[Calling for Full-Service Grocery Store in the Tenderloin]

Resolution calling for a full-service grocery store in the Tenderloin and urging the Human Services Agency, Office of Economic and Workforce Development, and Planning Department to provide report on all efforts to bring a full service grocery store to the Tenderloin, all potential sites for a grocery store in the Tenderloin, and any current efforts or plans for a grocery store to the Tenderloin.

WHEREAS, The Tenderloin has lacked a full-service grocery store for decades; and WHEREAS, The vast majority of individuals living in the Tenderloin do not have access to a car, making it harder for them to have a variety of shopping choices; and

WHEREAS, Several grocery stores outside the Tenderloin are accessible by public transit for Tenderloin residents, but navigating public transit with groceries can be difficult, inconvenient, and for some impossible, with particular challenges for seniors and persons with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Healthy Retail SF was created through grassroots activism by the South East Food Access in the Bayview and The Tenderloin Healthy Corner Store Coalition, and led by the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD) in conjunction with the Department of Public Health, to provide healthy and affordable food access to food, and has successfully partnered with eight stores in the Tenderloin to date, but is not a replacement for a full-scale grocery store; and

WHEREAS, The Tenderloin community also relies on the Heart of the City Farmers' Market for certain types of fresh produce, but the Heart of the City Farmers' Market is only open for limited hours for two days a week; and

WHEREAS, In developing any plans for a full-scale grocery store in the Tenderloin, it is essential to consult with vulnerable communities, including communities of color, people with disabilities, and seniors, all of whom are disproportionately impacted by food insecurity; and

WHEREAS, It is important to consult with owners of corner stores and Healthy Retail SF stores in developing any plans for a full-scale grocery store in the Tenderloin so that any grocery store complements and does not harm local small businesses; and

WHEREAS, In 2013, The Tenderloin Hunger Task Force released a report entitled "Food Security and Services in San Francisco's Tenderloin" noting as a barrier to food security that "The neighborhood does not have a full grocery store;" and

WHEREAS, In 2017, the Tenderloin People's Congress engaged over 1,200 community members in a conversation envisioning the neighborhood's future, which resulted in the Vision 2020 Plan, published in 2021, that included the need for a large, full-scale grocery store; and

WHEREAS, In October 2023, Tenderloin residents and food justice leaders formed the Tenderloin Food Policy Council, and through a community process elevated the need for a large full-scale grocery store in the neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, Food insecurity has increased with budget cuts to the SF-Marin Food Bank, elimination of CalFresh supplemental payments, and rising food costs; and

WHEREAS, Multiple attempts over many decades to attract a private, for-profit grocery store in the Tenderloin have been unsuccessful; and

WHEREAS, There are many models of grocery stores in addition to major grocery chains, including co-ops, family-owned grocery stores, and municipally-owned grocery stores; and

WHEREAS, Chicago recently announced that it is considering opening a municipallyowned grocery store which would make it the first large U.S. city to do so, while smaller cities

like St. Paul, KS and Baldwin, FL have opened successful municipally-owned grocery stores; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors considers attracting a full-service grocery store to the Tenderloin to be an urgent priority, as articulated in neighborhood planning efforts for over a decade; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges City departments, including the San Francisco Human Services Agency (HSA), Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), and Planning Department, to work collaboratively with all stakeholders to bring a full-service grocery store to the Tenderloin; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the San Francisco Human Services Agency (HSA), Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), and Planning Department to provide a report to the Board of Supervisors within 60 days describing: (a) all efforts in the past five years to bring a full service grocery store to the Tenderloin, (b) all potential sites for a grocery store in the Tenderloin, and (c) any current efforts or plans for a grocery store to the Tenderloin.
