 community-based health and social services as an alternative to jail and prosecution. LEAD SF participants will have access
 to the city's extensive system of care that includes comprehensive behavioral health services (substance use disorder and
 mental health treatment), physical health services, transitional housing, employment, and other relevant services. LEAD SF
