1	WHEREAS, The India Basin Waterfront Park Initiative (the Initiative) is a multi-pronged
2	public-private partnership in which RPD is working in close partnership with the Bayview-
3	Hunters Point community, the A. Philip Randolph Institute, the San Francisco Foundation, and
4	Trust for Public Land (collectively, the Partners) to build the park in one of the City's most
5	historically underserved neighborhoods; and
6	WHEREAS, In addition to building IBWP, the Initiative will also enable RPD and the
7	Partners to ensure the benefits of the project accrue to the existing neighborhood through
8	projects and programs undertaken by Initiative Partners and other community-serving
9	nonprofits consistent with the India Basin Equitable Development Plan (EDP); and
10	WHEREAS, On May 14, 2019, The Board of Supervisors authorized RPD to accept
11	and expend a grant for the Initiative in the amount of \$25,000,000 from the John Pritzker
12	Family Fund, under Resolution No. 242-19; and
13	WHEREAS, RPD has secured public grants to date totaling approximately
14	\$125,000,000 including \$29,000,000 from the 2020 Health and Recovery Bond; and
15	WHEREAS, Bids for the final phase of construction were higher than expected and so,
16	in order to deliver the full scope of the project, Initiative partners raised the full project budget
17	to \$225 million and are working to secure additional public and private funds for construction
18	and EDP implementation; and
19	WHEREAS On December 5, 2023, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved
20	Resolution Nos. 577-23, 578-23, 579-23 and 580-23 authorizing RPD to Accept and Expend
21	approximately \$55 million in private funding from the non-profit partners on the project,
22	respectively the A. Philip Randolph Institute, Trust for Public Land and the San Francisco
23	Foundation; and
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ı	WHEREAS, TO date, the partners have secured approximately \$50 million of the \$55
2	million private fundraising goal and are continuing to work together to fundraise for the
3	remaining sum of approximately \$10 million; and
4	WHEREAS, RPD and the Office of the Mayor partner with numerous nonprofit
5	organizations, private entities, grantmakers and foundations, often through contracts or
6	permits; and
7	WHEREAS, On December 15, 2023, Mayor London Breed signed Resolution No. 573-
8	23 and on authorizing a waiver of the City's Behested Payment Ordinance (Campaign and
9	Governmental Conduct Code, Section 3.600 et seq.) for the Recreation and Park
10	Commission, the Mayor and officers and employees of the Office of the Mayor and officers
11	and employees of the Recreation and Park Department to the extent it prohibits solicitations of
12	financial support for the Initiative from persons or entities who would qualify as interested
13	parties under the Behested Payments Ordinance; and
14	WHEREAS, On April 15, 2025, Mayor Daniel Lurie signed Resolution No. 134-25 and
15	on authorizing a second waiver of the City's Behested Payment Ordinance (Campaign and
16	Governmental Conduct Code, Section 3.600 et seq.) for the Recreation and Park
17	Commission, the Mayor and officers and employees of the Office of the Mayor and officers
18	and employees of the Recreation and Park Department to the extent it prohibits solicitations of
19	financial support for the Initiative from persons or entities who would qualify as interested
20	parties under the Behested Payments Ordinance; and
21	WHEREAS, Resolution No. 134-25 expires in October 2025 under of the San
22	Francisco Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, Section 3.620(f); and
23	WHEREAS, The Recreation and Park Commission, the Mayor and officers and
24	employees of the Office of the Mayor and officers and employees of the Recreation and Park
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1	Department seek a new waiver of the City's Behested Payment Ordinance for six months from
2	the effective date of this Resolution so that they may solicit donations from private
3	organizations and philanthropists to support the India Basin Waterfront Park Initiative
4	including EDP activities; now, therefore, be it
5	RESOLVED, That under Section 3.620(f) of the Campaign and Governmental Conduct
6	Code, the Board of Supervisors hereby waives application of the Behested Payment
7	Ordinance for six months from the effective date of this Resolution to fundraising from
8	nonprofits, private organizations, grantmakers and foundations to support the Initiative; and,
9	be it
10	FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver under Section 3.620(f) serves the
11	public interest by bringing private funding into an underserved neighborhood to support an
12	Initiative long advocated for by the community and executed in partnership with neighborhood
13	residents; and, be it
14	FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver under Section 3.620(f) does not
15	create an appearance of impropriety.
