SUPPORTING THE GOLDEN GATE NATIONAL RECREATION AREA'S APPLICATION FOR

THE SUTRO HISTORIC DISTRICT TO BE INCLUDED IN THE NATIONAL REGISTER

OF HISTORIC PLACES AND URGING THE GGNRA TO PRESERVE THE GIANT CAMERA

OBSCURA IN ITS PRESENT STRUCTURE AND LOCATION AS PART OF THE SUTRO

HISTORIC DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, The Camera Obscura, or "Giant Camera," was built in 1946 and been in continuous operation at a site facing the ocean, just west of the Cliff House, since that time; and,

WHEREAS, The Giant Camera at the Cliff House was built by a San Francisco businessman, Floyd Jennings, who became interested in the idea of a camera obscura through reading scientific publications; and,

WHEREAS, In 1957, the then-owner of the Cliff House, George K. Whitney, Sr., suggested housing the Giant Camera in a structure designed to resemble a camera - a style of architecture known as "signature architecture" in which the building looks like its name; and,

WHEREAS, The Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA) submitted an application for the Giant Camera to be included in the National Register of Historic Places in 1980, but the application was denied because the Camera was then less than the fifty years old required for approval; and,

WHEREAS, In conjunction with this application, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors unanimously passed a resolution requesting the Secretary of the Interior to issue a determination regarding the eligibility of the Giant Camera Obscura for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places and supporting the "retention of the Giant Camera Obscura as a project of special historical and cultural importance and for its preservation and inclusion in the Masterplan of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area," and this resolution was Resolution #650-80; and,

WHEREAS, The Giant Camera has been a popular tourist attraction at its location next to the Cliff House for fifty-three years because it provides a spectacular view of the ocean and Seal Rocks; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors supports the Golden Gate National Recreation Area's application for the Sutro Historic District to be included in the National Register of Historic Places; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the GGNRA to preserve the Giant Camera Obscura in its present structure and location as part of the Sutro Historic District; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board forward a copy of Resolution #650-80 to the GGNRA for inclusion in the application of the Sutro Historic District to the National Register of Historic Places.
