Re: Ethics Commission Recommending Changes to Trustee Election Disclosures

Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors:

The San Francisco Ethics Commission recommends that the Board of Supervisors enact legislation that would discontinue the campaign reporting requirements of candidates for the Retirement Board, Health Service Board, and Retiree Health Care Trust Fund Board. The Commission has found these requirements to be unnecessary, overly strict, and administratively burdensome and does not believe they add sufficient value to the City to justify their continued existence.

This recommendation stems from the Commission's current *Streamlining Project* that was undertaken to evaluate various programs and policies administered by the Commission to determine if they are effective, efficient, adding value to the City, and furthering the Commission's mission of promoting the highest standards of integrity in government. This program evaluation included soliciting feedback from the regulated community, members of the public, and other stakeholders.

Most of the recommendations emerging from this project involve changes to San Francisco's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code and will thus require joint approval by the Board of Supervisors and the Ethics Commission. Commission staff will be reaching out to the Board soon to engage on those changes. However, the rules regarding the trustee election disclosure requirements are contained within the Administrative Code,¹ which is outside of the Ethics Commission's legislative authority. Thus, these changes require action solely from the Board of Supervisors.

On June 13, 2025, the Ethics Commission voted to authorize the Chair and the Executive Director to send this letter to the Board to formally make this legislative recommendation. At that meeting, Ethics Commission staff presented this recommendation, along with several others, under <u>Agenda Item 7</u>. The portion of the associated staff memo regarding the trustee election disclosure requirements is provided as **Attachment 1** to this letter.

A brief overview of the current program, the Commission's findings, and proposed recommendations are included below.

History of Trustee Election Disclosure Requirements

In 2018, the Administrative Code was amended to establish a uniform set of registration, disclosure, and termination filings for both candidates and third-party spenders in elections to the Health Service Board, Retirement Board, and Retiree Health Care Trust Fund Board. These trustee elections are

administered by the Department of Elections but are not open to the public and candidates for these seats are not considered candidates under State and local law. Although the disclosure program was created following a 2017 Retiree Health Care Trust Fund Board in which third-party spending was prevalent, in general there is little or no spending in these races.

Current Requirements are Unnecessary, Overly Strict, and Burdensome

The current program provides little public benefit, as these elections do not typically have candidates that raise or spend any money, and the poor program structure creates undue burdens on candidates and City officials.

- Since the program was implemented, there has been virtually no financial activity reported.
 Since 2018, there have been a total of just seven candidates who have registered and filed disclosures with the Ethics Commission of those seven, only one candidate has ever disclosed raising funds. The total amount raised was \$78.60, which is below the \$100 threshold that requires contributor itemization on a campaign statement. No third-party spending has been reported during this time.
- The existing disclosure requirements are overly strict on trustee candidates, with the
 requirements being more stringent than those followed by candidates for City elective office.
 The current program requires these trustee candidates to establish a bank account regardless
 of whether they anticipate raising or spending any money. These requirements create a
 barrier to entry and discourage participation by potential candidates, who are typically City
 employees and retirees interested in how their benefits are managed.
- There are also unnecessary support costs borne by the Ethics Commission and the trustee bodies regarding the implementation of these rules, as they must coordinate to assist candidates and otherwise administer these trustee elections.

The public demands and deserves government agencies that are focused on using public resources in ways that are effective, efficient, and adding value to their lives. Discontinuing these unnecessary, overly strict, and burdensome reporting requirements will help encourage more people to run for trustee positions and enable Ethics Commission staff to focus more on the Commission's core functions that serve to promote the highest standards of integrity in City government.

Deficit



Today, the Controller's Office released a report that identifies a list of practical options to help the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) address its significant budget deficit and avoid future service cuts. Despite public perception of SFMTA service increasing steadily since the pandemic, declining parking revenue and ridership (due to remote work), the exhaustion of one-time federal and state grants, and slower growth of General Fund support have contributed to the SFMTA's growing fiscal troubles.

The latest projections show that SFMTA's budget deficit is expected to rise to approximately \$322 million by July 2026. In order to balance the budget and prevent harder decisions down the road, including service cuts that would cause significant impact, the SFMTA and policymakers will need to press ahead with selecting options from this report to ensure the continued operation of public transit in San Francisco and, by extension, the City's continued economic recovery. Actions taken from this report will be in addition to SFMTA's ongoing efforts to close the budget gap.

In fall 2024, the SFMTA partnered with the Controller's Office to establish the Muni Funding


Working Group — which included labor representatives, business groups, City officials, and external advocacy organizations — to identify a combination of new revenue sources and administrative reductions to close the budget gap. The Working Group's report details a shortlist of the 37 most feasible options, organized into six packages. Each of the six packages includes different combinations of service cuts, funding options, and efficiencies to reach \$322 million and, importantly, includes ideas that provide ongoing revenue vs. one-time solutions.

Of the options presented, service cuts represent a worst-case scenario for both Muni riders and the City as a whole. Members of the Muni Funding Working Group were clear about their objections to major service cuts. In contrast, revenue generating options, including regional or local ballot measures, stand to be the most important and least painful tools for impacting San Francisco.

Today's report will provide a foundation for future decision-making by the SFMTA Board of Directors, the Mayor and Board of Supervisors, and ultimately the voters, should ballot measures proceed in future municipal elections. Any ballot measures asking San Franciscan's to vote for or against funding Muni would appear no earlier than calendar year 2026.

The Office of the Controller (CON) presents its Muni Funding Working Group report — a summary of the workshop series designed to identify potential policy options to address the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency's (the SFMTA) emerging deficit. The Working Group was comprised of elected officials, labor, business, and advocacy organization representatives.

Over a series of seven meetings in the last year, members of the Working Group reviewed service improvements, service cut scenarios, and both ballot and non-ballot funding options to address the SFMTA's projected \$320 million deficit. SFMTA staff developed policy options with CON staff providing technical assistance in reviewing the costing analyses. CON staff also partnered with SFMTA staff to design and facilitate the workshops. While this report is not an audit or a list of policy recommendations, it does provide insights and context from the robust discussions with key stakeholders. It is my hope that this report will provide a foundation for future decision-making by the SFMTA Board of Directors, the Mayor and Board of Supervisors, and ultimately the voters should any ballot measures proceed in future municipal elections.

Through the financial and data analysis conducted as part of this Working Group, it has become clear to me that San Francisco faces a significant policy choice in the coming months—with no easy answers. Either we must create a substantial new revenue source for public transportation, or the MTA's only option will be to implement significant service cuts to Muni. In response to this choice, members of the Muni Funding Working Group clearly expressed concern with the size and potential impact of the service cuts discussed and highlighted a general consensus among the convened stakeholders that it is imperative for the City to find sufficient revenue through the ballot to prevent such a worst-case scenario.

Muni is vital to the city's economy and economic recovery. It is an essential component of both revitalizing downtown and bringing customers to small businesses on commercial corridors in our neighborhoods. With San Francisco nurturing an economic recovery that is slowly but noticeably gaining momentum, service cuts at the level needed to address Muni's financial deficit could be a significant setback. It is also noteworthy that data show the public's perception of SFMTA service has increased steadily since the pandemic because of service improvements, less service disruption, and other improvements. Service cuts risk reversing those important gains by lowering public perception and potentially resulting in even lower ridership.

The possibility of asking the public to support new revenue measures, particularly in a time of uncertainty, should not be taken lightly. However, given the high stakes of this choice for our city's future, in my opinion it is imperative that City leadership actively engage in a substantive policy conversation with stakeholders and the public about the appetite for revenue generating options, including potential ballot measures for the November, 2026 ballot.

I want to express my thanks to SFMTA staff and members of the working group for their engagement during this important process.

Executive Summary

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (the SFMTA) faces an approximately \$320 million deficit beginning in Fiscal Year 2026–2027 (FY27). Declining parking revenue and ridership due to a shift to remote work, the exhaustion of COVID-19 pandemic-related one-time federal and state grants, and slower growth of General Fund support have contributed to the SFMTA's growing fiscal gap. Without a solvent transit agency, San Francisco's economy will not fully recover from the effects of the pandemic.

In the fall of 2024, the SFMTA partnered with the Controller's Office to establish the Muni Funding Working Group, which included labor representatives, City officials, and external advocacy organizations. From September 2024 to March 2025, the Working Group met seven times to discuss a wide range of policy options to address the budget shortfall.

During the working group meetings, the SFMTA presented funding options, service cuts, efficiency improvements, and other ideas to meet the \$320 million gap. Member feedback on the individual options led to the SFMTA developing six potential packages of options ("packages") for additional member feedback at the final workshop session on March 21st, 2025. Each of the six packages included different combinations of service cuts, funding options, and efficiencies to reach \$320 million.

SUMMARY OF KEY MEMBER FEEDBACK

Members overwhelmingly supported addressing the deficit through revenue-raising options over service cuts. Through facilitated discussion at the workshops and voting activities throughout the workshop series, members repeatedly showed support for revenue options over cutting service. In ranking individual options against one another, on average members ranked all the revenue options over every service cut option. When reviewing the packages, members ranked packages with no service cuts higher than packages with service cuts.

Of the revenue-raising options, members supported both ballot measures and parking revenue options. Members were in favor of ballot measures, though some forms of ballot measures (e.g. ride-hail and autonomous vehicle gross receipts tax and the regional revenue measure) received more support than others (utility user tax or local parcel tax). Members were generally open to parking revenue options and favored options like optimizing parking but supported other parking options like increasing residential parking permit fees to a lesser extent. In discussions, members had concerns about the potential impact of parking options on downtown businesses and residents.

Service cut options generally received significant opposition, with less opposition for non-Muni service cut options. In voting activities, Working Group Members rated every funding option higher than every service cut option. Of the service cut options, non-Muni proposals such as Flexing Capital Funds to the Operating Budget and Reducing or Eliminating Tow Subsidies received the least opposition. Of the four packages of options that included service cuts, the most popular option included only non-Muni service cuts.

Members expressed concerns that the ballot measures would not pass. In discussion, members pointed out the potential challenges of proposing multiple different tax ballot measures in the same year or in quick succession given the potential for voter fatigue. Members also highlighted the need for contingency planning should ballot measures fail and suggested finding options that increased non-ballot revenue over service cuts.

Members provided additional feedback throughout the workshops to help inform the development of the final packages. Members also shared concerns about the impact of cuts on seniors and people with disabilities and recommended avoiding cutting subsidies. Members cited passenger and pedestrian safety, liability risks, the city's economic recovery, and impact on local businesses as their primary concerns with service cuts. Members encouraged the SFMTA to roll out any parking fee increases and expansions slowly to help ease resident concerns.

At the conclusion of the meeting series, members supported package options with higher ballot revenue options and supported additional non-ballot measure revenue in order to avoid cutting service. The two packages with the highest levels of parking revenue received lower levels of support from members in the voting activities, however, based on group discussions that support may be related to the higher levels of Muni and non-Muni service cuts in those packages.

CONCLUSIONS

All six packages meet the \$320 million target—but may require short-term funding depending on timing and implementation decisions. Each package includes combinations of funding options, cuts, and efficiencies to meet the SFMTA's FY27 budget deficit of \$320 million. However, as presented, some packages include components that would not be fully implemented until 2028 or later. The SFMTA identified capital budget cuts and potential bridge funding from the state as potential options to cover shortfalls in FY27.

If the ballot measures do not pass, even with all of the proposed Muni service cuts and the parking revenue increases considered, there would still be an approximately \$100 million gap. Should voters fail to approve the proposed ballot measures, the SFMTA and the City will face difficult tradeoffs. If no ballot measures pass and the SFMTA implemented every non-ballot measure option across all six packages, the remaining proposals would only equal \$222 million—70% of \$320 million needed. If voters do not approve ballot revenue, the SFMTA and policymakers would be left with less popular solutions discussed by the Working Group, other options not discussed by the Working Group, or would have to rely more on non-ballot revenue such as parking revenue or deeper service cuts.

Public perception of Muni service has steadily increased since the pandemic; deep transit service cuts could reverse these gains and impact ridership. In SFMTA's <u>2024 Muni Rider Survey</u>, 72% of respondents rated Muni service overall as either good or excellent—a steady improvement over 57% of respondents in 2021 and 66% of respondents in 2022. In the <u>2023 City Survey</u>, residents gave Muni service a B- grade, an improvement over the C+ rating in 2019. As shown in these surveys, service improvements have led to

higher satisfaction ratings. Implementing service cuts discussed by the Working Group could reverse these gains and impact ridership.

The impact to the city's economy resulting from deep transit service cuts would be significant.

Substantial Muni service cuts would have serious economic consequences for San Francisco, especially the downtown core that drives the city's economy. Three of the final packages included Muni service cuts ranging from \$23 million in Package D to \$90 million in Package F. The \$90 million amount in Package F is 50% of the total \$181 million worst case scenario outlined at the November 13, 2024 Muni Funding Working Group, which would represent a large decrease in transit service across multiple lines and mode types. The service impact of this option and the resulting impact on the city's economy would be significant. Without a solvent transit agency, the city will not achieve economic recovery.

NEXT STEPS

On April 22, 2025, the SFMTA presented options to the SFMTA Board of Directors for consideration for the FY27 budget process. Beginning in Summer 2025, the SFMTA staff will develop detailed implementation plans that will provide further certainty on the timing and amount of any expected revenues or savings. The SFMTA Board of Directors, the Board of Supervisors, and the Mayor will make final decisions on which packages or combination of package components as part of the normal FY27 budget process starting in fall 2025.


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Introduction and Background

SFMTA'S IMPACT ON THE LOCAL ECONOMY

Thousands rely on Muni every day to get to work, school, and go shopping. Without a solvent transit agency, San Francisco's economy will not fully recover from the effects of the pandemic.

As of May 2025, ridership is approximately 79% of prepandemic levels compared to the same month in 2019. Downtown metro ridership recovery remains lower. However, without Muni's network of buses, light-rail trains, streetcars, and cable cars, businesses, employees, and customers would struggle with limited accessibility to the city's economic core in the downtown. Any significant reduction to the city's public transportation system would have a significant impact on



the city's economy and economic recovery.

Impact on the Downtown Core

With a GDP per capita nearly four times the national average, San Francisco has a large and vibrant economy relative to its comparatively small population. The city historically achieved this economic vitality by connecting skilled labor across the Bay Area to businesses and offices densely concentrated in San Francisco's downtown core. Many of these skilled workers commuted on public transit, including Muni. Prior to the pandemic, 44% of employees in San Francisco took public transit to work, the second highest percentage in the country.

The downtown core makes up a significant portion of the City and County of San Francisco's (the City's) tax base and its recovery has been slower than any other part of the city. Potential reductions in transit operations could weaken the city's access to regional talent, pushing existing businesses to relocate and prospective businesses to expand to other cities instead of San Francisco.

The city—and the downtown core specifically—is too dense to expand road capacity to meet an increase in demand for private transportation (such as private vehicles, autonomous vehicles, or ride-share vehicles) if public transit is reduced. Thus far, workers returning to the office for in-person work have pivoted away from public transit and toward driving.

The health of San Francisco's economic recovery and tax base depend on a functioning Muni. And Muni's functioning depends on the health of the San Francisco economy and tax base.

SFMTA'S BUDGET AND FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

The SFMTA faces an approximately \$320 million deficit beginning in FY27¹ and a \$350 million deficit in FY28 due to decreasing revenue across many of the SFMTA's main funding sources.

- Shifts to telecommuting work arrangements for many workers in the city during the COVID-19 pandemic and afterwards caused the SFMTA's ridership, fare revenue, and parking revenue to fall.
- Wider shifts in San Francisco's economy also affected the City's tax revenues, which in turn led to a slower rate of growth in General Fund support the City provides the SFMTA.
- Finally, starting in FY27, the SFMTA will have exhausted the original one-time state and federal pandemic relief funds that were temporarily making up for reductions in other revenue sources.

Under current projections, the SFMTA's total recurring revenue will grow by approximately 3% over the next four years. However, with inflation and previously agreed upon cost-of-living adjustments, expenditures will grow at 4% over the same period.² As expenditures and revenues diverge, the SFMTA's budget deficits will grow.

The budget information in this section is based on the SFMTA Budget Context and Background presentation from the <u>April 22, 2025 Board of Directors Special Meeting</u>. The SFMTA will update budget and deficit projections next in Summer 2025.


Revenue Sources


As outlined in the charts below, transit and parking revenue accounts for 25% of the SFMTA's projected budget for the current fiscal year (FY26). Other revenue, including one-time sources, advertising, and rent, makes up another 5%. Taken together, these internal sources make up 30% of the SFMTA's revenue.


The remaining 70% comes from external sources. The single largest funding source comes from San Francisco's General Fund, the City's primary account that most City tax revenue flows through. Federal and state relief funds account for approximately 17% of the SFMTA's budget for FY26. These funds will be unavailable in the SFMTA's FY27 budget. Since FY24, federal and state relief has contributed over \$200 million annually to the SFMTA's budget. The SFMTA will continue to receive operating grants from state and regional governments in FY27.

¹ San Francisco's and the SFMTA's fiscal year runs from July to June. Fiscal Year 2026–2027 ("FY27") begins July 1, 2026, and ends June 30, 2027.

Expenditure Categories

While certain SFMTA revenue sources have slowed, fallen, or ended, total expenditures have continued to rise due to inflation and cost-of-living increases in negotiated labor contracts.

As outlined in the previous charts, over 87% of the SFMTA's expenditures are for transit or revenue generating activities that fund transit. The SFMTA spends 3% of its budget on street safety and functionality, which includes traffic engineers, school crossing guards, and the workshops that install and maintain paint and signs on the city's streets and sidewalks. The SFMTA spends less than 1% on taxi and microtransit. Another 10% of the budget is spent on administration, which includes central offices for finance and information technology, communications, human resources, the chief of staff, and the Board of directors and fixed costs such as retiree health costs, debt service payments, and reserves.

Because spending on transit services makes up the majority of the SFMTA's expenditures in any given year, Muni service spending cuts are the only service area large enough to close the \$320 million budget deficit in FY27.

SFMTA'S ONGOING EFFORTS TO CLOSE THE GAP

Prior to the creation of the Muni Funding Working Group, the SFMTA began planning efforts and implemented changes to operations to address the anticipated upcoming deficit.

FY25 Internal Cuts and Efficiencies

At the October 17, 2024 Muni Funding Working Group Meeting and the April 22, 2025 Board of Directors Special Meeting, the SFMTA discussed ongoing, internal efforts to control the deficit.

- Hiring Slowdown: Slowed and delayed hiring to contain the growth of personnel costs including
 holding positions vacant, saving up to \$90 million in personnel costs in FY25 with ongoing savings
 likely.
- Work Order Efficiencies: The SFMTA increased review and monitoring of services from other
 departments to control costs and will continue to assess workorders for opportunities to bring
 services in house to achieve savings. The SFMTA currently allocates approximately 9% (\$123 million)
 of the Agency's budget to hiring other City departments to perform work at its request.
- **Fiscal Monitoring Efficiencies**: Instituted monthly budget monitoring, ensuring personnel and non-labor expenses are appropriately charged to capital projects.
- **Energy Efficiencies**: Replaced old electric and gas fixtures, pumps and heaters to reduce energy by 5%.
- Approved Muni Forward Projects: Finalized and implemented Muni Forward projects that deliver more Muni service without increased costs.

FY26 Proposed Internal Cuts and Efficiencies

By winter 2024, the SFMTA projected a budget deficit of \$50 million in the next fiscal year (FY26), beginning July 1, 2025. To address this immediate-term budget need, the SFMTA proposed additional programs and changes that built on the prior efforts outlined above.

The \$7.2 million in Muni service cuts were not included in the packages discussed by the Working Group on March 21, 2025, but will be included in future deficit projections.

The proposed changes will address the entirety of the SFMTA's \$50 million immediate-term budget deficit. To address the full \$320 million deficit projected in FY27, the SFMTA and the City will need to identify even larger strategies to ensure the continued operation of public transit in San Francisco.

The Muni Funding Working Group was founded to identify these larger strategies.

³ The San Francisco Charter Sec. 8A.105 establishes a minimum level of funding from the General Fund to the SFMTA, which is adjusted annually based on the change in General Fund revenue. Proposition B, passed by voters in November 2014, adjusts these baselines by the annual growth in population.

Working Group Background

WORKING GROUP BACKGROUND

In Fall 2024, the Controller's Office and the SFMTA convened the Muni Funding Working Group to review and prioritize policy options that the SFMTA can implement to address the agency's long-term funding gap. Past citywide working groups such as the T2030, T2045, and the Muni Reliability Working Group were successfully convened to address the SFMTA's funding or structural problems, and the Muni Funding Working Group aimed to build on these efforts. The Working Group was not formed as a decision making or advisory body. Working Group members provided insights and feedback to SFMTA staff and leadership, who developed individual policy options and overall packages for discussion.

Across seven workshops, members assessed and evaluated potential policy solutions through open dialogue and active participation. In the final meeting, the SFMTA provided the Working Group with a set of packages for discussion and prioritization. SFMTA presented packages to the SFMTA Board of Directors for further consideration as a part of the FY27 budget process.

MEETING THEMES OVERVIEW

The Working Group reviewed 38 detailed policy options across the following four categories:

- 1. Efficiency Improvements
- 2. Service Cuts
- 3. Funding Options
- 4. Service Improvements

Efficiency Improvements

Streamline systems and processes to decrease operating costs

The SFMTA presented four efficiency improvement options to the Working Group.

- **Accelerated work on Muni Forward**: Accelerate implementation of Muni Forward transit priority improvements that reduce travel time and operating costs on seven heavily used routes
- HOV lanes on state highways: Implement additional high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes on stateowned highways to reduce transit travel times and operating costs
- **Mailed parking citations**: Amend state law to allow Parking Control Officers (PCOs) to send citations to the registered address of the vehicle instead of printing citations and placing them on windshields
- Automated parking enforcement: Amend state law to enforce parking violations via photo or video to speed up enforcement efforts

Service Cuts

Reduce service to decrease operating costs

The SFMTA presented 11 service cut options to the Working Group.

- Reduce frequencies up to 50%: Decrease frequency on the most frequent, highest ridership routes
- **Suspend lower utilized routes**: Suspend routes with parallel service and low ridership routes without parallel service
- **Suspend historic train and cable car service**: Suspend all historic service including F-line and cable car service
- **Owl Service only from 9pm–6am:** Suspend all service at 9pm and replace with owl service from 9pm–6am
- Eliminate or reduce fare subsidies: Reduce subsidies for youth, seniors, and people with disabilities
- Eliminate or reduce tow subsidies: Decrease or limit discounts to tow and storage fee waivers
- **Flexing capital funds to the operating budget**: Reduce capital investments by approximately 40% over two years
- **Muni Assistance Transit Program**: Reduce funding for the Muni Transit Assistance Program. The program deters disruptive behavior, enhances public safety, and improves community engagement on Muni lines with high levels of violence and vandalism
- **Safety work reductions**: Safety cuts for transportation engineering operations, transit engineering, bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and Vision Zero, and school crossing guard programs
- Maintenance reductions: Maintenance cuts for the signal shop, sign shop, and paint shop
- **Constituent services reductions**: Service cuts for Streets' programs with associated reductions in customer service request response time, which include tow, garage and janitorial services, parking policy and programs, shared spaces, special events, and planning.

Funding Options

Increase fees, revenue, or taxes to generate new revenue

The SFMTA presented 17 funding options to the Working Group.

- Regional revenue measure: Sales and/or parcel tax measure to address the funding deficit for the SFMTA and regional transit partners
- Local sales tax measure: Increase local sales tax between 1/4 cent and 1 cent
- **Local parcel tax measure**: Parcel tax that would adjust depending on the type of property, size of property, size of building, or other characteristics

- **Commuter benefit Clipper Card:** Commuter benefit program where businesses provide their employees Clipper cards
- Ride-hail and AV tax: Tax on ride-hail platforms and autonomous vehicle companies
- Parking tax measure: Increase the existing parking tax rate to 35%
- New off-street parking tax: Tax on publicly available, off-street free parking (like retail parking lots)
- **Utility tax measure**: Increase the utility user tax on commercial properties and charge residential users a natural gas and/or electricity tax
- **Transit fare optimization**: Optimize deployment by hiring more Transit Fare Inspectors, implementing tap-to-pay with Clipper 2.0, and exploring fare increases
- **Parking optimization**: Optimize enforcement by hiring more PCOs, update paid parking meters to increase minimum times or extending limits, and explore additional charges for off-street parking and contractor permit rates
- **Increase residential parking permit fee**: Increase the Residential Parking Permit (RPP) rates in existing areas with a possible subsidy for people with low incomes
- Extend paid parking hours to Sunday: Extend paid parking hours to Sundays from 12pm-6pm
- **Extend evening paid parking**: Extend paid parking hours Monday to Saturday from 6pm–10pm in alignment with typical business hours

Additionally, the SFMTA presented four ideas for longer term funding, to start in 2029 or later.

- Visitor paid parking (citywide): Expand paid parking for visitors in all residential areas in the city
- **Charge for short-term curb use**: Charge short-term curb users like ride share, on-demand delivery, parcel delivery, and other similar companies
- **Joint development**: Work with developers to use the SFMTA's property for non-SFMTA uses, like housing and retail
- Roadway pricing: Collect fees or tolls for use of city roads by private vehicles during specific times of day

Service Improvements

Enhance services to win voter support for revenue measures

The SFMTA presented six service improvement options to the Working Group.

- **Safety and security**: Expand the Muni Safe initiative by building out the SFMTA Security Operations Center, increasing transit ambassador staff, adding solar lighting to transit stops, and refreshing Cityowned parking garages
- **Transit access increases**: Provide new Muni connections by expanding rapid service and reinstating express routes to support downtown recovery
- Accessibility improvements: Improve access to the transportation system for disabled and older
 adults by adding new accessible transit stops, accelerating flag stop conversion, improving accessible
 wayfinding, and enhancing the Essential Trip Card
- **Customer experience**: Improve the waiting and navigation experience at transit stops to maximize smooth experiences by ensuring clean stops and stations, improving cable car turnarounds, accelerating new bus stop signage, and launching a new Customer Engagement program
- **Regional transit coordination**: Make regional transit trips seamless by upgrading signage for regional wayfinding and implementing a regional free and reduced transfer program

• **Street upkeep**: Pave roadways on major transit corridors, refresh faded signs, crosswalks and curbs, and improve street beautification and landscaping

Member Feedback on Individual Options

Throughout the first six meetings of the Muni Funding Working Group, members provided detailed feedback on the individual options through group discussion and breakout group activities. Breakout group activities enabled members to share in-depth feedback in a small group setting and allowed the SFMTA staff to immediately respond to questions or to address ideas or concerns that may not be feasible. Full-group discussions encouraged collaboration by allowing members to build on each other's ideas when sharing with the SFMTA staff.

SFMTA staff developed the final packages discussed in the next section based on the feedback Working Group members provided on the individual options.

FEEDBACK ON INDIVIDUAL OPTIONS

Throughout the meeting series, Working Group members indicated their level of support and opposition for each individual option through voting activities during the meetings. These voting activities helped align feedback to measurable levels of support and ensured members' votes were recorded.

Note: The sections below are high-level summaries of detailed conversations among the Working Group members. They do not represent any individual or organization's viewpoints and should not be considered to represent all the Working Group members' opinions. These summaries are intended to provide high-level takeaways.

Efficiency Improvements


Members provided the following feedback regarding the efficiency improvement options from the October 17, 2024 Muni Funding Working Group meeting:

- Members asked about whether there are any additional areas to find efficiency improvements given the four options presented.
- Members expressed the importance of prioritizing the safety of seniors and people with disabilities when boarding transit.
- Members shared concerns about how the SFMTA would inform riders about a reduction in stops as part of the proposed policy options that would accelerate Muni Forward.
- Some members cautioned that automation may not always equal efficiency and reiterated the importance of prioritizing PCO safety in discussions on Automated Parking Enforcement.
- Members also suggested reprioritizing parking enforcement towards issues with higher safety risk and higher fines.

Service Cuts

Members provided the following feedback regarding the service cut options at the November 13, 2024, and November 20, 2024 Muni Funding Working Group meetings:

- Most members were opposed cuts reducing frequency, Muni Transit Assistance Program (MTAP), streets safety and maintenance work.
- Members had more interest in supporting cuts for tow subsidies or flexing capital funds.
- Some members supported and some members opposed suspending lowerutilized routes, historic service, and streets constituent services options.
- Members expressed concerns regarding the population, transit, and citywide impacts of service cuts.




• Members shared suggestions on modifications to the options including lowering the frequency of the lines rather than suspending entire routes, or eliminating only the less frequently used portions of a route or portions of routes with parallel service, among others.


Funding Options

Below is a summary of member feedback regarding the funding options at the January 23, 2025 Muni Funding Working Group meeting:

- Most members supported the funding options, with a few opposing a local parcel tax, a parking tax measure and off-street parking tax measure.
- Members shared suggestions for avoiding voter fatigue at the ballot. These included combining ballot measures, exploring funding options that didn't require voter approval, and creating a permanent tax measure that would not expire.



Members also supported the options that would maximize funding from existing programs and
establish revenue from new programs, with a few votes against the increase in residential parking
permit fees and transit fare optimization.



encourage transit use for tourists.

- Some members suggested modifying the options to raise utility user tax for non-zero emission buildings and to implement a congestion tax on autonomous vehicle and delivery companies.
- Members shared modifications the SFMTA could make to the transit fare optimization and parking optimization funding options. These included creating a multi-agency regional payment pass and employee parking permits, partnering with live venues to include transit fares in the event cost, and launching marketing campaigns to

Long-term Funding Ideas and Service Improvements

Members provided the following feedback regarding long-term funding options at the January 31, 2025 Muni Funding Working Group meeting:

- Members supported the longterm ideas, especially the short-term curb use option.
- A few members either did not support or had mixed support for the road pricing, citywide parking, and joint development options.
- Members had questions about who would qualify as a visitor under the visitor paid parking



- and how that charge would be implemented.
- Members were supportive of more expansive joint development opportunities, especially along key transit corridors or areas with higher density.
- Members generally supported the road pricing option, but some suggested a focus on expanding congestion management strategies as opposed to generating revenue.

Members provided the following feedback regarding service improvement options at the January 31, 2025 Muni Funding Working Group meeting:

- Most members supported the service improvement options.
- Members suggested prioritizing improvements that affect the whole city, especially historically underserved areas.
- Some members also recommended pairing service improvement options with revenue measures to appeal to a broader base of voters instead of solely Muni riders.



Through dot voting activities, members rated each funding and service cut option. Members rated every funding option higher than every service cut option, with some service cut options receiving significant opposition.

Member Feedback on Packages

PACKAGES OVERVIEW

Option Groupings

Between September 2024 and January 2025, the Working Group reviewed 38 individual Efficiency Improvements, Service Cuts, Funding Options, and Service Improvements options. Based on Working Group feedback on the individual options (summarized in the prior section), the SFMTA then bundled these individual options into six packages that each would address the \$320 million budget gap.

Based on feedback, the policy ideas and categorizations changed over time. Efficiency Improvements and Service Improvements discussed in the workshops became Efficiencies and Internal Cuts in the final packages. Service Cuts discussed in the workshops were split into Muni, Non-Muni, and Subsidy Reductions in the final packages. Funding Options discussed in the workshops were split into Large, Small, and Non-Ballot Revenue Measures.

The following table lists the 20 individual components included in the final packages. Packages did not include some individual options that were one-time solutions, would not be ready in time, or had other implementation challenges.

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

Package Composition

As presented and discussed on March 21, 2025, the six packages include different combinations of service cuts, funding options, and efficiencies to reach \$320 million (see chart below).



Commonalities Across Packages

Large ballot measures (regional revenue measure, local sales tax, and local parcel tax) make up the single largest category in all six packages.

• The large ballot measure category in all six packages includes a version of a Regional Revenue Measure (SB63) that San Francisco and the SFMTA is collaborating on with other Bay Area stakeholders outside of the Muni Funding Working Group. The exact amount of revenue generated for the SFMTA is subject to ongoing regional discussions. August 11, 2025 is the deadline for

reaching consensus on the final parameters of the regional measure. All packages include some form of a Regional Revenue Measure with revenue to the SFMTA projected at either \$88 million or \$162 million.

- Option 1A—included in Packages D, E, & F
 - o Flat ½ cent sales tax in four counties
 - o \$88 million/year for Muni
- Variable Rate Option—included in Packages A, B, & C
 - o Sales tax rate based on each county's needs (up to 1 cent in San Francisco)
 - \$162 million/year for Muni
- In addition to the Regional Revenue Measure, the large ballot measure category in all packages includes an additional local tax measure (either a sales or parcel tax), with projected revenue ranging from \$49 million to \$99 million.

Certain **efficiencies and internal cuts** were also included in all six packages.

- Accelerated work on Muni Forward—\$3 million in every package.
- Transit fare optimization—\$5 million in every package
- Parking optimization—\$18 million in every package
- Administrative cuts to the SFMTA's central office functions—minimum of \$10 million in every package
 and increasing proportionally with the size of service cuts in each option (up to \$19 million in
 Package F).

Packages Summary

The table below provides a detailed breakdown of the components included in each of the six packages. The components are organized by category with green shading indicating the relative size of the budget impact of each component in each option. Note that different packages include different versions of components with different projected budget impacts.

Context on the Packages

The discussion of the packages included above reflects their composition as of March 21, 2025, when the SFMTA presented them to the Working Group. The composition of the packages, the versions of the components included, and the budget impacts of all components are subject to change.

- Packages were based on modeled assumptions and were not implementation plans, so timing and projected revenue or projected savings will continue to evolve.
- Some funding identified in the packages may not be available until after FY27, depending on implementation decisions.
- The SFMTA has implemented budget cuts in the current fiscal year cycle, some of which will result in ongoing savings which could reduce the projected \$320 million deficit.
- Short-term funding options may need to be explored which could include state funding support or could leverage the "Flexing Capital to Operating" option.

Timing and Potential Gaps in FY27

As presented on March 21, 2025, two components will not be fully implemented and/or their revenues will not impact the SFMTA's budget until FY28 or later.

- Pay or permit/visitor parking expansion—the SFMTA assumed the component could not be fully implemented until FY28 or later.
- **Small ballot measures**—the SFMTA assumed small ballot measures would not appear on the ballot until 2028, at the earliest.

As shown in the table below, the gap in FY27 (which equals the total of the two components in FY28 or later) ranges from \$20 million (Package A) to \$70 million (Package B). Package F is the only one with no gap in FY27.


Additionally, potential revenue from the Regional Revenue Measure would be unlikely to be realized until the end of FY27, likely leading to a larger gap than represented above. Given larger gaps, the SFMTA put forward two potential strategies to fill any budget gaps in FY27 that the packages would not address.

- 1. Secure short-term budget assistance from the State to bridge the revenue gap
- 2. Flex parts of the capital budget towards the operating budget as a one-time solution⁴

Additionally, as discussed on March 21, 2025, none of the six packages include the \$7.2 million in annual savings from Muni service cuts (to be implemented in Summer 2025) that the SFMTA Board approved on April 15, 2025. However, future versions of the packages will include these ongoing savings.

Reliance on Ballot Measures


Should voters fail to approve the proposed ballot measures, the SFMTA and the City will face difficult tradeoffs. If no ballot measures pass and the SFMTA implemented every non-ballot measure option across all six packages, the remaining proposals would only equal \$222 million—70% of \$320 million needed. To close the approximately \$100 million gap, the SFMTA would need to implement additional service cuts or higher or more expansive paid parking fees than proposed in the six packages, or explore other solutions not discussed by the Working Group.



⁴ This option was discussed by the Muni Funding Working Group but was not included in the final packages as it is one-time funding, and the packages include only ongoing funding or savings.

Service Cuts and Parking Fees

Responding to feedback from the working group and other stakeholders, the SFMTA kept the percentage of each of the six options made up of service cuts and parking fees relatively low—ranging from 6% (A & B) to 43% (F, see graph below). Several packages included parking revenue ranging from \$14 million in Package F to \$49 million in Package D.




MEMBER FEEDBACK ON PACKAGES

The Muni Funding Working Group reviewed and provided feedback on all six packages through a combination of facilitated large group and small group discussions and individual voting activities. In addition to voting for their top choice of package, members also provided more detailed feedback on the packages, challenges with addressing the budget deficit going forward, and concerns about the impact of various options.

Voting Results

When asked to select their top choice of package, nearly 70% of members voted for Package A and nearly 20% voted for Package B (see table below). Only 12% of members ranked an option that included any service cuts as their first choice (C & D each received 6%). Packages E and F, the packages with the largest Muni service cuts (\$40 million and \$90 million, respectively) received no first-choice votes.

In addition to voting for their top choice of package, members also indicated their level of support and opposition for each package (see graph below).



In this more detailed voting exercise—similar to the dot voting exercises for the individual options—members underscored their preference for funding options over service cuts. In particular,

- At least 50% of members indicated they "would actively support" the two packages with no service cuts (A & B)
- No members opposed Packages A and B
- All options with service cuts (Packages C through F) received some level of opposition, ranging from 19% to 63%
- At least half of members indicated they "would actively oppose" the three options (D, E, & F) that include Muni service cuts

Taking the average of member support and opposition for each package further highlights how consistent members were in evaluating the individual options and the packages. Members ranked every package with higher levels of service cuts worse than every package with lower levels of service cuts (see table below).

Limitations on Interpretation of Voting Results

In the final workshop, members voted on six separate packages. This feedback represents member feedback at a single point in time; perception may change as the SFMTA shares additional implementation details. Additionally, the voting results only represent one dimension of member feedback and should be considered alongside the content of the group discussions. The two packages with the highest levels of parking revenue (Packages D & E) received lower levels of support from members in the voting activities, however based on group discussions that support may be related to the higher levels of Muni and non-Muni service cuts in those packages.

The sections below are high-level summaries of detailed conversations among the Working Group members. They do not represent any individual or organization's viewpoints and should not be considered to represent all the Working Group members' opinions. These summaries are intended to provide high-level takeaways.

Concerns, Recommendations, and Additional Feedback

In addition to voting on the six packages, members also provided more detailed feedback on the packages through discussion as summarized below.

Ballot Measures

- Members highlighted the potential challenges of proposing multiple different tax ballot measures in the same year or in quick succession, given the potential for voter fatigue.
- Members strongly recommended combining ballot measures in the same election year.
- Members suggested modifying ballot measures that create permanent tax changes.
- Members voiced concerns that service cuts and fee increases could decrease public support for higher taxes.
- Members also highlighted the need for contingency planning, should ballot measures fail.
- Members suggested that having a plan to reverse planned service cuts in Summer 2025 or restore service to pre-pandemic levels may increase public support for ballot measures.

Modification Suggestions

- Members consistently voiced concerns for how various service cut proposals could impact certain vulnerable populations including seniors, people with disabilities, youth, and others.
- Members suggested adding certain parking revenue options to packages that did not include them to help pay for reversing recently passed service cuts.
- Members encouraged the SFMTA to roll out any parking fee increases and expansions slowly to help ease resident concerns.
- Members recommended exploring whether other City departments could take on the subsidies currently provided by the SFMTA.
- Members recommended the SFMTA should consider reducing the budget for consulting and professional services instead of service cuts.

Conclusions

All six packages meet the \$320 million target—but may require short-term funding depending on timing and implementation decisions. Each package includes combinations of funding options, cuts, and efficiencies to meet the SFMTA's FY27 budget deficit of \$320 million. However, as presented, some packages include components that would not be fully implemented until 2028 or later. The SFMTA identified capital budget cuts and potential bridge funding from the state as potential options to cover shortfalls in FY27.

If the ballot measures do not pass, even with all of the proposed Muni service cuts and the parking revenue increases considered, there would still be an approximately \$100 million gap. Should voters fail to approve the proposed ballot measures, the SFMTA and the City will face difficult tradeoffs. If no ballot measures pass and the SFMTA implemented every non-ballot measure option across all six packages, the remaining proposals would only equal \$222 million—70% of \$320 million needed. If voters do not approve ballot revenue, the SFMTA and policymakers would be left with less popular solutions discussed by the Muni Funding Working Group or other options not discussed by the Working Group, or would have to rely more on non-ballot revenue such as parking revenue or deeper service cuts.

Public perception of Muni service has steadily increased since the pandemic; deep transit service cuts could reverse these gains and impact ridership. In SFMTA's <u>2024 Muni Rider Survey</u>, 72% of respondents rated Muni service overall as either good or excellent—a steady improvement over 57% of respondents in 2021 and 66% of respondents in 2022. In the <u>2023 City Survey</u>, residents gave Muni service a B- grade, an improvement over the C+ rating in 2019. As shown in these surveys, service improvements have led to higher satisfaction ratings. Implementing service cuts discussed by the Working Group could reverse these gains and impact ridership.

The impact to the city's economy resulting from deep transit service cuts would be significant.

Substantial Muni service cuts would have serious economic consequences for San Francisco, especially the

downtown core that drives the city's economy. Three of the final packages included Muni service cuts ranging from \$23 million in Package D to \$90 million in Package F. The \$90 million amount in Package F is 50% of the total \$181 million worst case scenario outlined at the November 13, 2024 Muni Funding Working Group, which would represent a large decrease in transit service across multiple lines and mode types. The service impact of this option and the resulting impact on the city's economy would be significant. Without a solvent transit agency, the city will not achieve economic recovery.

Closing and Next Steps

On April 22, 2025, the SFMTA presented options to the SFMTA Board of Directors for consideration for the FY27 budget process. Beginning in Summer 2025, the SFMTA staff will develop detailed implementation plans that will provide further certainty on the timing and amount of any expected revenues or savings. Final decisions on which packages, or combination of package components will be made by the SFMTA Board of Directors, the Board of Supervisors, and the Mayor as a part of the normal FY27 budget process starting in Fall 2025.

APPENDIX 2: FINAL MUNI FUNDING WORKING GROUP MEETING SUMMARY

Below is a summary of the committee members' questions and concerns regarding the SFMTA's proposed options packages. These packages were presented at the March 21, 2025 Muni Funding Working Group meeting. During the meeting, members were invited to share their immediate reactions to the packages presented through a raise of hands activity, where each member raised their hand if they felt positively about a package. Members were able to cast their vote for multiple packages. Next, there was a live polling activity through the survey tool Alchemer where members were asked to vote on their preferred package.

Members provided feedback below and suggestions for SFMTA. This feedback should not be construed as direction or commitment from the SFMTA on a single package or combination or options. Further implementation decisions will be made by the SFMTA, SFMTA Board of Directors, and policymakers as applicable.

Discussion on Packages

Package A

- Raise of hands activity votes: 9
- Feedback:
 - o Members liked this package overall because there were no service or subsidy cuts.
 - Multiple members expressed concerns about the inherent risks of relying heavily on ballot measures. There was concern that the tax measures would not pass.
 - The SFMTA should consider including positive outcomes in its messaging and outreach to make campaigning for the ballot measures easier.
 - The SFMTA should consider the negative impact of going back to the ballot in 2028 and try to ensure the necessary funding measures are proposed on the 2026 ballot.
 - o The SFMTA should consider including Sunday paid parking as an option in this package.
 - The SFMTA should consider reversing recently passed service cuts as part of this package.
- Final survey votes: 11

Package B

- Raise of hands activity votes: 11
- Feedback:
 - o Members liked this package overall because there were **no service or subsidy cuts**.
 - Multiple members expressed concerns about the inherent risks of relying heavily on ballot measures.
 - o The SFMTA should consider the negative impact of going back to the ballot in 2028 and try to ensure the appropriate funding measures are proposed on the 2026 ballot.
 - The SFMTA should consider including positive outcomes in its messaging and outreach to make campaigning for the ballot measures easier.
 - The SFMTA should consider expanding Muni services to pre-pandemic levels as part of this package proposal.

• Final survey votes: 3

Package C

- Raise of hands activity votes: 5
- Feedback:
 - o Multiple members expressed **concerns with the potential street safety cuts** and wanted more clarity on where the cuts would happen.
 - Members expressed concerns about the inherent risks of relying heavily on ballot measures.
 - The SFMTA should consider the impact of street safety cuts on seniors, youth, and crossing guards.
 - There was a concern about the proposed local sales tax and a suggestion to consider exploring more progressive tax measures.
 - A member suggested considering a tax on ride share companies that utilize San Francisco roads.
 - o The SFMTA should consider exploring whether other City departments could take on the subsidies currently provided by the agency.
- Final survey votes: 1

Package D

- Raise of hands activity votes: 0
- Feedback:
 - o No members voiced support for this package.
 - The SFMTA should consider reducing the budget for consulting and professional services instead of service cuts.
 - The SFMTA should consider the challenge of proposing multiple different tax measures in the same year.
- Final survey votes: 0

Package E

- Raise of hands activity votes: 1
- Feedback:
 - There were fewer volunteers to speak about this package, with only one member volunteering to speak in support. The facilitator instead had to ask members to speak to what they found difficult to support instead.
 - The SFMTA should consider the impact of administrative cuts on seniors and people with disabilities and should avoid cutting subsidies.
 - o Members expressed concerns about the impact of expanded permit parking and Sunday paid parking but emphasized that such measures may be needed.
 - The SFMTA should consider a measured approach when introducing the parking option to help ease resident concerns and get them used to it.

- The SFMTA should consider the challenge of proposing multiple different tax measures in the same year.
- Final survey votes: 0

Package F

- Raise of hands activity votes: 0
- Feedback:
 - o No members voiced support for this package.
 - The SFMTA should consider the impact of administrative cuts on seniors and people with disabilities and should avoid cutting subsidies.
 - Members expressed concerns that this package was not a fully-developed plan to succeed at the ballot. The SFMTA should consider how an approach that maximizes ballot measure success and plan separately an approach if it fails.
 - A member shared that this package does start a conversation about the difficult choices the agency faces.
- Final survey votes: 0

Close-out Discussion

Organization next steps

- SPUR is campaigning for \$2 billion of state funds with a portion coming to support the Bay Area transit companies.
- Labor will continue to engage with the SFMTA to support a future ballot measure campaign.
- Organizations that have campaigned and have reached out to the public for transit before will continue to do so moving forward.
- Supervisor Melgar will support an approach that avoids service cuts.
- The Mayor's office will continue to prioritize this budget challenge and is open to community feedback.

Things that members support

- Labor Organizations supported an approach that avoids any service cuts.
- Members were glad to see support for Package A and reiterated the hard work needed to campaign for this to pass.
- Multiple members expressed support for the Muni Now, Muni Forever campaign.
- Members expressed support for continued dialog with the SFMTA.
- Multiple members expressed broad support for packages that maintained service levels (no service cuts).

Key points for the SFMTA to consider

- It will be challenging to go to the ballot twice: in 2026 and then again in 2028.
- Service cuts will impact both riders and operators.
- It is important to highlight Muni successes as well as ongoing efforts in increasing efficiency in the agency's messaging and outreach.

- The SFMTA should create a more aspirational package with ballot measures and new/extended Muni service.
- The importance of being honest about the budget challenges the SFMTA is facing and preparing for the worst in case ballot measures do not pass.
- A document with MFWG FAQ would be helpful to members now that meeting series is completed.
- The SFMTA should continue to engage with advocates, business leaders, labor, and other stakeholders. Consider continuing the MFWG meeting series through 2026.
- The SFMTA should leverage district liaisons for outreach to the public, and should consider the role of the press in influencing public opinion.
- The SFMTA should explore more polling to understand sentiment around proposed options.
- The SFMTA should consider withdrawing the proposed summer service cuts. The SFMTA should explore other options for budget cuts while avoiding service cuts.
- The SFMTA should take options without support off the table.

The reporting requirements under Chapter 96A to include reporting of officer activity (Chapter 96A.3, 96A.4), crime victim data (Chapter 96A.5), and Domestic Violence Reporting (Chapter 96E) for 2025 Quarter 2 (April, May and June) will be delayed.

SFPD is transitioning its Quarterly Activity and Data Report into a series of online dashboards. These dashboards will replace a large section of the "paper" QADR with explorable data, updated quarterly, in tandem with data prepared for submission to California Department of Justice. The Stop Dashboards are located here: (SFPD Stop Data Dashboards | San Francisco Police Department).

Additionally, starting with the Q1 2025 report, we now include three other types of metrics to the Census Population benchmark. The additional benchmarks are the Risk Adjusted Disparity (RAD) index, Suspect Adjusted Disparity (SAD) index and Not-at-fault crash Traffic Analytic Layout (TAL) index. They each utilize different measures to provide additional context and an additional benchmark with which to understand with whom the department interacts.

Subject: July 2025 Monthly Memo on the Status of Abortion Rights

The following update provides an overview of abortion laws in individual states, as well as local and statewide efforts to protect patients' access to reproductive healthcare. Our goal is to provide a monthly update that keeps the Mayor and other key internal stakeholders informed of developments in this new, ever-changing post-Dobbs landscape.

I. Current Snapshot of Abortion Access across the Nation

 A total of 19 states <u>restrict abortion access</u>, and 12 states now ban abortions. In November of 2024, voters passed abortion protections in seven states, ending bans in Arizona and Missouri. However, measures to enshrine abortion rights failed to pass in three states, and Nebraska voters passed a measure to uphold the state's abortion restrictions. Restrictions exist in seven states: Florida, Georgia, Iowa and South Carolina have six-week abortion bans; Nebraska and North Carolina have bans at 12 weeks; and Utah has a ban after 18 weeks. Abortion bans are currently blocked in Montana and Wyoming, while court cases progress. Some states with abortion bans have exceptions for certain scenarios, six states have no exceptions to protect the life of the pregnant person; eight have no exceptions for rape or incest, and ten have no exceptions for lethal fetal anomalies.

- On July 21st, a District Court judge in Boston granted a preliminary injunction in a suit brought by Planned Parenthood Federation of America against Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr. regarding provisions of the Big Beautiful Bill Act that would cut Medicaid payments to clinics that provide abortion care. The injunction "blocks the government from cutting Medicaid payments to Planned Parenthood member organizations that either don't provide abortion care or didn't meet a threshold of at least \$800,000 in Medicaid reimbursements in a given year."
- Polling continues to show the majority of Americans support protecting access to abortion, making efforts to enact a national abortion ban wildly unpopular. To avoid political blowback, antiabortion groups and officials are pursuing a myriad of other tactics to restrict abortion access. Moves like the cuts in federal funding for clinics that provide abortion care and calls to roll back access to medication abortion are priorities. Anti-abortion activists are exploring ways to restrict access to medication abortion by rolling back FDA approval and dispensing guidelines, going after telehealth providers and looking to the Comstock Act to prevent the medication from being mailed. Now anti-abortion activists are also targeting contraceptives. They have blocked funding to family planning clinics and information and guidance on contraception from the CDC website.
- A study published in the <u>American Journal of Public Health</u> by researchers from the <u>University of California, San Francisco</u>, examined the experiences of individuals seeking abortion care in 14 states with bans. They found that women seeking abortion care are seeing increased costs, travel times, navigating overnight stays and receiving abortion care later than they were before the *Dobbs* decision.
 - o 81% traveled to another state

- o Travel time after the abortion bans were implemented increased from 2.8 to 11.3 hours, and 58% required an overnight stay compared to 5% before bans
- Mean travel costs increased from \$179 to \$372
- The proportion of those receiving an abortion at or after 13 weeks increases by 9% and the mean pregnancy duration increased from 7.7 weeks to 8.8 weeks

These challenges are <u>likely to worsen for women</u>, both in states with bans and in states with abortion protections. Efforts to defund clinics in states with abortion protections by restricting federal Medicaid funds could lead to closures in pro-abortion states like New York and California, many of whom support women from states with abortion bans. Planned Parenthood clinics in Colorado and New Mexico have had to turn away patients covered by Medicaid. Meanwhile, efforts by anti-abortion groups to restrict medication abortion continue to gain steam.

- In Idaho abortion bans have resulted in gaps in care for residents of the state. Wait times for general and specialist care have increased as some hospitals and providers have cut services due to both staffing shortages and the political climates. Women seeking routine reproductive, fertility and gynecological care all experience delays. Rural areas, which were already facing health care delivery challenges, and labor and maternity wards have been the hardest hit: more than 100 hospitals across 26 states have closed labor and delivery services since 2020.
- A <u>consent decree</u> was issued between Idaho's Attorney General Raúl Labrador and two county prosecutors and Planned Parenthood Great Northwest, Hawaii, Alaska, Indiana, Kentucky and two doctors, ending a <u>case regarding advice and referrals for patients seeking</u> <u>out-of-state for abortions</u>. Labrador stated "we do not have the authority to prosecute referrals for out-of-state services" while the state's abortion ban remains in place.
- On July 3rd, a Missouri County Circuit judge <u>reinstated an injunction blocking most regulations</u> in the state that restrict abortion access. The ruling overturned a ruling just <u>over a month ago</u> that lifted the restrictions and effectively banned abortion in the state. Republican Missouri <u>Attorney General Andrew Bailey has appealed the ruling.</u> A Jackson County Circuit Court is currently <u>hearing arguments as to whether or not it has jurisdiction</u> in the appeal. In the interim, abortions are legal again in the state through 21 weeks after voters

passed a constitutional amendment in November 2024. However, the Republican controlled legislature has approved its own constitutional amendment to again ban abortion in the state. The measure may be on the ballot in 2026, or sooner. The Missouri ACLU is challenging the measure, suing to keep the measure off the ballot or to force the measure to be rewritten, arguing it is unfair and misleading.

- The Supreme Court <u>declined to hear a case</u> regarding Montana's parental consent requirement for minors to receive abortion care without commenting on the underlying premise of the case. Montana's State Supreme Court had ruled that minors "have a fundamental right to privacy, which includes procreative autonomy and making medical decisions affecting his or her bodily integrity and health in partnership with a chosen health care provider free from governmental interest." Justices Samuel Alito and Clarence Thomas noted technical problems with and called it a "poor vehicle" for reviewing the law, leaving open the possibility of a future challenge.
- In Nevada, Planned Parenthood Mar Monte has filed a lawsuit seeking to <u>suspend the implementation of a parental notification law</u> for minors seeking abortion care. The suit alleges that the 1985 law is "hazy [and] inadequate" and should have been nullified by a 2019 law repealing "informed consent laws for abortions" and the 2022 constitutional amendment ensuring equal rights for all.
- A judge <u>struck down the provision of a Tennessee abortion</u>
 <u>restriction</u> that banned the "recruitment" or transportation of a minor
 for an abortion without parental consent. The Court found the
 recruitment provision posed free speech concerns, and that
 "Tennessee cannot criminalize 'disseminating information about an
 activity that is legal in another state."
- A federal appeals court upheld West Virgina's <u>ability to ban</u> <u>mifepristone</u>, stating the FDA's approval "did not preempt West Virginia Law" by a 2-1 vote. GenBioPro, a major manufacturer of mifepristone, challenged the near-total ban, arguing that the FDA's authority superseded state efforts to restrict access to medications. GenBioPro vowed to keep fighting, noting the ruling risked "a dangerous ripple effect on the availability of essential medications in this country."
- The Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled that the <u>state's 1849 law did not</u> <u>in fact ban abortion</u>. They found that "the Wisconsin Legislature

functionally repealed the 1849 law by later laws regulating abortion." However, the Court declined to rule on the question of whether abortion bans would conflict with the State Constitution, leaving the door open to future challenges and potential ballot measures. In Wisconsin, only the legislature can introduce ballot measures. The current legislature is Republican controlled, but the state has a Democratic governor.

II. State Policy Update

- A man in Texas filed a civil suit against a doctor in California that he
 <u>claims violated the Comstock Act</u> by mailing abortion medication
 that was taken by his girlfriend. The plaintiff is seeking an injunction
 on behalf of a class of "all current and future fathers of unborn
 children in the United States" and \$75,000 in damages from the
 provider. The plaintiff also claims the abortion qualifies as murder
 under Texas law.
- Planned Parenthood clinics in Los Angeles are poised to lose federal funding after the passage of the One Big Beautiful Bill Act. Planned Parenthood Federation of America filed a lawsuit challenging the act, and a partial injunction is in effect. However, the injunction does not apply to Planned Parenthood clinics in Los Angeles as the injunction only applies in states with abortion bans and for Planned Parenthood affiliates that received less than \$800,000 in Medicaid reimbursements. Local officials have expressed outrage and concern, noting the wide array of reproductive care and health screenings Planned Parenthood provides. Planned Parenthood LA vows to keep providing healthcare.

III. San Francisco Bay Area Abortion Rights Coalition Update

 The Department on the Status of Women continues to work with regional partners and participate in meetings with abortion rights advocates in fiscal year 25/26. We will be working with our partners to help implement recommendations from our regional abortion landscape report, "Preparing for an Uncertain Future in Post-Dobbs America." 




Portfolio Analysis Pooled Fund

Statement of Purpose

This report was prepared in response to a resolution (BF 240683), introduced by Supervisor Peskin on June 11, 2024, and enacted into law on July 26, 2024 (enactment number 405-24). The resolution imposed interim zoning controls for an 18-month period for parcels within the Upper Market Street Neighborhood Commercial Transit District (NCT) and the Castro Street Neighborhood Commercial District (NCD). The interim controls require a Conditional Use Authorization (CUA) and specified findings for a change of use from a Health Services Use or a Social Services Use. These interim controls will be in effect until January 26, 2026, at which point they may be extended for an additional six months, or until the adoption of permanent controls requiring CUAs for Health Services or Social Services Uses in these districts, whichever occurs first.

The resolution directs the Planning Department to submit a written report to the Clerk of the Board six months after the effective date, and every six months thereafter the resolution is in effect. The report should describe the measures taken to alleviate the conditions that led to the adoption of resolution 405-24. Upon receipt of the report, a hearing is required pursuant to Planning Code Section 306.7(i) for the Land Use and Transportation Committee to consider this report.

Background

According to the adopted resolution, the proposed interim controls were put into effect due to the challenges faced by organizations and individuals providing mental and behavioral health services in the Castro and Upper Market neighborhoods. These providers have been threatened with eviction as landlords attempt to dramatically increase rents in the aftermath of the pandemic. Currently, only a handful of queer-focused health facilities are left in the Castro, and those that provide care at low to no cost are even more

rare. The adopting resolution also emphasizes that the LGBTQ community has a unique need for affordable, culturally competent, and accessible mental, medical, and behavioral health services. It highlights the disparities the LGBTQ community faces in accessing these services within close proximity to the Castro neighborhood and the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District.

Existing Controls Within the Castro and Upper Market Neighborhood

Depending on the services being provided, mental and behavioral health services fall under either Health Servies or Social Service or Philanthropic Facility. Health Service uses are principally permitted on the first and second floors and conditionally permitted on the third floor and above within the Upper Market NCT and Castro Street NCD. Additionally, Social Service or Philanthropic Facility uses are principally permitted on all floors in these same districts.

Planning Code Section 102 defines Health Service and Social Service as follows:

Service, Health. A Retail Sales and Service Use that provides medical and allied health services to the individual by physicians, surgeons, dentists, podiatrists, psychologists, psychiatrists, acupuncturists, chiropractors, Sole Practitioner massage therapists as defined in Section 29.5 of the Health Code, or any other health-care professionals when licensed by a State-sanctioned Board overseeing the provision of medically oriented services. It includes, without limitation, a clinic, primarily providing outpatient care in medical, psychiatric, or other health services, and not part of a Hospital or medical center, as defined by this Section of the Code, and Sole Practitioner Massage Establishments as defined in Section 29.5 of the Health Code, but does not include other Massage Establishments, which are defined elsewhere in this Code.

Social Service or Philanthropic Facility. An Institutional Community Use that provides programs and/or services of a charitable or public service nature, including but not limited to arts, education, financial or housing assistance, training, and advocacy. In addition to providing their services on site, such uses may also conduct their administrative activities on site as a Principal Use.

Affected Projects

The interim controls were put forward in response to the possible eviction of Queer LifeSpace (QLS) in May 2024. QLS was founded in 2011 and located at 2275 Market Street within the Upper Market NCT. It is a nonprofit counseling agency that provides affordable, evidence-based mental health and substance abuse services to the LGBTQIA+ community in the Bay Area. The Department understands that QLS is still operating at the site and has not been evicted. Additionally, the Department has not received any CUA applications triggered by these interim controls.

Environmental Review

This Report was determined not to be a project per State CEQA Guidelines, Sections 15378 and 15060(c)(2), because it does not result in a physical change to the environment.



Report Conclusion

There are at least two other provisions in the Planning Code that require CUA for replacing an existing use: one for replacing movie theaters and the other for grocery stores. However, the Department's experience has shown that this type of land use control is often ineffective in achieving its long-term goals. This is because the city cannot mandate that a business remain operational. These CUA requirements are designed to disincentivize landlords from evicting tenants or demolishing buildings with these uses, aiming to preserve such businesses. Nevertheless, these businesses frequently close because they are no longer economically viable. Once a business ceases operations, the CUA requirement often discourages new tenants from occupying the space, resulting in vacancies that can persist for years or indefinitely. A similar issue arose with the CUA requirement for the removal of gas stations, which was ultimately repealed under the Constraints Reduction Ordinance.

The interim controls under discussion were initially adopted in response to mental and behavioral health service organizations in the Castro and Upper Market neighborhoods facing the threat of eviction due to significant rent increases sought by landlords. As of this report's date, QLS, the one organization known to have been at risk of displacement, continues to operate at its site and has not been evicted. While it is unclear whether these interim controls directly prevented QLS's eviction, it is possible that the CUA requirement played a role in deterring such an outcome; moreover, the Department's understanding is that the outstanding issues between the tenant and landlord have not yet been resolved.

As a long-term solution, the Department does not recommend making these interim controls permanent. The most effective land use approach to encourage and support these uses in any neighborhood is to permit them outright, with minimal regulatory barriers. Other than the CUA requirement for Health Services on the third floor and above, there are no Planning Code restrictions preventing the establishment of Health Service or Social Service uses in these districts. However, implementing permanent controls that require CUA for the replacement of these uses could unintentionally discourage landlords from leasing new spaces to such businesses or organizations.

Health Service and Social Service uses are vital to the city and particularly important to the Castro and Upper Market neighborhoods. Nevertheless, the city should explore alternative, non-land use strategies to retain and attract these critical services in the Castro neighborhood. Such approaches could prove more effective and sustainable in supporting these uses over the long term.



Notice of Proposed Changes in Regulations

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fish and Game Commission (Commission), pursuant to the authority vested by sections 200, 202, 205, 219, 220, 265, 275, 399, 713, 1050, 1053.1, 1055.1, 2084, 7071, 7149.8, 7380 and 8587.1, of the Fish and Game Code, interpret or make specific sections 110, 200, 205, 206, 255, 265, 270, 275, 713, 1050, 1053.1, 1055.1, 2084, 7071, 7120, 7149.8, 7380, 7381, 7382 and 8587.1, proposes to amend sections 1.74, 5.80, 5.81, 27.60, 27.90, 27.91 and 701, repeal sections 5.78, 5.79, 27.92, 27.93 and 27.95, Title 14, California Code of Regulations (CCR), relating to white sturgeon fishing.

Informative Digest/Policy Statement Overview

Unless otherwise specified, all section references in this document are to Title 14, CCR.

On November 29, 2023, the California Fish and Game Commission (Commission) received a petition from San Francisco Baykeeper, The Bay Institute, Restore the Delta, and California Sportfishing Protection Alliance to list white sturgeon as threatened under the California Endangered Species Act (CESA). The petitioners argued that long term declines in the abundance of white sturgeon are due to 1) Central Valley water management infrastructure and operations, 2) overharvest in the recreational fishery, 3) Harmful Algal Blooms, and 4) other factors such as poaching, pollution, vessel strikes, and climate change. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) returned an evaluation on March 15, 2024, determining that the petition provided sufficient scientific information to indicate that the petitioned action may be warranted. On June 19, 2024, the Commission voted that white sturgeon warranted candidacy under CESA and directed the Department to initiate a status review of white sturgeon.

Under CESA, candidate species receive protections while a status review is conducted. This prohibition of take includes non-harvest "catch-and-release" angling; however, California Fish and Game Code Section 2084 permits the Commission to authorize the take of candidate species of fish by hook and line for sport based on the best available scientific information. Scientific studies of the effects of angling on white sturgeon in other populations indicate that the species is robust and tolerates catch-and-release angling well. Since the best available science suggests the risks would be minimal.

At the August 2024 Commission meeting, the Department presented an emergency exemption regulation package under Section 2084 that would allow for a catch-and-release fishery during the candidacy period. The Commission voted to approve the Section 2084 exemption, and it went into effect on September 6, 2024.

The goal of the emergency regulations that this regulation extends is to continue to permit a catchand-release fishery for white sturgeon during the CESA, while providing recreational opportunities for anglers and mitigating adverse economic impacts to businesses that serve sturgeon angling.

The proposed regulations in this Certificate of Compliance are fundamentally the same as the original emergency ruling with the following clarifications:

- The previous long-term sturgeon fishing regulations for inland (5.80) and ocean (27.90) will be edited so that they mirror the language in the emergency regulations (5.78 and 27.93). This language includes both species and report card regulations.
- Sections 5.80 and 27.90 have been edited to change the sturgeon fishing report card season from October 1 through June 30 to encompass the fishing season rather than follow the calendar year. This is the only major difference between the existing emergency regulations and what is proposed in this Certificate of Compliance.

- The emergency regulations (5.78 and 27.93) will be allowed to expire to avoid confusion and duplication.
- The previous long-term sturgeon report card regulations (5.79 and 27.92) will be repealed because all relevant report card information is now included in 5.80 and 27.90.
- The general report card section (1.74) will be edited to remove sturgeon specific information that is now found in 5.80 and 27.90.
- The fee for a white sturgeon sport fishing report card will be set from a range of \$5 to \$11.

Benefit of the Regulations

The status of the existing white sturgeon population and the impacts of recent Harmful Algal Blooms are currently not known. The Department piloted a new sturgeon abundance monitoring program in 2024 to provide population data and the species is currently the subject of a comprehensive CESA species status review. Evidence from successful recreational fisheries on other West Coast rivers and states indicate that the species tolerates catch-and-release angling well and can coexist with a financially lucrative fishery. Maintaining the opportunity for catch-and-release angling will protect the remaining population while still permitting angling and business opportunities.

Consistency and Compatibility with Existing Regulations

The proposed regulations are neither inconsistent nor incompatible with existing state regulations. Section 20, Article IV, of the state Constitution specifies that the Legislature may delegate to the Commission such powers relating to the protection and propagation of fish and game as the Legislature sees fit. The Legislature has delegated to the Commission the power to adopt regulations governing white sturgeon sport fishing (Section 200, California Fish and Game Code). No other state agency has the authority to adopt regulations governing white sturgeon sport fishing. The Commission has reviewed its own regulations and finds that the proposed regulations are neither inconsistent nor incompatible with existing state regulations. The Commission has searched the CCR for any regulations regarding the adoption of white sturgeon sport fishing regulations; therefore, the Commission has concluded that the proposed regulations are neither inconsistent nor incompatible with existing state regulations.

Impact of Regulatory Action/Results of the Economic Impact Assessment

The potential for significant statewide adverse economic impacts that might result from the proposed regulatory action has been assessed, and the following initial determinations relative to the required statutory categories have been made:

The Commission does not anticipate any impacts on the creation or elimination of jobs, the creation of new business, the elimination of existing businesses or the expansion of businesses in California. The Commission does not anticipate any benefits to the health and welfare of California residents, or worker safety. The Commission anticipates benefits to the State's environment by sustainably managing California's sportfishing resources.

(c) Cost Impacts on a Representative Private Person or Business:

The Commission is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action. No change in gear or equipment requirements are introduced for the recreational white sturgeon fishery. However, the proposed fee range of \$5 to \$11.06 may lower the sturgeon report card fee below the current expected price of \$11.06, which would represent a slight cost benefit to fishers.

(d) Costs or Savings to State Agencies or Costs/Savings in Federal Funding to the State:

No costs or savings to state agencies or costs/savings in federal funding to the state are anticipated. The Department's existing level of monitoring and enforcement activities are expected to be unchanged by this action. However, it is anticipated that the proposed easing of take limits during the CESA candidacy may result in changes to sturgeon report card sales.

Thank you for your solidarity in standing with our trans siblings last evening as we appealed the Letter of Determination issued to GEO Reentry Services in support of its ongoing operations at 111 Taylor Street. I am writing to you as well as to my own Supervisor Jackie Fielder, President Mandelman and the entire Board to request that you hold a special hearing to investigate and determine if GEO Reentry Services should be allowed to continue to operate at 111 Taylor Street under the false pretense of group housing rather than a quasi-carceral enterprise, ascertain the extent of the violations and infractions that may have occurred under their stewardship of the site, and hear testimony on the ongoing and irrevocable harm their presence continues to have on the lives of the recently incarcerated in their custody as well as the surrounding community of the Tenderloin and Transgender Cultural District.

Although the Board of Appeals voted 4-1, with Vice-President Eppler in dissent, to deny the appeal and uphold the determination, this fight must not end here. Indeed, every Commissioner was in support of that spirit and encouraged Zoning Administrator Teague to continue his ongoing investigation into the numerous and engregious infractions and violations that many in the community gave testimony on. Furthermore, they advocated that the community pursue every path available with every pertinent City entity, including this body. I agree that a hearing in collaboration with multiple departments, agencies, and organiations is key to holding this company to maximum accountability, and go further in ensuring that this include key Trasngender leadership, orgs, and City entities such as the Trasngender Cultural District and Office of Transgender Initiatives.

Furthermore, per Stephen's comments this evening, it is incumbent upon this City not only to determine what code violations may have occurred, but if the presence of this operation in our city isn't in violation of San Francisco ordinances, and more importantly, our values. This group is a subsidiary of the GEO Group, a corporation in league with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement and the very same that is currently holding San Franciscans who have been disappeared off our streets. Tonight GEO representatives affirmed that the LOD is what they required to continue their contracts with the State and Federal Government. They also tried to disingenuously separate themselves from their parent company, implying they have nothing to do with the numerous targeted raids that are terrorizing our country. In effect, although our City may be only fulfilling departmental obligations, due to grey areas and lack of context, what are we inadvertently cosigning? As we seek to hold all City Departments and Agencies accountable to our Sanctuary City status, we must also scrutinize any possible gaps in policy or loopholes.

Our City government is well-acquainted with extractive corporations who use such grey areas in code and law to further emesh themselves in our communities, but given the cruel and horrific times we are living in, can we continue to allow this *affiliate* of state sanctioned terror to continue to operate in the heart of one of our most vulnerable communities and continue to desecrate the site of one one the first battles in LGBTQ civil rights?

Chandra Laborde, who was this evening's named appellate, framed it best. Although, a member of the San Francisco Police Force and charged with upholding an even narrover interpretation of law, Officer Elliott Blackstone could have hid behind his badge and the letter of the law in the months that followed the Compton's Cafteria Riot, but instead, he allied himself with the movement and fought for the community through his role and in his life until the day he died. As San Franciscans continue to be imperiled by the very country that should be protecting them, now is not the time to hide behind the law, but to find ways to use it to protect our most vulnerable and remove the vagaries and lack of clarity that may be inviting harm.

Although we are aware that August is the legislative recess, it is also the month that the riot of 1966 occurred at this very site and, we believe, helps frame how already imperative this issue is as our communities grow more imperiled by the day.

Dear Board of Supervisors and SF Recreation and Parks,

I would like to request that a ground-level bowl for dogs be installed within Balboa Park for the dog park. There would be two options, with the first likely being lower cost:

- 1. Add a dog bowl with a foot pedal to the existing public water fountain near the basketball courts. Improve water pressure.
- 2. Add a fountain, including a dog bowl and pedal, near the main benches in the area of the park designated for off-leash dogs.

The existing water fountain near the basketball courts has extremely low water pressure and can only fill water bottles extremely slowly and, due to the angle of the spout, dog bowls can only be filled to approximately 1" of water making this a laborious and fairly useless water fountain for humans and dogs. Because of the water pressure issues, even for a human to drink from the existing fountain is problematic as one's mouth might come into contact with the unsanitary spout.

Please let me know what would need to happen for this to take place.

Why am I receiving this notice?

On June 30, 2025, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) submitted an application to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to recover approximately \$133 million in 2027 to continue offering state-required support to customers through its Income Qualified Programs (IQP). This reflects a decrease from current funding levels of \$190 million in 2025. These programs—including the California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE), Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) and Energy Savings Assistance (ESA)—help lower energy bills and provide no-cost energy saving measures for eligible customers. The funding will allow PG&E to maintain these assistance programs while completing evaluations that will strengthen and improve these programs in the future. If approved, this request may result in a change to the rates you pay for energy.

Why is PG&E requesting this rate change?

PG&E is requesting this rate change to continue providing energy assistance programs that help income-qualified customers manage their energy use and lower their monthly bills. PG&E is asking the CPUC to approve one year of bridge funding for 2027.

This funding would allow PG&E to maintain current levels of support and services while it completes important studies and program evaluations in 2025 and 2026. These evaluations will help shape program improvements for 2028 and beyond, ensuring that PG&E continues to meet the needs of the communities it services with safe, reliable, clean, affordable energy. By requesting this funding, PG&E is working to ensure there's no interruption in assistance for customers who rely on these programs.

How could this affect my monthly electric rates?

Many customers receive bundled electric service from PG&E, meaning they receive electric generation, transmission and distribution services. A typical residential non-CARE,1 bundled electric customer using 500 kWh per month would see a decrease from \$214.93 to \$214.88, or 0.02% in 2027.

Direct Access (DA) and Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) customers receive electric transmission and distribution services and select CPUC-ordered services from PG&E. If this application is approved, on average compared to current rates, rates for services provided by PG&E to these customers would decrease by 0.01% in 2027. DA providers and CCAs set their own generation rates. Check with your DA provider or CCA to learn how this would impact your overall bill.

Another category of nonbundled customers is Departing Load. These customers do not receive electric generation, transmission or distribution services from PG&E. However, these customers are required to pay certain charges by law or CPUC decision. On average, existing Departing Load customers would see a rate decrease of 0.25% in 2027.

Actual impacts will vary depending on usage and are subject to CPUC regulatory approval.

¹ CARE is an income qualified discount program. Electric CARE customers are exempt from certain charges and receive a 35% discount on nonexempt charges for an overall average discount of approximately 38%.

How could this affect my monthly gas rates?

Bundled gas customers receive transmission, distribution and procurement services from PG&E.

Based on rates currently in effect, the bill, including the average monthly climate credit, for a typical non-CARE, bundled residential gas customer averaging 31 therms per month would decrease from \$83.86 to \$83.48, or 0.4% in 2027.

Actual impacts will vary depending on usage and are subject to CPUC regulatory approval.

How does the rest of this process work?

This application will be assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt PG&E's application, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.

Parties to the proceeding may review PG&E's application, including the Public Advocates Office which is an independent consumer advocate within the CPUC that represents customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. 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

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

That said, I respectfully urge the committee to consider a **shorter renewal term** than the proposed 15 years. Neighborhood needs, economic conditions, and priorities can shift significantly over time, and a shorter term — such as 5 years — would allow for **regular review**, **community input**, and **financial reassessment**.

This approach would preserve the GBD's momentum while ensuring it remains responsive to the evolving needs of residents and property owners.

Dear Board of Supervisors:

As the Treatment on Demand Coalition, we are a diverse stakeholder group of San Francisco community members and service providers, including residents, people who use drugs, family members, advocates, medical professionals, and researchers. We work collaboratively to uphold and expand the City's mental health and substance use disorder treatment framework established under Proposition T (2008), which committed San Francisco to a "treatment on demand" policy.

Thank you for the focus and attention on better citywide accessibility for behavioral health services with Ordinance 250487. We appreciate the spirit of this legislation, but we understand certain provisions in this ordinance can be further developed to improve access to behavioral health services and achieving our shared goal of treatment on demand.

Fair Share Rule

The Fair Share Rule suggests that the use of behavioral health services is specific to homelessness while the reality is that people who are not experiencing homelessness also access and use behavioral health services. In addition, applying these homelessness numbers to approve behavioral health services is not suitable or relevant to assess the opening of a new behavioral health service location. Because of this non-relevant assessment, we support a removal of "Behavioral Health Residential Care and Treatment Facility" and "Behavioral Health Specialized Outpatient Clinic" under the definition of Covered Facilities.

Enhanced Care

Opportunities exist to maximize care by enhancing service models in non-Covered Facility locations with colocated behavioral health care. For example, the City funds the Citywide Roving Team and PHACS that support permanent supportive housing tenants with behavioral health challenges. Yet, this ordinance would prohibit these programs benefitting tenants and virtually all additive and co-located care. We urge that spaces where people and communities already access care and support be exempted.

<u>Funding</u>

The State of California and the City and County of San Francisco are heavily focusing on policy responses and significant resources towards behavioral health treatment. In addition, the upcoming Continuum of Care (CoC) funding is extremely likely to be geared towards behavioral health treatment. While we understand that behavioral health treatment will not uniquely solve homelessness, accessing and leveraging these resources may be hampered with this ordinance. We recommend further consideration to ensure that no money is left on the table.

We appreciate all consideration of our recommendations. In addition, we also serve as a useful space to engage in the development of policy efforts. Accordingly, we sincerely welcome and appreciate all future opportunities to partner and collaborate on solutions to improve the local behavioral health system. On behalf of the Bay Area Council, I write to express our support for the proposed Geographic Equity Ordinance. San Francisco today has approximately 11 percent of the Bay Area's population, 20 percent of the region's homeless shelters, and over 40 percent of the region's Permanent Supportive Housing. This over-concentration of the region's homeless infrastructure isn't spread throughout the city but is instead further concentrated into just a handful of neighborhoods.

This disparity deprives homeless residents in the city's underserved neighborhoods of critical services while burdening all residents in over-served neighborhoods with the externalities that come with high concentrations of high-needs individuals.

The proposed Geographic Equity Ordinance defines a fair-share threshold for the geographic distribution of homeless shelters and interim housing in the City based on a capacity ratio calculated by the percentage of homeless residents and homeless shelters currently located in a neighborhood. This rational approach would help make sure the city is meeting homeless residents where they're at, rather than forcing them to relocate to where they're not. These elements not only help guarantee fairness but also foster public buy-in.

The end result is likely to be families poised on a knife edge - waiting years for housing opportunities while constantly worried that their home may be towed if they make a single misstep.

RVs are homes, especially for immigrant families, elderly, and disabled San Franciscans. Over 1,400 City residents live in their vehicles, including 90% of families experiencing unsheltered homelessness. There are 872 people on the family shelter waitlist and 471 people on the adult shelter waitlist. We know as well that existing shelters are often temporary and inadequate. Is it surprising that people would prefer to live in an RV over sleeping on a gymnasium floor where you get kicked out at 7AM?

I am especially dismayed that the Mayor's proposed plan doesn't include safe parking sites. Many elderly residents have been living in their vehicles for decades. It's unrealistic to think that they'll be willing to give up their homes in six months - or a year. Safe parking sites are a proven strategy to meet people where they're at while addressing complaints about street conditions. The City's own failure to run a safe parking site at Candlestick Point isn't an excuse, especially when there's a for-profit RV park operating within SF city limits. If Oakland, San Jose, Fremont, Palo Alto, and Union City can all run safe parking sites affordably, why can't we?

For people living in their vehicles who are ready to move immediately to housing, what's included in the current plan is equally inadequate. There are far more people at risk of having their homes towed than there are housing vouchers, and many of the vouchers being offered are given at the expense of people staying in congregate shelters. An RV or vehicle, while not perfect, is permanent, private housing, and forcing people to give that up in exchange for temporary rental support is unproductive, cruel, and contrary to established research.

I'll conclude by expressing my absolute opposition to the punitive enforcement strategy in the

Mayor's plan, which includes as much funding for signage and tows as it does for helping people. The 2-hour RV parking ban, unlike the housing vouchers, is permanent, and underscores the real purpose of the Mayor's plan: reducing visible poverty, no matter who it hurts. I know SF officials frequently use the existence of 'vanlords' to justify their support for towing policies. While I want to eliminate exploitative landlords as much as anyone, evicting their tenants isn't how we solve this problem. The best way to address predatory behavior is to remove opportunities for predation - by providing permanent, affordable housing.

No one is saying SF shouldn't have a plan for helping our neighbors living in their vehicles, but the solution isn't poverty tows. I'm asking that you push Mayor Lurie and his oligarch pals to come up with a real strategy for addressing this issue, one that includes safe parking sites and real, permanent housing offers for everyone who needs them.

Re: Board File No. 250735, Appeal of 3-Lot Subdivision at 1979 Mission Street

Dear Board of Supervisors:

Our office represents 1979 Mission Street PSH Associates, LP (co-developers Mission Housing Development Corporation and Mission Economic Development Agency), the applicant for the approved affordable housing development at Mission and 16th Street that will construct 136 dwelling units with supportive services to serve vulnerable populations in the neighborhood and City at large. (the "Supportive Housing Project"). The development includes a subdivision of an existing parcel into three parcels, one of which will be occupied by the Supportive Housing Project.

On May 27, 2025, the Planning Department approved the Supportive Housing Project, authorizing the subdivision of 2970 16th Street into three new lots, the demolition of an existing two-story commercial building, and the construction of a new nine-story residential building. The Planning Department approval was in accordance with State laws requiring by-right approval of supportive housing projects in certain residential zones and protecting affordable housing developments from denial on the basis of non-objective criteria, such as concerns about neighborhood character and architectural style that are often weaponized to prevent affordable housing projects.

On June 25, 2025, pursuant to the City's Subdivision Ordinance, the Public Works Department issued a conditional approval of a tentative parcel map subdividing 2970 16th Street into three new lots – a procedural necessity for development of the Supportive Housing Project already approved by the Planning Department. On July 3, 2025, an appeal of Public Work's conditional approval of the tentative parcel map subdividing 2970 16th Street was filed, citing concerns about the Supportive Housing Project's design, the potential for the project to generate excessive traffic, and concerns about impacts on "neighborhood conditions."

The Board of Supervisors must deny this appeal. First and foremost, the purported issues the appeal cites are completely unrelated to the approval of the tentative map, which is solely intended to ensure compliance with the requirements of the City's Subdivision Ordinance. Moreover, even setting aside this disqualifying factor, the Supportive Housing Project's design is

in compliance with applicable City ordinances and applicable objective standards. The Planning Department correctly concluded that the Supportive Housing Project must be approved by right under State law. The Board of Supervisors may not grant the appeal unless the Supportive Housing Project would violate a written, objective and quantifiable public health or safety standard. No such standards are violated here. Even if the underlying project approval could be considered, State law requires the Board of Supervisors to affirm the Planning Department's decision and deny the appeal.

We urge the Board of Supervisors to deny the meritless appeal and ensure that sorely needed housing and supportive programs can move forward.

The Appeal Exceeds the Scope of the Public Works Department's Subdivision Map Approval

The appeal before the Board solely concerns the Public Works Department's approval of a tentative parcel map subdividing 2970 16th Street into three lots. As the Planning Department's July 21, 2025 response to the appeal explains, none of the issues raised by the appeal concern any of the criteria that the Public Works Department or the Planning Department consider in approving a tentative parcel map under the City's subdivision ordinance. Appellants do not contend, for instance, that the parcels created under the tentative parcel map do not conform to any City standards, or that the proposed subdivision map fails to comply with the requirements of local or State law. Instead, the appeal solely addresses aspects of the design of the future supportive housing building and subjective, speculative fears regarding the operation of said building, both of which concern the Planning Department's approval of the *building* on May 27, 2025. Appellants did not appeal the May 27, 2025 approval, and should not be permitted to hijack the subdivision map approval process to air grievances concerning matters that were never under the scope of the Public Works Department's review. The appeal must be denied because it does not raise any alleged deficiencies related to the conditional approval of the tentative parcel map.

The City Cannot Deny a Supportive Housing Project On the Basis of Appellants' Subjective Concerns.

Appellants' failure to raise any issues germane to the Public Works Department's consideration of the tentative parcel map is a sufficient reason for the Board to deny the appeal.

That said, even if the Board were to improperly entertain the issues raised by appellants, State law requires the City to approve the Supportive Housing Project. Under AB 2162 (Gov. Code §§ 65650-65656), all supportive housing projects are subject to streamlined by-right City review. The by-right review process limits the criteria that the City is permitted to consider when reviewing such projects. Under Government Code § 65651(b)(1), the City may only require the Supportive Housing Project to comply with the <u>objective</u>, <u>written development standards and policies</u> that apply to other multifamily development within the same zone. The City's guidelines for implementing AB 2162 clarify that City decisionmakers may not rely on any standards that require personal or subjective judgment in reviewing the Supportive Housing Project. (See Planning Director Bulletin No. 5 (attached)).

The appeal raises subjective concerns and does not identify any objective, written development standards or policies that could legally serve as a basis for denial of the requested project approvals.

While the appeal raises subjective concerns about height, massing, and building footprint, the Planning Department's July 21, 2025 response to the appeal establishes that the proposed building is far below the applicable 105 foot height standard. This is consistent with the Planning Department's findings in its initial May 27, 2025 approval of the Supportive Housing Project, which determines that the Project is in compliance with applicable development standards and policies in the General Plan, Mission Area Plan, and Planning Code. (May 27, 2025 Planning Approval Letter for 2025-002304PRJ at pp. 6-9). The May 27, 2025 Planning Approval Letter also includes findings authorizing the Supportive Housing Project use of State Density Bonus Law to waive development standards relating to building bulk (Planning Code § 270) and alter the rear yard setback requirements. (Planning Code § 134). To the extent appellants are suggesting that use of State Law Density Bonus waivers and concessions render the Supportive Housing Project inconsistent with objective bulk and setback standards, appellants' position is explicitly contrary to the City's guidance on AB 2162 implementation. (See Planning Director Bulletin No. 5 at p. 3 ["Any waivers, concessions, or incentives, conferred through the State Density Bonus Law are considered code-complying, and therefore are consistent with the objective standards of the Planning Code."]). The City's guidance is consistent with State Density Bonus Law requirements, which require the City to waive any development standards that "would physically preclude construction of that project as designed." (Bankers Hill 150 v. City of San Diego (2022) 74 Cal. App.5th 755, 775.) Similarly, the appellants' discussion of "traffic and parking congestion" does not cite any objective, written development standards that the Supportive Housing Project are not addressed by the Planning Department's approval. Under Planning Code § 151.1, there are, in fact, no required parking space for any residential project in the Mission Street Neighborhood Commercial Transit (NCT) District.² The appellants' unsupported assertion that the Supportive Housing Project "will amplify issues of homeless, drug use, and crime" is not based on any development standard – it is precisely the type of personal or subjective judgment that AB 2162 is designed to remove from the approval process. The pages of cherry-picked articles that appellants have submitted along with their appeal have no bearing on the City's obligation to evaluate the Supportive Housing Project on the basis of objective development standards.

Lastly, appellants request that the City "hold a full environmental impact report on this proposed project at 1979 Mission." This requested course of action would be a flagrant violation of AB

¹ Under State Density Bonus Law (and the Housing Accountability Act), development standards that preclude the construction of the project as designed can be applied only if the project would have a "a significant, quantifiable, direct, and unavoidable impact, based on objective, identified written public health or safety standards, policies, or conditions as they existed on the date the application was deemed complete." (Gov. Code, §§ 65589.5(d)(2), 65915(d)(3), 65915(e)(1).) Neither the appeal letter nor any other evidence in the record identifies any relevant objective standards or provides credible evidence of a public health or safety impact.

² Elimination of minimum parking requirements for this location advances the City's goal of encouraging dense, transit-oriented development in an area with excellent excess to transit. The project advances this policy goal, which is embodied in the objective development standards that the Planning Department correctly applied.

2162, which requires the City to ministerially approve the Supportive Housing Project for the purpose of avoiding the delay and expense of additional environmental review for development in a location that the City has already zoned for dense residential development. (See Gov. Code, § 65651(d)(1) [AB 2162 supportive housing is not a "project" subject to CEQA].)"

Granting the Appeal Would Violate the Housing Accountability Act.

The Housing Accountability Act restricts the ability of the City to deny a 100 percent affordable housing project. Under Government Code § 65589.5(d) the City may only deny the Supportive Housing Project if it determines that there is direct and unavoidable impact on public health or safety based on objective, identified written public health or safety standards, policies, or conditions. (Gov. Code, § 65589.5(d)(2).) Any action the Board takes to disapprove a required land use approval or entitlement needed to facilitate a housing project, including a tentative parcel map, is considered a denial. (Gov. Code § 65589.5(h)(6); *Honchariw v. County of Stanislaus* (2011) 200 Cal.App.4th 1066, 1074.)

The appeal identifies no objective, written public health or safety standards that the Supportive Housing Project would violate. Therefore, under the Housing Accountability Act, the Board cannot grant the appeal without violating State housing law.³

* *

The Supportive Housing Project presents an invaluable opportunity for the City to increase its supply of supportive housing units and supportive programs. Policy 8 of the City's Housing Element specifically directs the City to expand permanent supportive housing options for vulnerable individuals and families, and Housing Element Action 8.6.2 directs the City to utilize and comply with the state-wide streamlining opportunities to expedite and increase the production of permanent supportive housing. The Planning Department has already determined that the Supportive Housing Project complies with all applicable development standards. We appreciate the City's adherence to its subdivision ordinance appeal procedures; however, the substance of this appeal is composed of precisely the type of nebulous and non-objective objections that have hindered the development of affordable and supportive housing projects throughout the City and the State. We urge the Board to continue its support for the development of affordable and supportive housing in the City and comply with its duty under State law. The Board should reject this meritless appeal.

³ Apart from the complete absence of evidence of any non-compliance with any objective standard in the record, the City determined the project to be complete on April 2, 2025 and did not identify any inconsistencies with objective standards within 30 days of that date. Any standard not identified by that date cannot serve as the basis for denial of the project under the Housing Accountability Act. (See Gov. Code, § 65589.5(j)(2)(A)(i).)
