SUPPORTING CONGRESSIONAL BIPARTISAN EFFORTS TO PROTECT STATES TOBACCO SETTLEMENTS

WHEREAS, on November 16, 1998 the attorneys general of most states and the major United States tobacco companies (Brown & Williamson Tobacco Corporation, Lorillard Tobacco Company, Phillip Morris Incorporated and R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company) agreed to settle more than forty pending lawsuits brought by states against the tobacco industry; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco was one of four California counties which filed lawsuits independently against the tobacco industry, in addition to the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco filed its lawsuit against the tobacco industry because it supports efforts to reduce tobacco consumption by its residents in order to promote public health and improve health status; and

WHEREAS, on August 5, 1998 California's Attorney General entered into a memorandum of understanding with local governments to coordinate their lawsuits with the State's lawsuit and provide for the allocation of any recovered monies; and

WHEREAS, the settlement agreement calls for financial payments to the states, the creation of a national foundation to develop an anti-smoking advertising and education program and the establishment of certain advertising restrictions to benefit public health the

agreement will result in significant new revenues to States and local governments; and

WHEREAS, the settlement agreement places no restrictions on the use of the monies by the states and the City and County of San Francisco which was one of four localities which filed a lawsuit against the tobacco industry; and,

WHEREAS, the settlement agreement requires the tobacco companies to make payments to the states in perpetuity, with the payment totaling an estimated \$206 billion through 2025 nationally; and,

WHEREAS, the settlement is projected to result in payments to California of \$25 billion and the City and County of San Francisco is estimated to receive over \$586 million; and,

WHEREAS, on December 9, 1998 the State of California approved the settlement agreement in San Diego Superior Court; and,

WHEREAS, the settlement agreement has provisions to reduce payments to states in the event that the federal government takes certain actions against tobacco companies by November 30, 2002; and,

WHEREAS, President Clinton's FY2000 budget request assumes the recoupment of Medicaid expenses from state tobacco settlement funds; and,

WHEREAS, this proposal will have a detrimental impact on the City and County of San Francisco by reducing settlement agreement revenues to states and localities and dictating the use of such settlement agreement revenues; and,

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WHEREAS, the National League of Cities, National Governors
Association, National Association of Counties, and National
Conference of State Legislators oppose such efforts by the federal
government to take portions of the settlement agreement revenues away
from states and localities; and,

WHEREAS, Senators Kay Bailey Hutchinson (R-Texas) and Bob Graham (D-Florida) have co-sponsored Senate Bill 346 and are leading a bipartisan effort to ensure that individual States tobacco settlement funds are protected from seizure by the federal government; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco strongly supports efforts by Congress to protect state and local tobacco settlement funds; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County strongly believes that states and localities should be given flexibility on the use of settlement agreement revenues; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco supports congressional bipartisan efforts and national state and local association efforts to protect state tobacco settlement revenues; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors strongly believes that any bipartisan efforts should protect both state and local tobacco settlement agreement revenues; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors supports federal efforts to reduce tobacco consumption, but strongly endorses state

and local flexibility with respect to the use of settlement agreement revenues; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors directs that this resolution be forwarded to the City and County's federal lobbyist.
