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[Central American and Haitians Adjustment Act of 1999]

URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO PASS HR 2722 THE CENTRAL AMERICAN AND HAITIANS ADJUSTMENT ACT OF 1999.

WHEREAS, There are over 260,000 Salvadoran and Guatemalan immigrants (known as "the ABC class") and their families, 18,000 Haitians and 80,000 Hondurans in the United States who fled their countries because of civil war, violence and natural disaster; and

WHEREAS, These immigrants have made their home in the U.S., have U.S.-born children who are citizens, work, run businesses, and contribute to U.S. society; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Bay Area is home to over 50,000 ABC class members. Haitians and Hondurans, and the City of San Francisco is a self-proclaimed sanctuary for immigrants with a long history of responsiveness to newcomers from other parts of the world: and

WHEREAS, After years of court rulings and Immigration and Naturalization Service temporary provisions, these residents of our nation face an uncertain future with regard to their ability to remain in their adopted country; and

WHEREAS, In 1997, the U.S. Congress approved the Nicaraguan Adjustment and Central American Relief Act ("NACARA") providing immigrants from Nicaragua and Cuba who arrived in the United States on or before December 1, 1995 with the status of Permanent Residency; and

WHEREAS, Under NACARA, immigrants from El Salvador and Guatemala, known as "the ABC class," must show hardship in order to stave off deportation on a case-by-case basis: and

WHEREAS, NACARA only provided Honduran immigrants with a temporary protection status and did not provide any benefits to Haitian immigrants; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco declared itself a City of Refuge where federal INS agents will not receive any cooperation from City authorities or representatives whenever they are carrying out actions of detention and arrests against tax-paying immigrant residents who might be undocumented; and

WHEREAS, In May of 1998, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors reaffirmed by ordinance its policy of being a safety zone for immigrants; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors has consistently taken positions in defense of immigrant rights and has passed over 30 resolutions in support of immigrant rights since 1989; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby urges the United States Congress to approve HR 2722, the Central American and Haitians Adjustment Act of 1999 (Rep. Smith, NJ), which will treat all the above-named immigrants who came to the U.S. on or before December 1, 1995 with fairness, justice and equity by allowing them the opportunity to apply for permanent residency.
