Supervisor Ronen, seconded by Supervisor Peskin, moved that this Ordinance be AMENDED, AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING NEW TITLE, on Page 1, Line 4, by changing 'known to belong to' to 'from', Line 5, by changing 'victims' to 'victim reference samples', and Lines 5 and 12, adding 'Reference'; on Page 2, Lines 16-17, by adding "'Reference DNA Profile' means a DNA Profile obtained from a known individual and used for purposes of comparison with Evidentiary DNA Profiles.', and Lines 19-22, by updating the definition to read 'Victim Reference DNA Profile' means a Reference DNA Profile obtained from a Victim, and does not include any Evidentiary DNA Profile determined to belong to a Victim.', on Page 3, Lines 8-9, by adding 'such as the Police Department Crime Laboratory', Line 18, by adding 'or by accreditation standards', Line 19, by adding '(“SFPD”)', Lines 19 and 21, by adding 'Reference', Line 23, by adding 'or by accreditation standards', and Line 24, by changing 'Police Department' to 'SFPD'; on Page 4, Lines 6, 13, and 22, by changing 'Police Department' to 'SFPD', Line 8, by adding 'Reference', Line 23, by adding 'Reference DNA Profiles and', and Line 25, by adding 'Reference'; on Page 4, Line 25, through Page 5, Line 1, by changing 'that were' to 'and all Evidentiary DNA Profiles determined to belong to victims that are known to have been'; and on Page 5, Line 2, by adding 'at any time' and 'Reference', Lines 3-4, by adding 'and Evidentiary DNA Profiles determined to belong to Victims that are known to have been', Line 4, by changing 'that were' to 'at any time that have been', Line 5, by changing 'and' to 'together with', Line 9, by striking 'the Police Department', Line 13, by adding 'Reference', and Line 14, by adding 'Reference DNA'.
