rates of children and youth lost to unintentional firearms-related deaths; and

WHEREAS, From 1987 to 1996, nearly 2,200 children under the age of 15 years died in unintentional shootings in the United States; and WHEREAS, Children as young as three years old are strong enough

to fire most commercially available handguns; and

WHEREAS, A study of unintentional firearm deaths among children in California found that unintentional gunshot wounds most often involve handguns; and

WHEREAS, According to the Government Accounting Office (GAO), an estimated 31% of accidental deaths caused by firearms might be prevented by the addition of two safety devices; and

WHEREAS, Currently, firearms are the only products manufactured in the United States that are not subject to minimum safety standards; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 106 and Senate Bill 130, both referred to as the Aroner-Scott-Hayden Firearms Safety Act of 1999, would require

that all firearms sold, transferred or manufactured in the State be accompanied by a firearms safety device; and

WHEREAS, The Aroner-Scott-Hayden Firearms Safety Act of 1999 would require that all firearms sold, transferred or manufactured in the State be accompanied by warning labels; and

WHEREAS, The Aroner-Scott-Hayden Firearms Safety Act of 1999 requires the Attorney General to develop regulations to implement a minimum safety standard for firearms safety devices and gun safes; and

WHEREAS, The Aroner-Scott-Hayden Firearms Safety Act of 1999 makes a violation of the Act punishable by \$1,000, a second violation punishable by a fine of \$1,000 and a 30-day sales and manufacturing suspension, and a third violation punishable by a permanent loss of the ability to sell or manufacture guns; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 106 and Senate Bill 130 would save lives and save money as a result of reduced medical care costs; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco endorses Assembly Bill 106 and Senate Bill 130 and urges the State Legislature and Governor to approve the bill to significantly reduce the risk of firearms-related injuries to children; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to his Honor, the Mayor, with a request that he transmit copies to the delegation from San Francisco in the State Legislature, as well as

Governor Davis, with a request that they take all action necessary to pass Assembly Bill 106 and Senate Bill 130.
