

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Legislative Objective

- Resolution authorizing the Human Services Agency to retroactively accept and expend a \$105,000 grant from Code for America Labs, Inc., a nonprofit organization, toward the cost of participating in the 2013 Code for America Fellowship Program, which has selected HSA to receive technology design services from Code for America to increase access to public benefits by the City's lowest income residents.

Key Points

- Under the proposed 15-month grant, three individuals selected as fellows for Code for America would be assigned to San Francisco to research and develop technology-based solutions for improved access to public assistance benefits for HSA clients. Under the terms of the proposed grant agreement between the City and Code for America, the proposed Fellowship Program would be for a total of \$360,000, including \$105,000 from Code for America Labs, Inc. and \$255,000 of required City matching funds from HSA and the Department of Technology (DT).

Fiscal Impacts

- The proposed \$105,000 Code for America grant would provide 29% of the total \$360,000 Code for America Fellowship Program, and the City would provide the balance of the \$255,000 or 71% of matching funds with (a) \$75,000 of General Fund revenues from HSA's FY 2012-13 budget and (b) \$180,000 of workordered revenues from DT's FY 2012-13 budget.
- The proposed resolution requests that the Board of Supervisors waive the inclusion of indirect costs (the City's costs to administer the grant), which are estimated at approximately 12 percent or \$12,600, which would be absorbed by HSA and DT, in order to maximize the use of available grant funds on program expenditures.
- Although specific savings cannot be calculated at this time, this project has the potential to generate workload efficiencies at HSA due to (a) a reduction in caseload churning and (b) the use of technology to facilitate client outreach and communication. However, such efficiencies and cost savings may be partially offset by future ongoing operating expenditures required to sustain the technology solutions developed as part of this project.

Recommendation

- Approval of the proposed resolution is a policy decision for the Board of Supervisors as outlined in the Policy Consideration section below.

MANDATE STATEMENT / BACKGROUND**Mandate Statement**

Administrative Code Section 10.170-1 provides that the acceptance and expenditure of federal, state or other grants of \$100,000 or more are subject to approval by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

Background

Code for America Labs, Inc. is a nonprofit organization, often referred to as the “peace corps for geeks”, which is dedicated to helping governments work better for everyone through people and the power of the web. As part of Code for America Labs Fellowship Program, Code for America Labs recruits individuals who (a) are experts in web technology, (b) can dedicate a year to public service, and (c) are interested in creating innovative technology solutions to civic problems. These individuals are then matched with applicant cities that (a) demonstrate strong leadership to overcome bureaucratic obstacles, (b) have identified real cost-saving projects, (c) can provide funding to support the project, (d) promote transparency, and (e) provide community participation.

The City of San Francisco, through the Mayor’s Office, the Human Services Agency, and the Department of Technology applied and was selected through a competitive process to participate in the 2013 Code for America Labs Fellowship Program.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed resolution would authorize the Human Services Agency to retroactively accept and expend a grant for \$105,000 from Code for America Labs, Inc. toward the cost of participating in the 2013 Code for America Fellowship Program, which has selected HSA to receive technology design services from Code for America to increase access to public assistance benefits by the City’s lowest income residents. Under this grant, three individuals selected as fellows for Code for America would be assigned to San Francisco to research and develop technology-based solutions for improving access to public assistance for recipients of HSA benefits and services, such as the homeless, MediCal recipients and CalFresh¹ clients.

According to Mr. David Curto, Director of Contracts for HSA, the working problem posed to Code for America, that would be addressed under the proposed grant, is that (a) not all San Franciscans that are eligible for public assistance benefits are enrolled, and (b) those San Franciscans that are enrolled frequently “churn” on and off of HSA public benefit caseloads, creating significant workload inefficiencies for HSA and service gaps for clients. Under the proposed grant, the Code for America fellows would research, identify and develop strategies that facilitate the cross-enrollment of HSA clients who are participating in one set of HSA

services into other HSA services for which those clients may be eligible. Mr. Curto advises that the specific technology solutions to these problems are yet to be determined, but the applications developed would potentially be for use by HSA staff, community-based service providers and/or current and prospective clients.

The term of the subject grant is 15 months, retroactive from October 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013. Under the terms of the proposed grant agreement between the City and Code for America, the proposed Fellowship Program would be for a total of \$360,000, including \$105,000 from Code for America Labs, Inc. and \$255,000 of required City matching funds from HSA and the Department of Technology.

Under this grant, the three fellows would receive an initial one-month intensive training from Code for America support staff working with City staff in government, industry and technology, including the specific issues affecting San Francisco, HSA and the specific clients to be served. This one-month training period is anticipated to occur in January of 2013. During February, the three fellows would conduct interviews with City staff and HSA clients to gain a better understanding of the specific problems and issues. During the remainder of the 15-month grant period, the three fellows would research potential solutions and then focus their attention on developing and implementing specific web-based applications for this project. During the last two months, the three fellows would develop plans to sustain their solutions on an ongoing basis.

FISCAL IMPACTS

As shown in Table 1 below, the proposed \$105,000 Code for America grant would provide 29% of the total \$360,000 Code for America Fellowship Program funds. As also reflected in Table 1 below, the City would provide the balance of the \$255,000 or 71% of matching funds with (a) \$75,000 of General Fund revenues from HSA's FY 2012-13 budget and (b) \$180,000 of revenues allocated to DT's FY 2012-13 budget through workorders from other City departments. According to Mr. Ken Bukowski, Chief Financial Officer for the Department of Technology, approximately 70% or approximately \$126,000 of the total \$180,000 workordered funds are General Fund revenues. Therefore, the City's matching funds include approximately \$201,000 (\$75,000 + \$126,000) of General Fund revenues.

According to Mr. Curto, the \$75,000 included in HSA's FY 2012-13 budget, as previously approved by the Board of Supervisors, is a general line item included for information technology and software programming purposes to support agency operations, which is the intent of the subject grant. According to Mr. Bukowski, the \$180,000 included in DT's FY 2012-13 budget, as previously approved by the Board of Supervisors, was originally budgeted for various innovation projects, with the expectation that the City might receive this Code for America grant.

As shown in Table 2 below, most of the \$360,000 project costs would pay for salaries and benefits for the three Code for America Fellows and Code for America support staff. The overall budget also includes \$56,000 to cover office space and equipment at Code for America headquarters, located at 155 9th Street, where the three fellows will spend significant time during the grant period. In addition, Mr. Curto advises that the three Code for America Fellows would have office space in HSA's existing offices at 1650 Mission Street.

The proposed resolution requests that the Board of Supervisors waive the inclusion of indirect costs (the City's costs to administer the grant) in the grant budget, in order for HSA to maximize the use of available grant funds on program expenditures. Mr. Curto estimates indirect costs for the subject \$105,000 grant would be approximately 12 percent, or \$12,600, which would be absorbed by HSA and DT. Under the proposed grant agreement, the City will designate 5%-10% of HSA's and DT's staff's time to assist the three Fellows throughout the year.

Mr. Curto advises that, although specific savings cannot be calculated at this time, this project has the potential to generate efficiencies and potential cost savings to the City, including workload efficiencies at HSA due to (a) a reduction in caseload churning and (b) the use of technology to facilitate client outreach and communication.

Mr. Curto acknowledges that such efficiencies and cost savings may be partially offset by future ongoing operating expenditures required to sustain the technology solutions developed as part of

this project. However, Mr. Curto reports that the specific costs of maintaining future technology solutions, while unknown at this time, are anticipated to be primarily covered by using existing HSA information technology staff. According to Mr. Curto, Code for America develops applications using open source technology² and that one or more of HSA's information technology staff will be trained by the Code for America fellows in the use of such open source technology in order to be able to maintain such technology solutions in the future.

Mr. Curto notes that, although he was not able to provide specific calculations, Code for America estimates that if the City were to contract with a private vendor for the services that will be received under the proposed \$360,000 grant project, the market value would be worth approximately \$900,000.

POLICY CONSIDERATION

Under the proposed resolution, the City would receive \$105,000 of grant funds from Code for America to undertake a \$360,000 2013 Code for America Fellowship Program for the subject 15-month period ending December 31, 2013. However, in order to receive such grant funds under the proposed resolution, the City would (a) be required to contribute \$255,000 (see Table 1 above) to this Program, including approximately \$201,000 of General Fund revenues, and (b) waive the inclusion of indirect costs (the City's costs to administer the grant) which are estimated at \$12,600, which would be absorbed by HSA and DT. In addition, the potential workload efficiencies and cost savings to HSA from the proposed technologies to be developed as well as any potential additional operating expenditures to be incurred in the future cannot be estimated at this time. Therefore, approval of the proposed resolution is a policy decision for the Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDATION

Approval of the proposed resolution is a policy decision for the Board of Supervisors.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) requests authorization to enter into a new grant agreement with Code For America Inc. for the period of October 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013, in an amount not to exceed \$ 360,000. The purpose of this grant is to participate in a competitive fellowship program awarded by Code for America to DHS to research and develop technology based solution(s) for improved access to benefits for Homeless, MediCal and CalFresh clients.

Background

Code for America (CfA) is a new non-profit organization with an innovative model and mission. Beginning in 2011, CfA has brought together web experts, civic leaders, and members of the technology industry to form a network of individuals who believe there is a better way of doing

things. CfA refers to themselves as the “peace corps for geeks”. CfA helps governments become more connected, lean, and participatory through new opportunities for public service both inside and outside of government. Through a collaborative effort with the Mayor’s office, Department of Technology and DHS, San Francisco applied to become a participant in the 2013 Fellowship program and was accepted into this very prestigious program. This is the first time CfA will be targeting solutions specifically for clients served by our department.

Services to be Provided

Code for America is providing a cash contribution of \$105,000 to this project in addition to the \$255,000 the Departments are contributing. The market value of this specialized service is estimated to be in the \$900,000 range if purchased in the private sector.

During the grant term CfA will host a team of three “fellows” to work closely with our staff to understand the needs and challenges for access to benefits and create web based solutions to address them.

Selection, Recruitment, Training

Fellows are selected from a pool of passionate individuals with skills in technology, design, and management. Fellow selection is highly competitive. Applicants are evaluated by a selection committee composed of CfA staff, and industry and government leaders. Fellows will participate in a one-month intensive training experience covering relevant topics associated with government, industry and technology including an immersion into specific issues affecting San Francisco and DHS. Training continues throughout the year.

Residency

Over the course of the Program, Fellows will conduct interviews with our staff and clients and continue research to form and drive solutions. They will focus on developing applications that drive engagement, transparency and efficiencies targeted for this project.

“Wrap up and Hand-off”

The last two months of the program are dedicated to wrapping up the program and ensuring DHS has a plan to sustain the solution(s) and continue collaboration going forward. The program ends formally in December 2013.

Selection

Award of fellowship participation grant by Code for America to the San Francisco Human Services Agency.

Funding

Funding for this grant is provided by the City and County General Fund (71%); \$75,000 from DHS and \$180,000 via work order from the Department of Technology. Funding will also be provided through a \$105,000 contribution from Code for America (29%).





Section A: Elements of Fellowship Program

2013 Program Selection	CfA selects partners that demonstrate strong leadership, secured funding, and a dedication to building efficiencies, transparency and citizen participation into government.
Fellow Recruitment	CfA recruits and selects passionate individuals with skills in technology, design, and management who want to dedicate a year to public service. Fellow selection is highly competitive. Applicants are evaluated by a selection committee composed of CfA staff, and industry and government leaders.
CfA Training	CfA fellows participate in a one-month intensive training experience covering relevant topics associated with government, industry and technology and will do a deep dive into learning about you city. Training also continues throughout the year.
Residency	During February 2013 the fellows will be on site in [Your City] working with the designated team there. Goals during this month include learning how City X operates, gathering information about the proposed program focus, building a network of government, community and developer support, and brainstorming ideas and solutions with industry leaders and city staff. City X is expected to provide tours of major departments and training in the major functions of the city, set up appropriate meetings between the Fellows and staff, and to make the necessary introductions to city employees in order to ensure a successful Program. Section C: City Expectations

Program Coordinator	City will designate a Program Coordinator that will work with CfA staff to execute the contract, ensure the success of the Residency, support Fellows throughout the Program, and participate in team meetings and other meetings, as needed.
Contract Execution	City will ensure timely execution of the contract. This will require contract to be signed and completed by September 1, 2012.
CfA Training	Your City Team will participate in specific modules during CfA Training designed to introduce you to your assigned Fellows and help them understand program goals and objectives. These modules can be conducted via a video conference call.
Host 2013 Residency	City is expected to set up appropriate meetings between CfA Fellows and city staff and relevant community leaders and groups to ensure a successful Program. City X will host the CfA Fellows on site in city offices and provide them with space to work. As necessary, City X will also provide necessary access to government buildings and systems.
City X Support	City will be prepared to designate 5% - 10% of one or two staff's time to help support the Fellows during the program including serving as an overall resource, participating in planning and organizing meetings, identifying project sponsors, helping with sustainability planning, etc..
Team Meetings	City will participate in regular team meetings as required. Team meetings may occur more frequently during the Residency month and occasionally throughout Program.
Program Conferences	City will participate in two Program Conferences in San Francisco, CA tentatively scheduled for October 2012 and October 2013.
Program Sustainability	City will plan for and ensure sustainability of the solution after the 2013 Program. This may require identifying city resources that can support, maintain, and grow the solution over time.

Section D: Code for America Expectations

Fellow Recruitment and Selection	CfA recruits and selects passionate technologists throughout the country who want to give a year to public service. Fellow selection is highly competitive. Fellows are evaluated by a selection committee made up of CfA staff, and industry and government leaders.
CfA Head of Government Relations	CfA's head of Government Relations will be the City's primary point person within CfA for issues associated with contracting, overall program performance, and other issues as they arise. Other CfA staff will interact with the cities periodically around City Residency planning and overall program execution.

Residency	CfA staff will partner with City X's Program Coordinator to ensure the success of Residency. CfA provides travel and housing expenses for the Fellows during the Residency period.
Solution Building	CfA Fellows will partner with city staff to develop solution(s) to the proposed focus, as defined in the 2013 Program application, or other focus that is mutually determined during the Program.
Program Conferences	CfA will host two conferences - one in October 2012 to orient the City Coordinator (and other applicable staff) to the 2013 program. The other will be in October, 2013 that will bring together city staff, Fellows, government partners, and industry leaders, to review and share progress, stories and further opportunities.
Wrap-up and Hand Off	CfA will dedicate the last two months of the Program to wrap-up and hand off the solution to ensure City X has the ability to sustain the solution. Events may be conducted in your city to formalize the transition.

Section E: Payments

Program Fee. City shall pay to CFA a fee for the City's participation in our program in the amount of \$180,000. Invoices will be issued 30 days prior to the scheduled payment date. Payments are scheduled as follows:

1. \$120,000 on November 1, 2012
2. \$120,000 on February 1, 2013
3. \$40,000 on May 1, 2013

Late Payments

In the event that the City fails to pay when due any amounts set forth above, CFA shall send to City written notice of such failure. If the City fails to cure the breach by paying such amounts within fifteen (15) days after receipt of such written demand, then City shall be deemed to be in material breach of this Agreement and CFA shall have the right to take any of the following actions: (i) suspend its own performance under this Agreement until such payment has been received; or (ii) terminate the Agreement, in which case CFA shall be entitled to receive payment of all amounts due under this Agreement through the effective date of termination. Regardless of the action taken by CFA, any amounts owed to CFA by City shall be calculated from the date the last payment was made up to, and, including the last day of the notice period by calculating a pro rata portion of the Program Fee.
