19 Section 1. Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Article  
20 XLII, consisting of Sections 5.42-1 through 5.42-8, to read as follows:

**ARTICLE XLII:**

**FIRE CODE TECHNICAL ADVISORY COUNCIL**

**SECTION 5.42-1. CREATION OF THE FIRE CODE TECHNICAL ADVISORY**

**COUNCIL.**

*The Board of Supervisors hereby establishes the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council (the  
“Council”) of the City and County of San Francisco.*

1           **SEC. 5.42-2. PURPOSE.**

2           San Francisco Fire Code Section 1103.5.4, requires certain existing high-rise residential  
3 buildings to install an automatic sprinkler system by January 1, 2035. The purpose of the Council is to  
4 evaluate, further define, and advise the Board of Supervisors, Mayor, and the Fire Department, on the  
5 criteria and types of evidence the Fire Marshal shall consider in determining whether to approve  
6 alternate methods and materials, waive specific individual requirements, and grant necessary  
7 extensions of time, as permitted in Section 1103.5.4. The Board of Supervisors may adopt legislation to  
8 implement the recommendations of the Council as necessary.

9  
10           **SEC. 5.42-3. MEMBERSHIP.**

11           (a) The Council shall consist of 11 voting members. Seats 1 through 6 shall be appointed by  
12 the Board of Supervisors.

13                   (1) Seat 1 shall be held by a property owner or building manager of a building subject  
14 to the requirements of Section 1103.5.4 of the San Francisco Fire Code.

15                   (2) Seat 2 shall be held by a non-owner tenant of a building affected by Section  
16 1103.5.4.

17                   (3) Seat 3 shall be held by a duly authorized homeowners' association representative of  
18 a building subject to the requirements of Section 1103.5.4.

19                   (4) Seat 4 shall be held by a person who holds an active C-16 fire protection contractor  
20 license issued by the California Contractors State License Board (CA-CSLB), as defined in California  
21 Code of Regulations, Title 16, Division 8, Article 3.

22                   (5) Seat 5 shall be held by a construction professional with experience in either general  
23 labor or a skilled trade.

1                   (6) Seat 6 shall be held by a professional architect who holds an active license issued by  
2 the California Architects Board or a professional structural engineer who holds an active license  
3 issued by the California Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists.

4                   (7) Seat 7 shall be held by an employee of the Controller's Office appointed by the  
5 Controller.

6                   (8) Seat 8 shall be held by an employee of the Fire Department appointed by the Fire  
7 Chief.

8                   (9) Seat 9 shall be held by an employee of the Department of Building Inspection,  
9 appointed by the Director of the Department of Building Inspection.

10                  (10) Seat 10 shall be held by an employee of the Public Utilities Commission, appointed  
11 by the General Manager of the Public Utilities Commission.

12                  (11) Seat 11 shall be held by a member of the Board of Supervisors appointed by the  
13 President of the Board of Supervisors; the appointed Supervisor may designate a legislative assistant to  
14 serve in the Supervisor's seat.

15  
16                  **SEC. 5.42-4. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.**

17                  (a) Members of the Council shall serve at the pleasure of their appointing authority and may be  
18 removed by their appointing authority without cause.

19                  (b) The Fire Department shall provide administrative support for the Council.

20  
21                  **SEC. 5.42-5. POWERS AND DUTIES.**

22                  (a) The Council shall have the power and the duty to advise the Board of Supervisors, Mayor,  
23 and the Fire Department on the criteria and types of evidence the Fire Marshal should consider in  
24 determining whether to approve alternate methods and materials, waive specific individual  
25 requirements, and grant necessary extensions of time, as permitted in Section 1103.5.4.4. In addition,

1 the Council shall develop definitions for the following terms used in Section 1103.5.4.4: “reasonable  
2 degree of fire protection”; “alternative protection”; “not physically possible”; “disproportionate  
3 effort”; and “undue hardship.”

4 (b) In developing criteria and definitions described in subsection (a), the Council shall  
5 consider all documents and information submitted to it, including but not limited to the Public Utilities  
6 Commission’s response to a December 16, 2025 Letter of Inquiry from a member of the Board of  
7 Supervisors seeking information related to water capacity and sprinkler retrofits, and all reports  
8 prepared by the Budget and Legislative Analyst related to or regarding residential high rise sprinkler  
9 retrofits.

10 (c) No later than 90 days following its first meeting, the Council shall submit to the Board of  
11 Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Fire Department its findings and recommendations.

12  
13 **SEC. 5.42-6. MEETINGS AND PROCEDURES.**

14 (a) The Fire Chief or their designee shall set the inaugural meeting of the Council not more  
15 than 60 days following the appointment of a quorum of the members of the Council. The Fire Chief or  
16 their designee shall provide at least ten days’ public notice of the Council’s inaugural meeting.  
17 Following the inaugural meeting, the Council shall hold a regular meeting not less than twice each  
18 month during the first 90 days following its first meeting, and thereafter shall continue to meet no less  
19 than once per month until its sunset as provided in Section 5.42-7.

20 (b) The Council shall elect a chair and such other officers as it deems appropriate and may  
21 establish bylaws and rules for its organization and procedures.

22  
23 **SEC. 5.42-7. SUNSET.**

24 Unless the Board of Supervisors by ordinance extends the term of the Council, this Article XLII  
25 shall expire by operation of law, and the Council shall sunset, one year after its first meeting. In that

1 event, and after the sunset date, the City Attorney shall cause this Article XLII to be removed from the  
2 Administrative Code.

3  
4 **SEC. 5.42-8. UNDERTAKING FOR THE GENERAL WELFARE.**

5 In enacting and implementing this ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to  
6 promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an  
7 obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach  
8 proximately caused injury.

9  
10 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective at 12:00 a.m. on the  
11 31st day after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor  
12 returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it,  
13 or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor’s veto of the ordinance.

## LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Fire Code Technical Advisory Council]

**Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to establish the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council to evaluate and advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Fire Department, on the criteria and types of evidence the Fire Marshal should consider in determining whether to waive, modify, or delay certain compliance requirements under the Fire Code that certain existing high-rise residential buildings have sprinkler systems; and to set forth the membership and duties of the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council.**

### Existing Law

San Francisco Fire Code Section 1103.5.4, requires certain existing high-rise residential buildings to install an automatic sprinkler system by January 1, 2035. Section 1103.5.4.4 authorizes the Fire Marshal to approve modifications and alternate methods and materials for the automatic sprinkler system retrofit when it is clearly evident that a reasonable degree of fire safety is provided. In such cases, the Fire Marshal may, among other things, (a) waive specific individual requirements if it can be shown that such requirements are not physically possible, require disproportionate effort, or pose an undue hardship with little increase in life safety, and (b) grant necessary extensions of time when it can be shown that the specific time periods are not physically practical or pose an undue hardship.

### Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would establish the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council. The Council would evaluate, further define, and advise the Board of Supervisors, Mayor, and the Fire Department, on the criteria and types of evidence the Fire Marshal should consider in determining whether to approve alternate methods and materials, waive specific individual requirements, and grant necessary extensions of time, as permitted in Section 1103.5.4. In addition, the Council would develop definitions for the following terms used in Section 1103.5.4.4: “reasonable degree of fire protection”; “alternative protection”; “not physically possible”; “disproportionate effort”; and “undue hardship.” The Council would consist of 11 voting members. The Council would submit to the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Fire Department its findings and recommendations.

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Board of Supervisors Rules of Order 2.21 establishes certain criteria that must be included in legislation creating and establishing, or reauthorizing, new bodies (boards/commissions/task forces/advisory bodies) and requires the Clerk of the Board to advise the Board on certain matters. In order to fulfill these requirements, the following is provided:

*File No. 260216 Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to establish the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council to evaluate and advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Fire Department, on the criteria and types of evidence the Fire Marshal should consider in determining whether to waive, modify, or delay certain compliance requirements under the Fire Code that certain existing high-rise residential buildings have sprinkler systems; and to set forth the membership and duties of the Fire Code Technical Advisory Council.*

- Does a current body address the same or similar subject matter?  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the Clerk of the Board shall advise the Board if there is a current body that addresses the same or similar subject matters.)*  
No. There are no bodies that address the same subject matter.
  
- Language requiring the body to meet at least once every four months  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the enabling legislation must include language requiring the subordinate body to meet at least once every four months.)*  
Yes. Section. 5.42-6 states "Following the inaugural meeting, the Council shall hold a regular meeting not less than twice each month during the first 90 days following its first meeting, and thereafter shall continue to meet no less than once per month until its sunset as provided in Section 5.42-7."



- Language indicating members serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority  
*(Past practices have shown the need to ensure the appointing authority may remove an appointee at any time.)*

Yes. Section 5.42-4 states “Members of the Council shall serve at the pleasure of their appointing authority and may be removed by their appointing authority without cause.”

- Language establishing attendance requirements  
*(Past practices have shown the need to ensure a process is in place to address attendance concerns and quorum issues.)*

No. Pursuant to the BOS Rules of Order, suggest adding “Any member who misses two regular meetings of the Council within any 12-month period without the express approval of the Council at or before each missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the body.”

- Number of seats and qualifications  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the enabling legislation must include a description of the qualifications for each member, the date on which the appointments commences, and the length of term of appointments.)*

Yes. Section 5.42-3 states The Task Force shall consist of eleven(11) voting members. Seats 1 through 6 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

- Seat 1 shall be held by a property owner or building manager of a building subject to the requirements of Section 1103.5.4 of the San Francisco Fire Code.
- Seat 2 shall be held by a non-owner tenant of a building affected by Section 1103.5.4.
- Seat 3 shall be held by a duly authorized homeowners’ association representative of a building subject to the requirements of Section 1103.5.4.
- Seat 4 shall be held by a person who holds an active C-16 fire protection contractor license issued by the California Contractors State License Board (CA-CSLB), as defined in California Code of Regulations, Title 16, Division 8, Article 3.
- Seat 5 shall be held by a construction professional with experience in either general labor or a skilled trade.
- Seat 6 shall be held by a professional architect who holds an active license issued by the California Architects Board or a professional structural engineer who holds an active license issued by the California Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists.
- Seat 7 shall be held by an employee of the Controller’s Office appointed by the Controller.
- Seat 8 shall be held by an employee of the Fire Department appointed by the Fire Chief.
- Seat 9 shall be held by an employee of the Department of Building Inspection, appointed by the Director of the Department of Building Inspection.
- Seat 10 shall be held by an employee of the Public Utilities Commission, appointed by the General Manager of the Public Utilities Commission.
- Seat 11 shall be held by a member of the Board of Supervisors appointed by the President of the Board of Supervisors; the appointed Supervisor may designate a legislative assistant to serve in the Supervisor’s seat.”



- Term limits (E.g., commencement date? Staggered terms?)  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the enabling legislation shall include the commencement date and length of term of appointments.)*

No. Not applicable as the Council shall sunset one year after its first meeting.

- Administering department  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the enabling legislation shall identify the City Department that will provide administrative services to the subordinate body.)*

Yes. Section 5.42-4 states “The Fire Department shall provide administrative support for the Council.”

- Reporting requirements  
*(Past practices have shown the need to detail and codify the reporting requirements of a body.)*

Yes. Section 5.42-5(c) states “No later than 90 days following its first meeting, the Council shall submit to the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Fire Department its findings and recommendations.”

- Sunset date  
*(Pursuant to Board Rule 2.21, the enabling legislation shall include a sunset clause not to exceed three years.)*

Yes. Section 5.42-7 states “Unless the Board of Supervisors by ordinance extends the term of the Council, this Article XLII shall expire by operation of law, and the Council shall sunset, one year after its first meeting.”

My name is Jason May , I've been commissioning high rise buildings in sf for 25 years. I'm emailing because sf has a big problem with non of the buildings with smoke control doing any annual testing. Smoke control makes up 70% of the fire alarm system in these buildings and since 2007 annual testing has been mandatory. SFFD has not written any violations, I've been in many meeting with fire prevention and even gave them a little smoke control class. This hasn't helped and non of our 2700 smoke control buildings are complying to this code. That means 70% of the fire alarm has not been maintained and tested for 19 years in the city. This is a big problem, the liability to the owners if a fire does happen. The insurance companies will not take on a claim wants their aware of the building not testing the fire alarm to code. The habitability law is also violated. This means anyone leasing in these buildings can legally get out of the lease. It's the buildings responsible to keep the life safety system code compliant and non of them are doing this. I've been to the property management companies and owners reps and no one is taking this seriously because SFFD goes out for the fire inspection and never writes a violation. If I can give you more information please reach out.

Dear Rules Committee,

I'm writing to you to express my concern and opposition to the sprinkler retrofit mandate. This affects 126 buildings throughout the city and app 15,000 City residents. I own a studio apartment in the historic Hamilton building in the Tenderloin, one of these affected buildings.

I ask you to reverse this mandate or to create an exemption for these buildings unless they undertake a \*major\* renovation. Even before the adjacent costs are calculated, the estimated minimum expense will be approximately \$10,000 for my studio. As a homeowner in the Tenderloin, this added expense and construction is onerous, and may lead to my having to leave my home. Some of the homeowners in my building are on fixed incomes and / or disabled, most are first-time homeowners like myself. I was able to purchase my home through SFMOHCD's downpayment assistance program. As such, my income level to qualify for this program is below the median, making this sprinkler mandate an extreme financial burden.

Additionally, this increases the risk that property values will continue to decrease in my building. They have already fallen by over 30% since the pandemic, a reflection of the conditions in a vulnerable neighborhood that has already borne the brunt of City neglect. This decline directly impacts City property tax revenue.

Finally, I'm deeply concerned that this regulation was mandated without a transparent process, no feasibility studies, and with no homeowner input. Why don't homeowners and taxpayers have a say in this? Instead, only building unions have been given the opportunity to weigh in on these requirements.

Please, I urge you to speak with your colleagues and either reverse this mandate or create the exemption noted above.
