

#### **Grand Jury**

In response to the San Francisco Grand Jury Report we have learned:

- Truancy is a community issue and concern and so requires the school district to foster strong collaborations and partnerships with city and community agencies to address the issue in a systemic and comprehensive manner.
- A district-wide coordinated effort is necessary to address truency and increase the district's attendance rate.
- It is necessary to designate a Student Support Services Department Program Administrator as the SARB Chairperson to oversee the work of six Child Welfare and Attendance Liaisons,
- Ten ERIPs (Early Retirement Incentive Program retired educators) and three credentialed counselors to follow up on ALLSARB contracts and participate in SARB hearings.
- The need to educate families, school staff, and community members using a SARB brochure and a SARB Flow Chart for staff to understand the

#### 2010-2011 Truancy Plan Overarching Goals

#### **All School Sites**

 Increase the percentage of students present annually at our sites. All schools will try to achieve at least a 95% students present rate and if 95% or less in previous year, increase by one percentage point annually.

#### Individual School Sites

- Each site will reduce the number of chronic truants (Chronic truants miss at least 20 full school days unexcused)
- Each site will reduce the number of habitual truants (Habitual truants miss at least 10-19 full school days unexcused)

#### 2010-2011 Truancy Plan Target Population

What grade levels should we focus on with a focused array of effective interventions?

- Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> graders to prevent larger numbers in the future. Reduce the percentage of early chronic absenteeism with first graders.
- Increase the number of 8<sup>th</sup> graders who enter 9<sup>th</sup> grade with a map to graduation and increase attendance at the 9<sup>th</sup> grade level.
- Young people who are habitually and chronically absent from school.

#### Objective 4

Increase incentives and publicize success to recognize and affirm student, family, school and community achievements in ensuring every student is at school daily.

- •Solicit support for attendance incentives from SF Community
- \*Annual recognition of students/families for improved attendance

#### Objective 5

Increase on-going supports with city, neighborhood and district wide interventions for students and families at School Attendance Review Board hearings. Increase the percentage of parents and students who are accountable with compulsory education/ truancy

- Develop an MOU that describes the need for inter agency collaboration clarifies exchange of information and identifies key follow up resources.
- •Expand Truancy Court to meet with more students and families who do not comply with truancy laws.

#### Objective 6

Provide successful educational reentry opportunities for students at risk of dropping out.

- •Continue to maximize use of CARE in the Bayview
- \*Open second Center for Academic Reentry and Empowerment (CARE) Center on the west side.
- \*Increase use of Cyber High and other credit recovery resources at all sites.
- •Develop and implement academic supports in regular school day, "catch up programs."



# San Francisco Truancy Assessment Resource Center

## SF TARC Flowchart

PROCEDURES FLOWCHART



- Students who are truant and on the streets are picked up by SFPD between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m.
- Police call in to SF CARC/TARC office to give the student name and information, and complete an 849bpc and brief incident report for SFPD upon release to SFUSD staff.
- An SFUSD counselor will look up the student's attendance/truancy information on Student Information System (SIS) and SharePoint.
- Data will be logged daily.

#### **Upon first contact with a student:**

- If the student has not gone before the Student Attendance Review Board (SARB) the prior year, has less than 6 unexcused absences and/or is elementary age/level.
  - Student is taken back to school of origin.
  - SFUSD counselor, located at SF TARC, calls school site.
  - SFUSD counselor, located at SF TARC, calls parent/guardian.
  - School staff meets police and student is welcomed back to site.

#### Student Taken to School Site OR TARC

- If the student has more than 6 unexcused absences, was SARBed the previous year or a repeat truant with less than 6 unexcused absences.
  - Student is taken to TARC (44 Gough Street).
  - Parent/guardian called by SFUSD counselor, located at SF TARC, to explain the situation.
  - School of origin is contacted by SFUSD counselor, located at SF TARC.
- If the student provides no information or inaccurate information.
  - Student is automatically brought to SF TARC.
  - Police accompany student to SFUSD counselor, located at SF TARC.
  - Call is made to parent/guardian.

#### Student at TARC

#### At SF TARC:

- Students are assessed, and an Attendance Contract is developed with the student/family and signed by student/family before student is returned to school site or home.
- Student and parent/guardian are linked to support services.
- Student is released to school site or home by mid-day. Student is driven to their school with transportation approved by SFUSD Transportation Department, public transportation, or walks to site/home.
- Follow-up occurs by case manager assigned to student and SFUSD Student Support Services staff, such as the Child Welfare and Attendance Liaison assigned to the school site, in collaboration with school site staff.

# Your Options in Truancy Court

You have been called to court today for a violation of Education Code § 48293, an infraction. When you appear in front of the judge, you will be presented with three options. Please take time to consider your decision and feel free to ask for clarification from the District Attorney, your caseworker, or the presiding judge.

Failure to pay any fine ordered by the court may result in a charge of contempt and a warrant for your arrest.

PLEASE NOTE: Any parent found guilty of a first truancy offense who is re-referred to the District Attorney may be charged under Penal Code § 272, a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$2,500 fine.

Dear Parents/Guardians:

The new school year has begun. Truancy remains an alarming problem in San Francisco schools. Please remember: truancy is a crime. There are available resources if you need help getting your child to school.

Most of you are getting your child to school every day. Unfortunately, some children continue to miss far too many school days. Last year, 4,839 San Francisco students were habitually or chronically truant and 2,074 of those students were in elementary school.

It is estimated that 75% of all chronic truants will eventually drop out of school. Children who do not graduate from high school are far less likely to find a living wage job. They are more likely to be arrested for crime or to become victims of violence. Since 2003, 94% of our City's homicide victims under the age of 25 have been high school dropouts. Everyone in the community suffers when children do not go to school.

My office works with the San Francisco Unified School District, parents and students to resolve attendance problems when they arise. However, when these attempts fail, we must use other tools, including prosecution, to ensure children are in school. The California Education Code and Penal Code outline serious consequences for truancy. A student is a "habitual truant" if s/he has ten or more days of unexcused absences. A "chronic truant" is a student who has unexcused absences of twenty days or more.

Parents can be criminally liable for truancy and punished by up to a year in county jail or a fine of \$2,500. Truant students can also face legal consequences, including loss of drivers license and work permit, community service and court supervision. If you are facing problems getting your child to school, I urge you to resolve the issues before they become serious. Help is available at 701-STAY (7829).

Even if your child is not experiencing truancy problems, keeping children in school is the responsibility of all San Franciscans. Please make this issue a priority for you and for your PTAs. Please join me in ending truancy so all of our children can learn and thrive.
