# Behested Payment Waiver: Shelter and Homeless Services

**Government Audit and Oversight Committee | October 11, 2024**



# Proposed Legislation Details

- Authorize the **Office of the Mayor and Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing** to solicit donations from various private entities and organizations to support **the expansion of temporary shelter and other homeless services**.
  - Current Behested Payment Waiver was approved by the Board of Supervisors on March 26, 2024, through Resolution No. 125-24 and will expire on October 17, 2024.
- In the past, HSH and the Office of the Mayor have established successful and innovative **public-private partnerships** to meet **critical needs of people experiencing homelessness**.
- The **Mayor's Fund for the Homeless** is a category eight fund established to receive donations for homeless services, with existing reporting to Homeless Oversight Commission and Annual Reporting to the Board of Supervisors.

# Shelter Crisis

- According to the 2024 Point-in-Time Count, there were **~8,323** people experiencing homelessness, **52%** of whom were unsheltered.
  - 2024 PIT count found **13% fewer people sleeping on the streets or in tents** than in 2022, the lowest it has been in ten years.
- As of October 2024, HSH had **3,610** temporary shelter or crisis intervention slots, with a **92% occupancy rate**.
- Home by the Bay: A Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness in San Francisco, calls for an investment of resources including **1,075 new shelter beds** to meet the Plan's goals, including a **50% reduction of unsheltered homelessness** in 5 years.

Under the current waiver, HSH and the Mayor's Office are in **active conversations** with the following **philanthropies**:
