14	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:		
15			
16	Section 1. Land Use Findings. The Planning Department has determined that the		
17	actions contemplated in this ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act		
18	(California Public Resources Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with		
19	the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No and is incorporated herein by reference.		
20	The Board of Su	upervisors ("Board") affirms this determination.	
21			
22	Section 2	General Findings. On August 4, 2022, the City adopted Ordinance	
23	No. 174-22, which created a pilot program enabling the Department of Public Works ("Public		
24	Works") to perform graffiti abatement on private property following receipt of the owners'		
25	written consent, at no cost to the property owner. Commercial property owners and small		

businesses have appreciated the services provided under this program and the program has resulted in meaningful abatement of graffiti in commercial corridors. Based on the success of the pilot program, the Board wishes to create a permanent graffiti abatement program in commercial corridors.

Section 3. Article 23 of the Public Works Code is hereby amended by revising Section 2306, to read as follows:

SEC. 2306. ABATEMENT BY DIRECTOR.

(e) <u>Graffiti</u> Abatement <u>Program</u> in Commercial <u>Corridors Areas: Pilot Program</u>. Within 90 days of the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 220538 adding this subsection (e), the Director shall create a pilot program As an alternative to the other abatement procedures in this Article 23, the Director shall administer a Commercial Corridor Graffiti Abatement Program ("Abatement Program") that allows property owners in Commercial Corridors to provide written consent authorizing Public Works to enter onto their property and remove graffiti, <u>as described</u> further below, provided that Public Works has sufficient funds to operate this program. The Director is authorized to issue regulations consistent with the Abatement Program.

(1) Opt-In Program. Property owners in Commercial Corridors may elect to participate in the Abatement Program by providing Public Works with written consent as set forth herein. The scope of any graffiti abatement shall be consistent with the scope of abatement provided in subsection (d)(1). Such removal and abatement shall be offered at no cost to the property owner, provided that the owner waives any claims arising from the work, other than any claims for damages arising from negligence or non-compliance with laws. The pilot program is an alternative to the other abatement procedures in this Article 23, and aA property owner may enroll in the pilotAbatement pProgram at any time, including upon receipt of a Notice of Violation;

1	provided, however, that a property owner who contests the Notice of Violation shall be		
2	ineligible to participate in the program. The Director is authorized to issue regulations consistent		
3	with this subsection (e).		
4	(2)(1) Commercial Corridors. For purposes of the Abatement Programthis		
5	$\underline{subsection}$ (e), Commercial Corridors shall \underline{mean} include properties in the following areas:		
6	Neighborhood Commercial Districts, Named Neighborhood Commercial Districts,		
7	Neighborhood Commercial Transit Districts, and Named Neighborhood Commercial Transit		
8	Districts, as listed in Section 201 of the Planning Code, and defined in Section 702 of the		
9	Planning Code,: the Chinatown Community Business District, as defined in Planning Code		
10	Section 810; the Chinatown Residential/Neighborhood Commercial District as defined in		
11	Planning Code Section 812; and the Chinatown Visitor Retail District, as defined in Planning		
12	Code Section 811.		
13	(3)(2) Relationship to Community Benefits Districts and Green Benefits		
14	Districts. The owner of any property located in a Community Benefits District or Green		
15	Benefits District, as defined in Articles 15 and 15A of the Business and Tax Regulations Code		
16	must first demonstrate to the Director's satisfaction that the relevant district lacks funding for		
17	graffiti abatement or has exhausted all available funding for graffiti abatement, in order to		
18	participate in the $pilot \underline{Abatement} p\underline{P}$ rogram $\underline{established in this subsection (e)}$.		
19	(3) Expiration of Pilot Program. Unless the Board of Supervisors by ordinance		
20	extends the term of the Pilot Program, this subsection (e) shall expire by operation of law 27 months		
21	following the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 220538 establishing the Pilot Program.		
22	After that date, the City Attorney is authorized to remove this subsection (e) to be removed from the		
	After that date, the City Attorney is dumorized to remove this subsection (e) to be removed from the		
23	Public Works Code.

1	Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after	
2	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the	
3	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board	
4	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.	
5		
6	Section 5. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors	
7	intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles,	
8	numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal	
9	Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment	
10	additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under	
11	the official title of the ordinance.
