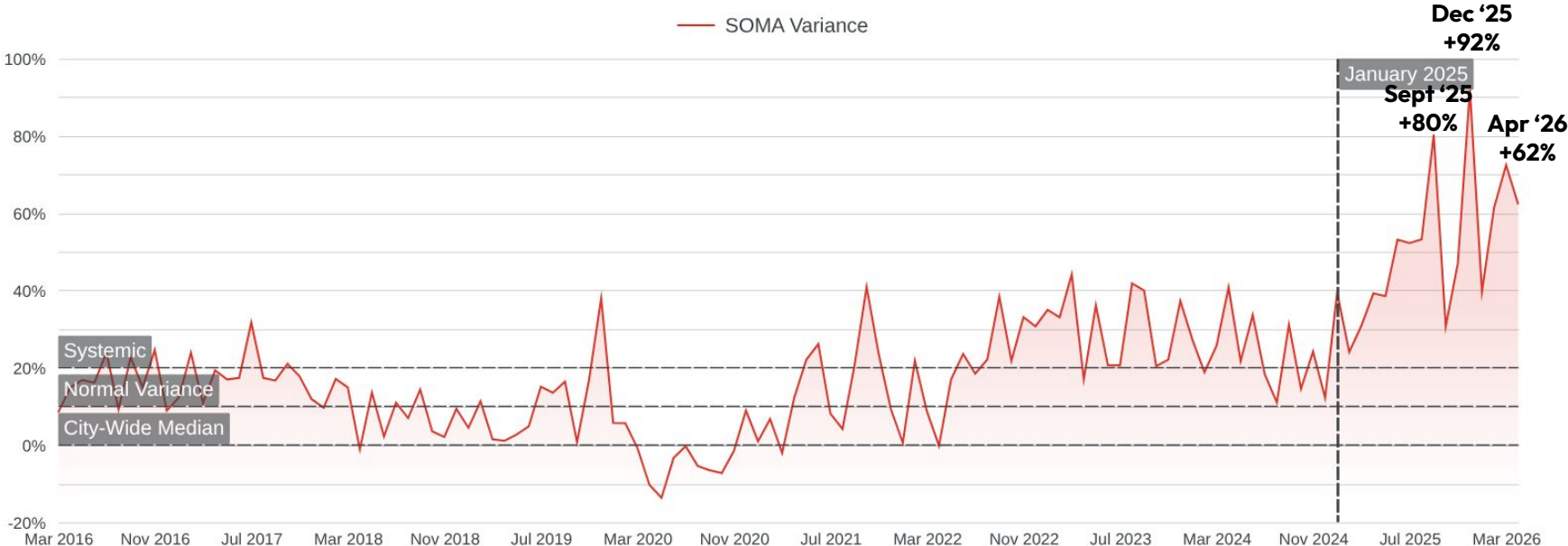

- Over the last 12 months, Southern residents waited 45% longer for Priority B responses compared to the city-wide median.
- In Southern, the most common Priority B call is "Fight No Weapon"—active, volatile conflicts.
- The city intentionally concentrates the city's most acute-needs populations into Southern and Tenderloin, creating a containment zone where baseline safety is compromised.

A Decade of Deliberate Abandonment

Prio B: City-Wide Baseline Median Response vs. SOMA (% delay)



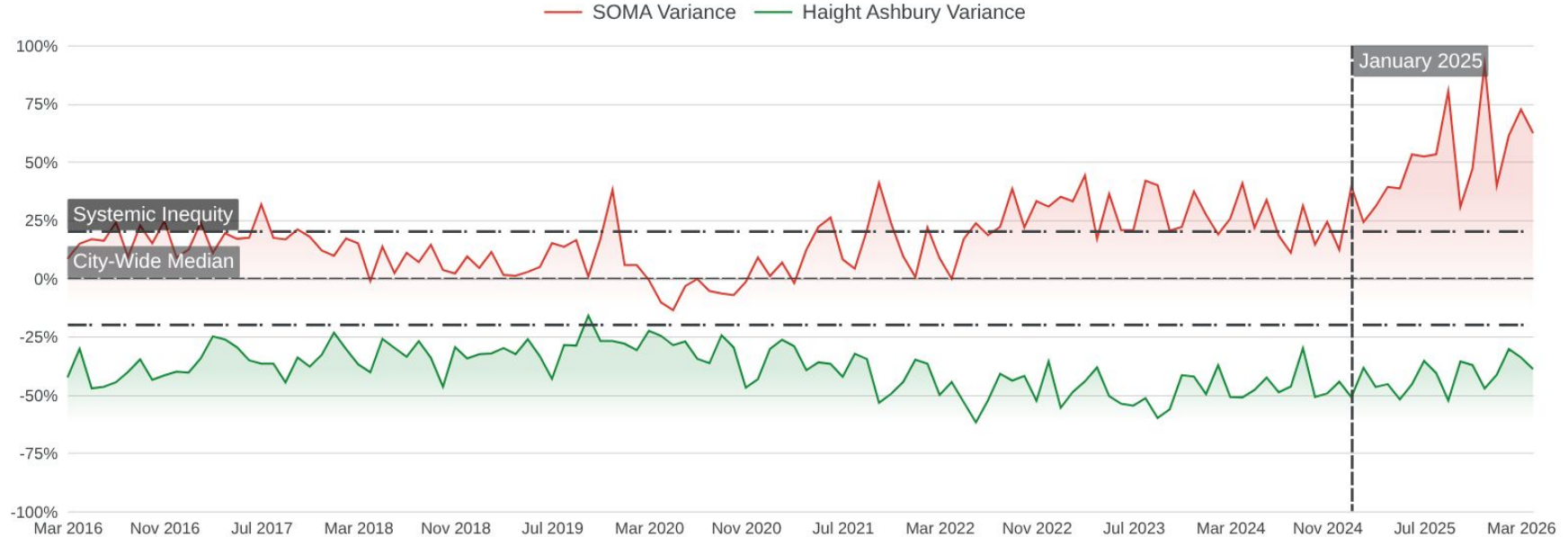
Historically, SOMA experienced Priority B response times at parity with the city-wide median.

The massive divergence since 2022 suggest our safety was deprioritized when staffing was stretched.

Wait times spiked dramatically and have been deeply inequitable for 18 months.

Inside vs. Outside the Containment Zone

Prio B: City-Wide Baseline Median Response vs. SOMA (% delay)



Meanwhile, fully staffed neighborhoods like Haight Ashbury, in Park District, just outside the city's Containment Zone, enjoyed a decade of systemically faster response times.

May 1 - May 25: The "Fix" Failed

Minor Additions Haven't Moved The Needle

SOMA: Still 43% Slower



- SFPD recently added 8 officers to Southern Station, in response to our civil rights complaint and to address these glaring inequities.
- Even with these additions, SOMA Priority B response times remained **43% longer** than the citywide median.
- The baseline deficit is so severe that minor staffing adjustments do not resolve the disparity.

The boundary expansion guarantees that the one of the city's most unprotected neighborhoods will become even more dangerous.

- The planned October boundary expansion will trigger a 23 percent spike in calls for service.
- Adding 5 to 10 officers to the current roster of 86 is only a 6 to 12 percent staffing increase.
- Southern and Tenderloin Stations are already the most under-resourced districts in San Francisco.
- This is a matter of policy, by design.
