

[Affirming Commitment and Accountability in the Age of Artificial Intelligence]

Resolution affirming San Francisco's commitment to civil liberties and ethical innovation, supporting the right of local companies to decline participation in mass surveillance and autonomous weaponry; and enduring commitment to civil liberties, privacy, human dignity, and democratic accountability in the age of artificial intelligence.

WHEREAS, San Francisco has long stood at the forefront of movements to protect civil liberties, defend human rights, and ensure that technological progress advances, rather than undermines, democratic values; and

WHEREAS, The City is home to leading artificial intelligence companies and research institutions whose technologies are shaping the future of society, governance, and global security; and

WHEREAS, Artificial intelligence systems possess transformative potential but also carry significant risks, particularly when deployed for mass surveillance, autonomous weaponry, or other applications that may erode privacy, civil liberties, and human dignity; and

WHEREAS, Reports and public statements from the Federal Government have raised concerns about efforts to pressure or compel private companies to deploy advanced technologies for uses that conflict with their publicly stated ethical commitments; and

WHEREAS, The integrity of democratic institutions depends in part on the ability of private actors, workers, and innovators to exercise conscience and ethical judgment without coercion; and

1 WHEREAS, San Francisco has previously acted to safeguard residents from
2 unchecked surveillance technologies and has consistently affirmed that innovation must be
3 guided by accountability and transparency; and

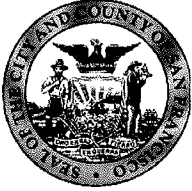
4 WHEREAS, Companies based in San Francisco have publicly articulated ethical
5 boundaries regarding the use of their technologies and have declined participation in certain
6 government applications on that basis; now, therefore, be it

7 RESOLVED, That the City affirms that no company should be coerced, through political
8 pressure, contracting leverage, or other means, into deploying technology in ways that conflict
9 with its stated ethical standards; and, be it

10 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors stands with San Francisco
11 based companies that draw a clear ethical red line against participation in mass surveillance
12 or the development and deployment of lethal autonomous weapon systems; and, be it

13 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors reaffirms San Francisco's
14 enduring commitment to civil liberties, privacy, human dignity, and democratic accountability
15 in the age of artificial intelligence; and, be it

16 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors recognizes the responsibility
17 that accompanies technological leadership and supports responsible innovation guided by
18 transparency, public dialogue, and respect for fundamental rights.

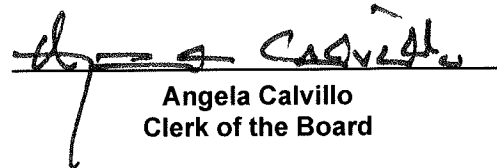

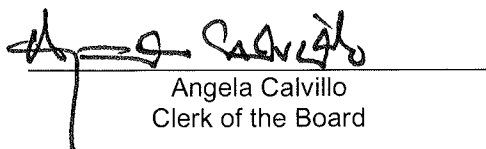
