12 WHEREAS, The COVID-19 pandemic has increased demand for food assistance,  
13 mental health services, childcare, and other critical services, and the YMCA of San Francisco  
14 has continued providing this essential aid, and SF Goodwill partnered with a local food bank  
15 to support the community; and

16 WHEREAS, SF Goodwill provides second chances through training and the dignity of  
17 work and SF Goodwill has transitioned their job training and career services programs to  
18 virtual platforms and began helping recently unemployed residents navigate unemployment  
19 benefits and secure essential jobs; and

20 WHEREAS, Social enterprise organizations like SF Goodwill and YMCA of San  
21 Francisco operate self-funded business models in order to deliver their respective missions  
22 without full dependence on philanthropic donations or government grants; and

23 WHEREAS, SF Goodwill and YMCA of San Francisco have had to severely curtail their  
24 business operations and services to the community in order to comply with the Shelter in  
25 Place orders mandated by Bay Area jurisdictions and California Governor Newsom; and

1           WHEREAS, Although both organizations continue to receive funding through some  
2 private donations, regional and local financial hardships have made it increasingly difficult to  
3 continue to provide communities with critical services in the long term; and

4           WHEREAS, Despite financial hardships and difficult internal decisions to furlough  
5 and/or lay-off employees and skeletal staff, both organizations continue to serve all  
6 communities in the Bay Area during this critical time; and

7           WHEREAS, SF Goodwill and YMCA of San Francisco were ineligible for Paycheck  
8 Protection Program (PPP) funding from the CARES Act due to employing more than 500  
9 employees; and

10          WHEREAS, The newly proposed HEROES Act outlines the support necessary for the

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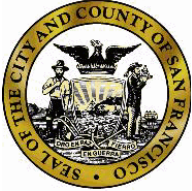

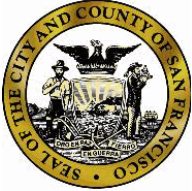

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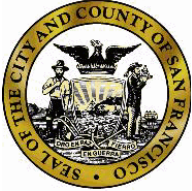
