13 WHEREAS, The Bayview-Hunters Point community is a historically underserved
14 community that has experience with a concentration of polluting industries and has lacked the
15 civic investment and inspiring greenspaces found elsewhere in San Francisco; and

16 WHEREAS, Community members have long advocated for improvements to and
17 expansion of the existing India Basin Shoreline Park, located at 950 Galvez Avenue (at
18 Hunters Point Boulevard and Hawes Street) as a way to correct previous disinvestment and
19 ensure residents have access to the physical health, mental health, and community benefits
20 that come from world class parks; and

21 WHEREAS, This advocacy moved closer to reality when the Recreation and Park
22 Department (RPD) acquired the 900 Innes property adjacent to the south side of the Park in
23 2014, with the goal of cleaning the formerly industrial site and connecting it to the existing
24 Park and waterfront spaces; and

1 WHEREAS, On October 19, 2024, Initiative Partners together with the community,
2 celebrated the opening of the first part of the park to the public; and

3 WHEREAS, On August 19, 2025 Mayor Daniel Lurie broke ground on construction for
4 the final part of the park, which is expected to be complete in late 2027 or early 2028; and

5 WHEREAS, The India Basin Waterfront Park Initiative (the Initiative) is a multi-pronged
6 public-private partnership in which RPD is working in close partnership with the Bayview-
7 Hunters Point community, the A. Philip Randolph Institute, the San Francisco Foundation, and
8 Trust for Public Land (collectively, the Partners) to build the park in one of the City's most
9 historically underserved neighborhoods; and

10 WHEREAS, In addition to building IBWP, the Initiative will also enable RPD and the
11 Partners to ensure the benefits of the project accrue to the existing neighborhood through
12 projects and programs undertaken by Initiative Partners and other community-serving
13 nonprofits consistent with the India Basin Equitable Development Plan (EDP); and

14 WHEREAS, On May 14, 2019, The Board of Supervisors authorized RPD to accept
15 and expend a grant for the Initiative in the amount of \$25,000,000 from the John Pritzker
16 Family Fund, under Resolution No. 242-19; and

17 WHEREAS, RPD has secured public grants to date totaling approximately
18 \$125,000,000 including \$29,000,000 from the 2020 Health and Recovery Bond; and

19 WHEREAS, Bids for the final phase of construction were higher than expected and so,
20 in order to deliver the full scope of the project, Initiative partners raised the full project budget
21 to \$225 million and are working to secure additional public and private funds for construction
22 and EDP implementation; and

23 WHEREAS On December 5, 2023, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved
24 Resolution Nos. 577-23, 578-23, 579-23 and 580-23 authorizing RPD to Accept and Expend
25

1 approximately \$55 million in private funding from the non-profit partners on the project,
2 respectively the A. Philip Randolph Institute, Trust for Public Land and the San Francisco
3 Foundation; and

4 WHEREAS, To date the partners have secured approximately \$50 million of the \$55
5 million private fundraising goal and are continuing to work together to fundraise for the
6 remaining sum of approximately \$10 million; and

7 WHEREAS, RPD and the Office of the Mayor partner with numerous nonprofit
8 organizations, private entities, grantmakers and foundations, often through contracts or
9 permits; and

10 WHEREAS, On December 15, 2023 Mayor London Breed signed Resolution No. 573-
11 23 and on authorizing a waiver of the City's Behested Payment Ordinance (Campaign and
12 Governmental Conduct Code, Section 3.600 et seq.) for the Recreation and Park





For previous waiver

1) Who are the specific interested parties that were solicited under the previous waiver? and a statement as to why the department believes the parties to be interested parties?

- **Lyft** – During the previous period, the partners on the India Basin project (including Partnership Staff and the India Basin Equitable Development Plan Manager) received a private grant enabling staff to work with Lyft to implement an equitable transportation element of the Initiative as directed by the community-developed [Equitable Development Plan](#) (EDP). This transportation program is designed to improve access to the park from the surrounding neighborhood. The program involves installing a bike rideshare station near the park – as specifically called out in the EDP – and creating a mechanism to offer subsidized car rides to the park. Lyft is an interested party to the Department because the company holds a five-year permit to operate a bikeshare program in San Francisco Parks under the Department's jurisdiction.

India Basin partners and Rec Park Partnerships staff, and the EDP manager worked with Lyft because they are the sole provider of bike share in San Francisco, per agreements with the Metropolitan Transportation Council.

The project, which is in formation, will also involve developing a pilot project with Lyft to create a geofenced area within the 94124 zip code and provide free car rides to qualifying community members, supported with private funding. This work is primarily a business deal, but to stretch the funding, Rec Park staff requested that Lyft make an in-kind contribution of subsidizing or offering additional free rides.

Lyft responded with an offer of a 5% rebate on all funds spent on the initiative, which is most likely a standard reduction in cost as part of a negotiation, but out of an abundance of caution and transparency staff recorded this as a contribution and noted it on the initiative Website.

2) If interested parties were solicited under the previous waiver, can you explain why your office believes this waiver does not create an appearance of impropriety?

- Further I did want to note that the Department takes ethics and transparency extremely seriously. Partnership staff are meticulously tracking every contribution to the Initiative, which has raised more than \$76 million in private funding as part of the \$225 million overall budget. This private funding has come from 70 gifts from individuals or institutions, and per the Sunshine Ordinance, every donor contributing more than \$100 is listed on a [dedicated page](#) the initiative website with a notation if the donor has any financial relationship with the city. None except Lyft, triggers a prong of the Behested Payments Waiver.
