Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Police Department to regularly report certain crime victim data pertaining to victims of Hate Crimes and other specified crimes (Assault, Aggravated Assault, Sexual Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, Robbery, Battery, Vandalism, Domestic Violence, and Murder).

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Chapter 96A of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising Section 96A.1, revising the heading of Section 96A.3, adding new Section 96A.5, and renumbering existing Sections 96A.5, 96A.6, and 96A.7 as Sections 96A.6, 96A.7, and 96A.8 respectively, to read as follows:

SEC. 96A.1. DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this Chapter 96A:

“Aggravated Assault” means the crime defined in Section 220 of the California Penal Code.

“Assault” means the crime defined in Section 245 of the California Penal Code.

“Battery” means the crime defined in Section 242 of the California Penal Code.

1 "Burglary" means the crime defined in Section 459 of the California Penal Code.

2 "Detention" means an interaction between an Officer and an individual in which the
3 Officer detains the individual.

4 "Domestic Violence" means the crime defined in Section 273.5 of the California Penal Code.

5 "Encounter" means a Detention or Traffic Stop where the Officer initiates activity based
6 solely on the Officer's own observations or the observations and direction of another Officer,
7 rather than on information provided by dispatch or reported by a member of the public.

8 "Gender Identity" means an individual's actual or perceived gender identity, or gender-
9 related characteristics intrinsically related to an individual's gender or gender-identity,
10 regardless of the individual's assigned sex at birth.

11 "Hate crime" means a crime defined in Section 422.55 of the California Penal Code.

12 "Location" means the address city block where the Encounter or reported crime occurred,
13 or the closest address or intersection thereto.

14 "Motor Vehicle Theft" means the crime defined in Section 10851 of the California Penal Code.

15 "Murder" means the crime defined in Section 187 of the California Penal Code.

16 "Officer" means a peace officer as defined by Section 830 of the California Penal
17 Code, employed by the Police Department or Sheriff's Department.

18 "Personal Identifying Information" means any information that can, on its own or in
19 combination with other information, be used to contact, track, locate, identify, or reasonably infer the
20 identity of, a specific individual.

21 "Robbery" means the crime defined in Section 211 of the California Penal Code.

22 "Sexual Assault" means the crimes defined in Sections 261, 262, 264.1, 266c, 286, 287, 288,
23 288.1, 288.5, 288.7, and 289 of the California Penal Code.

24 "Theft" means the crime defined in Section 484 of the California Penal Code.

25 "Traffic Stop" means an interaction between an Officer and an individual driving a

1 vehicle, in which the Officer orders the individual to stop the vehicle.

2 "Use of Force" means (a) for purposes of the Police Department, an Officer's use of
3 force on an individual that is required to be reported by department policy, and (b) for
4 purposes of the Sheriff's Department, an Officer's use of force on an individual that results in a
5 known injury.

6 "Vandalism" means the crime defined in Section 594 of the California Penal Code.

8 **SEC. 96A.3. QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND REPORTING OF OFFICER ACTIVITY.**

12 **SEC. 96A.5. QUARTERLY CRIME VICTIM DATA REPORTING.**

13
14 On a quarterly basis (the first Tuesday in February, May, August, and November), the Police
15 Department shall transmit a written report to the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and the Police
16 Commission, and post that report on the Police Department website, covering the previous quarter
17 (quarters commencing January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1). The report shall include de-
18 identified, aggregate data covering the previous quarter and de-identified, aggregate data for the year
19 to date. The report shall contain the following information:

20 (a) For each reported Assault, Aggravated Assault, Sexual Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor
21 Vehicle Theft, Robbery, Battery, Vandalism, Domestic Violence incident, and Murder:

22 (1) The Location of the crime or crimes;

23 (2) The reported crime or crimes;

24 (3) The race or ethnicity of each victim;

25 (4) The sex and perceived Gender Identity of each victim; and

1 (5) The age of each victim.

2 (b) For each Hate Crime reported, if the information has been or will be reported to the
3 California Department of Justice under Penal Code Section 13023:

4 (1) The Location of the crime or crimes;

5 (2) The reported crime or crimes;

6 (3) The disability, if any, of each victim;

7 (4) The gender or Gender Identity of each victim;

8 (5) The nationality of each victim;

9 (6) The race or ethnicity of each victim;

10 (7) The religion of each victim;

11 (8) The sexual orientation of each victim; and

12 (9) Association of the victim with a person or group with one or more of the actual or
13 perceived characteristics listed above in subsections (b)(1)-(8).

14 (c) The report shall include the information listed in subsections (a) and (b) grouped by police
15 district, and also city-wide.

16 (d) The report shall not include Personal Identifying Information.

17 (e) The reporting obligations under this Section 96A.5 are in addition to, and do not supplant,
18 the reporting obligations to the Attorney General under Penal Code Section 13023.

19 (f) This Section 96A.5 shall not be interpreted to require the Police Department to collect data
20 but instead requires only that the Police Department report available data.

9 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
10 enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
11 ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
12 of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

13 Section 3. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors
14 intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles,
15 numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal
16 Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment
17 additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under
18 the official title of the ordinance.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Crime Victim Data Reporting]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Police Department to regularly report certain crime victim data pertaining to victims of Hate Crimes and other specified crimes (Assault, Aggravated Assault, Sexual Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, Robbery, Battery, Vandalism, Domestic Violence, and Murder).

Existing Law

Administrative Code Chapter 96A requires the Police and Sheriff's Department to collect data regarding officers' encounters with citizens, and to report quarterly data regarding officers' encounters, arrests, and use of force.

Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would amend Administrative Code Chapter 96A to require the Police Department to report quarterly crime victim data for each reported Assault, Aggravated Assault, Sexual Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, Robbery, Battery, Vandalism, Domestic Violence incident, Murder, and Hate Crime.

Dear Mayor Breed and President Yee,

On behalf of the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) of San Francisco, the Peninsula, Marin, Sonoma, Alameda and Contra Costa counties, we are writing to ask for your support for Supervisor Gordon Mar's proposed legislation to require disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data.

JCRC advocates, often in coalition with other communities, for a just society and for security for all. We envision a vibrant Jewish community empowered to express its shared values in the public arena. JCRC serves as an umbrella organization for more than 50 synagogues, and Jewish organizations from throughout the Bay Area.

One of the JCRC's core values is *B'Tselem Elohim* – the belief that all people are created in God's image and accordingly each person's life is of infinite value. This principle leads the JCRC to maintain that it is critical for equal opportunity and equal protection to exist under the law for every individual. Therefore, we think it is important to provide law enforcement and policy makers with clarity and transparency. As a community that is frequently impacted by hate crimes, we support Supervisor Mar's legislation because of the additional data and transparency it creates for tracking and addressing hate crimes.

Lastly, given the increase in hate crimes both locally and throughout the United States, we strongly believe that providing better access to information and data will ensure that agencies, legislators and policy analysts will be better able to recognize, understand and potentially prevent these crimes. Reliance on data, as opposed to reacting to individual crime, will also ensure that law enforcement agencies can better coordinate to combat existing crime patterns and trends, particularly as it relates to communities impacted by hate crimes.



Dear Mayor Breed and President Yee,

Alice believes that law enforcement agencies should improve the collection, maintenance, and disclosure of accurate demographic data, including for gender, race, and sexual orientation. For this reason, we are pleased to support Supervisor Gordon Mar's legislation requiring the disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data. Particularly with hate crimes having increased by 58 percent last year, we feel that now is the right time to increase the scrutiny of who is being targeted and where we as a city need to prioritize resources.

The Crime Victim Data Disclosure Ordinance would make the maintenance and disclosure of crime victim data more routine and systematic. The ordinance will help agencies, policymakers, and the broader community focus resources based on data and facts. The improved accessibility of this data could also help organizations that support LGBTQ individuals and families, communities of color, children and youth, and survivors of domestic violence better apply for grants and funding to address what the data show.

We believe this legislation, by making the release of the data routine, could minimize the likelihood that high-profile and sensationalized incidents unduly influence policy or enforcement efforts in a way that harms public safety and community relations. The availability of this data can place high-profile incidents within a broader context and more readily equip agencies, policymakers, and the broader community with the information they need to most effectively respond. Given Supervisor Mar's approach, we believe it would accomplish these goals without unnecessarily inflaming tensions or infringing on the privacy of crime victims.


We strongly encourage you to work together to enact this legislation to better serve our vulnerable communities, including our own.


Dear Mayor Breed and President Yee,



Dear President Norman Yee and Mayor Breed,

The DTNA Board supports Supervisor Gordon Mar's proposed legislation to require disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data.

Over the past several years the DTNA and other neighborhood and public interest organizations have been frustrated by the unwillingness of the San Francisco Police Department to release aggregate data and long-term crime trends, especially in the area of clearance rates. We believe that San Francisco, like other cities, should publish yearly data showing ten-year trends in numbers of crimes citywide and broken down by neighborhood, including trends regarding what percentage of crimes are being solved, and why others are not. It is impossible for taxpayers to know whether the money they spend on public safety is being well spent without this information.

In addition, the DTNA Board finds it unacceptable that reasonable requests for data from sitting supervisors are rejected by the SFPD. That has been the experience of our last two supervisors, Scott Wiener and Rafael Mandelman. It is not possible for the legislative branch to do its job if it cannot access data that allows it to evaluate city departments.

We believe that Supervisor Mar's request for data was entirely reasonable – if a particular group of people are being targeted based on race, gender identity, or sexual orientation in our city, then that needs to be known. Legislators could then work with SFPD and the Mayor's office to craft a policy response. It is disappointing to us that it requires legislation for the SFPD to provide necessary information, but since that appears to be the case, we support the legislation.

We also hope that supervisors will work together in the next several months to craft broader legislation that would define specific benchmark data that the SFPD is required to provide, including statistics broken down by neighborhood, and clearance rates, noting how many were cleared because the perpetrator was prosecuted and convicted, how many because the District Attorney declined to prosecute, and how many because the victim declined to file charges, as well as the status of cases that have not been cleared. We further hope that Mayor Breed will sign such legislation and see that it is promptly implemented.



VVAA support for Supervisor Gordon Mar's legislation to require disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data

Dear Supervisor,

In light of the recent and increasingly brutal crimes against our elderly Asian citizens, the Visitacion Valley Asian Alliance is writing to support much-needed aggregated victim demographic data transparency legislation from Supervisor Gordon Mar's office.

In the 1980's when I moved to Visitacion Valley, many crimes were targeted at the largely non-limited English speaking immigrants. However, victims were unable to make police reports because of language barriers, lack of access for them and LACK OF police data.

As their ESL instructor and multilingual neighbor, I organized monthly police meetings, initiated bilingual surveys, provided victims with translations in courts and police matters etc., I even offered, for free, to then Captain Bruce the use of my Leland Ave property to enable residents direct opportunities to communicate with law enforcement.

While the ethnic media has reported many of the crimes, the English media has only recently starting to write about the serious cases. In my 30 years of volunteer community work, I grieve for the many victims who suffered greatly because they did not get the services and resources they deserve.

Supervisor Mar's aggregated victim demographic data transparency legislation will provide annual disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data (race, age, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, religion) for crimes that are committed. This aggregated data will help guide budget and resource priorities, police staffing, and crime prevention programs to keep our communities safe.

We fully support Gordon Mar's legislation because the much needed data will make San Francisco a safer City for all.

Stop Crime SF fully supports Supervisor Gordon Mar's calling on the San Francisco Police Department to release the last 10 years of aggregated victim demographic data and legislation to require annual disclosure of aggregated victim demographic data going forward. This legislation will indicate whether certain communities or demographic groups are disproportionately victims of specific types of crimes and is critical to developing more effective crime prevention strategies, determining appropriate police staffing, identifying budget and resource priorities for public safety programs, and ensuring that all communities are safe.

Stop Crime SF is a grassroots group with more than 800 members. We are San Francisco residents with the mission to work together to reduce and prevent crime in our neighborhoods.

Nationally, hate crimes increased for three consecutive years since 2015 and hate-motivated crimes in San Francisco have surged in the past few years increasing by 61 percent from 2017 to 2018. Since hate crimes require intent to be proven, without an obvious statement of hate against a certain community, many hate crimes go undocumented.

This disturbing trend of increasing hate crimes against ethnic and religious minorities and the LGBT community cannot be tolerated.

Please support Supervisor Mar's call to release demographic crime data so we can better address hate crimes and other offenses.


