2 for Homeless Shelters]

3 Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Planning Code to streamline  
4 contracting for homeless shelters, and siting of homeless shelters by, among other  
5 things, authorizing the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) to  
6 enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for professional  
7 and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing  
8 homelessness (Projects Addressing Homelessness); authorizing the Department of  
9 Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without adhering to the Environment  
10 Code or to provisions relating to competitive bidding, equal benefits, local business  
11 enterprise utilization, and other requirements, for construction work and professional  
12 and other services relating to Projects Addressing Homelessness; permitting  
13 Homeless Shelters in PDR (Production Distribution Repair) and SALI  
14 (Service/Arts/Light Industrial) districts; authorizing HSH to operate Navigation Centers  
15 for more than two years; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under  
16 the California Environmental Quality Act, and making findings of consistency with the  
17 General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1.

1 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

2  
3 Section 1. Findings.

4 (a) California Government Code Sections 8698 through 8698.2 authorize the  
5 governing body of a political subdivision, including the Board of Supervisors, to declare the  
6 existence of a shelter crisis upon a finding by the governing body that a significant number of  
7 persons within the jurisdiction are without the ability to obtain shelter, and that the situation  
8 has resulted in a threat to the health and safety of those persons. In 2016, through the  
9 enactment of Ordinance No. 57-16, the Board of Supervisors declared the existence of a  
10 shelter crisis in San Francisco, based on findings that in January 2015, there were 6,686  
11 individuals in San Francisco who were homeless. Since that time, the shelter crisis has  
12 grown. According to the January 2017 Point in Time Homeless Count administered by the  
13 Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH), there were approximately  
14 7,499 people experiencing homelessness in San Francisco on a single night. Of those  
15 persons, 58% were unsheltered, 21% were under the age of 25 years, and 32% were over the  
16 age of 51 years with attendant deteriorating physical and mental health.

17 (b) On October 2, 2018, Mayor London Breed declared her intent that the City add  
18 1,000 new shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness, with half of the new beds  
19 becoming available by the summer of 2019, and the remainder becoming available by 2020.  
20 The beds will become available as a result of establishing new Navigation Centers, expanding  
21 existing Navigation Centers, and opening a new type of shelter called a SAFE Center, a name  
22 that stands for Shelter Access for Everyone.

23 (c) In early 2018, the Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 29-18, which  
24 waived competitive bidding requirements for contracts and leases relating to a number of  
25 identified Shelter Crisis Sites, as well as the City's existing Navigation Centers and homeless

1 shelters. That ordinance allowed HSH to expedite the award of contracts and grants for  
2 construction and services relating to homeless individuals, and to open three Navigation  
3 Centers with 340 beds and a permanent supportive housing site with 51 units. However, the  
4 expedited contracting and leasing authority that was granted by Ordinance No. 29-18 will  
5 expire on March 1, 2019. It is in the public interest to extend this authority so long as the City  
6 is experiencing a shelter crisis.

7 (d) In 2016, the Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 117-16, requiring the  
8 City to open and operate six Navigation Centers to address street homelessness and connect  
9 homeless people to health and mental health services, housing, and other benefits. The City  
10 has complied with that mandate, and plans to expand upon this successful model of shelter  
11 and service delivery. Ordinance No. 117-16 provided that once a Navigation Center opened,  
12 it could operate for no more than two years without approval of extension of the time limit by  
13 resolution of the Board of Supervisors. In light of the success of Navigation Centers, the  
14 capital investments that are required to open a center, and the fact that Navigation Centers  
15 have not been found to have had adverse impacts on the neighborhoods in which they have  
16 been located, the Board of Supervisors has, in Resolution No. 180522, approved the  
17 extension of two Navigation Centers beyond the two-year limit. For the same reasons, it is in  
18 the public interest to permit Navigation Centers generally to operate longer than two years  
19 without re-authorization. The City plans to expand upon the successful model of shelter and  
20 service delivery with greater geographic diversity across a majority of supervisorial districts.

21 (e) For all HSH-funded projects that involve new construction, a change in use, or an  
22 expansion of an existing use at a specific location, HSH complies with the requirements of  
23 Administrative Code Chapter 79 (Citizens' Right-to-Know Act of 1998) and Chapter 79A by  
24 providing community notice that it is considering approval of such a project, and by  
25 establishing a process by which members of the public may obtain additional information

1 about the project, and submit comments. Before opening a new facility, HSH staff collaborate  
2 with the member of the Board of Supervisors who represents the district in which the facility  
3 will be located, to conduct a thorough community outreach process that includes, at a  
4 minimum, written notice to neighbors located within 300 feet of the facility, information about  
5 how neighbors may provide input into the proposed programming at the facility, and the  
6 hosting of a community meeting. After opening a facility, HSH takes steps to ensure that its  
7 immediate surroundings are kept clean and secure.

8 (f) The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this  
9 ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources  
10 Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of  
11 Supervisors in File No. 190047 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms  
12 this determination.

13 (g) The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this  
14 ordinance are consistent, on balance, with the City's General Plan and eight priority policies of  
15 Planning Code Section 101.1. The Board adopts these findings as its own. A copy of this  
16 determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 190047, and is  
17 incorporated herein by reference.

18  
19 Section 2. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 21B,  
20 consisting of Sections 21B.1, 21B.2, 21B.3, and 21B.4, to read as follows:

21  
22 **CHAPTER 21B: COMMODITIES AND SERVICES RELATING TO PROJECTS**

23 **ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS.**

24  
25 **SECTION 21B.1. PURPOSE AND GOALS.**

1 In recognition of the fact that a significant number of persons within San Francisco lack the  
2 ability to obtain shelter, resulting in a threat to the health and safety of those persons, and that such  
3 threat constitutes a shelter crisis, the intent of this Chapter 21B is to expedite the procurement of  
4 professional and other services relating to Projects Addressing Homelessness. For purposes of this  
5 Chapter 21B, "Projects Addressing Homelessness" means projects designed to prevent homelessness  
6 through the provision of housing subsidies or other services, and projects designed to provide shelter,  
7 housing, food, and/or social services to people experiencing homelessness.

8  
9 **SECTION 21B.2. WAIVER OF COMPETITIVE BIDDING REQUIREMENTS.**

10 Notwithstanding Section 21.1 of the Administrative Code or any other provision of the  
11 Municipal Code, the Department of Public Works and the Department of Homelessness and Supportive  
12 Housing may enter into and/or amend contracts, including grants, for professional and other services  
13 or commodities relating to Projects Addressing Homelessness without adhering to the requirements of  
14 Section 21.1 or any other competitive procurement requirements. The power to amend such contracts  
15 and grants extends to contracts and grants entered into prior to the effective date of the ordinance in  
16 Board File No. 190047 enacting this Chapter 21B.

17  
18 **SECTION 21B.3. REPORTING.**

19 Within one year of the effective date of this Chapter 21B, and every year thereafter, the  
20 Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing and the Department of Public Works shall  
21 submit to the Board of Supervisors a report that includes the following information for each contract or  
22 grant that the department executed during the prior year without adhering to the requirements of  
23 Section 21.1, pursuant to the authority in this Section 21B.3: the name of the contractor or grantee; the  
24 services to be provided under the contract or grant; the amount of funds conveyed; the duration of the  
25 contract or grant; and any measurable outcomes of the contract or grant.

1  
2           **SECTION 21B.4. SUNSET PROVISION.**

3           *This Chapter 21B shall expire by operation of law five years from its effective date, or on the*  
4 *effective date of an ordinance making the finding that according to the most recent Point in Time*  
5 *Homeless Count, there are fewer than 5,250 homeless persons in San Francisco, whichever date is*  
6 *earlier. Upon expiration of this Chapter 21B, the City Attorney shall cause this Chapter to be removed*  
7 *from the Administrative Code.*

8  
9           Section 3. Article IV of Chapter 6 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by  
10 adding Section 6.76, to read as follows.

11  
12           **SECTION 6.76. PUBLIC WORKS ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS.**

13           *(a) The Department of Public Works is authorized to enter into and/or amend any contract for*  
14 *any Public Work or Improvement, as defined in Administrative Code Section 6.1, including any*  
15 *professional services for a Public Work or Improvement, without adherence to the requirements of this*  
16 *Chapter 6, Administrative Code Chapters 12B and 14B, and the Environment Code; provided,*  
17 *however, that the Public Work or Improvement is for the construction, repair, or improvement of one or*  
18 *more sites that will be used for the primary purpose of providing housing, shelter, or services to people*  
19 *experiencing homelessness. The power to amend such contracts extends to contracts entered into prior*  
20 *to the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 190047 enacting this Chapter 21B.*

21           *(b) This Section 6.76 shall expire by operation of law five years from its effective date, or on*  
22 *the effective date of an ordinance making the finding that according to the most recent Point in Time*  
23 *Homeless Count, there are fewer than 5,250 homeless persons in San Francisco, whichever date is*  
24 *earlier. Upon expiration of this Section 6.76, the City Attorney shall cause this Section to be removed*  
25 *from the Administrative Code.*

1  
2 Section 4. Chapter 106 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising  
3 Sections 106.1 and 106.3, to read as follows:  
4

5 **SEC. 106.1. NAVIGATION CENTERS REQUIRED.**

6 As specified further in this Chapter 106, the City ~~may open and operate~~*shall open and*  
7 ~~operate no fewer than six~~ Navigation Centers to address street homelessness and connect  
8 homeless people to health and mental health services, housing, benefits, and other services.  
9 For purposes of this Chapter, "Navigation Center" means a temporary, low-barrier-to-entry  
10 shelter that, through case management and social service programs, aids in moving homeless  
11 people off the streets and into permanent housing or transitional or stable supportive housing  
12 that eventually leads to permanent housing.  
13

14 **SEC. 106.3. PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION.**

15 \* \* \* \*

16 ~~(b) Navigation Centers shall be temporary facilities, and once opened shall operate on a~~  
17 ~~specific site for no fewer than six months and no more than two years without approval of adjustment~~  
18 ~~or extension of the time limit by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.~~

19 (b) The City may enter into grant agreements with nonprofit organizations to provide services  
20 relating to Navigation Centers.

23 Section 5. Article 2 of the Planning Code is hereby amended by modifying Section  
24 210.3 as follows:

4 (19) During a declared shelter crisis, Homeless Shelters that satisfy the provisions of  
5 California Government Code Section 8698.4(a)(1) shall be P, principally permitted and may be  
6 permanent. ~~Otherwise, In this District,~~ Homeless Shelter uses are permitted only with  
7 Conditional Use authorization and only if each such use (a) would operate for no more than  
8 four years, and (b) would be owned or leased by, operated by, and/or under the management  
9 or day-to-day control of the City and County of San Francisco. If such a use is to be located  
10 within a building or structure, the building or structure must be either (a) preexisting, having  
11 been completed and previously occupied by a use other than a Homeless Shelter, or (b)

16 Section 6. Article 8 of the Planning Code is hereby amended by modifying Section 846

Section 7. Effective Date; Retroactive Operation; Ratification of Prior Acts.

(a) This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

(b) Sections 2 and 3 of this ordinance (Chapter 21B and Section 6.76 of the Administrative Code, respectively) shall be retroactive to March 1, 2019.


(c) The Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and confirms all actions taken by City officials or City agencies in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21B and Section 6.76 of the Administrative Code, respectively, from March 1, 2019, to the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 8. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles, numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal

1 Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment  
2 additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under  
3 the official title of the ordinance.  
4

5 Section 9. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this  
6 ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not  
7 assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it  
8 is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused  
9 injury.

**REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**  
(Amended in Committee, 3/11/2019)

[Administrative, Planning Codes - Streamlined Contracting for Homeless Services and Siting for Homeless Shelters]

**Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Planning Code to streamline contracting for homeless shelters, and siting of homeless shelters by, among other things, authorizing the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) to enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for professional and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing homelessness (Projects Addressing Homelessness); authorizing Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without adhering to the Environment Code or to provisions relating to competitive bidding, equal benefits, local business enterprise utilization, and other requirements, for construction work and professional and other services relating to Projects Addressing Homelessness; permitting Homeless Shelters in PDR (Production Distribution Repair) and SALI (Service/Arts/Light Industrial) Districts; authorizing HSH to operate Navigation Centers for more than two years; affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; and making findings of consistency with the General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1.**

Existing Law

California law authorizes the Board of Supervisors to declare the existence of a shelter crisis based on a finding that a significant number of people in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") lack shelter, and that the situation has resulted in a threat to their health and safety. The law authorizes the City to suspend state or local laws setting housing, health, or safety standards for new homeless shelter facilities in response to the shelter crisis, to the extent that strict compliance would prevent, hinder, or delay the mitigation of the shelter crisis. In Ordinances No. 57-16 and 29-18, and Resolution No. 319-18, the Board of Supervisors has declared the existence of a shelter crisis.

Local Law generally requires City departments to use a competitive bidding process and follow other contracting requirements for personal services, procurement, and construction contracts, subject to exceptions. In 2018, the Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 29-18, which waived competitive bidding requirements for contracts and leases relating to a number of identified Shelter Crisis Sites, as well as the City's existing Navigation Centers and homeless shelters. The expedited contracting and leasing authority that was granted by Ordinance No. 29-18 will expire on March 1, 2019.

Chapter 106 of the City's Administrative Code regulates the opening and operation of Navigation Centers. Currently, Navigation Centers are defined as temporary facilities, and once opened may operate at a specific site for no fewer than six months and no more than two years without approval of adjustment or extension of the time limit by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

Currently, homeless shelter uses are permitted in Production, Design, and Repair ("PDR") and Service/Arts/Light Industrial ("SALI") districts only with conditional use authorization, and only if such use would operate for no more than four years.

#### Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance would reaffirm the Board of Supervisors' prior declarations of a shelter crisis.

The proposed ordinance would allow the Departments of Homelessness ("HSH") and Supportive Housing and Public Works to enter into and amend contracts and grants for professional and other services or commodities relating to projects addressing homelessness without using a competitive bidding process. For purposes of this authority, "projects addressing homelessness" are projects designed to prevent homelessness through the provision of housing subsidies or other services, and projects designed to provide shelter, housing, food, and/or social services to people experiencing homelessness. The authority to enter into and amend contracts without competitive bidding would expire five years from the effective date of the ordinance, or on the effective date of an ordinance making a finding that according to the most recent Point in Time Homeless Count, there are fewer than 5,250 homeless persons in San Francisco, whichever date is earlier.

The proposed ordinance would also allow the Department of Public Works to enter into or amend contracts for public works and improvements without using a competitive bidding process, provided the contracts are for public works or improvements for the construction, repair, or improvement of one or more sites that will be used for the primary purpose of providing housing, shelter, or services to people experiencing homelessness. The authority to enter into and amend contracts without competitive bidding would expire five years from the effective date of the ordinance, or on the effective date of an ordinance making a finding that according to the most recent Point in Time Homeless Count, there are fewer than 5,250 homeless persons in San Francisco, whichever date is earlier.

The proposed ordinance would also eliminate the requirement that the Board of Supervisors approve by resolution an extension of the deadline for operation of a Navigation Center beyond two years, and would clarify that HSH may enter into grant agreements with nonprofit organizations to provide services relating to Navigation Centers.

The proposed ordinance would amend the Planning Code to provide that during a declared shelter crisis, homeless shelters that are located or constructed on land owned or leased by

the City would be principally permitted in PDR and SALI districts and therefore would not require a conditional use permit, and would not be subject to the four-year limit, but may operate permanently.

For all HSH-funded projects that involve new construction, a change in use, or an expansion of an existing use at a specific location, HSH complies with the requirements of Administrative Code Chapter 79 (Citizens' Right-to-Know Act of 1998) and Chapter 79A by providing community notice that it is considering approval of such a project, and by establishing a process by which members of the public may obtain additional information about the project, and submit comments. Before opening a new facility, HSH staff collaborate with the member of the Board of Supervisors who represents the district in which the facility will be located, to conduct a thorough community outreach process that includes, at a minimum, written notice to

Dear Ms. Calvillo and Mayor Breed,

On February 28, 2019, the Planning Commission conducted duly noticed public hearing at regularly scheduled meeting to consider the proposed Ordinance, introduced by the Honorable Mayor London Breed that would amend Planning Code Sections 210.3 and 846. At the hearing the Planning Commission recommended approval.

RESOLUTION APPROVING A PROPOSED ORDINANCE THAT WOULD AMEND THE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE AND PLANNING CODE TO AUTHORIZE THE DEPARTMENTS OF HOMELESSNESS AND SUPPORTIVE HOUSING ("HSH") AND PUBLIC WORKS TO ENTER INTO AND AMEND CONTRACTS WITHOUT REQUIRING COMPETITIVE BIDDING FOR CONSTRUCTION WORK AND PROFESSIONAL AND OTHER SERVICES RELATING TO SITES AND PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS; PERMITTING HOMELESS SHELTERS IN PDR AND SALI DISTRICTS; AUTHORIZING HSH TO OPERATE NAVIGATION CENTERS FOR MORE THAN TWO YEARS; ADOPTING FINDINGS, INCLUDING ENVIRONMENTAL FINDINGS, PLANNING CODE SECTION 302 FINDINGS, AND FINDINGS OF CONSISTENCY WITH THE GENERAL PLAN AND PLANNING CODE SECTION 101.1.

WHEREAS, on January 15, 2019 Mayor Breed introduced a proposed Ordinance under Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "Board") File Number 190047, which would amend Sections 210.3 and 846 of the Planning Code to permit Homeless Shelters in PDR and SALI Districts as of right during a declared shelter crisis and would amend the Administrative Code to authorize the Departments of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("HSH") and Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for construction work and professional and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing homelessness and authorizes HSH to operate Navigation Centers for more than two years;

WHEREAS, The Planning Commission (hereinafter "Commission") conducted a duly noticed public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting to consider the proposed Ordinance on February 28, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Ordinance has been determined to be categorically exempt from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act Section 15060(c); and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has heard and considered the testimony presented to it at the public hearing and has further considered written materials and oral testimony presented on behalf of

Department staff and other interested parties; and

WHEREAS, all pertinent documents may be found in the files of the Department, as the custodian of records, at 1650 Mission Street, Suite 400, San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has reviewed the proposed Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission finds from the facts presented that the public necessity, convenience, and general welfare require the proposed amendment; and

MOVED, that the Planning Commission hereby approves the proposed ordinance.

### FINDINGS

Having reviewed the materials identified in the preamble above, and having heard all testimony and arguments, this Commission finds, concludes, and determines as follows:

1. Ordinance enables expedited shelter construction during a declared shelter crisis which is vital to combating homelessness. These amendments ensure that there will not be any disruption in services provided to our most vulnerable population.
2. Ordinance ensures that PDR and SALI retain their industrial character by not changing the underlying zoning and proposing temporary provisions during a declared shelter crisis.
3. Ordinance removing competitive bidding requirements is a significant time and cost savings for both Departments of HSH and Public Works.
4. Ordinance allowing HSH to operate Navigation Centers longer than two years removes the requirement for a Board of Supervisors time extension. Two Navigation Centers have received such extensions based upon their operational success and the lack of adverse impacts on the surrounding neighborhood.
5. **General Plan Compliance.** The proposed Ordinance and the Commission's recommended modifications are consistent with the following Objectives and Policies of the General Plan:

### HOUSING ELEMENT

#### OBJECTIVE 6

#### REDUCE HOMELESSNESS AND THE RISK OF HOMELESSNESS

##### Policy 6.1

Prioritize permanent housing and service-enriched solutions while pursuing both short- and long-term strategies to eliminate homelessness.

##### Policy 6.2

Prioritize the highest incidences of homelessness, as well as those most in need, including families and immigrants.

**Policy 6.3**

Aggressively pursue other strategies to prevent homelessness and the risk of homelessness by addressing its contributory factors.

**Policy 6.4**

Improve coordination among emergency assistance efforts, existing shelter programs, and health care outreach services.

*Although shelters do not provide permanently affordable housing, shelters are a successful strategy to combat homelessness. Further, Policy 6.4 calls for improved coordination among emergency assistance efforts, existing shelter programs, and health care outreach services. By permitting shelters in the PDR and SALI Districts, removing competitive bidding requirements, and allowing shelters constructed during a shelter crisis to remain permanently, this Ordinance is streamlining shelter construction and removing bureaucratic barriers for continued operation.*

6. **Planning Code Section 101 Findings.** The proposed amendments to the Planning Code are consistent with the eight Priority Policies set forth in Section 101.1(b) of the Planning Code in that:

1. That existing neighborhood-serving retail uses be preserved and enhanced and future opportunities for resident employment in and ownership of such businesses enhanced;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have a negative effect on neighborhood serving retail uses and will not have a negative effect on opportunities for resident employment in and ownership of neighborhood-serving retail.*

2. That existing housing and neighborhood character be conserved and protected in order to preserve the cultural and economic diversity of our neighborhoods;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have a negative effect on housing or neighborhood character.*

3. That the City's supply of affordable housing be preserved and enhanced;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have an adverse effect on the City's supply of affordable housing. Conversely, the Ordinance will be providing temporary shelter for our most vulnerable population.*

4. That commuter traffic not impede MUNI transit service or overburden our streets or neighborhood parking;

*The proposed Ordinance would not result in commuter traffic impeding MUNI transit service or overburdening the streets or neighborhood parking.*

5. That a diverse economic base be maintained by protecting our industrial and service sectors from displacement due to commercial office development, and that future opportunities for resident employment and ownership in these sectors be enhanced;

*The proposed Ordinance would not cause displacement of the industrial or service sectors due to office development, and future opportunities for resident employment or ownership in these sectors would not be impaired. The proposed Ordinance permits shelters as a permitted use in the SLAI and PDR Districts during a declared shelter crisis and is not anticipated to permanently alter the industrial character of these districts.*

6. That the City achieve the greatest possible preparedness to protect against injury and loss of life in an earthquake;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have an adverse effect on City's preparedness against injury and loss of life in an earthquake.*

7. That the landmarks and historic buildings be preserved;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have an adverse effect on the City's Landmarks and historic buildings.*


8. That our parks and open space and their access to sunlight and vistas be protected from development;

*The proposed Ordinance would not have an adverse effect on the City's parks and open space and their access to sunlight and vistas.*

7. Planning Code Section 302 Findings. The Planning Commission finds from the facts presented that the public necessity, convenience and general welfare require the proposed amendments to the Planning Code as set forth in Section 302.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Commission hereby APPROVES the proposed Ordinance as described in this Resolution.

### PLANNING CODE AMENDMENT

The proposed Ordinance would permit Homeless Shelters in PDR (Production Distribution and Repair) and SALI (Service/Arts/Light Industrial) Districts during a declared shelter crisis. Homeless Shelters constructed during this period may be permanent.

The proposed Ordinance also amends the Administrative Code to authorize the Departments of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("HSH") and Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for construction work and professional and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing homelessness and authorizes HSH to operate Navigation Centers for more than two years.

#### The Way It Is Now:

Currently, a Homeless Shelter is permitted with a Conditional Use Authorization in PDR and SALI Districts. In addition, Homeless Shelter uses are limited in operation in the follow regard:

- May operate no more than four years.
- Must be owned or leased by, operated by, and/or under the management or day-to-day control of the City and County of San Francisco.
- If located within an existing building or structure, the building or structure must either be (a) preexisting, having been previously completed and occupied by a use other than a Homeless Shelter or (b) temporary.
- Construction of a permanent structure or building to be used as a Homeless Shelter is not permitted.

#### The Way It Would Be:

As proposed, during a declared shelter crisis, Homeless Shelters that satisfy the provisions of California Government Code Section 8698.4(a)(1) shall be P, Principally Permitted and may be permanent.

In times where there is not a declared shelter crisis, a Homeless Shelter is permitted with a Conditional Use Authorization in PDR and SALI Districts. In addition, Homeless Shelter uses are limited in operation in the follow regard:

- May operate no more than four years.
- Must be owned or leased by, operated by, and/or under the management or day-to-day control of the City and County of San Francisco.
- If located within an existing building or structure, the building or structure must either be (a) preexisting, having been previously completed and occupied by a use other than a Homeless Shelter or (b) temporary.
- Construction of a permanent structure or building to be used as a Homeless Shelter is not permitted, unless it was a Homeless Shelter that was constructed during a declared shelter crisis.

#### BACKGROUND

In 2016, the Board of Supervisors declared the existence of a shelter crisis in San Francisco through the enactment of Ordinance 57-16, pursuant to California Government Code Section 8698.4. At this time San Francisco reported 6,686 homeless individuals and this number has since grown. According to the January 2017 Point in Time Homeless Count administered by HSH, there were 7,499 individuals experiencing homelessness. Of those, 58% were unsheltered, 21% were under the age of 25 years, and 32% were over the age of 51 years with attendant deteriorating physical and mental health.

In response, the Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 117-16, requiring the City to operate six Navigation Centers for a period no longer than two years, which the Board can extend. Two of the six Navigation Centers have received an extension to operate beyond the two year limit. The Navigation Centers currently operating include: Civic Center Hotel, Central Waterfront, Division Circle, Bryant Street, and Hummingbird at SF General. Navigation Centers located at 1515 South Van Ness and 1950 Mission Streets have closed.

#### ISSUES AND CONSIDERATIONS

##### Homeless Shelter Provisions in San Francisco

Shelters within San Francisco are permitted as of right in most zoning districts. A Conditional Use Authorization is required for shelters in the RH-2, RH-3, RED-MX, PDR, and SALI Districts. Within the SALI and PDR Districts, shelters authorized through the Conditional Use Authorization process may operate for a period of four years. This requirement does not preclude a project sponsor from applying for another Conditional Use Authorization to operate a shelter for another four years. This Ordinance is seeking to allow shelters constructed during a declared shelter crisis to be permanent. It also removes the Conditional Use Authorization requirement in the SALI and PDR Districts during a declared shelter crisis.

#### Changes to the Administrative Code

The proposed Ordinance also amends the Administrative Code to authorize HSH and Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for construction work and professional and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing homelessness. There is a significant cost savings for Public Works and a 3-6-month time savings by removing this requirement. In early 2018, the Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 29-18 to waive competitive bidding requirements for contracts and leases relating to several identified Shelter Crisis Sites, as well as the City's existing Navigation Centers and homeless shelters. This Ordinance allowed HSH to expedite the award of contracts and grants for construction and services relating to the opening of three Navigation Centers with 340 beds and a permanent supportive housing site with 51 units. This Ordinance is set to expire on March 1, 2019. It is in the public interest to extend this authority for the duration of a shelter crisis.

#### Sunset Provision

The proposed changes to the PDR and SALI Districts in the Planning Code are in effect during a declared shelter crisis and do not sunset; however, these changes are not anticipated to permanently alter the industrial nature of the SALI and PDR zoning districts. The proposed changes to the Administrative and Public Works Code have a sunset provision of five years or on the effective date of an ordinance making the findings that there are fewer than 5,250 homeless persons in San Francisco.

#### Related Legislation

California Government Code Section 8698.4 enables local jurisdictions to declare a shelter crisis. Further, with the passing of AB-932, cities that have declared a shelter crisis including Berkeley, Emeryville, Los Angeles, Oakland, San Diego, and San Francisco may adopt procedures for design site development, and operation of homeless shelters in lieu of complying with local building approvals. A related Ordinance, File 190045, activates AB-932, and is currently moving through the legislative process. File 190045 seeks to remove the requirement for discretionary building permits for homeless shelters and proposes an alternative approval process for homeless shelters subject to portions of Appendix N of the California Building Code. Appendix N provides consistent and available standards by which local agencies may develop emergency housing and provides a set of building standards for compliance. These standards have been proposed and approved by the state. DBI, Fire, Public Works, and Planning will enter into an MOU that outlines the procedure for written confirmation that the project complies with all applicable zoning, health and safety standards and Planning staff will continue to evaluate each site for compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act. This Section of the California Government Code is set to expire on January 1, 2021.

#### General Plan Compliance

Objective 6 of the General Plan is to reduce homelessness and the risk of homelessness. Although shelters do not provide permanently affordable housing, shelters are a successful strategy to combat homelessness. Further, Policy 6.4 calls for improved coordination among emergency assistance efforts, existing shelter programs, and health care outreach services. By permitting shelters in the PDR and SALI Districts, removing competitive bidding requirements, and allowing shelters constructed during a shelter crisis to remain permanently, this Ordinance is streamlining shelter construction and removing bureaucratic barriers for continued operation.

#### Implementation

The Department has determined that this Ordinance will impact our current implementation procedures; however, the proposed changes can be implemented without increasing permit costs or review time.

### RECOMMENDATION

The Department recommends that the Commission *approve* the proposed Ordinance and adopt the attached Draft Resolution to that effect.

### BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Department finds that the proposed ordinance enables expedited shelter construction during a declared shelter crisis. The legislation will also ensure that PDR and SALI retain their industrial character by not changing the underlying zoning and proposing temporary provisions during a declared shelter crisis. Removing competitive bidding requirements is a significant time and cost savings for both Departments of HSH and Public Works. Finally allowing HSH to operate Navigation Centers longer than two years removes the requirement for a Board of Supervisors time extension. Two Navigation Centers have received such extensions based upon their operational success and the lack of adverse impacts on the surrounding neighborhood. These amendments ensure that there will not be any disruption in services provided to our most vulnerable population. Allowing expedited shelter construction is vital to combating homelessness.

### REQUIRED COMMISSION ACTION

The proposed Ordinance is before the Commission so that it may approve it, reject it, or approve it with modifications.

### ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

The proposed amendments are not defined as a project under CEQA Guidelines Section 15060(c) and 15378 because they do not result in a physical change in the environment.

### PUBLIC COMMENT

As of the date of this report, the Planning Department has not received any public comment regarding the proposed Ordinance.

# The Homelessness Crisis in San Francisco

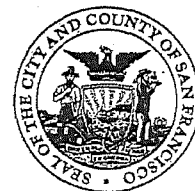
- **7,500** people experience homelessness in San Francisco on any given night.
  - **4,300** of are unsheltered living on the streets
  - 32% of the homeless population is over the age of 51
  - 39% of people experiencing homelessness report a psychiatric condition
  - 31% report a chronic health issue
  - 41% report drug or alcohol abuse
- There are consistently over 1,100 people in the shelter waiting list.

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# 2018 Shelter Emergency

- The 2018 ordinance expedited the contracting procedures for specifically named shelter crisis sites.
- Helped expedite the opening of 340 new temporary shelter beds in 3 navigation centers.
- Expedited the master lease of 50 units of permanent supportive housing at the Minna Lee Hotel.
- The ordinance expires on March 1, 2019.
- However the crisis on our streets continues and the 2019 ordinance will build upon the success of the more modest 2018 ordinance.



# Shelter Crisis Overview

On January 15, 2019 Mayor Breed introduced two ordinances declaring a shelter crisis.

## Ordinance #1 (Admin & Planning Code Amendments)

- Streamlines the contracting process for the construction and operations of new homeless shelters and programs.
- Removes planning code barriers to opening shelters in certain zoning districts that currently have limitations or restrictions.
- Extend operations of Navigation Centers beyond the current two-year limit to ensure that we do not lose shelter capacity during this time of crisis.



# Shelter Crisis Overview

## Ordinance #1

- Require HSH to engage in a robust community process before opening any site-specific homeless service program (shelters, navigation center, etc).
- The ordinance would remain in effect for five years or until homelessness has been reduced by 30%.
- The ordinance requires HSH and DPW to submit detailed annual reports on all contracts awarded under this expedited procedure, to ensure accountability.
- Ordinance was unanimously supported by the Planning Commission on February 28<sup>th</sup>.

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# Shelter Crisis Overview

- Ordinance #2 (Building Code Amendment)
  - **Activates AB 932 (Ting):** California law allowing communities to adopt by ordinance standards and procedures for the design, site development and opening of homeless shelters in lieu of complying with local building approval procedures during a declared shelter crisis.
  - In lieu of requiring discretionary building permits for homeless shelters, the ordinance adopts an alternative approval process for homeless shelters.
  - DBI, Fire, Public Works, and Planning will enter into an MOU that outlines the procedure for written confirmation that the project complies with all applicable zoning, health and safety standards.

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# Shelter Crisis Overview

- Ordinance #2:

- Adopts Appendix N to the state building code. Appendix N provides a consistent and available standards by which local agencies may develop emergency shelters and provide a set of building standards for compliance. These standards have been proposed and approved by the state.
- The ordinance allows the Board of Supervisors to pass an ordinance prohibiting specific shelter sites from utilizing this expediting procedure.
- Following passage by the Board of Supervisors, the California Department of Housing and Community Development must sign off on the ordinance.
- The ordinance would remain in effect as long as AB 932 is in effect. AB 932 is currently set to expire on January 1, 2021.
- Ordinance was reviewed and unanimously supported by the Building Inspection Commission on February 20<sup>th</sup>.

Dear President Yee and Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors:

We are writing to you on behalf of Safe Embarcadero For All, an unincorporated association of residents who live near Seawall Lot 330. Our members have serious concerns regarding two Ordinances under consideration by the Board of Supervisors:

- Ordinance 190045, amending the Building Code to adopt standards for constructing homeless shelters, and to create an alternative approval procedure for homeless shelters, during a shelter crisis, pursuant to California Government Code, Section 8698.4; amending the Business and Tax Regulations Code to provide for an expedited permit appeals process for homeless shelters during a shelter crisis; affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; and directing the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors to forward this Ordinance to the California Building Standards Commission and the California Department of Housing and Community Development upon final passage.
- Ordinance 190047, amending the Administrative Code and Planning Code to streamline contracting for homeless shelters, and siting of homeless shelters by, among other things, authorizing the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) to enter into and amend contracts without requiring competitive bidding for professional and other services relating to sites and programs for people experiencing homelessness (Projects Addressing Homelessness); authorizing Public Works to enter into and amend contracts without adhering to the Environment Code or to provisions relating to competitive bidding, equal benefits, local business enterprise utilization, and other requirements, for construction work and professional and other services relating to Projects Addressing Homelessness; permitting Homeless Shelters in PDR (Production Distribution Repair)

(Collectively, the "Ordinances".)

**No environmental review of the Ordinances has been carried out**, despite the likely significant environmental impacts that will result from them.

The California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") requires public agencies to "inform their decisions with environmental considerations." (*Muzzy Ranch Co. v. Solano County Airport Land Use Com.* (2007) 41 Cal.4th 372, 380.) CEQA applies to any project undertaken by a public agency that "may cause either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment." (Pub. Res. Code 21065; CEQA Guidelines, § 15378.) Under CEQA, if there is a possibility that a project may have a significant effect on the environment, the lead agency must undertake environmental review of the project.

Here, the Planning Department has asserted that the Ordinances are exempt from environmental review because they are "not defined as a project under CEQA Guidelines Sections 15378 and 15060(c)(2) because [they] would not result in a direct or indirect physical change in the environment." In relation to Ordinance 190045, the CEQA determination goes on to assert that it is "adopting standards and procedures. Physical projects will require environmental review." These findings are legally and factually inaccurate.

CEQA provides a broad definition of "project" to include any activities directly undertaken by a public agency which has the potential to ultimately culminate in a physical change to the environment. (Pub. Res. Code s 21065(a); *City of Livermore v. Local Agency Formation Com.* (1986) 184 Cal.App.3d 531, 537.) The CEQA Guidelines establish that the "enactment and amendment of zoning ordinances" can be a project. (14 Cal. Code Regs., s 15378(a)(1).)

Importantly, the question of whether the ordinance will cause a physical change in the environment is a threshold inquiry – that is, the mere fact that an agency action *may*, directly or indirectly, cause a physical change in the environment makes it a CEQA "project." Changes to zoning ordinances have consistently and categorically been deemed to be a "project," whether or

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not they will actually have environmental effects. (*Muzzy Ranch, supra*, 41 Cal.4th 382; *Union of Medical Marijuana Patients Inc. v. City of San Diego* (2016) 4 Cal.App.5th 103, 120.)

Zoning ordinances implicate CEQA because their key feature is to regulate the physical use of land and the structures that may be built. (*Morehart v. County of Santa Barbara* (1994) 7 Cal.4th 725, 750.) Here, the Ordinances necessarily regulate the use of land by streamlining the approval and construction of new large structures, with less thorough review. Among other things, Ordinance 190045 suspends the standard building permitting process for building homeless shelters, and Ordinance 190047 allows homeless shelters to be operated for more than two years, and makes them a permitted (rather than conditional) use in certain zoning districts. The accelerated construction of new homeless shelters will undoubtedly result in a physical change to the environment. Indeed, this is the very purpose of the Ordinances.

Moreover, the impacts caused by homeless shelters, which will concentrate hundreds of homeless individuals on single lots, are “physical impacts” under CEQA. These impacts potentially include an increase in trash, abandoned shopping carts, discarded syringes, and crime in the surrounding neighborhood. Such impacts are all elements of “urban decay,” which the Court of Appeal has recognized as a physical impact for the purposes of CEQA (*Placerville Historic Preservation League v. Judicial Council of California* (2017) 16 Cal.App.5th 187.) These impacts have not been identified or analyzed at any point.

Even if individual project applications would be subject to review at a later date, the truncated review process created by the Ordinances will have a cumulative impact on the environment. The Ordinances trigger a requirement for further environmental review based on these cumulative impacts. (Cal. Code Regs. § 15300.2(b).)

In the complete absence of CEQA review of the Ordinances, it is impossible to assess the extent of their individual and cumulative impacts. The City must assess these Ordinances as “projects” for the purposes of CEQA, and undertake proper environmental review, prior to passing the Ordinances.

### **The City Did Not Provide Adequate Notice of the Ordinances**

The City failed to give the “notice required by law” of the Ordinances (Pub. Res. Code § 21177(e)). The members of Safe Embarcadero for All live near Seawall Lot 330 – a site that has already been earmarked for a navigation center, and to which the Ordinances are apparently intended to apply. As such, they should have been notified of the Ordinances (Planning Code §§ 302(b); 333.) They received no notice of either Ordinance, and were deprived of their opportunity to submit comments to the Planning Commission, Building Inspection Commission, or the Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Moreover, the public notices for the Land Use and Transportation Committee's hearings of the Ordinances did not provide "a meaningful description of each item of business to be transacted or discussed at the meeting." (Brown Act; San Francisco Administrative Code, §67.7.) The notice for each Ordinance simply mentioned: "affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act." This generic description did not provide any details about the substance of the Planning Department's determinations: that CEQA does not apply because the Ordinances are not a "Project." Accordingly, the content of the public notices was legally inadequate.

The City must comply with its CEQA obligations. We respectfully request that a complete environmental analysis be completed prior to final approval of the Ordinances.

In reference to the Board of Supervisors' meeting of Tuesday, 19 March 2019, items 23 and 24 of the agenda, files 190045 and 190047 respectively.

Dear Supervisors and Staff.

My wife and I have been residents of Brannan Street for ten years. We've seen the South Beach neighbourhood considerably change in this short span of time. Some things for the better, some for the worse, including the increase of homeless neighbours. All-in-all, we are extremely thankful for our privileged life, and wish all people the same or better quality of life. We applaud the City's commitments and efforts to help folk in need. However, a second Navigation Centre in our neighbourhood (in addition to one nearby in Dogpatch,) will bookend our home between approximately 600 homeless folk, and the known consequences that come with it. That's an unacceptable burden on us. South Beach and the east SOMA area are home to approximately 10,000 residents, from new borns to elderly, and numerous small businesses that cater a variety of services to us. Homeless folk don't, and really shouldn't, stay all day in the shelters. They wander during the day and interact with neighbours. They also wander at night when they cannot enter a shelter. Most of the interactions are pleasant, but some end in aggression, assault, theft, robbery, vandalism, break-ins, trespassing, loitering, unpleasant exchanges, public intoxication and use of drugs, relieving in public, control of public spaces, etc. Doubling the number of homeless in our neighbourhood will exacerbate the ongoing problem, not solve it. That's utterly unacceptable. I am a tall and large man with experience dealing with homeless folk, and I am accosted and harassed routinely while running local errands. And as I approach the mid-50s, I feel unsafe. The City is creating an unsafe environment for my wife and me. And promises of safety and cleanliness aren't sufficient. And there's nothing temporary about the proposed Navigation Centre. It will be there for a long time, far beyond the intended four years.

While my wife and I acknowledge the homeless situation, and we pitch-in with money and volunteering, and we believe homelessness ought to be solved with kindness and dignity, the proposed Navigation Centre, the largest in the City, is an unfair burden on us. We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings. Numerous neighbours are unaware of the proposed Navigation Centre, and during the two

public meetings of Tuesday 12 March, I (personally) couldn't find one supporter of the proposed Navigation Centre who lives or works in South Beach and the east SOMA area. The local inhabitants of the area, that is, those aware of the proposed Navigation Centre, are overwhelmingly opposed to it.

Regarding this specific passage in both ordinances, 'affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act', this is an unacceptable attempt at circumvent good environmental, sanitation, hygiene and health practices. Homeless shelters must adhere to CEQA (and NEPA) as a matter of principle.

Another point is that it seems the City is willing or considering paying fair market value to rent Seawall Lot 330. If my understanding is correct, that changes everything. There are dozens of properties in the San Francisco Bay Area that can be rented and that are more suitable for a Navigation Centre. Including, and echoing a neighbour who commented at the Port's Commission hearing, the lawn and space in front of the City Hall would easily host a couple of thousand homeless folk. And that immediate vicinity hardly has 10,000 residents like ours.

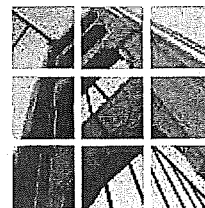
Finally; this 'crisis', as it has been labeled, draws parallels with the other infamous 'crisis' on the southern border, in which the latter is being extrapolated, exaggerated, dramatised to legitimise an unconstitutional use of power to implement an ill-conceived solution that locals don't support, don't want, and that won't solve the underscoring real problem. We must not allow this to happen in San Francisco, the bastion of progressiveness and liberalism. Otherwise we are no better than those that reject the legitimate will of the people. That's the real crisis.

We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings.

- Temporary Homeless Shelter Provisions During Shelter Crisis (File #190045)
- Streamlined Contracting for Homeless Services and Siting for Homeless Shelters (File #190047)

On March 5, a group of HSN representatives participated in a conversation with Emily Cohen, the Mayor's Policy Advisor on Homelessness, and Jeff Kositsky, Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing. We raised potential concerns about the importance of community engagement, the benefits of competitive bidding and the possibility of unintended consequences. Ms. Cohen and Mr. Kositsky provided thoughtful responses that addressed these issues. We are encouraged that the legislation maintains Prop I provisions for public notice, includes regular reports to the Board of Supervisors, allows for the use of RFQ's to ensure bidders are qualified, and ensures that the Department will monitor the performance of contractors who receive a no-bid contract.

Most importantly, we believe that the urgent need to address the emergency of people living – and dying – on our streets far outweighs the benefits of rigorous application of administrative processes for the duration of this shelter crisis. We urge the Board to approve these Ordinances and forward them to Mayor Breed for her signature.

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Good evening,

While I fully recognize the enormity of the homelessness crisis in San Francisco and the greater Bay Area, I have some concerns about the proposed plan to locate a navigation center along the Embarcadero (SF Port seawall lot 330).

First, why is it being located there rather than where the highest concentration of homeless people are currently located? It would make more sense to me to locate a place to help the homeless where they can easily and readily access it.

What will the navigation center do to help people who are chronically homeless? I fully support helping people who are attempting to get back on their feet, but what is the plan to help people actually get out of the navigation center rather than simply providing a place that bandaids a larger issue. Housing has been regularly shown to be the first step to helping people overcome homelessness, is a navigation center housing? Or simply a place to sleep? How is a navigation center really helping fight the homelessness crisis?

What is the impact of a large navigation center going to be on the visitors to SF and especially the Giants games? A lot of people travel along the Embarcadero and I struggle to believe that placing a navigation center along the Embarcadero will not increase the impression of SF being a place to avoid. I love SF and it's painful to hear all the stories of people coming here and seeing how poorly we are dealing with the homelessness crisis.

Also, as a resident of the area, what is going to be done/what assurances does the city provide to ensure waste, needles, trash, tents, or other sidewalk obstacles will not proliferate by drawing in more people? The East Cut neighborhood association spends our local money taking care of the job the city abdicates: keeping the streets clean. How is the city going to ensure the East Cut or other neighborhood associations are not required to take up an extra burden of keeping the streets clean and open for people with limited mobility.

I want SF to help those who need housing. I support the concept of providing services to homeless people to help them get back on their feet. I am not convinced that the current plan and this bypassing of so many regulations and public input processes is a proper approach. I urge you to reject the fast-track ordinances (190045 and 190047). Please instead fast track affordable housing (i.e., something people who make \$40,000 or less could afford) and affordable rentals (less than \$1200 a month for people who make \$40,000 or less). (FYI: these are guesses at affordable based on my experiences...I'm fine with making them lower, but not higher.)

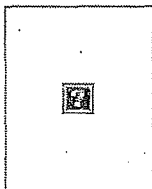

In reference to the Board of Supervisors' meeting of Tuesday, 19 March 2019, items 23 and 24 of the agenda, files 190045 and 190047 respectively.

Dear Supervisors and Staff.

My wife and I have been residents of Brannan Street for ten years. We've seen the South Beach neighbourhood considerably change in this short span of time. Some things for the better, some for the worse, including the increase of homeless neighbours. All-in-all, we are extremely thankful for our privileged life, and wish all people the same or better quality of life. We applaud the City's commitments and efforts to help folk in need. However, a second Navigation Centre in our neighbourhood (in addition to one nearby in Dogpatch,) will bookend our home between approximately 600 homeless folk, and the known consequences that come with it. That's an unacceptable burden on us. South Beach and the east SOMA area are home to approximately 10,000 residents, from new borns to elderly, and numerous small businesses that cater a variety of services to us. Homeless folk don't, and really shouldn't, stay all day in the shelters. They wander during the day and interact with neighbours. They also wander at night when they cannot enter a shelter. Most of the interactions are pleasant, but some end in aggression, assault, theft, robbery, vandalism, break-ins, trespassing, loitering, unpleasant exchanges, public intoxication and use of drugs, relieving in public, control of public spaces, etc. Doubling the number of homeless in our neighbourhood will exacerbate the ongoing problem, not solve it. That's utterly unacceptable. I am a tall and large man with experience dealing with homeless folk, and I am accosted and harassed routinely while running local errands. And as I approach the mid-50s, I feel unsafe. The City is creating an unsafe environment for my wife and me. And promises of safety and cleanliness aren't sufficient. And there's nothing temporary about the proposed Navigation Centre. It will be there for a long time, far beyond the intended four years.

While my wife and I acknowledge the homeless situation, and we pitch-in with money and volunteering, and we believe homelessness ought to be solved with kindness and dignity, the proposed Navigation Centre, the largest in the City, is an unfair burden on us. We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings. Numerous neighbours are unaware of the proposed Navigation Centre, and during the two public meetings of Tuesday 12 March, I (personally) couldn't find one supporter of the proposed Navigation Centre who lives or works in South Beach and the east SOMA area. The local inhabitants of the area, that is, those aware of the proposed Navigation Centre, are overwhelmingly opposed to it.

Regarding this specific passage in both ordinances, 'affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act', this is an unacceptable attempt at circumvent good environmental, sanitation, hygiene and health practices. Homeless shelters must adhere to CEQA (and NEPA) as a matter of principle.

Another point is that it seems the City is willing or considering paying fair market value to rent Seawall Lot 330. If my understanding is correct, that changes everything: There are dozens of properties in the San Francisco Bay Area that can be rented and that are more suitable for a Navigation Centre. Including, and echoing a neighbour who commented at the Port's Commission hearing, the lawn and space in front of the City Hall would easily host a couple of thousand homeless folk. And that immediate vicinity hardly has 10,000 residents like ours.

Finally, this 'crisis', as it has been labeled, draws parallels with the other infamous 'crisis' on the southern border, in which the latter is being extrapolated, exaggerated, dramatised to legitimise an unconstitutional use of power to implement an ill-conceived solution that locals don't support, don't want, and that won't solve the underscoring real problem. We must not allow this to happen in San Francisco, the bastion of progressiveness and liberalism. Otherwise we are no better than those that reject the legitimate will of the people. That's the real crisis.

We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings.

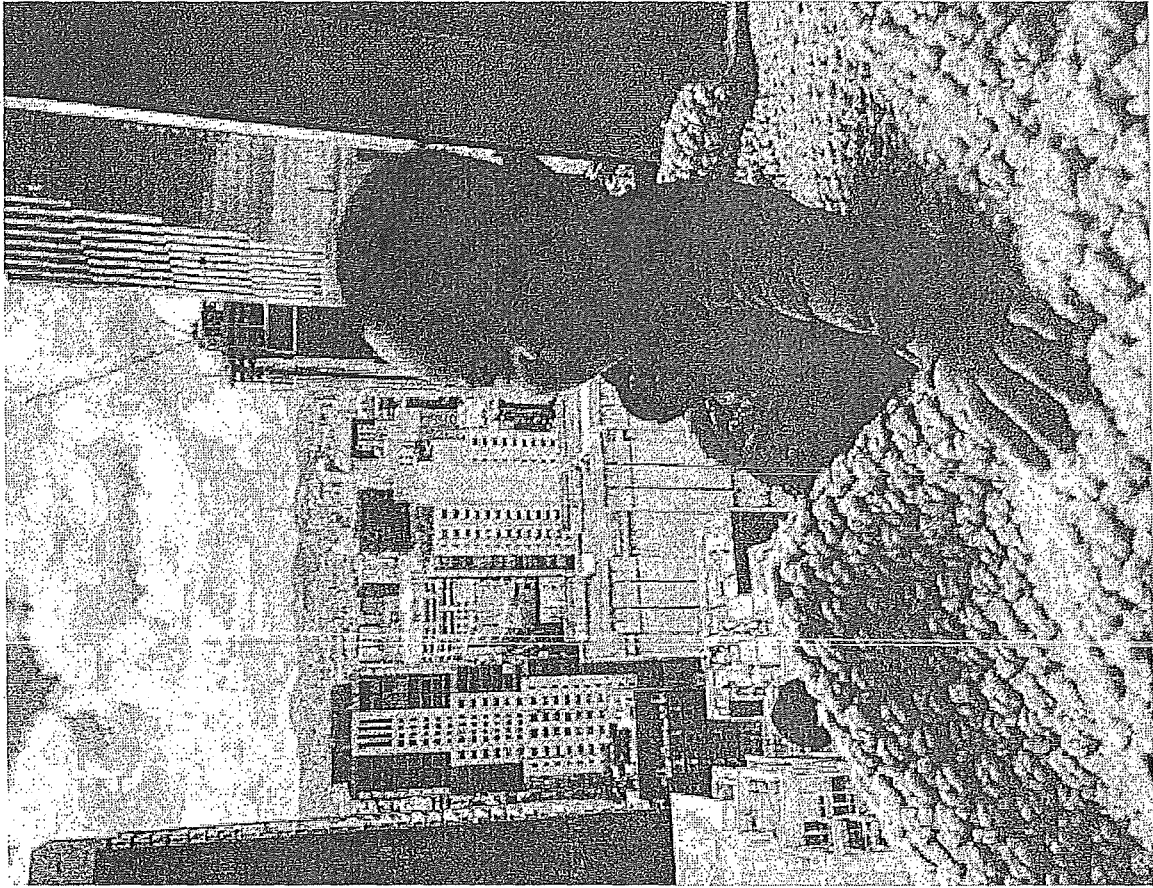

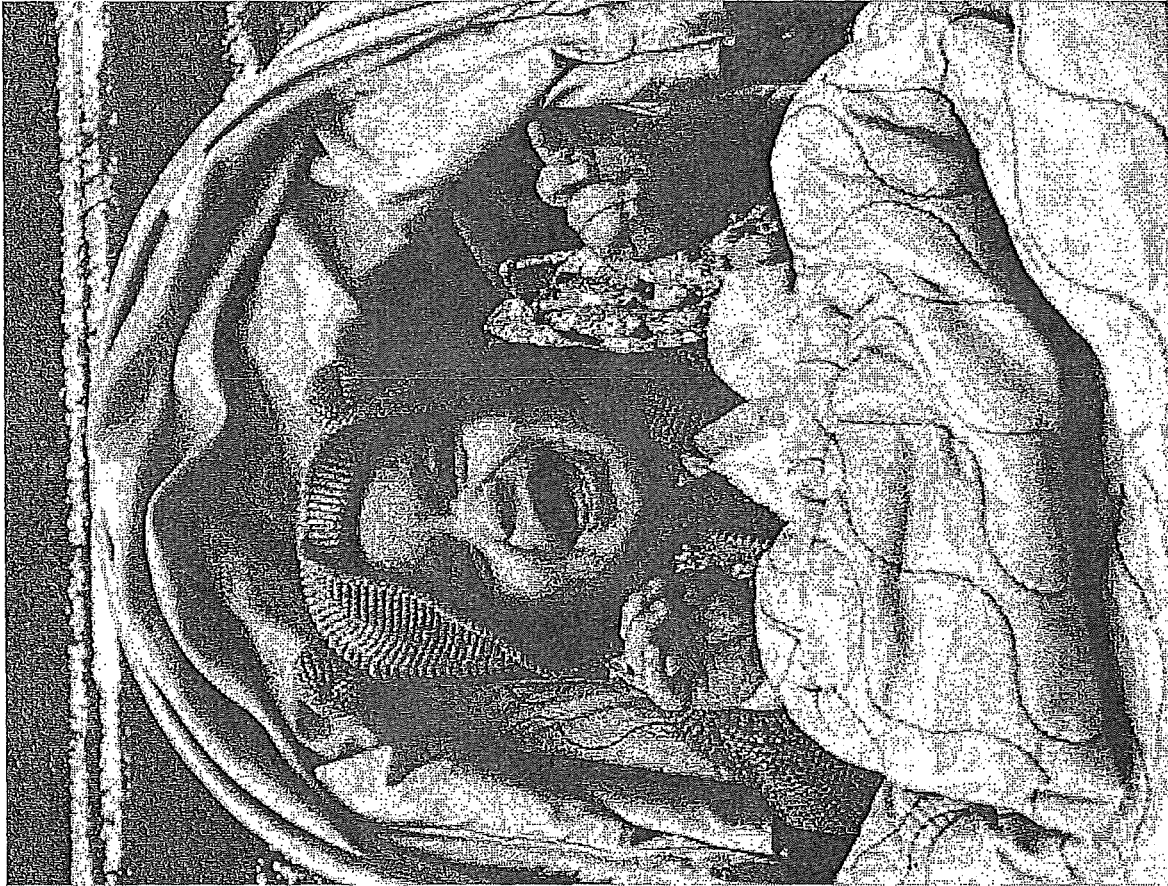

Dear Supervisor Yee,

We are elderly residents of D7, and your constituents. Our family has one simple reason to oppose the fast track ordinances are pushed to enable a poorly thought through plan for the mega navigation center: **our daughter's family with two grandchildren will be forced to move.**

Here's Victoria's story and grave concern about the way Mayor Breed is steamrolling the Board and her constituents:

"I've been a resident of South Beach since 2004. My two kids have been born and raised here. Our family has always been deeply committed to the neighborhood - I organized a very first mom group, our international community of young families and children spending time every Friday at Crossroads. After our second child was born, we didn't move even though raising two kids in an area with no public schools, surrounded by Bay Bridge and games traffic wasn't a small feat. But we felt that benefits of urban environment and our love for the community of South Beach outweighed the difficulties.

Over the years, we watched our neighbors and friends move out, some after having one child, others after a second one was born or kids hit kindergarten age. The local press and even NYT portrayed San Francisco as a **the most child unfriendly city**. Our family stayed. Delayed construction projects in Downtown, in particular completely broken down pothole-riddled Brannan street on top of never ending MUNI tunnel on 4th, have taken a tremendous toll on us as we have to drive our kids to school outside of SOMA 5 days a week, and return to FIDi for work. Our commute just to the kids' school extended from 20 min to almost an hour; even worse for the commute back. This cut into the time kids could have been using for sports or other activities. Still, we have stayed.

But the area continued to deteriorate. Open illegal drug use is happening within a few blocks of our house. My children see piles of trash, feces, needles... And then they go to school to learn how to care about the environment. They see tents, they see mentally ill people and going off high drug users screaming on the streets or pacing around aimlessly. All of those stopped being educational moments for us long time ago. At this point, my one all consuming worry is the safety of my children. And this is not unwarranted.

My teenage son and I were recently attacked on Embarcadero and Townsend on Sunday late afternoon. In the broad daylight, a large man with signs of mental disturbance started screaming obscenities and ran towards us. 911 was called, eventually SFPD got he attacker. This incident resulted in my son being scared of walking alone in South Beach. He was forced to quit YMCA swim team because he no longer felt safe walking 4 blocks to Embarcadero Y. This is not the only story of altercations my family had with the homeless addicted



individuals, But this one shows you the impact lack of safety has on ANY and ALL parts of our day to day life.

You may want to dismiss this as a "first world problems". It is not. I am an immigrant and a refugee escaping discrimination; my husband is a war refugee escaping bombs that fell on his city. We know UNSAFE. We came here looking for safety for us, safety for our children, and safety for our elderly parents. We've been gradually losing the safety. And now, with the decision to put a 200+ bed Navigation Center, with no mandatory treatment program for addicts, with a completely incompetent HSH vouching for running the mega center in a manner that "won't impact the community", and with Mayor's complete disregard to any real impact or proper process, we know you are forcing us out. **My immigrant refugee family looking for a safer life for our kids is no longer welcome in San Francisco, we simply do not exist. A threat to safety will impact many many immigrants that made a home here, because safety is what we came here for.**

It is evident that Mayor Breed making "take no prisoners" approach with the navigation center because somehow she is seeing it as a pillar for her re-election. I campaigned for Mayor Breed, and got my and my husband's family to vote for her. Over 10 FIRST TIME votes went to Breed because of me. And now her policies, specifically as it relates to having safe streets, are the only reason we have to move out of the city. She sees this project as an appeasement to small vocal special interests group, and uses vulnerable segments such as immigrants, children, elderly as a sacrifice.

Putting 200 "hard to reach street dwellers" who are chronically homeless under one roof is going to create problems inside the center. HSH has a clear track record of inability to control those problems and they lack any experience handling the location of such scale. Once uncontrolled, the problems such as drug use, violent behavior and theft will quickly spill over into the neighborhood. SFPD seemed to promise to help. I have not seen anything from Southern station. And the homeless outreach team is always citing how overwhelmed they are handling Tenderloin. The promise brings me no comfort. In addition, this parking lot is cut off by heavy traffic on Embarcadero, Beale and Brannan. So just mere geography make this location a very challenging one to deal with in a timely banner when problems start arising. I am appalled that no one is looking at the impact based on real life scenarios. The center is open 24/7, and with most residents using drugs regularly but unable to use inside, where would they be? on the Waterfront. Where would they buy illegal drugs? On the Waterfront. Where will the dealers come to sell to users? To the Waterfront. There's no mandatory treatment, there's no consequence for openly using meth or heroin, and there are very little consequences of dealing. So **WHAT WILL STOP THIS FROM HAPPENING?"**

Please do what you can to prevent this project from happening without doing any adequate due diligence. Your ethics should stop you from supporting this.

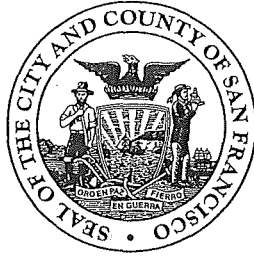

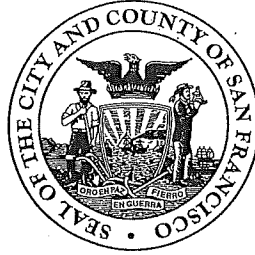
