

1 [Declaration of Election Results - November 5, 2024, Consolidated General Election]

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3 **Resolution declaring the results of the November 5, 2024, Consolidated General**
4 **Election.**

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6 WHEREAS, A Consolidated General Election was conducted in the City and County of
7 San Francisco on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, at which the voters considered candidates for
8 the Mayor, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, City Attorney, District Attorney, Sheriff,
9 Treasurer, the Governing Board of the San Francisco Unified School District, the Board of
10 Trustees for the Community College District, the BART District Board of Directors, and local
11 ballot measures; and

12 WHEREAS, John Arntz, the Director of Elections for the City and County of San
13 Francisco, has certified the results of the Consolidated General Election, a copy of which is
14 contained in Board File No. 241178 and which is incorporated herein by reference; now,
15 therefore, be it

16 RESOLVED, That under California Elections Code, Sections 9269 and 15400, this
17 Board of Supervisors affirms the Director of Elections' certified results for the City and County
18 of San Francisco's November 5, 2024, Consolidated General Election and declares the
19 results for the local elective offices and local ballot measures, as follows:

16 Each measure listed below is declared adopted:

17 1. Bonds

18 The following Bond required and received an affirmative vote of at least 55% of the

19 votes cast thereon and was therefore passed by the voters:

20 PROPOSITION A: Schools Improvement and Safety Bond

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22 The following Bond required and received an affirmative vote of two-thirds (66.67%) of

23 the votes cast thereon and was therefore passed by the voters:

1 PROPOSITION B: Community Health and Medical Facilities, Street Safety, Public
2 Spaces, and Shelter to Reduce Homelessness Bond

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4 2. Charter Amendments

5 The following Charter Amendments required and received an affirmative vote of a
6 majority (50%, plus 1) of the votes cast thereon and were therefore passed by the
7 voters:

8 PROPOSITION C: Inspector General

9 PROPOSITION E: Creating a Task Force to Recommend Changing, Eliminating, or
10 Combining City Commissions

11 PROPOSITION G: Funding Rental Subsidies for Affordable Housing Developments
12 Serving Low Income Seniors, Families, and Persons with Disabilities

13 PROPOSITION H: Retirement Benefits for Firefighters

14 PROPOSITION I: Retirement Benefits for Nurses and 911 Operators

15 PROPOSITION J: Funding Programs Serving Children, Youth, and Families

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17 3. Ordinances

18 The following Ordinances required and received an affirmative vote of majority
19 (50%+1) of the votes cast thereon and were therefore passed by the voters:

20 PROPOSITION K: Permanently Closing the Upper Great Highway to Private Vehicles
21 to Establish a Public Open Recreation Space

22 PROPOSITION L: Additional Business Tax on Transportation Network Companies and
23 Autonomous Vehicle Businesses to Fund Public Transportation. (Because Propositions
24 L and M both passed and Proposition M received more votes than Proposition L, by
25 Proposition M's express terms, Proposition L will not go into effect.)

1 PROPOSITION M: Changes to Business Taxes
2 PROPOSITION N: First Responder Student Loan and Training Reimbursement Fund
3 PROPOSITION O: Supporting Reproductive Rights
4 All other local ballot measures failed to meet the legally required vote thresholds for
5 adoption.

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
