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[Maintaining Recreational Activities and Environmental Protection at Ocean Beach]

Resolution urging the establishment of fair and effective guidelines for beach fires at Ocean Beach that protect the public's access to recreational activities and support environmental protection.

WHEREAS, For generations, beach fires held at Ocean Beach have offered affordable and unique recreational opportunity for individuals and families throughout San Francisco and Northern California; and

WHEREAS, Ocean Beach is under the jurisdiction of the National Park Service (NPS) as a part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and plays a critical role in San Francisco's recreational system; and

WHEREAS, Historical records show beach fires at Ocean Beach dating at least as far back as 1890; and

WHEREAS, The NPS has a responsibility to listen to and work in partnership with of San Franciscans and others who frequent and appreciate Ocean Beach; and

WHEREAS, In the spirit of shared responsibility for Ocean Beach's welfare, the City and County of San Francisco allocated \$50,000 to the Recreation and Parks Department (RPD) in FY2014-2015 <u>and an additional \$185,000 in FY2015-2016 to conduct janitorial and</u> <u>maintenance services and</u> a robust outreach and education campaign to ensure compliance with regulations; and

WHEREAS, In 2014, the NPS piloted new regulations to mitigate the impact of the beach fires at Ocean Beach and will use the data collected to inform new guidelines; and

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WHEREAS. From calendar year 2013 through 2015 only 15 citations were issued by the NPS for illegal fires on Ocean Beach; and

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WHEREAS, That, while regulations should aid in Ocean Beach's environmental protection, they must also protect the public's access to recreational activities they have long appreciated and enjoyed; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges the National Park Service to establish fair and effective guidelines for beach fires at Ocean Beach that maintain the level of affordability and access San Franciscans are acclimated to; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges the National Park Service to not implement its current proposal, to create a fee-based permitting system to reserve fire rings, as it limits access and creates a financial barrier that will adversely impact the equitable nature of the Ocean Beach recreation experience; and, be it further

RESOLVED, Honoring the shared responsibility for safety and maintenance at Ocean Beach between residents, community organizations, the NPS, and local government, the City and County of San Francisco is committed to working with the NPS to protect the environment and <u>to</u> providing access to recreational activities at Ocean Beach.

The Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA) under the National Parks Service (NPS) was created in 1972 to "provide for the maintenance of needed recreational open space" for the people of the Bay Area. Congress stated that the purpose of the creation was to "assure the preservation of open space...to provide public access along the waterfront, and to expand to the maximum extent possible the outdoor recreation opportunities available to the region." NPS is performing what is more like ownership rather than appropriate management on behalf of the taxpaying public to enjoy its open recreational areas, parks and spaces.

San Francisco

San Francisco has limited open space to recreate thus the GGNRA is our backyard and recreation area plus is our only beachfront to enjoy the famous West Coast sunsets. The People of SF did not give NPS rights to maintenance and stewardship of our shoreline to cordon it from public use which these restrictions are slowly but surely seeking to do. This is not a national park in the middle of a wilderness area. It is an official "Recreational Area" adjacent to one of the most dense metropolitan and destination cities in the nation and world, San Francisco. It is highly inappropriate for NPS to treat it or even refer to the GGNRA as a "National Park," and it is not referred to as such in law.

NPS has implemented a General Management Plan (GMP) that makes restrictions on many forms of recreation in the GGNRA with the most recent major change at Ocean Beach by requiring an expensive permit and inconvenient reservation system for the long-time tradition of family outings and recreational bonfires on the beach which have been without significant incident to warrant such restrictions. Soon, NPS will be instituting even more highly restrictive rules despite thousands of Bay Area residents in opposition. The general public has not made any requests for such restrictions.

DogPAC of SF urges all SF Supervisors to SUPPORT this resolution to once again send a strong, earnest message and our collective voice as a City to cease and desist from instituting restrictions to public access in our publicly funded national open spaces.

Beach Fire and Campfire Regulations

Beach Fire Regulations

Beach fires are only permitted at:

- **Muir Beach**: The number of fire rings available changes seasonally. May November: 6 fire rings are available. December April: 3 fire rings are available. They are located on the beach near the south end of the parking lot. Fires are allowed beginning at 9:00 am and must be cleared and groups must vacate the beach by 1-hour after sunset.
- Ocean Beach: Only in the fire rings provided, between Stairwells 15 and 20. See below 1 more details.

Notice of Proposed Changes to Ocean Beach Fire Program

The National Park Service is proposing changes to the recreational fire program at Ocean Bee in order to create a safe and sustainable program that addresses environmental impacts and public safety concerns while creating a high quality user experience. Key elements of the proposed program include a permit system, winter restrictions to promote better air quality, more durable fire rings and a maintenance and educational partnership with the San Francis Recreation and Parks Department.

The comment period for this proposal ends on November 20, 2015.

Following the comment period, the park will evaluate all feedback before finalizing the Ocear Beach Fire Program.

Rules for Beach Fires:

- Fires are only allowed WITHIN the provided concrete fire rings. Any fires crea outside of these rings are illegal.
- NO GLASS OR ALCOHOL is allowed on the beach.
- Fires must be out by **9:00 PM**.
- The parking lots at Ocean Beach close at 10:00 PM each night and are owned ar managed by the City of San Francisco.

- Fires are not allowed on "Spare the Air" days. When air pollution reaches unhealt levels, the Bay Area Air Quality Management District notifies the public by declaring a "Spare the Air day." To find out if today is a "Spare the Air" day, visit www.sparetheair.or call 1-800-HELP-AIR.
- Fires must be **extinguished with WATER ONLY**. Bring a bucket to collect ocean wate or bring your own water. Covering the fire with sand only insulates the hot coals and fills pits with sand.
- Burn only untreated, unpainted wood.
- Don't burn pallets or any wood containing nails or other hardware.
- Bring your own firewood. Gathering, cutting or scavenging of firewood or kindling is not permitted at the beach or in the park. Locally grown firewood is best.
- Burn Clean. Do not use accelerants such as lighter fluid, as they leave pollution and poiso in the sand and the air. Paper and kindling are preferred fire starter material.
- Don't burn trash or debris. Most trash gives off pollution and poisonous gases.
- Refuse must be removed from the beach. LEAVE NO TRACE.
- Fires shall be attended at all times by a responsible adult (18 year of age or older).
- Minors must be supervised by one person 21 or over for each 10 people under 18.
- Groups of more than 25 people must obtain a permit by calling 415-561-4700. The administrative cost for the permit is \$50.00.
- Large-scale events may require more extensive review by National Park Service staff. If it determined that your event will require extensive review, the administrative cost may be higher. Observe all posted regulations.

Golden Gate National Recreation Area is committed to universal access for all visitors. The C of San Francisco provides designated Accessible Parking Spaces at Stairwells 15/16. For more

Campfire regulations

- Permitted only at the Kirby Cove Campground & Picnic Area in the fire grills provided by park. Only wood or charcoal may be burned in these grills.
- No gathering, cutting or scavenging of firewood or kindling is permitted in the park from any source. All firewood must be brought into the park
- Chemically treated wood, painted wood, wood with nails or staples shall not be used in an fire.
- Before departure, campfires must be completely extinguished with water, using the "drov stir and feel" method.
- During very hot, dry weather conditions, "Spare the Air" days, strong winds, and extreme fire danger days or by order of the Superintendent, fires of any type may not be allowed anywhere in the park.

Charcoal fire regulations

Charcoal fires are permitted in fixed grills provided by the park or visitor-provided portable barbecues in established picnic areas, in the Kirby Cove Campground, or at Muir and Ocean beaches unless signed or prohibited otherwise. Debris burning is not permitted. Grill/Stove f coals must be extinguished and disposed of in receptacles provided by the park.

Park-provided charcoal grills may be found at the following picnic areas:

- Baker Beach
- Battery Wallace
- China Beach
- Kirby Cove
- Rodeo Beach
- Muir Beach

Only liquid fuel stoves are permitted in Haypress Campground, Hawk Campground and Bicentennial Campground. Campers staying at Bicentennial Campground may use charcoal i the barbecue grills in the nearby Battery Wallace picnic area.
