1 [Settlement of Lawsuit - Tommy O. Johnson, John Doe, and Others Similarly Situated - \$5,845,000]

Ordinance authorizing settlement of the lawsuit filed by Tommy O. Johnson, by and through his Attorney-in-Fact Rev. Doris White and John Doe, by and through his conservator Thomas O'Connor, on behalf of themselves and all others similarly situated, against the City and County of San Francisco for \$5,845,000; the lawsuit was filed on March 24, 2020, in San Francisco Superior Court, Case No. CPF-20-517064; entitled Tommy O. Johnson, by and through his Attorney-in-Fact Rev. Doris White and John Doe, by and through his conservator Thomas O'Connor, on behalf of themselves and all others similarly situated v. City and County of San Francisco, et al.; the lawsuit involves claims of elder/dependent adult abuse, invasion of privacy, negligence, and violations of patients' rights brought by over 700 former and current residents of Laguna Honda Hospital.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Pursuant to Charter Section 6.102(5), the Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the City Attorney to settle the action entitled Tommy O. Johnson, by and through his Attorney-in-Fact Rev. Doris White and John Doe, by and through his conservator Thomas O'Connor, on behalf of themselves and all others similarly situated v. City and County of San Francisco, et al., San Francisco Superior Court, Case No. CPF-20-517064, by the payment of \$5,845,000. The lawsuit involves claims of elder/dependent adult abuse, invasion of privacy, negligence, and violations of patients' rights brought by over 700 former and current residents of Laguna Honda Hospital.

Section 2. The above-named action was filed in San Francisco Superior Court on March 24, 2020, and the following parties were named in the lawsuit: Plaintiffs: Tommy O.

> Take the pledge to help create a culture of patient safe

Dear Chair Fielder and GAO Committee Members.

The Tommy O. Johnsom et. al settlement at the Board of Supervisors GAO hearing tomorrow to settle the \$5.85 million class action lawsuit filed fully five years ago in 2020 is shameful. City Attorney time fighting this settlement aren't yet known.

Attached is a tracking log I've kept ever since the 2019 patient sexual abuse case that became known in 2019 when news of the patient sexual abuse scandal at Laguna Honda erupted as a result of then-LHH CEO Mivic Hirose — who by her own

admission acknowledged her failure to have created a culture of patient safety at LHH.

My log shows that to date, LHH has received \$14 million in various penalties and lawsuit settlements, some of which are ongoing — plus City Attorney costs that haven't been yet reported publicly, or haven't concluded litigation (highlighted in yellow shading), most of which were **not** state and federal fines following the patient abuse scandal.

The current \$5.8 million settlement is just the tip of the iceberg ... and it all stems from serious and ongoing management failures that led to LHH's decertification in April 2022. LHH just had to pay another \$20,000 fine to CDPH over having stopped one patient's "sitter" that led him to assault an elderly woman with dementia.

LHH's problems are still ongoing, and the costs continue to rise.

Following the 2019 sex abuse scandal, SFDPH released a "60-day" <u>Laguna Honda Reform Plan</u>," claiming that as part of its *Plan of* Correction to CMS and CDPH, it would appoint a permanent CEO to

PATIENT SAFETY AWARENESS WEEK INITED for Patient Safety What Was Hirose Thinking? On June 19, 2019 Mivic opened her mouth and inserted her foot in front of a City Attorney, admitting to a State patient safety inspection team that under her watch as LHH's CEO she'd forgotten to institute a culture of safety, despite having celebrated Patient Safety Awareness Week in March 2018!

We are failing at reporting. If we had a safety culture, reporting would have happened

three years ago."

replace LHH's then CEO, Mivic Hirose. A year passed before an interim CEO, Maggie Rykowski, was replaced by Michael Phillips, who was hired, in part, due to his experience running a behavioral health facility, not a skilled nursing facility. He lasted just two years but was let go in June 2022 after LHH was decertified. So much for a "permanent" CEO.

As a reminder, because LHH had failed to report the sexual abuse incidents in a timely manner — or at all — to the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), LHH received four "Immediate Jeopardy" citations. The scandal has cost at least \$1,914,025 to date in federal and stated regulatory agency fines, penalties, lawsuit settlements, and City Attorney time and expenses appealing the citations. Costs of that scandal will continue to rise.

The 60-day Reform Plan written in August 2019 by the San Francisco Health Network's (SFHN) Chief of Quality Officer, Troy Williams, asserted SFDPH was re-organizing LHH's Quality Management Department, and would appoint a permanent Quality Management Director to ensure resident safety at LHH. It took until June 2020 before Williams appointed Nawzaneen Talai as an interim Chief Quality Officer at LHH. She was promoted from within.
