environment is constantly evolving and changing which will continuously result in the creation of new health and safety risks. To combat these growing hazards, the SFFD continuously changes its policies and procedures in order to meet the current health and safety risks of today and in the future.

Since 2004, the SFFD has had work-related claims filed that state 16 SFFD Firefighters have developed cancer due to the cumulative exposures over their lifespan as an SFFD Firefighters. Of the 16 cases reported to SFFD, 9 members had prostate cancer, 3 members had melanoma, 2 members had neck/nasopharyngeal cancer, 1 member had bladder cancer and 1 members had colon cancer. These, however, are not the only cancer cases among SFFD members; these are the cases filed as work related. The SFFD has implemented health and safety components that focus on preventions and mitigation strategies in order to limit exposures to toxins and carcinogens by SFFD Firefighters.

In order for the SFFD to produce an effective response and safe incident scene and to continue to meet its health and safety commitment to SFFD uniform members and the San Francisco community we protect, the San Francisco Fire Department is requesting Federal grant assistance under the 2010 DHS Assistance to Firefighters Grant to purchase and install 7 commercial washer extractors that meet cleaning and decontamination guidelines (NFPA 1851). The acquisition of washer extractors will have an immediate impact

on health and safety of SFFD Firefighters and the San Francisco community. Grant Total (\$134,120): Federal share (\$107,296); Applicant share (\$26,824).

The SFFD seeks to purchase 7 energy efficient commercial washer extractors that meet NFPA 1851 guidelines for care and maintenance of PPE. The commercial wash extractor will have the capability to completely launder 3-4 sets of PPE within 45 minutes. The current outsourced cleaning process can take up to three weeks. Most importantly we are seeking to acquire washer extractors that are specifically designed for Firefighter personal protective equipment cleaning which has programmable wash/rinse temperatures, variable rotation options, programmable extract speeds, tumble features that offer reflective tape protection, and injection connections for automatic dispensing of liquid chemicals.

Seven (7) energy efficient washer extractors, 40 lbs., programmable wash/rinse/tumble cycles, auto dispensing of liquid chemicals, 'cycle lockout capability', steel base, drain trough, lint filters and piping at \$6,650/machine (\$46,550); freight to SFFD Firehouse (\$2,625 for 7 washer extractors); Sales Tax (\$4,794.56); Installation costs to install washer extractors at \$1,450/machine (\$10,150); minor facility alterations to bring electrical, plumbing, etc. up to capacity to accommodate manufacturer's recommendations for optimum operational capacity at \$10,000/firehouse (\$70,000). Total Grant Funding: \$134,120.

SFFD's Commitment to Public Safety

The SFFD's Division of Fire Prevention is composed of two Bureaus; Fire Prevention and the Fire Investigation. Both Bureaus have performed roles of tremendous importance in the continuing vigilance of all matters affecting the fire safety of the citizens of San Francisco as it relates to fire prevention, public awareness and education, fire inspections and code enforcement, and fire investigations. Implementing washer extractors as a SFFD health and safety component will have an immediate and direct impact on public safety. If PPE is not cleaned correctly or frequently, toxins, contaminants and bodily fluids can also be passed on to the public. In addition, improper care and maintenance of PPE overtime can impair the fire retardant integrity of the PPE which could ultimately impair a Firefighters rescue attempt.

SFFD's Commitment to Firefighter Safety

The SFFD's safety commitment is to ensure that all Firefighters have the physical ability and capacity to perform essential job tasks. All SFFD health and safety components, as described in the SFFD's Rules and Regulations, SFFD Procedure Guides and SFFD General Orders, are in accordance with NFPA and/or Cal-OSHA Standards as required by Fire Departments. Furthermore, the critical adherence to these components is reinforced during Daily Drills, Monthly Battalion Inspections, Tri-Annual Inspections, and during Firefighter Refresher Courses and Specialized Training. The SFFD has implemented the use of diesel exhaust extraction systems in all 42 SFFD firehouses Cal-OSHA Section 5 (a)(1) and 29CFR 1910]; provides medical examinations and vaccine immunization and screening for uniform members [NFPA 1582] and fitness assessments [NFPA 1583]; voluntary cancer screening (bladder and breast); provides light weight fire equipment, respiratory and personal protective gear for structural fire fighting and proximity fire fighting (including some ensembles that provide limited protection from specified chemicals, biological agents, and radiological CBRN particulates [NFPA 1971, NFPA 1981 and Cal-OSHA, T8CCR, Sections 3401 (b)(1) & (2) and 3406 (a), T8CCR, Sections 3401(b)(1) & (a) and 3408 (a)]; conducts annual fit testing on SCBA's and N-95 Masks [Cal-OSHA T8CCR Sections 3409 (b)(i)]; implemented a comprehensive Hearing Conservation Program [Cal-OSHA 29CFR 1910 Subpart G & 1910.95], a comprehensive Wellness and Fitness Program [NFPA 1582 and 1583], Fire Scene Management and On-Scene Rehabilitation.

Implementing washer extractors as a SFFD health and safety component will have an immediate and direct impact on Firefighters' health and safety. If PPE is not cleaned correctly after every chemical or carcinogenic exposure, toxins, contaminants and bodily fluids can build up over time which increases Firefighter's cancer risks. In addition, improper care and maintenance of PPE overtime can impair the fire retardant integrity of the PPE which could ultimately impair a Firefighters rescue attempt. Having washer extractors strategically installed at SFFD Fire houses will improve cleaning and decontamination frequency.

SFFD's Organizational Profile

With an estimated population of 815,358 within approximately 47.5 square miles, the City and County of San Francisco is ranked the second most densely populated major city in the United States, yielding roughly 17,165 persons/square miles on its resident population alone. The population dramatically increases to 1.4 million on any given day with the influx of commuters and tourists. Within the SFFD's response area is an array of critical infrastructures including National monuments and famous landmarks, bridges, sports arenas, postal facilities, fuel tanks, water treatment facilities, educational, medical, research, financial, technological industries and home

to over 30 international financial institutions. San Francisco is ranked one of the top seven Tier 1 Urban Area Cities and the Port of San Francisco is identified as a Group 1 Port at highest risk for terrorist attack.

The SFFD's 1,419 Firefighting and Emergency Medical personnel are part of the Metropolitan Medical Task Force (MMTF), Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) and Regional Taskforce (RTF) Response for Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE). The SFFD, California's Emergency Management Agency (Cal-EMA) and surrounding 8 Bay Area Counties have developed the first Regional Disaster Response Plan for responding to a catastrophic man-made or natural disaster, such as a paralyzing major earthquake or pandemic. In 2009, the SFFD responded to 102,976 calls for service. All SFFD's Firefighters are 100% compliant in NFPA 1001/1002 Standard. SFFD's Engine 3 ranked the Busiest Engine (with 7,799 runs), and Truck 3 ranked 8th Busiest Ladder (with 3,571 runs) among fire departments surveyed in the 2008 National Run Survey, Firehouse Magazine.

The SFFD also provides immediate mutual aid to the San Francisco Presidio, a former U.S. Military base which consists of 1,480 acres with 800 commercial and residential buildings dating back to 1861, and to 8 surrounding Bay Area counties. The SFFD has been a contributor to the State of California Master Mutual Aid Agreement since its inception in 1950, providing mutual aid to 49 counties within the State of California, as well as parts of southern Oregon and western Nevada. The SFFD also provides water response mutual aid under the same Agreement to Alameda, San Mateo, Contra Costa, Marin, Solano and Sonoma counties.

Financial Need – Budget Practices and Funding Sources 2010

The SFFD strives to fulfill its mission of protecting lives and property in the City and County of San Francisco. This has become increasingly challenging due to the economic climate. The SFFD's annual operating budget is funded primarily through general fund support from the City and County of San Francisco (74% of sources), California Public Safety Sales Tax revenue (13%), and revenues collected from various fees and services (13%). Since the majority of the SFFD's annual funding comes from revenues and tax dollars, the current revenue downturn within San Francisco and the State of California itself has put severe financial constraints upon the City and County of San Francisco and the SFFD.

In response to the mounting budget deficit faced by the City and County of San Francisco in Fiscal Year 2009-10, the SFFD was mandated to reduce approximately \$15 million dollars from its operating budget. The financial outlook for Fiscal Year 2010-11 has remained grim for the City and County of San Francisco. The City has been working to solve a projected budget shortfall of \$522 million for Fiscal Year 2010-11. The SFFD in has been asked to propose cuts over \$13 million from its operating budget for Fiscal Year 2010-11. The Department's goal through these difficult economic times has been to reduce costs while at the same time minimizing the effects on services. The SFFD's salary and fringe benefit expenditures account for 93% of its operating budget; the remaining 7% go towards materials and supplies, maintenance of equipment and assets, fuel, property rentals, utilities and miscellaneous services.

Cost/Benefit of Washer Extractor Project

It is difficult to put a monetary value on saving the life of a Firefighter and and/or saving the life of a civilian. By implementing the use of washer extractors will not only improve the effectiveness of property cleaning and decontaminating PPE, but a Battalion-based washer will improve frequency, ease and convenience for Firefighters. This, in turn, will decrease the probability of transference of toxins, contaminants, bodily fluids to the community that we serve. By using a washer extractor, the probably that the PPE protective integrity will be damaged will decrease which will provide the Firefighter with ease of mind. Maintaining the integrity of the PPE will improve Firefighter health and safety, as well as improve public safety.

Impact on the SFFD's Daily Operations

Overall health and safety will be improved for each SFFD Firefighter and each member of the public that we come in contact with. Implementing washer extractors will also allow the SFFD to meet its Mission Statement and maintain its safety commitment to its members. Furthermore, by properly maintaining PPE, the Firefighters will be able to maintain rapid interior fire attack on structures, while lowering probability of flashover or structural collapse. Fewer residents will be displaced, less losses to property damage, and less overall injuries or possible deaths to civilians and SFFD Firefighters.
