MANDATE STATEMENT

City Charter Section 9.105 states that amendments to the Annual Appropriations Ordinance, after the Controller certifies the availability of funds, are subject to Board of Supervisors approval by ordinance.

BACKGROUND

Participatory budgeting is a process that gives community members an opportunity to provide input on how to spend public funds. For FY 2024-25, District 7 residents were invited to submit project proposals prior to March 29, 2024. A Review Committee composed of District residents and community members evaluated the proposals.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed ordinance would de-appropriate \$399,950 from District 7 General City Responsibility and \$150,000 from SFMTA and re-appropriate the funds to the Departments and projects shown below in Exhibit 1.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed ordinance would de-appropriate \$399,950 from District 7 General City Responsibility and \$150,000 from SFMTA and re-appropriate the funds to the following Departments: Arts Commission (\$50,000), Children Youth and Families (\$125,000), Public Works (\$162,850), Library (\$13,200), Recreation & Parks (\$49,000), and the Municipal Transportation Agency (\$150,000).

Funding Source

The FY 2024-25 – FY 2025-26 Annual Appropriation Ordinance includes \$400,000 for District 7 projects. The \$150,000 in funding from MTA was appropriated in a prior budget.

In the proposed ordinance, the General Fund uses total \$400,050 or \$100 more than General Fund sources of \$399,950. The proposed ordinance should be amended to increase appropriations from General City Responsibility from \$399,050 to \$400,000 and decrease re-appropriations to the General Fund projects by \$50. Which account to reduce is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Amend the proposed ordinance to match the total General Fund sources and uses.
- 2. Approve the proposed ordinance, as amended.

I am writing on behalf of Monterey Heights and D7 residents, in support of Supervisor Melgar's ordinance to allocate funds for winning 2024 PB projects.

The Monterey Heights Housing Association (MHHA) PB proposal, also supported by Westwood Highlands, Sherwood Forest & St. Francis Woods, received > 400 D7 residents' votes in support of our Traffic Calming proposal described below.

MHHA 2024 PB Project Overview -

Proposal: Install push-button activated flashing beacons on both sides of the raised crosswalk.

Goal: In keeping with the citywide Vision Zero & Pedestrian Safety PB category, we want to make it safer for pedestrians to cross Yerba Buena Avenue, especially those heading to the SFMTA Bus Stops, by installing push-button activated flashing beacons at the raised crosswalk on Yerba Buena, just south of the complicated intersection of Yerba Buena, Casitas & Hazelwood Avenues.

MHHA proposed an upgrade to the **dangerous crosswalk on Yerba Buena (YB) Avenue, just south of the large intersection with Casitas & Hazelwood Avenues.** Yerba Buena is a thoroughfare used by drivers throughout the city, especially as a short cut from the southern parts of SF to the Sunset District, Southwest & Central parts of the city. Additionally, the SFMTA 43 Bus travels in both directions on Yerba Buena, and is heavily used by middle school, high school and City College students as well as by other adults traveling from the Monterey Heights, Sherwood Forest & Westwood Highland neighborhoods.

While speed humps and a raised crosswalk with signs have recently been installed, pedestrians crossing Yerba Buena remain at risk for significant injury due to a) limited visibility as cars drive up the hill from either direction, b) the 3-part intersection just north of the crosswalk, and c) vehicular high speeds. This issue is particularly heightened at night and/or with dense fog.

Flashing lights, initiated by a pedestrian planning to cross the street, will further improve drivers' awareness and prompt drivers to slow down.

Funding Request: \$42,000 (estimated cost of installing push-button activated flashing beacon pair)

Location: Yerba Buena Ave, just south of the intersection that includes Casitas and Hazelwood Avenues.

Please note: We have met, on site, with Damon Curtis, Manager of Traffic Calming, SFMTA to discuss this, and we have SFMTA's endorsement.

Thank you in advance for your consideration of this important project at the September 4th Budget & Finance Committee vote.

After the tragic accident that occurred in West Portal in the spring of this year, a few of us partnered together and developed a proposal to improve an intersection not far from there that suffered from a multitude of safety issues.

Laguna Honda and Ulloa Streets form a complex intersection where cars often roll through racing to make the light to turn on Portola. This intersection has no signage or lights, and pedestrians crossing Laguna Honda are not visible to the approaching cars. To make the situation more dangerous, the intersection is immediately in front of St Brendan's Church and its K-8 school. If you polled most people in our neighborhood, they'd likely tell you their own stories of almost being hit here along with plenty of ideas on how to make improvements. Our proposal is to install flashing beacons and a median on Laguna Honda to provide visibility and safety for elderly individuals, parents, and students as they cross these wide streets with safety.

This year, we took part in the submission for Participatory Budgeting through Supervisor Melgar's office and outlined a thorough plan for our proposal. This was approved with significant buy-in and votes from our neighborhood, and we are excited by the prospect of getting funding to have this plan implemented.

For the three of us, we love our city and our neighborhood and we want to invest in it so it flourishes. Our families and friends deserve peace of mind and modern infrastructure to ensure that we can navigate our streets safely. We know that you'll be voting on an ordinance to unlock budgeting for these projects, and **we feel that these funds would make a significant impact in a lot of people's daily lives and are consistent with the City's vision zero policies.** We urge passage of this budget item and look forward to SFMTA advancing this important safety project as soon as possible.

Dear Members of the San Francisco Participatory Budget and Finance Committee,

My family has resided in Westwood Park for the past 40 years. My paternal ancestors were lured to California during the days of the Gold Rush, but eventually settled in San Francisco.

At that time, the neighborhood of Westwood Park was just a dream. The 1906 earthquake shook the City, and residents left in droves. In an attempt to bring them back, the City fathers and developers realized that homes needed to be built for middle class residents. Westwood Park was one of those neighborhoods. In 1917, the first home in Westwood Park was finished. Today, the majority of our more than 650 homes are 100-years-old.

The neighborhood's Entrance Gates and Pillars were designed by a well-respected architect of the era, Louis Christian Mullgardt. They were built on Miramar Avenue at Ocean Avenue, and on Miramar at Monterey Boulevard. (The Gates on Ocean Avenue at Miramar Avenue no longer exist.) Among other things, Mullgardt led the redesign of the De Young Museum in the early 1900s. He also designed the 1916 Juvenile Court and Detention Home at 150 Otis Street (San Francisco Landmark #248), and the Infant Shelter at 19th Avenue and Ortega Avenue. The Infant Shelter is now a private French school - and Landmark #242.

Westwood Park takes pride in its contribution to the development of the City of San Francisco. I urge you to support our neighborhood's plan to preserve and protect our 108-year-old remaining, historic, Entrance Gates and Pillars – San Francisco Landmark #314.

Our schoolyard remains part of the Shared Schoolyard program and our friends and neighbors, who have access to the yard on weekends and holidays, have also enjoyed the use of our turf and yard.
