Priority for Veterans with an Affordable Housing Preference under Administrative Code, Chapter 47 – Disparate Impact Analysis (File 211094)

February 28, 2022

Analysis Prepared by Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development


Per File 211094, by no later than February 28, 2022, MOHCD shall complete an analysis of the disparate impact and any discriminatory effect under fair housing laws of granting a priority for Veterans eligible for a preference under Administrative Code Section 47.3 to occupy affordable housing over other applicants with the same preference ("Veterans Priority"), and shall deliver such disparate impact analysis to the Board of Supervisors for review and study of an amendment to Administrative Code Chapter 47 to add the Veterans Priority.

A disparate impact analysis determines the likelihood of a policy or program having a disproportionately adverse effect on members of a protected class. MOHCD's disparate impact analysis looked at whether any racial or ethnic group of veterans would disproportionately impact another racial or ethnic group of applicants under the proposed change to San Francisco's housing lottery regime. Veterans are defined as those who have served on active duty in the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, or the Coast Guard, or who served in the U.S. Merchant Marine during World War II. Veterans does not include those who are still actively serving in the military.

The analysis did not include Veteran sub-populations, such as disabled Veterans or current National Guard and Reservists because data is not available at the level needed for the analysis, or is not available at all.

MOHCD conducted this analysis based on the proposal that a Veteran preference would be prioritized in each the three existing lottery preference programs (Certificate of Preference; Displaced Tenant Housing Preference Program; Neighborhood Resident Housing Preference).

Based on San Francisco County veterans' population data from the 2019 US Census and the 2019 American Community Survey, MOHCD's analysis shows that the proposal would produce a disparate impact in all but two Supervisorial Districts. Only in Districts 6 and 7 would there be no disparate impact of the proposed change to the lottery preferences.



Veteran Demographic Snapshot

Race/Ethnicity: In San Francisco, 58% (13,633) of Veterans are white, compared to the total SF population, which is 46% white. And 16% (3,800) of Veterans are Black, whereas 5% of the SF population is black.





Geographic Distribution of Veterans by Race/Ethnicity: The Veteran population by race, by Supervisorial District is notably uneven. Veterans by race are concentrated in different Districts. In D10, 33% of the Veterans in that District are Black; in D2, 3% of Veterans are Black.




Veterans Income Eligibility for Affordable Units: The comparison of the percentage of available affordable units by AMI that were offered last fiscal year and the AMI of households that include at least one Veteran illustrates a mismatch between available affordable units (79% are units were for those at 31-60% AMI) and Veterans' income (only 14% of Veterans are in that AMI bracket). By AMI brackets, households with Veterans are either extremely low-income or higher income.

Veteran Household Incomes by Race: Among five racial/ethnic Veteran populations (Asian Pacific Islander, Black, Hispanic/Latino, White, and Other/Multiracial), a disproportionate number of Black Veterans are at 30% AMI and lower. Given the small population of Black San Franciscans, this is approximately 1,500 people. Only 2% of available affordable units were reserved for this AMI.

Among the other racial and ethnic Veteran populations, 42% of Asian Pacific Islander households with a Veteran are above 100% AMI, 52% of Hispanic/Latino households with a Veteran are above 100% AMI, 52% of White households with a Veteran are above 100% AMI, 51% Other/Multiracial households with a Veteran are above 100% AMI.



Conclusion: The disparate impact analysis does produce a finding that a lottery preference for Veterans would have a disproportionately negative impact on certain populations in all but two Supervisorial Districts. A closer look at the Veteran population also highlights that overall, households with Veterans are at higher income levels not eligible for affordable units. The notable exception is extremely low-income Black Veterans (approximately 1,500 people). Given the limited supply of affordable units at this AMI, a lottery preference may not be the most impactful tool for supporting this population. Alternative policies and programs, either new or building on existing efforts, that directly serve this population and that focus on their particular needs, could be a more fruitful avenue. Existing programs and services that can benefit Veterans include the following.

- For those with disabilities, MOHCD has a variety of programs: https://sfmohcd.org/resources-people-disabilities
- Veterans within the income thresholds also are eligible for <u>neighborhood preference</u>, and when applicable, <u>certificate of preference</u> programs in the affordable housing lottery.
- For those who may need mental health supports, the Coop Living for Mental Health
 Program is available. All program participants are referred by DPH to sponsors. The scale
 of this program is currently small and placement is not via the MOHCD preference
 regime.
- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and VA Supportive Housing Program (HUD-VASH) provides housing vouchers to help Veterans who are homeless find and sustain permanent housing. For example, through this program, the Mission Housing Development Corporation operates 33 units at 2524 Mission Street for formerly homeless Veterans.

What's New

Gift Limit Increase

The gift limit increased to \$520 for calendar years 2021 and 2022. The gift limit in 2020 was \$500.

Who must file:

- Elected and appointed officials and candidates listed in Government Code Section 87200
- Employees, appointed officials, and consultants filing pursuant to a conflict of interest code ("code filers").
 Obtain your disclosure categories, which describe the interests you must report, from your agency; they are not part of the Form 700
- Candidates running for local elective offices that are designated in a conflict of interest code (e.g., county sheriffs, city clerks, school board trustees, and water board members)

Exception:

- Candidates for a county central committee are not required to file the Form 700.
- Members of newly created boards and commissions not yet covered under a conflict of interest code
- Employees in newly created positions of existing agencies

statements must have an original "wet" signature or be duly authorized by your filing officer to file electronically under Government Code Section 87500.2.

- State Board and State Commission Members listed in Government Code Section 87200

⇒ April 1, 2021

- Most other filers

Individuals filing under conflict of interest codes in city and county jurisdictions should verify the annual filing date with their local filing officers.

Statements postmarked by the filing deadline are considered filed on time.

Statements of 30 pages or less may be emailed or faxed by the deadline as long as the originally signed paper version is sent by first class mail to the filing official within 24 hours.

Assuming Office and Leaving Office Statements

Most filers file within 30 days of assuming or leaving office or within 30 days of the effective date of a newly adopted or amended conflict of interest code.

Exception:

If you assumed office between October 1, 2020, and December 31, 2020, and filed an assuming office statement, you are not required to file an annual statement until March 1, 2022, or April 1, 2022, whichever is applicable. The annual statement will cover the day after you assumed office through December 31, 2021. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 6, for additional exceptions.

Candidate Statements

File no later than the final filing date for the declaration of candidacy or nomination documents. A candidate statement is not required if you filed an assuming office or annual statement for the same jurisdiction within 60 days before filing a declaration of candidacy or other nomination documents.

Late Statements

There is no provision for filing deadline extensions unless the filer is serving in active military duty. (See page 19 for information on penalties and fines.)

Amendments

Statements may be amended at any time. You are only required to amend the schedule that needs to be revised. It is not necessary to amend the entire filed form. Obtain amendment schedules at www.fppc.ca.gov.

Types of Statements

Assuming Office Statement:

If you are a newly appointed official or are newly employed in a position designated, or that will be designated, in a state or local agency's conflict of interest code, your assuming office date is the date you were sworn in or otherwise authorized to serve in the position. If you are a newly elected official, your assuming office date is the date you were sworn in.

 Report: Investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you assumed the office or position must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you assumed the office or position.

For positions subject to confirmation by the State Senate or the Commission on Judicial Appointments, your assuming office date is the date you were appointed or nominated to the position.

Example: Maria Lopez was nominated by the Governor
to serve on a state agency board that is subject to state
Senate confirmation. The assuming office date is the
date Maria's nomination is submitted to the Senate.
Maria must report investments, interests in real
property, and business positions she holds on that date,
and income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments)
received during the 12 months prior to that date.

If your office or position has been added to a newly adopted or newly amended conflict of interest code, use the effective date of the code or amendment, whichever is applicable.

 Report: Investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the effective date of the code or amendment must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the effective date of the code or amendment.

Annual Statement:

Generally, the period covered is January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020. If the period covered by the statement is different than January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020, (for example, you assumed office between October 1, 2019, and December 31, 2019 or you are combining statements), you must specify the period covered.

Investments, interests in real property, business
positions held, and income (including loans, gifts, and
travel payments) received during the period covered
by the statement must be reported. Do not change the
preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B unless
you are required to report the acquisition or disposition
of an interest that did not occur in 2020.

 If your disclosure category changes during a reporting period, disclose under the old category until the effective date of the conflict of interest code amendment and disclose under the new disclosure category through the end of the reporting period.

Leaving Office Statement:

Generally, the period covered is January 1, 2020, through the date you stopped performing the duties of your position. If the period covered differs from January 1, 2020, through the date you stopped performing the duties of your position (for example, you assumed office between October 1, 2019, and December 31, 2019, or you are combining statements), the period covered must be specified. The reporting period can cover parts of two calendar years.

 Report: Investments, interests in real property, business positions held, and income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the period covered by the statement. Do not change the preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B unless you are required to report the acquisition or disposition of an interest that did not occur in 2020.

Candidate Statement:

If you are filing a statement in connection with your candidacy for state or local office, investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date of filing your declaration of candidacy must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months <u>prior to</u> the date of filing your declaration of candidacy is reportable. Do not change the preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B.

Candidates running for local elective offices (e.g., county sheriffs, city clerks, school board trustees, or water district board members) must file candidate statements, as required by the conflict of interest code for the elected position. The code may be obtained from the agency of the elected position.

Amendments:

If you discover errors or omissions on any statement, file an amendment as soon as possible. You are only required to amend the schedule that needs to be revised; it is not necessary to refile the entire form. Obtain amendment schedules from the FPPC website at www.fppc.ca.gov.

Note: Once you file your statement, you may not withdraw it. All changes must be noted on amendment schedules.

- · Sole proprietorships
- Your own business or your spouse's or registered domestic partner's business (See Reference Pamphlet, page 8, for the definition of "business entity.")

- Partnerships (e.g., a law firm or family farm)
- Investments in reportable business entities held in a retirement account (See Reference Pamphlet, page 15.)

Real property is also considered to be "within the jurisdiction" of a local government agency if the property or any part of it is located within two miles outside the boundaries of the jurisdiction or within two miles of any land owned or used by the local government agency. Interests in real property include:

- Your spouse's or registered domestic partner's interests in real property that are legally held separately by him or her

You are <u>not</u> required to report:

- A residence, such as a home or vacation cabin, used exclusively as a personal residence (However, a residence in which you rent out a room or for which you claim a business deduction may be reportable. If reportable, report the fair market value of the portion claimed as a tax deduction.)
- Some interests in real property held through a blind trust (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16.)
 - Please note: A non-reportable property can still be grounds for a conflict of interest and may be disqualifying.

To Complete Schedule B:

- Report the precise location (e.g., an assessor's parcel number or address) of the real property.
- Check the box indicating the fair market value of your interest in the property (regardless of what you owe on the property).
- Enter the date acquired or disposed only if you initially acquired or entirely disposed of your interest in the property during the reporting period.
- · Identify the nature of your interest. If it is a leasehold,

- If you received rental income, check the box indicating the gross amount you received.

If you received a total of \$10,000 or more from two or more tenants acting in concert (in most cases, this will apply to married couples), disclose the name of each tenant. Otherwise, mark "None."
- Loans from a private lender that total \$500 or more and are secured by real property may be reportable. Loans from commercial lending institutions made in the lender's regular course of business on terms available to members of the public without regard to your official status are not reportable.

When reporting a loan:

- Provide the name and address of the lender.
- Describe the lender's business activity.
- Disclose the interest rate and term of the loan. For variable interest rate loans, disclose the conditions of the loan (e.g., Prime + 2) or the average interest rate paid during the reporting period. The term of a loan is the total number of months or years given for repayment of the loan atother time the loan was established.
- Check the box indicating the highest balance of the loan during the reporting period.

Identify a guarantor, if applicable.

If you have more than one reportable loan on a single piece of real property, report the additional loan(s) on Schedule C.

Example:

Allison Gande is a city planning commissioner. During the reporting period, she received rental income of \$12,000, from a single tenant who rented property she owned in the city's jurisdiction. If Allison received \$6,000 each from two tenants, the tenants' names would not be required because no single tenant paid her \$10,000 or more. A married couple is considered a single tenant.

Reporting Income:

- Income from investment interests, such as partnerships, reported on Schedule A-1
- Commission income not required to be reported on Schedule A-2 (See Reference Pamphlet, page 8.)
- Gross income from any sale, including the sale of a house or car (Report your pro rata share of the total sale price.)
- · Rental income not required to be reported on Schedule B
- Prizes or awards not disclosed as gifts
- Payments received on loans you made to others
- An honorarium received prior to becoming a public official (See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)
- Incentive compensation (See Reference Pamphlet, page 12.)

Reminders

- Code filers your disclosure categories may not require disclosure of all sources of income.
- If you or your spouse or registered domestic partner are self-employed, report the business entity on Schedule A-2.
- Do not disclose on Schedule C income, loans, or business positions already reported on Schedules A-2 or B.

You are not required to report:

Instructions – Schedule D Income – Gifts

A gift is anything of value for which you have not provided equal or greater consideration to the donor. A gift is reportable if its fair market value is \$50 or more. In addition, multiple gifts totaling \$50 or more received during the reporting period from a single source must be reported.

It is the acceptance of a gift, not the ultimate use to which it is put, that imposes your reporting obligation. Except as noted below, you must report a gift even if you never used it or if you gave it away to another person.

If the exact amount of a gift is unknown, you must make a good faith estimate of the item's fair market value. Listing the value of a gift as "over \$50" or "value unknown" is not adequate disclosure. In addition, if you received a gift through an intermediary, you must disclose the name, address, and business activity of both the donor and the intermediary. You may indicate an intermediary either in the "source" field after the name or in the "comments" section at the bottom of Schedule D.

Commonly reportable gifts include:

- Tickets/passes to sporting or entertainment events
- · Tickets/passes to amusement parks
- Parking passes not used for official agency business
- Food, beverages, and accommodations, including those provided in direct connection with your attendance at a convention, conference, meeting, social event, meal, or like gathering
- Rebates/discounts not made in the regular course of business to members of the public without regard to official status
- Wedding gifts (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16)
- An honorarium received prior to assuming office (You may report an honorarium as income on Schedule C, rather than as a gift on Schedule D, if you provided services of equal or greater value than the payment received. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)
- Transportation and lodging (See Schedule E.)
- · Forgiveness of a loan received by you

Reminders

- Gifts from a single source are subject to a \$500 limit in 2020. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)
- Code filers you only need to report gifts from reportable sources.

Gift Tracking Mobile Application

 FPPC has created a gift tracking app for mobile devices that helps filers track gifts and provides a quick and easy way to upload the information to the Form 700. Visit FPPC's website to download the app.

You are not required to disclose:

- Gifts that were not used and that, within 30 days after receipt, were returned to the donor or delivered to a charitable organization or government agency without being claimed by you as a charitable contribution for tax purposes
- Gifts from your spouse or registered domestic partner, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, and certain other family members (See Regulation 18942 for a complete list.). The exception does not apply if the donor was acting as an agent or intermediary for a reportable source who was the true donor.
- Gifts of similar value exchanged between you and an individual, other than a lobbyist registered to lobby your state agency, on holidays, birthdays, or similar occasions
- Gifts of informational material provided to assist you in the performance of your official duties (e.g., books, pamphlets, reports, calendars, periodicals, or educational seminars)
- A monetary bequest or inheritance (However, inherited investments or real property may be reportable on other schedules.)
- Personalized plaques or trophies with an individual value of less than \$250
- Campaign contributions
- Up to two tickets, for your own use, to attend a fundraiser for a campaign committee or candidate, or to a fundraiser for an organization exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The ticket must be received from the organization or committee holding the fundraiser.
- Gifts given to members of your immediate family if the source has an established relationship with the family member and there is no evidence to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you. (See Regulation 18943.)
- Free admission, food, and nominal items (such as a pen, pencil, mouse pad, note pad or similar item) available to all attendees, at the event at which the official makes a speech (as defined in Regulation 18950(b)(2)), so long as the admission is provided by the person who organizes the event.
- Any other payment not identified above, that would otherwise meet the definition of gift, where the payment is made by an individual who is not a lobbyist registered to lobby the official's state agency, where it is clear that the gift was made because of an existing personal or business relationship unrelated to the official's position and there is no evidence whatsoever at the time the gift is made to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you.

To Complete Schedule D:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym), address, and, if a business entity, the business activity of the source.
- Provide the date (month, day, and year) of receipt, and disclose the fair market value and description of the gift.

Instructions - Schedule E Travel Payments, Advances, and Reimbursements

Travel payments reportable on Schedule E include advances and reimbursements for travel and related expenses, including lodging and meals.

Gifts of travel may be subject to the gift limit. In addition, certain travel payments are reportable gifts, but are not subject to the gift limit. To avoid possible misinterpretation or the perception that you have received a gift in excess of the gift limit, you may wish to provide a specific description of the purpose of your travel. (See the FPPC fact sheet entitled "Limitations and Restrictions on Gifts, Honoraria, Travel, and Loans" to read about travel payments under section 89506(a).)

You are not required to disclose:

- · Travel payments received from any state, local, or federal government agency for which you provided services equal or greater in value than the payments received, such as reimbursement for travel on agency business from your government agency employer.
- A payment for travel from another local, state, or federal government agency and related per diem expenses when the travel is for education, training or other inter-agency programs or purposes.
- Travel payments received from your employer in the normal course of your employment that are included in the income reported on Schedule C.
- A travel payment that was received from a nonprofit entity exempt from taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) for which you provided equal or greater consideration, such as reimbursement for travel on business for a 501(c)(3) organization for which you are a board member.

Note: Certain travel payments may not be reportable if reported via email on Form 801 by your agency.

To Complete Schedule E:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym) and address of the source of the travel payment.
- Identify the business activity if the source is a business
- Check the box to identify the payment as a gift or income, report the amount, and disclose the date(s).
 - Travel payments are gifts if you did not provide services that were equal to or greater in value than the payments received. You must disclose gifts totaling \$50 or more from a single source during the period covered by the statement.

When reporting travel payments that are gifts, you must provide a description of the gift, the date(s) received, and the travel destination.

Travel payments are income if you provided services that were equal to or greater in value than the

payments received. You must disclose income totaling \$500 or more from a single source during the period covered by the statement. You have the burden of proving the payments are income rather than gifts. When reporting travel payments as income, you must describe the services you provided in exchange for the payment. You are not required to disclose the date(s) for travel payments that are income.

Example:

City council member MaryClaire Chandler is the chair of a 501(c)(6) trade association, and the association pays for her travel to attend its meetings. Because MaryClaire is deemed

to be providing equal or greater consideration for the travel payment by virtue of serving on the board, this payment may be reported as income. Payments for MaryClaire to attend other events for which she is not providing services are likely considered gifts. Note that the same payment from a

Also note that if China Silicon Valley Business Development (a 501(c)(6) organization) paid for the travel costs rather than the governmental organization, the payments would be subject to the gift limits. (See the FPPC fact sheet, Limitations and Restrictions on Gifts, Honoraria, Travel and Loans, at www.fppc.ca.gov.)

Restrictions and Prohibitions

The Political Reform Act (Gov. Code Sections 81000-91014) requires most state and local government officials and employees to publicly disclose their personal assets and income. They also must disqualify themselves from participating in decisions that may affect their personal economic interests. The Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) is the state agency responsible for issuing the attached Statement of Economic Interests, Form 700, and for interpreting the law's provisions.

Gift Prohibition

Gifts received by most state and local officials, employees, and candidates are subject to a limit. In 2021-2022, the gift limit increased to \$520 from a single source during a calendar year. In 2019 and 2020, the gift limit was \$500 from a single source during a calendar year.

Additionally, state officials, state candidates, and certain state employees are subject to a \$10 limit per calendar month on gifts from lobbyists and lobbying firms registered with the Secretary of State. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.

State and local officials and employees should check with their agency to determine if other restrictions apply.

Disqualification

Public officials are, under certain circumstances, required to disqualify themselves from making, participating in, or attempting to influence governmental decisions that will affect their economic interests. This may include interests they are not required to disclose. For example, a personal residence is often not reportable, but may be grounds for disqualification. Specific disqualification requirements apply to 87200 filers (e.g., city councilmembers, members of boards of supervisors, planning commissioners, etc.). These officials must publicly identify the economic interest that creates a conflict of interest and leave the room before a discussion or vote takes place at a public meeting. For more information, consult Government Code Section 87105, Regulation 18707, and the Guide to Recognizing Conflicts of Interest page at www.fppc.ca.gov.

Honorarium Ban

Most state and local officials, employees, and candidates are prohibited from accepting an honorarium for any speech given, article published, or attendance at a conference, convention, meeting, or like gathering. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)

Loan Restrictions

Certain state and local officials are subject to restrictions

on loans. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)

Post-Governmental Employment

There are restrictions on representing clients or employers before former agencies. The provisions apply to elected state officials, most state employees, local elected officials, county chief administrative officers, city managers, including the chief administrator of a city, and general managers or chief administrators of local special districts and JPAs. The FPPC website has fact sheets explaining the provisions.

Late Filing

The filing officer who retains originally-signed or electronically filed statements of economic interests may impose on an individual a fine for any statement that is filed late. The fine is \$10 per day up to a maximum of \$100. Late filing penalties may be reduced or waived under certain circumstances.

Persons who fail to timely file their Form 700 may be referred to the FPPC's Enforcement Division (and, in some cases, to the Attorney General or district attorney) for investigation and possible prosecution. In addition to the late filing penalties, a fine of up to \$5,000 per violation may be imposed.

Form 700 is a Public Document Public Access Must Be Provided

Statements of Economic Interests are public documents. The filing officer must permit any member of the public to inspect and receive a copy of any statement.

- Statements must be available as soon as possible during the agency's regular business hours, but in any event not later than the second business day after the statement is received. Access to the Form 700 is not subject to the Public Records Act procedures.
- No conditions may be placed on persons seeking access to the forms.
- No information or identification may be required from persons seeking access.
- Reproduction fees of no more than 10 cents per page may be charged.

Questions and Answers

General

- Q. What is the reporting period for disclosing interests on an assuming office statement or a candidate statement?
- A. On an assuming office statement, disclose all reportable investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you assumed office. In addition, you must disclose income (including loans, gifts and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you assumed office.
 - On a candidate statement, disclose all reportable investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you file your declaration of candidacy. You must also disclose income (including loans, gifts and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you file your declaration of candidacy.
- Q. I hold two other board positions in addition to my position with the county. Must I file three statements of economic interests?
- A. Yes, three are required. However, you may complete one statement listing the county and the two boards on the Cover Page or an attachment as the agencies for which you will be filing. Report your economic interests using the largest jurisdiction and highest disclosure requirements assigned to you by the three agencies. Make two copies of the entire statement before signing it, sign each copy with an original signature, and distribute one original to the county and to each of the two boards. Remember to complete separate statements for positions that you leave or assume during the year.
- Q. I am a department head who recently began acting as city manager. Should I file as the city manager?
- A. Yes. File an assuming office statement as city manager. Persons serving as "acting," "interim," or "alternate" must file as if they hold the position because they are or may be performing the duties of the position.
- Q. My spouse and I are currently separated and in the process of obtaining a divorce. Must I still report my spouse's income, investments, and interests in real property?
- A. Yes. A public official must continue to report a spouse's economic interests until such time as dissolution of marriage proceedings is final. However, if a separate property agreement has been reached prior to that time, your estranged spouse's income may not have to be reported. Contact the FPPC for more information.

- Q. As a designated employee, I left one state agency to work for another state agency. Must I file a leaving office statement?
- A. Yes. You may also need to file an assuming office statement for the new agency.

Investment Disclosure

- Q. I have an investment interest in shares of stock in a company that does not have an office in my jurisdiction. Must I still disclose my investment interest in this company?
- A. Probably. The definition of "doing business in the jurisdiction" is not limited to whether the business has an office or physical location in your jurisdiction. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 13.)
- Q. My spouse and I have a living trust. The trust holds rental property in my jurisdiction, our primary residence, and investments in diversified mutual funds. I have full disclosure. How is this trust disclosed?
- A. Disclose the name of the trust, the rental property and its income on Schedule A-2. Your primary residence and investments in diversified mutual funds registered with the SEC are not reportable.
- Q. I am required to report all investments. I have an IRA that contains stocks through an account managed by a brokerage firm. Must I disclose these stocks even though they are held in an IRA and I did not decide which stocks to purchase?
- A. Yes. Disclose on Schedule A-1 or A-2 any stock worth \$2,000 or more in a business entity located in or doing business in your jurisdiction.
- Q. The value of my stock changed during the reporting period. How do I report the value of the stock?
- A. You are required to report the highest value that the stock reached during the reporting period. You may use your monthly statements to determine the highest value. You may also use the entity's website to determine the highest value. You are encouraged to keep a record of where you found the reported value. Note that for an assuming office statement, you must report the value of the stock on the date you assumed office.

Questions and Answers Continued

- Q. I am the sole owner of my business, an S-Corporation. I believe that the nature of the business is such that it cannot be said to have any "fair market value" because it has no assets. I operate the corporation under an agreement with a large insurance company. My contract does not have resale value because of its nature as a personal services contract. Must I report the fair market value for my business on Schedule A-2 of the Form 700?
- A. Yes. Even if there are no *tangible* assets, intangible assets, such as relationships with companies and clients are commonly sold to qualified professionals. The "fair market value" is often quantified for other purposes, such as marital dissolutions or estate planning. In addition, the IRS presumes that "personal services corporations" have a fair market value. A professional "book of business" and the associated goodwill that generates income are not without a determinable value. The Form 700 does not require a precise fair market value; it is only necessary to check a box indicating the broad range within which the value falls.
- Q. I own stock in IBM and must report this investment on Schedule A-1. I initially purchased this stock in the early 1990s; however, I am constantly buying and selling shares. Must I note these dates in the "Acquired" and "Disposed" fields?
- A. No. You must only report dates in the "Acquired" or "Disposed" fields when, during the reporting period, you initially purchase a reportable investment worth \$2,000 or more or when you dispose of the entire investment. You are not required to track the partial trading of an investment.
- Q. On last year's filing I reported stock in Encoe valued at \$2,000 \$10,000. Late last year the value of this stock fell below and remains at less than \$2,000. How should this be reported on this year's statement?
- A. You are not required to report an investment if the value was less than \$2,000 during the **entire** reporting period. However, because a disposed date is not required for stocks that fall below \$2,000, you may want to report the stock and note in the "comments" section that the value fell below \$2,000. This would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.

- Q. We have a Section 529 account set up to save money for our son's college education. Is this reportable?
- A. If the Section 529 account contains reportable interests (e.g., common stock valued at \$2,000 or more), those interests are reportable (not the actual Section 529 account). If the account contains solely mutual funds, then nothing is reported.

Income Disclosure

- Q. I reported a business entity on Schedule A-2. Clients of my business are located in several states. Must I report all clients from whom my pro rata share of income is \$10,000 or more on Schedule A-2, Part 3?
- A. No, only the clients located in or doing business on a regular basis in your jurisdiction must be disclosed.
- Q. I believe I am not required to disclose the names of clients from whom my pro rata share of income is \$10,000 or more on Schedule A-2 because of their right to privacy. Is there an exception for reporting clients' names?
- A. Regulation 18740 provides a procedure for requesting an exemption to allow a client's name not to be disclosed if disclosure of the name would violate a legally recognized privilege under California or Federal law. This regulation may be obtained from our website at www.fppc.ca.gov. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)
- Q. I am sole owner of a private law practice that is not reportable based on my limited disclosure category. However, some of the sources of income to my law practice are from reportable sources. Do I have to disclose this income?
- A. Yes, even though the law practice is not reportable, reportable sources of income to the law practice of \$10,000 or more must be disclosed. This information would be disclosed on Schedule C with a note in the "comments" section indicating that the business entity is not a reportable investment. The note would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.

Questions and Answers Continued

- Q. I am the sole owner of my business. Where do I disclose my income on Schedule A-2 or Schedule C?
- A. Sources of income to a business in which you have an ownership interest of 10% or greater are disclosed on Schedule A-2. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 8.)
- Q. My husband is a partner in a four-person firm where all of his business is based on his own billings and collections from various clients. How do I report my community property interest in this business and the income generated in this manner?
- A. If your husband's investment in the firm is 10% or greater, disclose 100% of his share of the business on Schedule A-2, Part 1 and 50% of his income on Schedule A-2, Parts 2 and 3. For example, a client of your husband's must be a source of at least \$20,000 during the reporting period before the client's name is reported.
- Q. How do I disclose my spouse's or registered domestic partner's salary?
- A. Report the name of the employer as a source of income on Schedule C.
- Q. I am a doctor. For purposes of reporting \$10,000 sources of income on Schedule A-2, Part 3, are the patients or their insurance carriers considered sources of income?
- A. If your patients exercise sufficient control by selecting you instead of other doctors, then your patients, rather than their insurance carriers, are sources of income to you. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)
- Q. I received a loan from my grandfather to purchase my home. Is this loan reportable?
- A. No. Loans received from family members are not reportable.
- Q. Many years ago, I loaned my parents several thousand dollars, which they paid back this year. Do I need to report this loan repayment on my Form 700?
- A. No. Payments received on a loan made to a family member are not reportable.

Real Property Disclosure

- Q. During this reporting period we switched our principal place of residence into a rental. I have full disclosure and the property is located in my agency's jurisdiction, so it is now reportable. Because I have not reported this property before, do I need to show an "acquired" date?
- A. No, you are not required to show an "acquired" date because you previously owned the property. However, you may want to note in the "comments" section that the property was not previously reported because it was used exclusively as your residence. This would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.
- Q. I am a city manager, and I own a rental property located in an adjacent city, but one mile from the city limit. Do I need to report this property interest?
- A. Yes. You are required to report this property because it is located within 2 miles of the boundaries of the city you manage.
- Q. Must I report a home that I own as a personal residence for my daughter?
- A. You are not required to disclose a home used as a personal residence for a family member unless you receive income from it, such as rental income.
- Q. I am a co-signer on a loan for a rental property owned by a friend. Since I am listed on the deed of trust, do I need to report my friend's property as an interest in real property on my Form 700?
- A. No. Simply being a co-signer on a loan for property does not create a reportable interest in real property for you.

Gift Disclosure

- Q. If I received a reportable gift of two tickets to a concert valued at \$100 each, but gave the tickets to a friend because I could not attend the concert, do I have any reporting obligations?
- A. Yes. Since you accepted the gift and exercised discretion and control of the use of the tickets, you must disclose the gift on Schedule D.

Questions and Answers Continued

- Q. Julia and Jared Benson, a married couple, want to give a piece of artwork to a county supervisor. Is each spouse considered a separate source for purposes of the gift limit and disclosure?
- A. Yes, each spouse may make a gift valued at the gift limit during a calendar year. For example, during 2020 the gift limit was \$500, so the Bensons may have given the supervisor artwork valued at no more than \$1,000. The supervisor must identify Jared and Julia Benson as the sources of the gift.
- Q. I am a Form 700 filer with full disclosure. Our agency holds a holiday raffle to raise funds for a local charity. I bought \$10 worth of raffle tickets and won a gift basket valued at \$120. The gift basket was donated by Doug Brewer, a citizen in our city. At the same event, I bought raffle tickets for, and won a quilt valued at \$70. The quilt was donated by a coworker. Are these reportable gifts?
- A. Because the gift basket was donated by an outside source (not an agency employee), you have received a reportable gift valued at \$110 (the value of the basket less the consideration paid). The source of the gift is Doug Brewer and the agency is disclosed as the intermediary. Because the quilt was donated by an employee of your agency, it is not a reportable gift.
- Q. My agency is responsible for disbursing grants. An applicant (501(c)(3) organization) met with agency employees to present its application. At this meeting, the applicant provided food and beverages. Would the food and beverages be considered gifts to the employees? These employees are designated in our agency's conflict of interest code and the applicant is a reportable source of income under the code.
- A. Yes. If the value of the food and beverages consumed by any one filer, plus any other gifts received from the same source during the reporting period total \$50 or more, the food and beverages would be reported using the fair market value and would be subject to the gift limit.

- Q. I received free admission to an educational conference related to my official duties. Part of the conference fees included a round of golf. Is the value of the golf considered informational material?
- A. No. The value of personal benefits, such as golf, attendance at a concert, or sporting event, are gifts subject to reporting and limits.



Subject: Update to COVID-19 Safer Return Together Order - Easing Masking Requirements and Further Alignment with State Rules

Supervisors -

Today the Health Officer issued an update to the main COVID-19 health order easing masking requirements in full alignment with the State's guidelines and making other changes bringing San Francisco into near alignment with the State. **The attached documents and the summary below are public.**

The Health Officer updated the Safer Return Together COVID-19 Order (the "Order") in light of recent changes to State and CDC guidelines and the decreasing number of cases in the community and lower number of hospitalizations associated with the spread in San Francisco and the Bay Area region of the Omicron variant of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. The changes bring the Order further into alignment with eased State masking and other health rules. Still, there remains the ongoing threat that the virus poses to the health of vulnerable residents. The summary below and the attached documents are public records. Corresponding changes to some of the FAQs posted on line will follow, though now that the Order is in alignment as to businesses and other

public facilities the FAQS will likely be retired in the near future. This update to the Order goes into effect on March 2, 2022, with the masking changes retroactive to March 1, 2022 (except as to K-12 schools and youth programs, which go into effect later).

Background.

On February 21, 2022, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) updated its health orders mandating boosters in certain high risk settings to specify that an employee may defer their booster for up to 90 days after a recent COVID-19 infection (as demonstrated by proof of recent infection), without requiring a medical exemption.

On February 25, 2022, the CDC significantly eased COVID guidelines, including for wearing masks in public settings indoors. Its recommendations no longer rely only on the number of cases in a community to determine the need for restrictions. Instead, the recommendations provide for local governments to consider three measures in assessing the risk of virus transmission: new Covid-related hospital admissions over the previous week; the percentage of hospital beds occupied by Covid patients; and new coronavirus cases per 100,000 people over the previous week. Based on these three factors, COVID-19 community level risk is ranked low, medium, or high, and the CDC recommends steps people should take for each level. San Francisco is ranked as low, as is the Bay Area region generally. Only people, including children in schools, in areas of high risk need to wear a mask in public indoor settings, according to the CDC. But the CDC says that unvaccinated people should wear masks indoors even in low-risk areas. And the new recommendations do not change the federal requirements to wear masks on public transportation and indoors in airports, train stations and bus stations. The federal mask requirements for public transportation expire March 18, 2022, unless extended.

On February 28, 2022, Governor Newsom announced that California, along with Washington and Oregon, will stop requiring masks inside K-12 schools beginning March 12, 2022. But local school districts and individual schools can decide to continue mask requirements. Also, beginning March 1, 2022 California will no longer require that unvaccinated individuals wear masks in most indoor public settings. The State still strongly recommends that everyone wear masks indoors while in public. And there is still a requirement that everyone continue to wear masks in designated high risk settings like hospitals and health care facilities, as well as, for the time being, a requirement to wear masks on federal transportation consistent with federal rules. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) updated its mask order consistent with the Governor's announcement.

Also on February 28, 2022, following CDPH's issuance of its updated mask order, Governor Newsom today an executive order that updates the Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/OSHA) COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) in keeping with the new CDPH masking guidance. Accordingly, starting March 1, the State will no longer require masks for workers indoors, including unvaccinated workers, in most workplace settings, consistent with the updated CDPH guidance. But masks are still strongly recommended for all individuals in those settings. Employers must still provide a face covering upon request of an employee.

Summary of Significant Changes in the Order.

In light of the decreasing number of cases in the community and lower number of hospitalizations associated with the spread in San Francisco and the Bay Area region of the Omicron variant, and in

near alignment with recent changes in State and CDC guidelines, the Health Officer has updated the Order. A summary of the significant changes follows.

- 1. Masks. With these changes the Order now fully aligns with State health rules as to masking.
 - a. Masks for Unvaccinated People in Indoor Public Settings. Beginning on March 1, 2022 masks are no longer required for patrons in most indoor public settings. That easing of mask requirements includes indoor mega-events, though the pre-entry vaccination or testing requirements continue to apply as described in paragraph 2 below. The Health Officer still strongly recommends that everyone wear masks in indoor public settings, especially people who are unvaccinated. The easing of mask requirements does not apply to public transportation or designated high-risk settings (such as hospitals and other healthcare facilities, homeless shelters, and jails). Also, the easing of mask requirements applies to unvaccinated employees in the workplace, under the recent Governor Executive Order aligning Cal\OSHA masking rules with the new CDPH masking guidance.
 - b. Masks in Schools. Face covering requirements in schools and programs for children and youth are moved from the Order to Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-33 and 2020-14, respectively, including as those directives are further updated in the future based on changes to State guidance. The mask requirements for schools and youth programs under these health directives align with State requirements, including the March 11 change from a mask mandate to a mask recommendation. But again, the school district and individual schools and youth program operators may adopt more heath protective measures that required under the State and local health orders and directives, including requiring masks. On February 28, the San Francisco Unified School District announced that it intends to continue to require masks after March 11.
- 2. Pre-entry Requirements for Indoor Mega-Events. Beginning on March 1, 2022 people attending indoor mega-events can show before entering the facility that they have completed an initial series of COVID-19 vaccination or that they have a negative COVID-19 test meeting the same verification timing and verification requirements as before. So, people attending these events no longer have to provide proof that they are up-to-date on vaccination, including boosters, to qualify for admission based on vaccination status. This change fully aligns with the State health rules for mega-events. Under the Order, the same vaccination or testing requirements for patrons apply to people working at indoor mega-events. The table summarizing the requirements for mega-events, available on-line on DPH's website and also through a weblink in the Order, will be updated accordingly.
- 3. No Change for Now for Pre-Entry Requirements for Indoor Restaurants, Gyms, and Other Covered Businesses. For now, under San Francisco health rules, patrons of indoor restaurants, bars, gyms and fitness centers, theaters, and other entertainment venues will continue to have to provide proof of completion of an initial series of COVID-19 vaccination or of a negative COVID-19 test, to enter the facility. But the Health Officer is continuing to evaluate this requirement and may ease it in the near future depending on health conditions.

4. Booster Requirement for Workers in High-Risk Settings. Beginning on March 1, 2022,

personnel in certain high risk settings (such as hospitals and healthcare facilities) may defer their booster for up to 90 days after a recent COVID-19 infection (as demonstrated by proof of recent infection), without requiring a medical exemption. They need to mask and test in the interim. This change aligns with recent changes in State rules. The same ability to defer booster requirements applies to personnel covered by the San Francisco order, and not the State order, who visit high-risk settings as part of their work, such as police and firefighters, paramedics, and emergency medical technicians.

5. General Considerations.

- a. <u>Individual Facilities</u>. Operators of individual facilities continue to be able to adopt more restrictive measures, that is, measures that are more protective of public health. For example, operators of those facilities may require that everyone wear masks indoors or that unvaccinated people wear mask indoors, or that people provide proof of vaccination or negative testing to attend or enter the facility.
- b. <u>Signage</u>. DPH is in the process of updating its recommended signage for businesses and other public facilities. Other than for indoor mega-events and indoor covered businesses (like restaurants and gyms), no signage is required.
- c. <u>Health Conditions</u>. If health conditions worsen in the future, due to a surge associated with another variant or for any other reason related to COVID-19, then the Health Officer may need to re-impose mask requirements or other health precautions as appropriate.

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ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO

ENCOURAGING COVID-19 VACCINE COVERAGE AND REDUCING DISEASE RISKS (Safer Return Together)

DATE OF ORDER: June 11, 2021, updated July 8, 2021, July 20, 2021, August 2, 2021, August 12, 2021, August 24, 2021, September 10, 2021, October 13, 2021, December 14, 2021, December 29, 2021, January 10, 2022, January 26, 2022, February 14, 2022, and March 2, 2022

NOTE (REVISED MARCH 2, 2022) On February 28, 2022 Governor Newsom announced that California, along with Washington and Oregon, will stop requiring masks inside K-12 schools after March 11, 2022. Also, beginning March 1, 2022 California will no longer require that unvaccinated individuals wear masks in most indoor public settings. The State still strongly recommends that everyone wear masks indoors while in public. The update to this Order includes changes to conform San Francisco's local rules regarding masking indoors to these newly-announced changes. Additionally, the update to this Order makes other important changes, including further alignment with State heath rules.

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295, et seq.; California Penal Code §§ 69, 148(a)(1); and San Francisco Administrative Code § 7.17(b).)

<u>Summary</u>: As of March 2, 2022, this Order replaces the prior update of this health order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07y (issued February 14, 2022), in its entirety.

The Health Officer is updating the Order in light of the recent changes to State guidelines and the decreasing number of cases in the community and lower number of hospitalizations associated with the spread in San Francisco and the Bay Area region of the Omicron variant of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. Still, there remains the ongoing threat that the virus poses to the health of vulnerable residents. Current evidence indicates that the Omicron variant is much more transmissible than Delta and other variants of the virus, and that individuals who have had only their initial vaccine series are susceptible to the Omicron variant. Medical data to date also show that individuals who have received a booster shot increase their immunity to a level that confers significantly more protection from all circulating SARS-CoV-2 variants, including the Omicron variant, and generally prevents severe disease. The United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the California Department of Public Health now recommend that everyone who has been vaccinated receive a booster shot as



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soon as they are eligible because immunity wanes several months after completion of the initial vaccine series. And the CDC and CDPH recommend that people receive the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna booster if they can.

Vaccination remains a critical component in preventing COVID-19 and its associated health harms. Individuals who have not received their initial vaccine series or a booster shot are more likely to become infected and spread infection to others, and more likely to become seriously ill and die. It is critical that community members receive their initial vaccine series and booster shots when eligible to maintain the protective effect of the high community-wide vaccination rates in San Francisco.

Even though a high percentage of people are vaccinated in San Francisco and the Bay Area region against the virus that causes COVID-19 and an increasing percentage are boosted, there remains a risk that people may come into contact with others who have COVID-19 when outside their residence. Many COVID-19 infections are caused by people who have no symptoms of illness. Also, there are people in San Francisco who have not completed their initial vaccine series or who are not yet eligible to receive a booster, including children under five years old, and people who are immuno-compromised and may be particularly vulnerable to infection and disease. Everyone who is eligible, including people at risk for severe illness with COVID-19—such as unvaccinated older adults and unvaccinated individuals with health risks—and members of their households, are strongly urged to get vaccinated and receive their booster as soon as they can if they have not already done so.

Consistent with CDPH orders requiring vaccination and boosters for most healthcare workers, the Health Officer has determined that all people working in designated highrisk settings be both vaccinated and boosted as soon as they are eligible. People working in these high-risk settings (1) can expose highly vulnerable people who are at increased risk of severe illness and death to COVID-19, (2) must therefore be protected from COVID-19 to the maximum extent possible to ensure adequate staffing in these critical settings, and (3) particularly for jails, shelters, and skilled nursing facilities, can cause large outbreaks if workers are infected.

Accordingly, this Order imposes a requirement, layered on top of the recently revised CDPH health orders, for (1) personnel working in designated high-risk settings—meaning general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, residential care facilities for the elderly, homeless shelters, and jails, all as further defined below—as well as (2) personnel working in other higher-risk settings—including adult care facilities, adult day programs, dental offices, home health care workers, and pharmacists, and (3) personnel who visit higher-risk settings as part of the work, such as paramedics, emergency medical technicians, police officers, and lawyers who visit people in the jails—to both receive the full initial course of vaccination and, once they are eligible, to receive a booster. Businesses and governmental entities with personnel in these high-risk settings have until March 1, 2022 to comply with the booster verification requirement, meaning those who are eligible to receive a booster on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their booster by March 1, 2022. And those who



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are eligible for a booster after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel working in high-risk settings who are eligible for a booster and have not yet received one must be tested once or twice a week for COVID-19, depending on the setting, and provide proof of a negative test, until one week after they receive a booster. For Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to High-Risk Settings but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time (such as police, firefighters, paramedics and emergency medical technicians), the deadline for receipt of a Booster is also March 1, 2022, but employers of such Personnel can extend that deadline subject to certain health precautions until April 15, 2022 due to critical staffing shortages.

On February 28, 2022, CDPH updated its order regarding the requirement to wear a face covering indoors, eliminating its face covering requirement for unvaccinated individuals in most indoor public settings, maintaining a strong recommendation that everyone, regardless of vaccination status, wear a mask in indoor public settings and businesses, and listing settings where masking is still required of everyone, regardless of vaccination status. The list of settings where masking is still required by CDPH includes: K-12 schools and childcare (through March 11, 2022); on public transit (at least through March 18, 2022); in emergency shelters and cooling centers; in healthcare settings; in state and local correctional facilities and detention centers; in homeless shelters; and in long term care settings and adult and senior care facilities. A copy of the updated CDPH masking order is available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/guidance-for-face-coverings.aspx. This Order has been updated to align with the updated CDPH masking rules, including strongly encouraging everyone, even people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date On Vaccination, to continue wearing masks in indoor public settings where they are not otherwise required. Operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events, as well as the operators of other indoor facilities that continue to have proof of vaccination or testing requirements (like gyms, bars, and restaurants) are allowed, but not required, to align with the State's rule allowing mask removal indoors. Also, particularly in light of the Omicron variant and risk of future variants, the Health Officer continues to recommend that whenever possible everyone wear a non-vented respirator, such as an N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator, when wearing a mask. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. Finally, the Order maintains face covering requirements in other settings such as public transit, as well as health care facilities, skilled nursing facilities, homeless shelters, and jails, consistent with federal and state rules.

This Order includes requirements related to entry to certain indoor gatherings. For indoor Mega-Events, consistent with State rules, patrons must show proof they either are vaccinated as required by the Order (including for most adults to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series) or have a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. Consistent with CDPH rules, self-administered antigen tests are not acceptable for pre-admission testing unless there is third-party verification. Staff of indoor Mega-Events are subject to the



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same rules as for patrons. Also, patrons of businesses that operate indoor gyms, other fitness centers, bars, restaurants, and certain other facilities must provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or of a negative Test ,before entry. This Order also includes a number of recommendations—but not requirements—for individuals, businesses, and governmental entities to reduce COVID-19 risk, including the strong recommendation everyone be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including Boosters, and a recommendation to post signage regarding COVID-19 best practices and any vaccination or masking rules imposed by a business or entity. Indoor Mega-Events and Businesses that operate gyms, other fitness centers, bars, restaurants, and certain other facilities are still required to post signage at public entrances listing their pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

And this Order maintains other minimum COVID-19 safety requirements on businesses and governmental entities, such as a general requirement to report outbreaks in the workplace.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO ORDERS:

1. Definitions.

For purposes of this Order, the following initially capitalized terms have the meanings given below.

- a. *Booster*. A "Booster" means an additional dose of a vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization (WHO), for which a person is Booster-Eligible. Consistent with CDC and CDPH guidance, either the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine is preferred for the Booster.
- b. Booster-Eligible. A person is "Booster-Eligible" once they meet criteria to receive a Booster under CDC guidance. For example, as of the date of issuance of this update to the Order, individuals who are 18 or older may receive a booster of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty), Moderna (Spikevax), or Johnson & Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine at least five months after receiving a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine or two months after receiving the single dose Johnson & Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine, and adolescents who are 12 to 17 years old may receive a booster of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine at least five months after their second dose of that vaccine. Consistent with CDC guidance (available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/booster-shot.html), anyone who received a WHO-authorized vaccine or a combination of vaccines should receive the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) vaccine as their booster pursuant to the timing listing in that guidance. Those preferences apply to all initial vaccination series, regardless of which vaccine an



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individual received. The CDC has been frequently updating booster eligibility. More up-to-date information on booster eligibility may be found online at www.sfcdcp.org/boosters, and individuals, Businesses, and governmental entities are urged to stay informed about changes.

- c. *Business*. A "Business" includes any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entity, whether a corporate entity, organization, partnership or sole proprietorship, and regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.
- d. *Cal/OSHA*. "Cal/OSHA" means the California Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Occupational Safety and Health, better known as Cal/OSHA.
- e. CDC. "CDC" means the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- f. CDPH. "CDPH" means the California Department of Public Health.
- g. Close Contact. "Close Contact" means being within six feet of a Person With COVID-19 for a total of 15 minutes or more in a 24-hour period while the person is contagious. In turn, a "Person With COVID-19" means a person who tests positive for the virus that causes COVID-19 (SARS-CoV-2) or has been clinically diagnosed with COVID-19 by a healthcare provider. A person is no longer considered a Person With COVID-19 once all of the following occur: (a) at least one day (i.e., 24 hours) has passed since their last fever (without use of fever-reducing medications), and (b) there has been improvement of other symptoms, and (c) at least five days have passed since symptoms first appeared. A person who tested positive for COVID-19 but never had symptoms is no longer considered a Person With COVID-19 five days after the date of their first positive test. The person is considered contagious if they either (i) had symptoms, from 48 hours before their symptoms began until at least five days after the start of symptoms, or (ii) did not have symptoms but learned they were COVID-19 positive from a test, from 48 hours before their COVID-19 test was collected until five days after they were tested.
- h. County. The "County" means the City and County of San Francisco.
- i. *COVID-19*. "COVID-19" means coronavirus disease 2019, the disease caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus and that resulted in a global pandemic.
- j. *DPH*. "DPH" means the San Francisco Department of Public Health.
- k. *DPH Core Guidance*. "DPH Core Guidance" means the webpage and related materials titled *Core Guidance for COVID-19* that DPH regularly updates and includes health and safety recommendations for individuals and Businesses as well as web links to additional resources, available online at sf.gov/core-guidance-covid-19.
- l. Face Covering Requirements. "Face Covering Requirements" means the limited requirements to wear a Well-Fitted Mask (i) under federal or state law including, but



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not limited to, California Department of Public Health guidance and Cal/OSHA's regulations; (ii) in indoor common areas of homeless shelters, emergency shelters, and cooling centers, except while sleeping, showering, engaged in personal hygiene that requires removal of face coverings, or actively eating or drinking; (iii) in indoor common areas of jails except while sleeping, showering, engaged in personal hygiene that requires removal of face coverings, or actively eating or drinking; and (iv) under Section 3(b), below and Appendix A, attached to the Order. If a separate state, local, or federal order or directive imposes different face covering requirements, including requirements to wear respirators or surgical masks in certain settings, the more health protective requirement applies.

- m. FDA. "FDA" means the United States Food and Drug Administration.
- n. *Fully Vaccinated*. "Fully Vaccinated" has the same meaning as the newer term "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series," defined below. Because other preexisting Health Officer orders and directives and other DPH or County guidance materials may still use the term Fully Vaccinated that term continues to be defined in this Order.
- o. *Health Officer*. "Health Officer" means the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco.
- p. *High-Risk Settings*. "High-Risk Settings" means certain care or living settings involving many people, including many congregate settings, where vulnerable populations reside out of necessity and where the risk of COVID-19 transmission is high, consisting of general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities (including subacute facilities), intermediate care facilities, residential care facilities for the elderly, homeless shelters, and jails (including, but not limited to, the Juvenile Justice Center Juvenile Hall).
- q. *Household*. "Household" means people living in a single Residence or shared living unit. Households do not refer to individuals who live together in an institutional group living situation such as in a dormitory, fraternity, sorority, monastery, convent, or residential care facility.
- r. *Mega-Event*. "Mega-Event" means an event with either more than 1,000 people attending indoors or more than 10,000 people attending outdoors. As provided in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance, a Mega-Event may have either assigned or unassigned seating, and may be either general admission or gated, ticketed and permitted events.
- s. *Personnel*. "Personnel" means the following people who provide goods or services associated with a Business in the County: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the Business); independent contractors; vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request



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of the Business. "Personnel" includes "gig workers" who perform work via the Business's app or other online interface, if any.

- t. *Qualifying Medical Reason*. "Qualifying Medical Reason" means a medical condition or disability recognized by the FDA or CDC as a contra-indication to COVID-19 vaccination.
- u. *Religious Beliefs*. "Religious Beliefs" means a sincerely held religious belief, practice, or observance protected by state or federal law.
- v. *Residence*. "Residence" means the location a person lives, even if temporarily, and includes single-family homes, apartment units, condominium units, hotels, motels, shared rental units, and similar facilities. Residences also include living structures and outdoor spaces associated with those living structures, such as patios, porches, backyards, and front yards that are only accessible to a single family or Household.
- w. *Schools*. "Schools" mean public and private schools operating in the County, including independent, parochial, and charter schools.
- x. State's Post-Blueprint Guidance. The "State's Post-Blueprint Guidance" means the guidance entitled "Beyond the Blueprint for Industry and Business Sectors" that the California Department of Public Health issued on May 21, 2021 and updated as of February 7, 2022, including as the State may further extend, update or supplement that guidance in the future. (See www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Beyond-Blueprint-Framework.aspx.)
- y. *Test* and *Tested*. "Tested" means to have a negative test (a "Test") for the virus that causes COVID-19 within the applicable timeframe as listed in this Order. Both nucleic acid (including polymerase chain reaction (PCR)) and antigen tests are acceptable. The following are acceptable as proof of a negative COVID-19 test result: a printed document (from the test provider or laboratory) or an email, text message, webpage, or application (app) screen displayed on a phone or mobile device from the test provider or laboratory. The information should include person's name, type of test performed, negative test result, and date the test was administered. If any state or federal agency uses a more restrictive definition of what it means to be Tested for specified purposes (such as Cal/OSHA rules for employers in workplaces), then that more restrictive definition controls for those purposes. Some sections of this Order require antigen tests to be third-party verified (meaning administered or observed by the third-party) to meet requirements for showing proof of a negative Test.
- z. *Unvaccinated*. "Unvaccinated" refers to a person age two or older who is eligible for COVID-19 vaccination and who is either (i) not at least Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or (ii) in an indoor setting where this Order requires proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series as a condition of entry but has not provided such proof.



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- aa. Up-to-Date on Vaccination. "Up-to-Date on Vaccination" means when a person both (i) is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and (ii) has received a Booster once the person is Booster-Eligible. A person is Up-to-Date on Vaccination immediately on receipt of a Booster. Until a person is Booster-Eligible, they are considered Up-to-Date on Vaccination two weeks after completing their full initial series of vaccination.
- bb. Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series. "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series" means two weeks after completing the entire recommended initial series of vaccination (usually one or two doses) with a vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization (WHO). For example, as of the date of issuance of this Order, an individual has completed an initial vaccination series at least two weeks after receiving a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine or two weeks after receiving the single dose Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine. A list of FDA-authorized vaccines is available at www.fda.gov/emergency-preparedness-and-response/coronavirus-disease-2019covid-19/covid-19-vaccines. A list of WHO-authorized vaccines is available at https://extranet.who.int/pqweb/vaccines/covid-19-vaccines. On August 23, 2021, the FDA granted full approval for the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) vaccine for people age 16 and older, and on January 31, 2022, the FDA granted full approval for the Moderna (Spikevax) vaccine for people age 18 and older. And, on October 29, 2021, the FDA granted emergency use authorization for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine for children age five to 11.

Unless otherwise specified, the following are acceptable as proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination: (i) the CDC vaccination card, which includes name of person vaccinated, type of vaccine provided, and date last dose administered, or similar documentation issued by another foreign governmental jurisdiction, (ii) a photo of a vaccination card as a separate document, (iii) a photo of the a vaccination card stored on a phone or electronic device, (iv) documentation of vaccination from a healthcare provider, (v) unless prohibited elsewhere in this Order in a specific context, written self-attestation of vaccination signed (including an electronic signature) under penalty of perjury and containing the name of the person vaccinated, type of vaccine taken, and date of last dose administered, or (vi) a personal digital COVID-19 vaccine record issued by the State of California and available by going to https://myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov or similar documentation issued by another State, local, or foreign governmental jurisdiction, or by an approved private company (a list of approved companies offering digital vaccine verification is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/vaccine-verification-sites.asp). If any state or federal agency uses a more restrictive definition of what it means to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or to prove that status for specified purposes (such as Cal/OSHA rules for employers in workplaces), then that more restrictive definition controls for those purposes. Also, to the extent Cal/OSHA approves an alternate means of documenting whether an employee has completed the full initial series or is



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"fully vaccinated," even if less restrictive than the definition contained here, employers may use the Cal/OSHA standard to document their employees' vaccination status.

- cc. Ventilation Guidelines. "Ventilation Guidelines" means ventilation guidance from recognized authorities such as the CDC, the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers, or the State of California (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Interim-Guidance-for-Ventilation-Filtration-and-Air-Quality-in-Indoor-Environments.aspx), including Cal/OSHA.
- dd. Well-Fitted Mask. A "Well-Fitted Mask" means a face covering that is well-fitted to an individual and covers the nose and mouth especially while talking, consistent with the Face Covering Requirements. CDC guidance regarding Well-Fitted Masks may be found at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/effective-masks.html. A well-fitting non-vented N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator is strongly recommended as a Well-Fitted Mask, even if not fit-tested, to provide maximum protection. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. Given higher transmissibility of the Omicron variant, cloth masks alone are no longer recommended. A Well-Fitted Mask does not include a scarf, ski mask, balaclava, bandana, turtleneck, collar, or single layer of fabric or any mask that has an unfiltered one-way exhaust valve.

2. Purpose and Intent.

a. Purpose. The public health threat of serious illness or death from COVID-19 is much lower in the County and the Bay Area than many parts of the State and country due to the high rate of vaccination of the community. But COVID-19 continues to pose a risk especially to individuals who are not eligible to be vaccinated or are not yet Upto-Date on Vaccination, and certain safety measures continue to be necessary or strongly recommended to protect against COVID-19 cases and deaths. Being Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster as soon as Booster-Eligible, is the most effective method to prevent transmission and ultimately COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths. It is important to ensure that as many eligible people as possible are vaccinated against COVID-19. Further, it is critical to ensure there is continued reporting of cases to protect individuals and the larger community. Accordingly, this Order allows Businesses, schools, and other activities to resume fully while at the same time putting in place certain requirements or recommendations designed to (1) extend vaccine coverage to the greatest extent possible; (2) limit transmission risk of COVID-19; (3) contain any COVID-19 outbreaks; and (4) generally align with guidance issued by the CDC and the State relating to COVID-19 except in limited instances where local conditions require more restrictive measures. This Order is based on evidence of continued community transmission of SARS-CoV-2 within the County as well as scientific evidence and best practices to prevent transmission of COVID-19. The Health Officer will continue to monitor data regarding the evolving scientific understanding of the risks posed by COVID-19,



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including the impact of vaccination, and may amend or rescind this Order based on analysis of that data and knowledge. It is possible that the Health Officer will determine in the future that prior health precautions that have been relaxed or removed need to be imposed again, based on changes in local health conditions and the course of the pandemic.

- b. <u>Intent</u>. The primary intent of this Order is to continue to protect the community from COVID-19, including by providing health recommendations as requirements are lifted, and to also increase vaccination rates to reduce transmission of COVID-19 long-term, so that the whole community is safer and the COVID-19 health emergency can come to an end.
- c. <u>Interpretation</u>. All provisions of this Order must be interpreted to effectuate the purposes and intent of this Order as described above. The note and summary at the beginning of this Order as well as the headings and subheadings of sections contained in this Order are for convenience only and may not be used to interpret this Order. In the event of any inconsistency between the summary, headings, or subheadings and the text of this Order, the text will control. Certain initially capitalized terms used in this Order have the meanings given them in Section 1 above. The interpretation of this Order in relation to the health orders or guidance of the State is described in Section 10 below.
- d. <u>Application</u>. This Order applies to all individuals, Businesses, and other entities in the County. For clarity, the requirements of this Order apply to all individuals who do not currently reside in the County when they are in the County. Governmental entities must follow the requirements of this Order that apply to Businesses, unless otherwise specifically provided in this Order or directed by the Health Officer.
- e. <u>DPH Core Guidance</u>. All individuals and Businesses are strongly urged to follow the DPH Core Guidance (available online at <u>sf.gov/core-guidance-covid-19</u>) containing health and safety recommendations for COVID-19.
- f. Effect of Failure to Comply. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both, as further provided in Section 12 below.

3. General Requirements for Individuals.

a. <u>Vaccination</u>. Individuals are strongly urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, meaning, as further provided in Section 1, that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and, as soon as they are Booster-Eligible, receive their Booster. In particular, people at risk for severe illness with COVID-19—such as unvaccinated older adults and unvaccinated individuals with health risks—and members of their Household, are urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster, as soon as they can. Information about who is at increased risk of severe illness and



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people who need to take extra precautions can be found at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/need-extra-precautions/people-with-medical-conditions.html. For those who are not yet Up-to-Date on Vaccination, making informed choices about the risk of different activities, wearing a Well-Fitted Mask indoors, or choosing outdoor activities as much as possible with physical distancing from other Households whose vaccination status is unknown, are the best ways to prevent the risk of COVID-19 transmission. Individuals who are Up-to-Date on Vaccination have the best protection against COVID-19.

- b. Face Coverings. All persons must follow the Face Covering Requirements. More specifically, everyone, and especially those who remain Unvaccinated, are strongly recommended to continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in public settings indoors where masking is not otherwise required by the Business, especially when indoors with people whose vaccination status is unknown. Also, everyone is required to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, regardless of vaccination status, in the following indoor settings: public transit; High-Risk Settings; health care and other long-term care facilities where masking is required by regulatory orders and rules; and anywhere else that federal or state health orders require doing so, as described in Section 3(b)(i) and Appendix A to this Order. Appendix A lists exceptions and allowances in such settings when a Well-Fitted Mask is not required, including an exception in certain situations where a person is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination. Face covering requirements in Schools and Programs for Children and Youth are covered in Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-33 and 2020-14, respectively, including as those directives are further updated in the future. When wearing a mask, everyone should consistently wear the best mask they can obtain, considering fit and filtration (and without using a one-way exhalation valve that is not filtered). As provided in the definition of a Well-Fitted Mask, a well-fitting nonvented N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator is strongly recommended. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. More information about fit and filtration and the best mask options is available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/ COVID-19/Getthe-Most-out-of-Masking.aspx. People should respect an individual's decision to wear face coverings even in settings where they are not required, and no Business or other person should take an adverse action against individuals who chose to wear a face covering to protect their health.
 - i. Other Federal and State Requirements. Under current federal law, when riding or waiting to ride on public transit people who are inside the vehicle or other mode of transportation or are indoors at a public transit stop or station, must wear Well-Fitted Masks. This requirement extends to all modes of transportation other than private vehicles, such as airplanes, trains, subways, buses, taxis, ride-shares, maritime transportation, street cars, and cable cars. But any passenger who is outdoors or in open-air areas of the mode of transportation, such as open-air areas of ferries, buses, and cable-cars, is not required by federal law to wear a face covering. Personnel and passengers on public transit are urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, and those who are



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not Up-to-Date on Vaccination are strongly urged to wear a Well-Fitted Mask or respirator when not otherwise required by the Face Covering Requirements. Businesses and other entities should also follow any additional Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace, including regarding masking, and more information can be found online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html. Nothing in this Order is intended to reduce any of those requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual's own choices to take more health protective measures.

- c. <u>Monitor for Symptoms</u>. Individuals should monitor themselves for symptoms of COVID-19. A list of COVID-19 symptoms is available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/symptoms-testing/symptoms.html. Anyone with any symptom that is new or not explained by another condition must comply with subsections 3(d) and 3(e) below regarding isolation and quarantine.
- d. <u>Isolation</u>. Anyone who has or likely has COVID-19, meaning that person (i) has a positive COVID-19 test result, (ii) is diagnosed with COVID-19, or (iii) has a COVID-19 symptom that is new or not explained by another condition, must refer to the latest COVID-19 isolation health directive issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/directives) and follow the requirements detailed there. There are special requirements for healthcare workers and emergency medical services personnel in healthcare settings.
- e. <u>Quarantine</u>. Anyone who had Close Contact must refer to the latest COVID-19 quarantine health directive issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/directives) and follow the requirements detailed there. There are special requirements for healthcare workers and emergency medical services personnel in healthcare settings.
- f. Moving to, Traveling to, or Returning to the County. Everyone is strongly encouraged to comply with (1) any State travel advisories (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Travel-Advisory.aspx) and (2) CDC travel guidelines (available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/travel-during-covid19.html).
- g. <u>Minimum Requirements</u>. Based on their risk preferences, individuals may decide for themselves to take greater safety precautions than required or even recommended under this Order. Also, nothing in this section limits any requirements that apply under this Order to indoor public settings, indoor Mega-Events, or that Cal/OSHA or other State authority may impose on any indoor setting involving gatherings.
- 4. General Requirements for Businesses and Governmental Entities.
 - a. <u>Vaccination</u>. Businesses and governmental entities are generally encouraged to require Personnel and patrons to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, meaning they are



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Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and have received a Booster when they are Booster-Eligible.

- Complete Initial Series Vaccination Requirement for Covered Indoor

 <u>Businesses</u>. The following Businesses (1) must require patrons and staff (as distinguished from the broader term "Personnel") to provide either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative Test (as detailed in Appendix B to this Order), (2) are strongly urged to implement measures as soon as possible to require those patrons and staff to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including requiring them to show proof of receipt of a Booster once they are Booster-Eligible, and (3) must comply with the other requirements detailed in Appendix B to this Order:
 - Operators or hosts of establishments or events where food or drink is served indoors—including, but not limited to, dining establishments, bars, clubs, theaters, and entertainment venues.
 - Gyms, recreation facilities, yoga studios, dance studios, and other fitness establishments, where any patrons engage in cardiovascular, aerobic, strength training, or other exercise involving elevated breathing.

Beginning on February 16, 2022, operators of such Businesses are allowed, but not required by this Order, and as an alternative to checking proof of vaccination status for patrons and staff, to instead accept proof of a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but people are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart).

For proof of a Test as listed in the preceding paragraph, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing.

Such Businesses must comply with the requirement listed in Section 4(e) below to conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

Because testing and masking is not as effective as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination at preventing the spread of COVID-19, a Business may determine that the minimum requirements in this subsection are not sufficient for its operations to protect the health and safety of patrons, staff, or others.



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ii. <u>Mega-Events</u>. Operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events are subject to the proof of vaccination or negative Test requirements for entry by patrons and staff set forth in Section 7 below.

And operators and hosts of indoor or outdoor Mega-Events are encouraged to consider requiring patrons and staff to provide proof that they are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (including proof of a Booster if Booster-Eligible) before entering the venue or outdoor area where the event is held.

b. Masking.

- i. <u>Mask Requirements and Allowances</u>. Businesses and governmental entities must follow the requirements for masking listed in this Order and Appendix A to this Order and may, but are not required by this Order, allow patrons and Personnel (or staff) who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series to remove masks indoors consistent with the requirements listed in Appendix A to this Order.
- ii. <u>Providing a Well-Fitted Mask</u>. Businesses and other entities subject to this Order are encouraged to provide a Well-Fitted Mask at no cost to people (patrons and Personnel) who do not have one upon entry inside the facility.
- c. Personnel Health Screening. Businesses and governmental entities should develop and implement a process for screening Personnel for COVID-19 symptoms, but this requirement does not mean they must perform on-site screening of Personnel. Businesses and governmental entities should ask Personnel to evaluate their own symptoms before reporting to work. If Personnel have symptoms consistent with COVID-19, they should follow subsections 3(d) and 3(e) above. Businesses and governmental entities may be required to conduct such screenings for Personnel under Cal/OSHA's regulations. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html.
- d. <u>Businesses Must Allow Personnel to Stay Home When Sick.</u> Businesses are required to follow Cal/OSHA regulations allowing Personnel to stay home where they have symptoms associated with COVID-19 that are new or not explained by another condition or if they have been diagnosed with COVID-19 (by a test or a clinician) even if they have no symptoms, and to not to have those Personnel return to work until they have satisfied certain conditions, all as further set forth in the Cal/OSHA rules. Also, Businesses must comply with California Senate Bill 114 (Labor Code, sections 248.6 and 248.7), which provides that employers with more than 25 employees must give every employee up to 80 hours of COVID-related sick leave retroactive to January 1, 2022 and through September 30, 2022 (pro-rated for less than full time employees), including that employees may use this paid sick leave to get vaccinated or for post-vaccination illness. Each Business is prohibited from



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taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in any of the circumstances described in this subsection.

e. <u>Signage</u>. All Businesses and governmental entities are encouraged to conspicuously post signage reminding individuals of the following COVID-19 prevention best practices to reduce transmission:

Get vaccinated and boosted;

Stay home if sick;

Wear a mask indoors if you are unvaccinated; and

Clean your hands.

Businesses and governmental entities are also encouraged to include in signage any custom requirements the business or entity requires of its patrons or Personnel regarding testing, vaccination, and masking. Sample signage is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19.

Operators or hosts of covered indoor businesses listed in Section 4(a)(i) above and of indoor Mega-Events (as provided in Section 7 below) must conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

- f. <u>Ventilation Guidelines</u>. All Businesses and governmental entities with indoor operations are urged to review the Ventilation Guidelines and implement ventilation strategies for indoor operations as feasible. Nothing in this subsection limits any ventilation requirements that apply to particular settings under federal, state, or local law.
- g. Mandatory Reporting by Businesses and Governmental Entities. Consistent with Cal/OSHA regulations, Businesses and governmental entities must require that all Personnel immediately alert the Business or governmental entity if they test positive for COVID-19 and were present in the workplace either (1) within 48 hours before onset of symptoms or within 10 days after onset of symptoms if they were symptomatic; or (2) within 48 hours before the date on which they were tested or within 10 days after the date on which they were tested if they were asymptomatic. If a Business or governmental entity is concerned about a workplace outbreak among Personnel, it may get additional information www.sfcdcp.org/covid19-positiveworkplace. Businesses and governmental entities must also comply with all case investigation and contact tracing measures directed by DPH including providing any information requested within the timeframe provided by DPH, instructing Personnel to follow isolation and quarantine protocols specified by CDPH and Cal/OSHA and any additional protocols specified by DPH, and excluding positive cases and unvaccinated close contacts from the workplace during these isolation and quarantine periods.

Schools and Programs for Children and Youth are subject to separate reporting requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-33 and 2020-14,



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respectively, including as those directives are further updated in the future.

- h. Compliance with CDPH Vaccination Status Order's Mask Requirements. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in Acute Health Care Settings, Long-Term Care Settings, High-Risk Congregate Settings, and Other Health Care Settings—as those terms are defined in the CDPH Vaccination Status Order, available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Unvaccinated-Workers-In-High-Risk-Settings.aspx—must provide appropriate face coverings as required by the CDPH Vaccination Status Order.
- i. Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures. This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to COVID-19 protections. Nothing in this Order is intended to reduce any other federal, state, or local legal requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual Business' or governmental entity's choices to take more health protective measures. Businesses or governmental entities may impose further restrictions that are more protective of public health than the minimum requirements or recommendations under this Order, including requiring patrons or Personnel to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, requiring them to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, requiring them to have a negative Test, or taking other more restrictive measures that are more protective of public health and meet their operational needs.

5. Schools and Programs for Children and Youth

- a. Schools. Largely because many children are not yet Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or eligible for a Booster, schools must follow the health and safety requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-33, including as it may be amended in the future, to ensure the safety of all students and Personnel at the school site. All children who are Booster-Eligible (including under an emergency use authorization) are strongly urged to receive a Booster as soon as possible. Also, adult Personnel in TK-12 schools, including educators, aides, administrators, and other staff, are strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination.
- b. Programs for Children and Youth. Largely because some children are not eligible to be vaccinated against COVID-19 at this time and many children are not yet Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or eligible for a Booster, the following Programs for Children and Youth must operate in compliance with the health and safety requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-14, including as it may be amended in the future: (1) group care facilities for children who are not yet in elementary school—including, for example, licensed childcare centers, daycares, family daycares, and preschools (including cooperative preschools); and (2) with the exception of schools, which are addressed in subsection (a) above, educational or recreational institutions or programs that provide care or supervision for school-aged children and youth—including for example, learning hubs, other programs that



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support and supplement distance learning in schools, school-aged childcare programs, youth sports programs, summer camps, and afterschool programs.

- c. <u>Mega-Events</u>. Operators or hosts of indoor events held at schools or under Programs for Children and Youth that meet the definition of an indoor Mega-Event must comply with the rules for indoor Mega-Events specified in Section 7 of this Order. Operators or hosts of such outdoor events are urged to follow the rules for outdoor Mega-Events.
- 6. <u>Vaccination Requirements for Personnel in High-Risk Settings and Other Health Care</u> Personnel.
 - a. <u>High-Risk Settings</u>. Except for some Personnel as provided in subsections (a)(iii), (b), and (c) below, and for Personnel exempt under subsection (d) below, all of the following requirements apply in High-Risk Settings:
 - Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in High-Risk Settings must:
 - 1. As of September 30, 2021, ascertain vaccination status of all Personnel in High-Risk Settings who routinely work onsite;
 - 2. As of September 30, 2021, ensure that before entering or working in any High-Risk Setting, all Personnel who routinely work onsite have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below; and
 - 3. No later than March 1, 2022, ensure that all such Personnel who routinely work onsite, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. And for the period between when such Personnel are Booster-Eligible but have not yet received one and when they become Up-to-Date on Vaccination (meaning one week after receipt of a Booster), the operator of the High-Risk Setting must ensure that each such person comply with the public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below regarding testing even though they have already received their full initial course of vaccination. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible.

And consistent with updated CDPH "Health Care Worker Vaccine

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Requirement" guidance (linked below in Section 6(b)), such Personnel who provide proof of COVID-19 infection after being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series (a "Recent Pre-Booster Infection") may defer Booster administration under this subsection for up to 90 days from the date of their first positive COVID-19 test or clinical diagnosis, which in some situations may extend the deadline for receipt of a Booster beyond March 1, 2022. Such Personnel who are not eligible for a Booster by March 1, 2022 must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the timeframe specified in this paragraph for receiving the Booster. Personnel with a deferral due to a proven COVID-19 infection must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of their deferral.

- ii. As of September 30, 2021, Personnel who routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings must have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below. Beginning on March 1, 2022, Personnel who routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings must, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel who are required by this subsection 6(a)(ii) to receive a Booster may use the Recent Pre-Booster Infection deferral described above in subsection 6(a)(i)(3) and must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of the deferral described in that subsection.
- iii. For purposes of this Order, Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time are considered to routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings. Businesses and governmental entities with such Personnel are required to (1) ascertain vaccination status of all such Personnel and (2) ensure that before entering or working in any High-Risk Setting, all such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series with any vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization, unless exempt under subsection (d) below. Additionally, as of September 29, 2021, all such Personnel must have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject



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to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below. And no later than March 1, 2022, Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time—including for example, but not limited to, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, police officers and other law enforcement, and attorneys who enter jail settings or other High-Risk Settings as part of their work—must, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel who are required by this subsection 6(a)(iii) to receive a Booster may use the Recent Pre-Booster Infection deferral described above in subsection 6(a)(i)(3) and must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of the deferral described in that subsection.

For purposes only of this subsection (iii), Businesses and governmental entities that have Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time as provided above, may qualify for a temporary extension beyond the March 1, 2022 deadline for such Personnel to receive a Booster, until no later than April 15, 2022, if they meet both of the following criteria: (1) they determine that there is a critical staffing shortage (determined in writing by the chief executive officer or department head); and (2) they ensure that only such Personnel who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, are free of any COVID-19 symptom, who wear a Well-Fitted Mask, and who have a negative Test in the manner required by subsection (iv)(1) below may continue to work in the High-Risk Setting.

- iv. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must require any Personnel who are exempt or who are otherwise not Up-to-Date on Vaccination (for clarity, the reference to these Personnel means any person who is Booster-Eligible for but not yet received a Booster or who has received a Booster for the seven days after receipt of the Booster before becoming Up-to-Date on Vaccination) to comply with at least the following public health and safety measures:
 - 1. get Tested for COVID-19 at least once a week—and at least twice a week for Personnel who are in general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, and jails—using either a nucleic acid (including polymerase chain reaction (PCR)) or antigen test; and
 - 2. at all times at the worksite in the High-Risk Setting wear a face covering in compliance with the State Public Health Officer Order of July 26, 2021



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("CDPH Vaccination Status Order"), available at https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Unvaccinated-Workers-In-High-Risk-Settings.aspx.

Because of the COVID-19 risks to any exempt Personnel who are not Up-to-Date on Vaccination, the High-Risk Setting must provide such Personnel, on request, with a well-fitting non-vented N95 respirator and strongly encourage such Personnel to wear that respirator at all times when working with patients, residents, clients, or incarcerated people.

Regular testing and masking as required under this Section 6 are not as protective of public health as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination in helping prevent transmission of COVID-19; accordingly, those measures are a minimum safety requirement for exempt Personnel in High-Risk Settings. Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 may require additional safety measures for such Personnel. For example, factors a Business or governmental entity may consider in determining appropriate safety measures for exempt Personnel include, but are not limited to:

- a) Whether the Personnel will place other people at risk of transmission of COVID-19 because they are required to come into contact (including on an emergency basis) with other Personnel or with persons whose vaccination status is unknown, who are not yet eligible for the vaccine, or who are members of a vulnerable population (*e.g.*, the elderly, incarcerated people, and acute care patients);
- b) The type and frequency of testing available to the Personnel and whether the Business or governmental entity has the ability to provide testing to Personnel, without relying on public health resources, and track the requisite testing;
- Whether the Business or governmental entity can ensure compliance with the mask mandate whenever the Personnel are around other people in the workplace; and
- d) Whether the proposed accommodation imposes an undue burden because it is costly, infringes on other Personnel's job rights or benefits, compromises workplace safety, decreases workplace efficiency, or requires other Personnel to do more than their share of potentially hazardous or burdensome work.

Nothing under the Order limits the ability of a Business or governmental entity under applicable law to determine whether they are unable to offer a reasonable accommodation to unvaccinated Personnel with an approved exemption and to exclude such exempt Personnel from a High-Risk

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Setting.

- v. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must, consistent with applicable privacy laws and regulations, maintain records of employee vaccination or exemption status.
- vi. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must provide these records to the Health Officer or other public health authorities promptly upon request, and in any event no later than the next business day after receiving the request.
- vii. This mandated vaccination schedule allows Businesses, governmental entities, and affected Personnel adequate time to comply with this Order. In the interest of protecting residents of High-Risk Settings, Personnel, and their families, Businesses, governmental entities, and affected Personnel are strongly urged to meet these vaccination requirements as soon as possible.

For clarity, this requirement applies to Personnel in other buildings in a site containing a High-Risk Setting, such as a campus or other similar grouping of related buildings, where such Personnel do any of the following: (i) access the acute care or patient, resident, client, or incarcerated person areas of the High-Risk Setting; or (ii) work in-person with patients, residents, clients, or incarcerated people who visit those areas. All people in San Francisco who work in a clinical setting with a population that is more vulnerable to COVID-19 are strongly urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster as soon as Booster-Eligible.

If a person covered by the requirements of this Section 6 to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination recently had COVID-19 when that person would otherwise have been Booster-Eligible based on the period since becoming Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, then that person should try to obtain the Booster as soon as possible at least 10 days after recovering and ending isolation. But to continue working in the High-Risk Setting that person does not need to receive the Booster until 30 days after recovering from infection and discontinuing isolation, unless a healthcare provider recommends in a note that the Booster be delayed for a longer specified period.

b. CDPH Requirements For Adult Care Facilities, Direct Care Workers, Other Health Care Workers, and Pharmacists. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in certain types of facilities and contexts, including those that provide health care, certain other care services, services in congregate settings, and the Personnel who work in those settings must comply with the following CDPH Orders and All Facilities Letters, including as they are updated in the future, which require Personnel of such Businesses and governmental entities to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster when Booster-Eligible, unless exempt under those Orders and All Facilities Letters by the deadlines listed in each order or letter:

- c. <u>Dental Offices</u>. Personnel who provide healthcare in dental offices are considered to provide care in "Clinics & Doctor Offices (including behavioral health, surgical)" under the following CDPH order and must comply with the requirements in that order: "Health Care Worker Vaccine Requirement", updated February 22, 2022, available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Health-Care-Worker-Vaccine-Requirement.aspx.
- d. <u>Limited Exemptions</u>. Personnel covered by this Section 6 may be exempt from the vaccination requirements under this section only upon providing the requesting Business or governmental entity a declination form stating either of the following: (1) the individual is declining vaccination based on Religious Beliefs or (2) the individual is excused from receiving any COVID-19 vaccine due to Qualifying Medical Reasons. A sample ascertainment and declination form is available online at www.sfdph.org/dph/covid-19/files/declination.pdf. As to declinations for Qualifying Medical Reasons, to be eligible for this exemption Personnel must also provide to their employer or the Business a written statement signed by a physician, nurse practitioner, or other licensed medical professional practicing under the license of a physician stating that the individual qualifies for the exemption (but the statement should not describe the underlying medical condition or disability) and indicating the probable duration of the individual's inability to receive the vaccine (or if the duration is unknown or permanent, so indicate). As to declinations based on Religious Beliefs, a Business or governmental entity may seek additional information



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as allowed or required by applicable law to determine whether Personnel have a qualifying Religious Belief. Personnel who qualify for and are granted by the employing Business or governmental entity an exemption due to Religious Beliefs or Qualifying Medical Reasons, as provided above, must still follow at least the minimum health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv), above. Nothing in this Order is intended to limit any Business's or governmental entity's ability under applicable law to determine whether they are able to offer a reasonable accommodation to Personnel with an approved exemption. Because testing and masking is not as effective as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination at preventing the spread of COVID-19, a Business may determine that the minimum requirements in subsection (a)(iv) above are not sufficient to protect the health and safety of people in High-Risk Settings.

- e. <u>Record Keeping Requirements</u>. Businesses or governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must maintain records with following information:
 - For Personnel who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, and also for Personnel where being Up-to-Date on Vaccination is required by this Order:

 full name and date of birth;
 vaccine manufacturer; and
 date of vaccine administration (for first dose and, if applicable, all subsequent doses required by this Order). Nothing in this subsection is intended to prevent an employer from requesting additional information or documentation to verify vaccination status, to the extent permissible under the law.
 - ii. For unvaccinated Personnel: signed declination forms with written health care provider's statement where applicable, as described in subsection (d) above.
- f. Compliance with CDPH Orders. In addition to the requirements set forth above:
 - Until any more health protective requirements in this section take effect, Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in High-Risk Settings must comply with the requirements of the CDPH Vaccination Status Order; and
 - ii. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in adult care facilities and Other Health Care Settings—as that term is defined in the CDPH Vaccination Status Order—must be in full compliance with the requirements of the CDPH Vaccination Status Order.
 - iii. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel who provide services or work in facilities covered by the State Public Health Officer Order of August 5, 2021, updated most recently on February 22, 2022 (titled "Health Care Worker Vaccine Requirement"), must comply with the requirements of that order, including as that order may be amended in the future. See www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Health-Care-Worker-Vaccine-Requirement.aspx.



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- g. Cooperation with Public Health Authorities. Businesses or governmental entities with Personnel subject to this Section 6 must cooperate with Health Officer or DPH requests for records, documents, or other information regarding the Business or governmental entity's implementation of these vaccination requirements. This cooperation includes, but is not limited to, identifying all jobs or positions within the organization and describing: (1) whether a given job or position is subject to the vaccination requirements of this Section 6, (2) how the Business or governmental entity determined a job or position is subject to vaccination requirements of this Section 6, and (3) how the Business or governmental entity is ensuring full compliance with the vaccination requirements set forth in this Section 6. Complete responses to these requests must be provided to the Health Officer or DPH promptly upon request, and in any event within three business days after receiving the request.
- h. <u>Chart</u>. For convenience of reference, a chart summarizing which settings and Personnel are subject to which state and local vaccination requirements is available at https://www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/C19-07-State-and-Local-Mandates-Chart.pdf.

7. Mega-Events.

- a. <u>Compliance with State's Post-Blueprint Guidance.</u> All Businesses, governmental entities, and other organizations hosting Mega-Events, including when held at schools or under Programs for Children and Youth as provided in Section 5 above, must comply with the requirements in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance for indoor Mega-Events, available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Beyond-Blueprint-Framework.aspx, and are strongly urged to follow the recommendations in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance for outdoor Mega-Events.
- b. <u>Vaccine Verification or Negative Test Requirements</u>.
 - Patron Vaccination or Testing Pre-Entry Requirements. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events must require all patrons to show proof, before entering the facility, of either a) being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or b) having had a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. For multi-day indoor Mega-Events, patrons are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart. Patrons age five to 11 (or their parents or guardians) must show for each such child either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. Patrons age two to four (or their parents or guardians) must show for each such child proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility.

Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events may not accept a written self-



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attestation as proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series. For proof of a Test, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at

www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing. And consistent with State rules, operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events are required to cross check proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of negative COVID-19 test, as provided below, for each patron age 18 and up against a photo identification, unless photo identification is integrated into the digital COVID-19 vaccine record. Under no circumstance—including in response to a claim by a patron of an exemption of any kind—is the operator or host of an indoor Mega-Event allowed to admit a patron (except children under age two) who has not shown, as listed in this subsection, proof of either being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or of a negative Test. All patrons are still strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster as soon as eligible.

ii. Staff Vaccination or Testing Pre-Entry Requirements. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events must require all staff to show proof, before entering the facility, of either (1) being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or (2) having a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but staff is not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart). These requirements for staff are subject to any applicable requirements for federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation. All staff are still strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster as soon as eligible.

For clarity, "staff" as used in this Section 7 does not include all individuals included in the broader term "Personnel." Individuals who enter or work in a Mega-Event facility for short periods of time (*e.g.*, individuals who deliver goods or packages) are not covered by the requirements in this Section, but anyone who is present for a single event or who provides setup or post-event services onsite for even part of a day is considered staff and is covered by this Section.

iii. Masking Indoors.

a. <u>Mask Recommendations</u>. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events are strongly recommended to require everyone, and especially anyone who remains Unvaccinated, to continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask indoors, especially when people are indoors with people whose vaccination status is unknown.



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- b. <u>Providing a Well-Fitted Mask</u>. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events are encouraged to provide a Well-Fitted Mask at no cost to people (patrons and Personnel (or staff)) who do not have one upon entry inside the facility.
- c. <u>Signage for Indoor Events</u>. All Businesses, governmental entities, and other organizations hosting indoor Mega-Events must comply with the requirement listed in Section 4(e) above to conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.
- d. <u>Summary Chart</u>. For convenience of reference, a chart summarizing the requirements for Mega-Events is available at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/C19-07-Mega-and-Large-Event-Chart.pdf</u>.
- 8. COVID-19 Health Indicators. The City will continue to make publicly available on its website updated data on COVID-19 case rates, hospitalizations and vaccination rates. That information can be found online at https://sf.gov/resource/2021/covid-19-data-and-reports. The Health Officer will monitor this data, along with other data and scientific evidence, in determining whether to modify or rescind this Order, as further described in Section 2(a) above.
- 9. <u>Incorporation of State and Local Emergency Proclamations and Federal and State Health Orders</u>. The Health Officer is issuing this Order in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the emergency proclamations and other federal, state, and local orders and other pandemic-related orders described below in this Section. But this Order also functions independent of those emergency proclamations and other actions, and if any State, federal, or local emergency declaration, or any State or federal order or other guidance, is repealed, this Order remains in full effect in accordance with its terms (subject to Section 13 below).
 - a. <u>State and Local Emergency Proclamations</u>. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by the Governor, the February 25, 2020 Proclamation by the Mayor Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency, and the March 6, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency Regarding Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) issued by the Health Officer, as each of them have been and may be modified, extended, or supplemented.
 - b. <u>State Health Orders</u>. This Order is also issued in light of the various orders, directives, rules, and regulations of the State, including, but not limited to, those of the State's Public Health Officer and Cal/OSHA. The State has expressly acknowledged that local health officers have authority to establish and implement public health measures within their respective jurisdictions that are more restrictive than those implemented by the State Public Health Officer.
 - c. <u>Federal Orders</u>. This Order is further issued in light of federal emergency declarations and orders, including, but not limited to, the January 20, 2021 Executive



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Order on Protecting the Federal Workforce and Requiring Mask-Wearing, which requires all individuals in Federal buildings and on Federal land to wear masks, maintain physical distance, and adhere to other public health measures, and the February 2, 2021 Order of the CDC, which requires use of masks on public transportation, as each of them may have been and may be modified, extended or supplemented.

10. Obligation to Follow Stricter Requirements of Orders.

Based on local health conditions, this Order includes a limited number of health and safety restrictions that are more stringent or more detailed than those contained under State orders. Where a conflict exists between this Order and any state or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive provision (*i.e.*, the more protective of public health) controls. Consistent with California Health and Safety Code section 131080 and the Health Officer Practice Guide for Communicable Disease Control in California, except where the State Health Officer may issue an order expressly directed at this Order and based on a finding that a provision of this Order constitutes a menace to public health, any more restrictive measures in this Order continue to apply and control in this County.

11. Obligation to Follow Health Officer Orders and Directives and Mandatory State Guidance.

In addition to complying with all provisions of this Order, all individuals and entities, including all Businesses and governmental entities, must also follow any applicable orders and directives issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/healthorders and www.sfdph.org/healthorders and www.sfdph.org/directives) and any applicable mandatory guidance issued by the State Health Officer or California Department of Public Health. To the extent that provisions in the orders or directives of the Health Officer and the mandatory guidance of the State conflict, the more restrictive provisions (i.e., the more protective of public health) apply. In the event of a conflict between provisions of any previously-issued Health Officer order or directive and this Order, this Order controls over the conflicting provisions of the other Health Officer order or directive.

12. Enforcement.

Under Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, the Health Officer requests that the Sheriff and the Chief of Police in the County ensure compliance with and enforce this Order. The violation of any provision of this Order (including, without limitation, any health directives) constitutes an imminent threat and immediate menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. DPH is authorized to respond to such public nuisances by issuing Notice(s) of Violation and ordering premises vacated and closed until the owner, tenant, or manager submits a written plan to eliminate all violations and DPH finds that plan satisfactory. Such Notice(s) of Violation and orders to vacate and



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close may be issued based on a written report made by any City employees writing the report within the scope of their duty. DPH must give notice of such orders to vacate and close to the Chief of Police or the Chief's designee to be executed and enforced by officers in the same manner as provided by San Francisco Health Code section 597. As a condition of allowing a Business to reopen, DPH may impose additional restrictions and requirements on the Business as DPH deems appropriate to reduce transmission risks, beyond those required by this Order and other applicable health orders and directives.

13. Effective Date.

This Order is effective at 12:01 a.m. on June 15, 2021 and will continue, as updated, to be in effect until the Health Officer rescinds, supersedes, or amends it in writing. The changes made in the March 2, 2022 update are effective immediately on issuance, and the changes regarding masking in indoor settings (other than for TK-12 schools) listed in this Order are retroactive to March 1, 2022.

14. Relation to Other Orders of the San Francisco Health Officer.

Immediately on issuance this Order revises and entirely replaces the prior update to Health Officer Order No. C19-07y (issued February 14, 2022). Leading up to and in connection with the effective date of this Order, the Health Officer has rescinded a number of other orders and directives relating to COVID-19, including those listed in the Health Officer's Omnibus Rescission of Health Officer Orders and Directives, dated June 11, 2021. On and after the effective date of this Order, the following orders and directives of the Health Officer shall continue in full force and effect: Order Nos. C19-16 (hospital patient data sharing), C19-18 (vaccine data reporting), C19-19 (minor consent to vaccination), and C19-20 (test collection sites); and the directives that this Order references in Sections 3 and 5, as the Health Officer may separately amend or later terminate any of them. Health Officer Order No. C19-15 was also reinstated on August 19, 2021, and remains in effect as outlined in that order (including as it is amended in the future). Also, this Order also does not alter the end date of any other Health Officer order or directive having its own end date or that continues indefinitely.

15. Copies.

The County must promptly provide copies of this Order as follows: (1) by posting on the DPH website (www.sfdph.org/healthorders); (2) by posting at City Hall, located at 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Pl., San Francisco, CA 94102; and (3) by providing to any member of the public requesting a copy.

16. Severability.

If a court holds any provision of this Order or its application to any person or circumstance to be invalid, then the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall



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continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.

[March 2, 2022]

1. <u>General Recommendation to Wear a Well-Fitted Mask; Requirement in Limited Indoor Settings.</u>

The intent of this Order and the masking rules in this Appendix is to align with the masking rules and recommendations issued by the State of California and the federal government, with this Appendix providing additional information for specific situations to help Businesses, governmental entities, and individuals comply with those rules and recommendations and make informed choices to improve safety during the pandemic.

Everyone, including even people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (meaning they have completed their initial course of vaccination and have received a Booster once eligible for a Booster, as further defined in Section 1 of the body of the Order), is strongly recommended, for the time being, to continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in indoor public settings where they are not otherwise required to do so, subject to the exemptions and allowances in Sections 4 through 7, below. Additional Face Covering Requirements may be imposed elsewhere in this Order or by state or federal rules or regulations.

Also, everyone is required to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, regardless of vaccination status, in the following indoor settings: public transit; TK-12 schools and childcare (through March 11, 2022, consistent with State rules, as provided in associated directives issued by the Health Officer); emergency shelters and cooling and heating centers; High-Risk Settings (as defined in Section 1 of the Order); health care and other long-term care and adult and senior care facilities where masking is required by regulatory orders and rules; and anywhere else that federal or state health orders require doing so, as described in Section 3(b)(i) of the Order and this Appendix.

Employees may be subject to additional restrictions or be required to provide additional documentation under state or federal laws and regulations, including Cal/OSHA's regulations. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html.

And as provided in Section 8 below, individual Businesses, governmental entities, or venue operators or hosts may impose requirements regarding masking, in addition to those in this Order, that are more protective of public health.

2. Ventilation.

Businesses and operators of other public and private facilities where people may remove their Well-Fitted Masks indoors are encouraged to use at least one of the following ventilation strategies: (1) all available windows and doors accessible to fresh outdoor air are kept open as long as air quality and weather conditions permit; (2) fully operational

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HVAC system; or (3) appropriately sized portable air cleaners in each room. For clarity, if windows and doors are closed due to air quality or weather conditions, then a Business or operator of a public or private facility should whenever feasible follow at least one of remaining ventilation strategies before allowing people to remove their Well-Fitted Masks under this Order.

3. Proof of Vaccination.

Businesses, governmental entities, and other venue operators or hosts are encouraged to require people to provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (including receipt of a Booster once Booster-Eligible) before allowing people to remove their Well-Fitted Mask indoors (subject to the limitations on mask removal set forth in Sections 5 through 7, below). And as provided in the Order, each Business, governmental entity, and other entity that is required to confirm proof of being Vaccinated with the Complete Initial Series is strongly urged to implement measures as soon as possible to require its patrons and staff (as distinct from Personnel) to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including requiring them to show proof of receipt of a Booster once they are eligible.

Despite the easing of masking requirements under this update to the Order, Businesses, governmental entities, and other venue operators or hosts may still require all patrons to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in their facilities. And no person can be prevented from wearing a Well-Fitted Mask as a condition of participation in an activity or entry into a Business.

- 4. <u>Status-Based Exemptions</u>. The following exemptions apply in the limited situations where Well-Fitted Masks are still required under this Order.
 - a. Medical or Safety Exemption. A person does not need to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when they can show: (1) a medical professional has provided a written exemption to the Face Covering Requirement, based on the person's medical condition, other health concern, or disability; or (2) that they are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication; or (3) wearing a Well-Fitted Mask while working would create a risk to the person related to their work as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines. In accordance with CDPH and CDC guidelines, if a person is required by this Order to wear a Well-Fitted Mask but is exempt from wearing one under this paragraph, they still must wear an alternative face covering, such as a face shield with a drape on the bottom edge, unless they can show either: (1) a medical professional has provided a written exemption to this alternative face covering requirement, based on the person's medical condition, other health concern, or disability; or (2) wearing an alternative face covering while working would create a risk to the person related to their work as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.

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A Well-Fitted Mask should also not be used by anyone who has trouble breathing or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the Well-Fitted Mask without assistance.

- b. Children. In accordance with CDPH and CDC guidelines, any child younger than two years old must not wear a Well-Fitted Mask because of the risk of suffocation. When required to do so by this Order, Children age two to nine years must wear Well-Fitted Masks to the greatest extent feasible. Children age two to nine years may wear an alternative face covering (as that term is described in Section 4(a), above) if their parent or caregiver determines it will improve the child's ability to comply with this Order. Children age two to nine and their accompanying parents or caregivers should not be refused any essential service based on a child's inability to wear a Well-Fitted Mask (for example, if a four-year old child refuses to keep a Well-Fitted Mask on in a grocery store), but the parent or caregiver should when possible take reasonable steps to have the child, when required to do so by this Order, wear a Well-Fitted Mask to protect others and minimize instances when children without Well-Fitted Masks are brought into settings with other people. Parents and caregivers of children age two to nine years must supervise the use of Well-Fitted Masks to ensure safety and avoid misuse. Children must wear face coverings in schools as required under State health rules.
- c. Personal Protective Equipment. A person required by this Order to wear a Well-Fitted Mask does not need to do so when wearing personal protective equipment ("PPE") that is more protective than a Well-Fitted Mask, including when required by (i) any workplace policy or (ii) any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or other mandatory guidance. When a person is not required to wear such PPE and in an indoor public setting, they must wear a Well-Fitted Mask or PPE that is more protective unless otherwise exempted under this Order.

5. <u>Activity- and Location-Based Exemptions.</u>

The activity- and location-based exemptions in this Section apply to everyone in the designated settings where this Order requires everyone, regardless of vaccination status, to wear a Well-Fitted Mask. To the extent allowed under Face Covering Requirements and subject to any additional health restrictions a particular Business, governmental entity, or other venue operator or host may impose for a facility or other setting it owns, operates, or controls, people in settings where this Order requires wearing a Well-Fitted Mask are not required do so in any of the following situations:

a. <u>Indoor Public Setting While Alone or With a Member of Household</u>. A person does not need to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when they are alone or with a member of their Household in a public building or completely enclosed space such as an office, <u>and</u> people who are not part of their Household are not likely to be in the same space. If someone who is not part of a person's Household enters the enclosed space, both people

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must wear a Well-Fitted Mask for the duration of the interaction unless otherwise exempt under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix.

- b. <u>Active Eating and Drinking</u>. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask while actively eating or drinking.
- c. <u>Showering, Personal Hygiene, or Sleeping</u>. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask only while showering or actively engaging in personal hygiene that requires removal of the Well-Fitted Mask. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask while sleeping in indoor public settings.

6. <u>Covered Businesses (Appendix B)</u>.

Covered Businesses described in Section 4(a)(i) of the Order and defined Appendix B (e.g., restaurants, bars, gyms and fitness facilities, theaters, clubs, and entertainment venues) are, for the time being, still required to check for proof of vaccination or Testing status for all patrons and staff before entry (or soon thereafter as allowed by Appendix B). Separate from those requirements, people are not required under this Order to wear Well-Fitted Masks while inside Covered Businesses. But, Covered Businesses may adopt requirements that are more protective of public health than this Order requires for their individual facilities as further provided below.

7. Other Businesses and Governmental Facilities.

Businesses, governmental entities, and other operators or hosts of indoor public settings (including Covered Businesses referenced in Section 6 above) may, but are not required to, adopt rules allowing patrons to remove their Well-Fitted Masks. As further provided in Section 8 below, they can also adopt requirements that are more protective of public health that meet their operational needs.

8. Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures.

This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to indoor masking. Nothing in this Order, including this Appendix A, is intended to reduce any other federal, state, or local legal requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual Business' or governmental entity's choices to take more health protective measures. Businesses or governmental entities may impose further restrictions that are more protective of public health than the minimum requirements under this Order, including, without limitation, requiring patrons or Personnel to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, requiring them to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, or taking other measures that meet their operational needs (such as, by way of example only, mandating that people be Up-to-Date on Vaccination and only allowing a testing alterative if someone has an exemption to vaccination based on Religious Beliefs or a Qualifying Medical Reason.)

Order No. C19-07y – Appendix B: Proof of Vaccination or Negative Testing Requirements

[March 2, 2022]

1. <u>Covered Businesses</u>.

For purposes of this Appendix B, "Covered Businesses" include:

- a. Operators/hosts of establishments or events where food or drink is served indoors—including, but not limited to, dining establishments, bars, clubs, theaters, and entertainment venues. For clarity, this does not include food or drink provided as part of a religious ceremony (*e.g.*, communion or kiddush).
- b. Gyms, recreation facilities, yoga studios, dance studios, and other fitness establishments, where any patrons engage in cardiovascular, aerobic, strength training, or other exercise involving elevated breathing. For clarity, fitness establishments and activities that are part of a K-12 school or operate as a Program for Children and Youth are covered by separate sector-specific directives (available at www.sfdph.org/directives) and are not subject to the requirements of this Appendix B.

2. Vaccination or Testing Requirement for Patrons of Covered Businesses.

a. Requirement. For the time being, Covered Businesses must continue to require all patrons age 12 and older to show proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series before entering any indoor portion of a facility, subject only to the Testing alternative in this Section 2 and any applicable requirements of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation. Boosters are not required. But Covered Businesses are strongly urged to require all patrons to show proof that they are Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster by patrons age 12 and older as soon as eligible, before entering any indoor portion of a facility, subject only to the exceptions below and any applicable requirement of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation.

For purposes of showing proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, Covered Businesses may not accept a written self-attestation. The following are the only acceptable proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series:

- (1) the CDC vaccination card, which includes name of person vaccinated, type of vaccine provided, and date last dose administered, or similar documentation issued by another foreign governmental jurisdiction;
- (2) a photo or copy of a vaccination card as a separate document;
- (3) a photo of a vaccination card stored on a phone or electronic device;
- (4) documentation of vaccination from a healthcare provider; or
- (5) a personal digital COVID-19 vaccine record issued by the State of California

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and available by going to https://myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov or similar documentation issued by another state, local, or foreign governmental jurisdiction, or by an approved private company (a list of approved companies offering digital vaccine cards is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/vaccine-verification-sites.asp).

Covered Businesses are required to cross-check proof of vaccination status for each patron against a photo identification, unless photo identification is integrated into the digital COVID-19 vaccine record.

As an alternative to checking proof of vaccination status for patrons and staff, operators of such Covered Businesses are allowed, but not required by this Order, to instead accept proof of a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but people are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart).

For purposes of showing proof of a Test as required in the preceding paragraph, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Covered Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing.

b. Exceptions and Clarifications.

- i. For clarity, individuals who are Unvaccinated (*i.e.*, who do not provide proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series) may, without being required to show proof of a negative Test, use the outdoor portions of Covered Business facilities (but not the indoor portions except solely as provided in subsections (ii), (iii), and (v) below).
- ii. Covered Businesses may allow Unvaccinated patrons to come indoors to use a restroom.
- iii. Dining establishments and bars may require proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test to be shown at the time of patrons' first in-person interaction with staff (*e.g.*, at the time of ordering) rather than at the entrance to the establishment. Dining establishments and bars are prohibited from serving any patron indoors who fails to provide this proof.
- iv. Theaters where concessions are sold may require proof of being Vaccinated

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with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test to be shown at the time of patrons' purchase of concessions rather than at the entrance to the establishment. Theaters are prohibited from selling food or beverages to any patron indoors who fails to provide this proof.

- v. Dining establishments and bars that serve food may allow people to enter the indoor portion of the facility to order, pick up, or pay for food or drink "to go" without showing either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative Test.
- vi. Businesses may obtain proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and proof of a negative Test in advance of a patron's arrival at a facility, *e.g.*, by email or through a reservation system, but must confirm identification and timing of the negative Test at the time of entry into the facility.
- vii. Businesses operating food courts in indoor shopping centers that offer seated dining are required to obtain proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test for patrons who eat at the food court, and such proof may be shown at the time of patrons' purchase of food or beverages rather than at the entrance to the dining area. Businesses are prohibited from selling food or beverages to any patron for consumption at the food court who fails to provide this proof.
- viii. Individuals hosting private events in their homes are not subject to the requirements of this Appendix B but are urged to consider requiring <u>all</u> guests age five and older to show proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test, particularly if the guests include people who may be medically vulnerable.
- 3. <u>Vaccination Requirement for Staff of Covered Businesses.</u>
 - a. <u>Requirements</u>. Subject to the exceptions below and any applicable requirements of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation:
 - i. Covered Businesses must use their best efforts to ascertain either the vaccination status or proof of a negative Test of all staff who routinely work onsite. A sample Employee Vaccination Program Ascertainment Form is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/covid-19/files/declination.pdf.
 - ii. Covered Businesses must ensure that all staff who routinely work onsite provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test before entering or working in any indoor portion of the facility.

- iii. Boosters are not required for staff. But Covered Businesses are strongly urged to ensure that all staff who routinely work onsite provide proof that they are Upto-Date on Vaccination before entering or working in any indoor portion of the facility.
- iv. Consistent with applicable privacy laws and regulations, Covered Businesses must maintain records of staff vaccination or exemption status, and provide these records to the Health Officer or other public health authorities promptly upon request, and in any event no later than the next business day after receiving the request.
- v. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html. At the time of the issuance of the current update to this Order, those regulations require employers to document the vaccination status of their staff (*i.e.*, no self-attestation).

b. Exceptions and Clarifications.

i. For clarity, "staff" as used in this order does not include all individuals included in the broader term "Personnel." Individuals who enter or work in a Covered Business facility on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time (*e.g.*, individuals who deliver goods or packages) are not covered by the requirements in this Appendix B.

4. <u>Signage</u>.

All Covered Businesses are required to conspicuously post signage as provided in Section 4(e) of the Order. That signage must include any rules specific to the Covered Business regarding pre-entry vaccination or Testing requirements (such as listing a requirement for entry that patrons be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including a Booster when Booster-Eligible, and whether a negative Test is allowed instead of being vaccinated).

5. Indoor Mega-Events.

The vaccination or testing requirements for entry to indoor Mega-Events, which align with State health rules under the State's Post Blueprint Guidance, are covered in Section 7 of the Order.

6. Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures.

This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to vaccination requirements for

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO

ENCOURAGING COVID-19 VACCINE COVERAGE AND REDUCING DISEASE RISKS (Safer Return Together)

DATE OF ORDER: June 11, 2021, updated July 8, 2021, July 20, 2021, August 2, 2021, August 12, 2021, August 24, 2021, September 10, 2021, October 13, 2021, December 14, 2021, December 29, 2021, January 10, 2022, January 26, 2022, and February 14, 2022, and March 2, 2022

NOTE (REVISED FEBRUARY 14, 2022) On February 7, 2022, the State of California issued revisions to its COVID-19 orders related to the use of face masks indoors (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/guidance-for-face-coverings.aspx) and to the thresholds for mega-events (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Beyond-Blueprint-Framework.aspx). Under these revised rules, universal indoor masking is no longer required in California for most public settings, although masking is still required in public indoor settings for anyone who has not completed their full initial vaccine series, and the definition of indoor and outdoor mega-events was adjusted back to the definition used before the surge associated with the Omicron variant.

NOTE (REVISED MARCH 2, 2022) On February 28, 2022 Governor Newsom announced that California, along with Washington and Oregon, will stop requiring masks inside K-12 schools after March 11, 2022. Also, beginning March 1, 2022 California will no longer require that unvaccinated individuals wear masks in most indoor public settings. The State still strongly recommends that everyone wear masks indoors while in public. The update to this Order includes changes to conform San Francisco's local rules regarding masking indoors and mega-events.to these newly-announced changes. Additionally, the update to this Order makes other important changes, including further alignment with State heath rules.

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295, et seq.; California Penal Code §§ 69, 148(a)(1); and San Francisco Administrative Code § 7.17(b).)

<u>Summary</u>: As of <u>February 16March 2</u>, 2022, this Order replaces the prior update of this health order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07y (issued <u>January 26February 14</u>, 2022), in its entirety.



ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. C19-07y (updated)

The Health Officer is updating the Order in light of the recent changes to State guidelines and the decreasing (though still high) number of cases in the community and lower number of hospitalizations associated with the spread in San Francisco and the Bay Area region of the Omicron variant of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. Still, there remains the ongoing threat that the virus poses to the health of vulnerable residents and also potentially to the capacity of San Francisco's healthcare system. Current evidence indicates that the Omicron variant is much more transmissible than Delta and other variants of the virus, and that individuals who have had only their initial vaccine series are susceptible to the Omicron variant. Medical data to date also show that individuals who have received a booster shot increase their immunity to a level that confers significantly more protection from all circulating SARS-CoV-2 variants, including the Omicron variant, and generally prevents severe disease. The United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the California Department of Public Health now recommend that everyone who has been vaccinated receive a booster shot as soon as they are eligible because immunity wanes several months after completion of the initial vaccine series. And the CDC and CDPH recommend that people receive the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna booster if they can.

Vaccination remains a critical component in preventing COVID-19 and its associated health harms. Individuals who have not received their initial vaccine series or a booster shot are more likely to become infected and spread infection to others, and more likely to become seriously ill and die. It is critical that community members receive their initial vaccine series and booster shots when eligible to maintain the protective effect of the high community-wide vaccination rates in San Francisco.

Even though a high percentage of people are vaccinated in San Francisco and the Bay Area region against the virus that causes COVID-19 and an increasing percentage are boosted, there remains a risk that people may come into contact with others who have COVID-19 when outside their residence. Many COVID-19 infections are caused by people who have no symptoms of illness. Also, there are people in San Francisco who have not completed their initial vaccine series or who are not yet eligible to receive a booster, including children under five years old, and people who are immunocompromised and may be particularly vulnerable to infection and disease. Everyone who is eligible, including people at risk for severe illness with COVID-19—such as unvaccinated older adults and unvaccinated individuals with health risks—and members of their households, are strongly urged to get vaccinated and receive their booster as soon as they can if they have not already done so.

Further, to address the continuing number of cases and hospitalizations due to the Omicron variant as well as the risk of future variants, and consistent Consistent with CDPH orders requiring vaccination and boosters for most healthcare workers, the Health Officer has determined that all people working in designated high-risk settings be both vaccinated and boosted as soon as they are eligible. People working in these high-risk settings (1) can expose highly vulnerable people who are at increased risk of severe illness and death to COVID-19, (2) must therefore be protected from COVID-19 to the maximum extent possible to ensure adequate staffing in these critical settings, and



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(3) particularly for jails, shelters, and skilled nursing facilities, can cause large outbreaks if workers are infected.

Accordingly, this Order imposes a requirement, layered on top of the recently revised CDPH health orders, for (1) personnel working in designated high-risk settings meaning general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, residential care facilities for the elderly, homeless shelters, and jails, all as further defined below—as well as (2) personnel working in other higher-risk settings including adult care facilities, adult day programs, dental offices, home health care workers, and pharmacists, and (3) personnel who visit higher-risk settings as part of the work, such as paramedics, emergency medical technicians, police officers, and lawyers who visit people in the jails—to both receive the full initial course of vaccination and, once they are eligible, to receive a booster. Businesses and governmental entities with personnel in these high-risk settings have until March 1, 2022 to comply with the booster verification requirement, meaning those who are eligible to receive a booster on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their booster by March 1, 2022. And those who are eligible for a booster after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel working in high-risk settings who are eligible for a booster and have not yet received one must be tested once or twice a week for COVID-19, depending on the setting, and provide proof of a negative test, until one week after they receive a booster. For Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to High-Risk Settings but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time (such as police, firefighters, paramedics and emergency medical technicians), the deadline for receipt of a Booster is also March 1, 2022, but employers of such Personnel can extend that deadline subject to certain health precautions until April 15, 2022 due to critical staffing shortages.

On February 728, 2022, CDPH updated its order regarding the requirement to wear a face covering indoors, eliminating its "universal" face covering requirement for individuals in most indoor public settings and returning to the pre-Omicron surge requirements that anyone who is unvaccinated and two years or older to wear a mask in those settings.face covering requirement for unvaccinated individuals in most indoor public settings, maintaining a strong recommendation that everyone, regardless of vaccination status, wear a mask in indoor public settings and businesses, and listing settings where masking is still required of everyone, regardless of vaccination status. The list of settings where masking is still required by CDPH includes: K-12 schools and childcare (through March 11, 2022); on public transit (at least through March 18, 2022); in emergency shelters and cooling centers; in healthcare settings; in state and local correctional facilities and detention centers; in homeless shelters; and in long term care settings and adult and senior care facilities. A copy of the updated CDPH masking order is available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/guidance-for-facecoverings.aspx. This Order has been updated to largely align with the newupdated CDPH masking rules, while maintaining local requirements in certain areas and including strongly encouraging, at least for the time being everyone, even people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date On Vaccination, to continue



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wearing masks in indoor public settings where they are not otherwise required. Operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events, as well as the operators of other indoor facilities that continue to have proof of vaccination or testing requirements (like gyms, bars, and restaurants) are allowed, but not required, beginning February 16, 2022 to align with the State's rule for indoor masking. That change means people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination may remove their Well-Fitted Masks, though for the time being the Health Officer still recommends that even vaccinated people continue to wear Well-Fitted Masks in public indoor settings to align with the State's rule allowing mask removal indoors. Also, particularly in light of the Omicron variant and risk of future variants, the Health Officer continues to recommend that whenever possible everyone wear a non-vented respirator, such as an N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator, when wearing a mask. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. Finally, the Order maintains face covering requirements in other settings such as public transit, K-12 schools and childcare, as well as health care facilities, skilled nursing facilities, homeless shelters, and jails, consistent with federal and state rules.

This Order includes requirements related to entry to certain indoor gatherings of different types. For indoor Mega-Events, consistent with State rules, patrons must show proof they either are vaccinated as required by the Order (including for most adults to be Up to Date on Vaccination, including having a Booster once Booster-Eligible Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series) or have a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. Consistent with CDPH rules, self-administered antigen tests are not acceptable for pre-admission testing unless there is third-party verification. Staff of indoor Mega-Events are subject to the same rules as for patrons. Also, Businesses patrons of businesses that operate indoor gyms, other fitness centers, bars, restaurants, and certain other facilities are allowed to acceptmust provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or of a negative Test (or a religious and medical exemption to vaccination for patrons and staff/personnel, subject to certain health protections, including providing proof of a negative COVID-19 test), before entry (but people are not required to be tested more than twice each week so long as each test is done at least three days apart). This Order also includes a number of recommendations—but not requirements—for individuals, businesses, and governmental entities to reduce COVID-19 risk, including the strong recommendation everyone be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including Boosters, and a recommendation to post signage regarding COVID-19 best practices and any vaccination or masking rules imposed by a business or entity. Indoor Mega-Events and Businesses that operate gyms, other fitness centers, bars, restaurants, and certain other facilities are still required to post signage at public entrances listing their pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

And this Order maintains other minimum COVID-19 safety requirements on businesses and governmental entities, such as a general requirement to report positive cases in the workplace and in schools, and limited requirements for signage for patrons that apply to certain indoor businesses.—outbreaks in the workplace.



ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. C19-07y (updated)

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO ORDERS:

1. Definitions.

For purposes of this Order, the following initially capitalized terms have the meanings given below.

- a. *Booster*. A "Booster" means an additional dose of a vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization (WHO), for which a person is Booster-Eligible. Consistent with CDC and CDPH guidance, either the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine is preferred for the Booster.
- b. Booster-Eligible. A person is "Booster-Eligible" once they meet criteria to receive a Booster under CDC guidance. For example, as of the date of issuance of this update to the Order, individuals who are 18 or older may receive a booster of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty), Moderna (Spikevax), or Johnson & Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine at least five months after receiving a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine or two months after receiving the single dose Johnson & Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine, and adolescents who are 12 to 17 years old may receive a booster of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine at least five months after their second dose of that vaccine. Consistent with CDC guidance (available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019ncov/vaccines/booster-shot.html), anyone who received a WHO-authorized vaccine or a combination of vaccines should receive the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) vaccine as their booster pursuant to the timing listing in that guidance. Those preferences apply to all initial vaccination series, regardless of which vaccine an individual received. The CDC has been frequently updating booster eligibility. More up-to-date information on booster eligibility may be found online at www.sfcdcp.org/boosters, and individuals, Businesses, and governmental entities are urged to stay informed about changes.
- c. *Business*. A "Business" includes any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entity, whether a corporate entity, organization, partnership or sole proprietorship, and regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.
- d. *Cal/OSHA*. "Cal/OSHA" means the California Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Occupational Safety and Health, better known as Cal/OSHA.
- e. *CDC*. "CDC" means the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- f. CDPH. "CDPH" means the California Department of Public Health.



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- g. Close Contact. "Close Contact" means being within six feet of a Person With COVID-19 for a total of 15 minutes or more in a 24-hour period while the person is contagious. In turn, a "Person With COVID-19" means a person who tests positive for the virus that causes COVID-19 (SARS-CoV-2) or has been clinically diagnosed with COVID-19 by a healthcare provider. A person is no longer considered a Person With COVID-19 once all of the following occur: (a) at least one day (i.e., 24 hours) has passed since their last fever (without use of fever-reducing medications), and (b) there has been improvement of other symptoms, and (c) at least five days have passed since symptoms first appeared. A person who tested positive for COVID-19 but never had symptoms is no longer considered a Person With COVID-19 five days after the date of their first positive test. The person is considered contagious if they either (i) had symptoms, from 48 hours before their symptoms began until at least five days after the start of symptoms, or (ii) did not have symptoms but learned they were COVID-19 positive from a test, from 48 hours before their COVID-19 test was collected until five days after they were tested.
- h. County. The "County" means the City and County of San Francisco.
- i. *COVID-19*. "COVID-19" means coronavirus disease 2019, the disease caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus and that resulted in a global pandemic.
- j. *DPH*. "DPH" means the San Francisco Department of Public Health.
- k. *DPH Core Guidance*. "DPH Core Guidance" means the webpage and related materials titled *Core Guidance for COVID-19* that DPH regularly updates and includes health and safety recommendations for individuals and Businesses as well as web links to additional resources, available online at sf.gov/core-guidance-covid-19.
- 1. Face Covering Requirements. "Face Covering Requirements" means the limited
 requirements to wear a Well-Fitted Mask (i) under federal or state law including, but
 not limited to, California Department of Public Health guidance and Cal/OSHA's
 regulations; (ii) in indoor common areas of homeless shelters, emergency shelters, and
 cooling centers, except while sleeping, showering, engaged in personal hygiene that
 requires removal of face coverings, or actively eating or drinking; (iii) in indoor
 common areas of jails except while sleeping, showering, engaged in personal hygiene
 that requires removal of face coverings, or actively eating or drinking; and (iv) under
 Section 3(b), below and Appendix A, attached to the Order. If a separate state, local,
 or federal order or directive imposes different face covering requirements, including
 requirements to wear respirators or surgical masks in certain settings, the more health
 protective requirement applies.
- m. FDA. "FDA" means the United States Food and Drug Administration.
- n. Fully Vaccinated. "Fully Vaccinated" has the same meaning as the newer term "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series," defined below. Because other pre-existing Health Officer orders and directives and other DPH or County guidance



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materials may still use the term Fully Vaccinated that term continues to be defined in this Order.

- o. *Health Officer*. "Health Officer" means the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco.
- p. *High-Risk Settings*. "High-Risk Settings" means certain care or living settings involving many people, including many congregate settings, where vulnerable populations reside out of necessity and where the risk of COVID-19 transmission is high, consisting of general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities (including subacute facilities), intermediate care facilities, residential care facilities for the elderly, homeless shelters, and jails (including, but not limited to, the Juvenile Justice Center Juvenile Hall).
- q. *Household*. "Household" means people living in a single Residence or shared living unit. Households do not refer to individuals who live together in an institutional group living situation such as in a dormitory, fraternity, sorority, monastery, convent, or residential care facility.
- r. *Mega-Event*. "Mega-Event" means an event with either more than 1,000 people attending indoors or more than 10,000 people attending outdoors. As provided in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance, a Mega-Event may have either assigned or unassigned seating, and may be either general admission or gated, ticketed and permitted events.
- s. *Personnel*. "Personnel" means the following people who provide goods or services associated with a Business in the County: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the Business); independent contractors; vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the Business. "Personnel" includes "gig workers" who perform work via the Business's app or other online interface, if any.
- t. *Qualifying Medical Reason*. "Qualifying Medical Reason" means a medical condition or disability recognized by the FDA or CDC as a contra-indication to COVID-19 vaccination.
- u. *Religious Beliefs*. "Religious Beliefs" means a sincerely held religious belief, practice, or observance protected by state or federal law.
- v. *Residence*. "Residence" means the location a person lives, even if temporarily, and includes single-family homes, apartment units, condominium units, hotels, motels, shared rental units, and similar facilities. Residences also include living structures and outdoor spaces associated with those living structures, such as patios, porches, backyards, and front yards that are only accessible to a single family or Household.



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- w. *Schools*. "Schools" mean public and private schools operating in the County, including independent, parochial, and charter schools.
- x. State's Post-Blueprint Guidance. The "State's Post-Blueprint Guidance" means the guidance entitled "Beyond the Blueprint for Industry and Business Sectors" that the California Department of Public Health issued on May 21, 2021 and updated as of February 7, 2022, including as the State may further extend, update or supplement that guidance in the future. (See www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Beyond-Blueprint-Framework.aspx.)
- y. *Test* and *Tested*. "Tested" means to have a negative test (a "Test") for the virus that causes COVID-19 within the applicable timeframe as listed in this Order. Both nucleic acid (including polymerase chain reaction (PCR)) and antigen tests are acceptable. The following are acceptable as proof of a negative COVID-19 test result: a printed document (from the test provider or laboratory) or an email, text message, webpage, or application (app) screen displayed on a phone or mobile device from the test provider or laboratory. The information should include person's name, type of test performed, negative test result, and date the test was administered. If any state or federal agency uses a more restrictive definition of what it means to be Tested for specified purposes (such as Cal/OSHA rules for employers in workplaces), then that more restrictive definition controls for those purposes. Some sections of this Order require antigen tests to be third-party verified (meaning administered or observed by the third-party) to meet requirements for showing proof of a negative Test.
- z. Unvaccinated. "Unvaccinated" refers to a person age two or older who is eligible for COVID-19 vaccination and who is either (i) not at least Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or (ii) in an indoor setting where this Order requires proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series as a condition of entry but has not provided such proof.
- aa. *Up-to-Date on Vaccination*. "Up-to-Date on Vaccination" means when a person both (i) is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and (ii) has received a Booster once the person is Booster-Eligible. A person is Up-to-Date on Vaccination immediately on receipt of a Booster. Until a person is Booster-Eligible, they are considered Up-to-Date on Vaccination two weeks after completing their full initial series of vaccination.
- bb. Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series. "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series" means two weeks after completing the entire recommended initial series of vaccination (usually one or two doses) with a vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization (WHO). For example, as of the date of issuance of this Order, an individual has completed an initial vaccination series at least two weeks after receiving a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) or Moderna (Spikevax) COVID-19 vaccine or two weeks after receiving the single dose Johnson & Johnson's



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Janssen COVID-19 vaccine. A list of FDA-authorized vaccines is available at www.fda.gov/emergency-preparedness-and-response/coronavirus-disease-2019-covid-19/covid-19-vaccines. A list of WHO-authorized vaccines is available at https://extranet.who.int/pqweb/vaccines/covid-19-vaccines. On August 23, 2021, the FDA granted full approval for the Pfizer-BioNTech (Comirnaty) vaccine for people age 16 and older, and on January 31, 2022, the FDA granted full approval for the Moderna (Spikevax) vaccine for people age 18 and older. And, on October 29, 2021, the FDA granted emergency use authorization for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine for children age five to 11.

Unless otherwise specified, the following are acceptable as proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination: (i) the CDC vaccination card, which includes name of person vaccinated, type of vaccine provided, and date last dose administered, or similar documentation issued by another foreign governmental jurisdiction, (ii) a photo of a vaccination card as a separate document, (iii) a photo of the a vaccination card stored on a phone or electronic device, (iv) documentation of vaccination from a healthcare provider, (v) unless prohibited elsewhere in this Order in a specific context, written self-attestation of vaccination signed (including an electronic signature) under penalty of perjury and containing the name of the person vaccinated, type of vaccine taken, and date of last dose administered, or (vi) a personal digital COVID-19 vaccine record issued by the State of California and available by going to https://myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov or similar documentation issued by another State, local, or foreign governmental jurisdiction, or by an approved private company (a list of approved companies offering digital vaccine verification is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/vaccine-verification-sites.asp). If any state or federal agency uses a more restrictive definition of what it means to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or to prove that status for specified purposes (such as Cal/OSHA rules for employers in workplaces), then that more restrictive definition controls for those purposes. Also, to the extent Cal/OSHA approves an alternate means of documenting whether an employee has completed the full initial series or is "fully vaccinated," even if less restrictive than the definition contained here, employers may use the Cal/OSHA standard to document their employees' vaccination status.

- cc. Ventilation Guidelines. "Ventilation Guidelines" means ventilation guidance from recognized authorities such as the CDC, the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers, or the State of California (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Interim-Guidance-for-Ventilation-Filtration-and-Air-Quality-in-Indoor-Environments.aspx), including Cal/OSHA.
- dd. Well-Fitted Mask. A "Well-Fitted Mask" means a face covering that is well-fitted to an individual and covers the nose and mouth especially while talking, consistent with the Face Covering Requirements. CDC guidance regarding Well-Fitted Masks may be found at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/effective-masks.html.



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A well-fitting non-vented N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator is strongly recommended as a Well-Fitted Mask, even if not fit-tested, to provide maximum protection. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. Given higher transmissibility of the Omicron variant, cloth masks alone are no longer recommended. A Well-Fitted Mask does not include a scarf, ski mask, balaclava, bandana, turtleneck, collar, or single layer of fabric or any mask that has an unfiltered one-way exhaust valve.

2. Purpose and Intent.

- a. <u>Purpose</u>. The public health threat of serious illness or death from COVID-19 is much lower in the County and the Bay Area than many parts of the State and country due to the high rate of vaccination of the community. But COVID-19 continues to pose a risk especially to individuals who are not eligible to be vaccinated or are not yet Upto-Date on Vaccination, and certain safety measures continue to be necessary or strongly recommended to protect against COVID-19 cases and deaths. Being Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster as soon as Booster-Eligible, is the most effective method to prevent transmission and ultimately COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths. It is important to ensure that as many eligible people as possible are vaccinated against COVID-19. Further, it is critical to ensure there is continued reporting of cases to protect individuals and the larger community. Accordingly, this Order allows Businesses, schools, and other activities to resume fully while at the same time putting in place certain requirements or recommendations designed to (1) extend vaccine coverage to the greatest extent possible; (2) limit transmission risk of COVID-19; (3) contain any COVID-19 outbreaks; and (4) generally align with guidance issued by the CDC and the State relating to COVID-19 except in limited instances where local conditions require more restrictive measures. This Order is based on evidence of continued community transmission of SARS-CoV-2 within the County as well as scientific evidence and best practices to prevent transmission of COVID-19. The Health Officer will continue to monitor data regarding the evolving scientific understanding of the risks posed by COVID-19, including the impact of vaccination, and may amend or rescind this Order based on analysis of that data and knowledge. It is possible that the Health Officer will determine in the future that prior health precautions that have been relaxed or removed need to be imposed again, based on changes in local health conditions and the course of the pandemic.
- b. <u>Intent</u>. The primary intent of this Order is to continue to protect the community from COVID-19, <u>including by providing health recommendations as requirements are lifted</u>, and to also increase vaccination rates to reduce transmission of COVID-19 long-term, so that the whole community is safer and the COVID-19 health emergency can come to an end.
- c. <u>Interpretation</u>. All provisions of this Order must be interpreted to effectuate the purposes and intent of this Order as described above. The note and summary at the beginning of this Order as well as the headings and subheadings of sections contained



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in this Order are for convenience only and may not be used to interpret this Order. In the event of any inconsistency between the summary, headings, or subheadings and the text of this Order, the text will control. Certain initially capitalized terms used in this Order have the meanings given them in Section 1 above. The interpretation of this Order in relation to the health orders or guidance of the State is described in Section 10 below.

- d. <u>Application</u>. This Order applies to all individuals, Businesses, and other entities in the County. For clarity, the requirements of this Order apply to all individuals who do not currently reside in the County when they are in the County. Governmental entities must follow the requirements of this Order that apply to Businesses, unless otherwise specifically provided in this Order or directed by the Health Officer.
- e. <u>DPH Core Guidance</u>. All individuals and Businesses are strongly urged to follow the DPH Core Guidance (available online at <u>sf.gov/core-guidance-covid-19</u>) containing health and safety recommendations for COVID-19.
- f. Effect of Failure to Comply. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both, as further provided in Section 12 below.

3. General Requirements for Individuals.

- a. <u>Vaccination</u>. Individuals are strongly urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, meaning, as further provided in Section 1, that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and, as soon as they are Booster-Eligible, receive their Booster. In particular, people at risk for severe illness with COVID-19—such as unvaccinated older adults and unvaccinated individuals with health risks—and members of their Household, are urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster, as soon as they can. Information about who is at increased risk of severe illness and people who need to take extra precautions can be found at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/need-extra-precautions/people-with-medicalconditions.html. For those who are not yet Up-to-Date on Vaccination, making informed choices about the risk of different activities, wearing a Well-Fitted Mask indoors, or choosing outdoor activities as much as possible with physical distancing from other Households whose vaccination status is unknown, are the best ways to prevent the risk of COVID-19 transmission. Individuals who are Up-to-Date on Vaccination are subject to fewer restrictions as provided in this Order, and there are allowances for certain large gatherings where all the participants are Up-to-Date on Vaccination or have been Tested and received a negative Test result the best protection against COVID-19.
- b. <u>Face Coverings</u>. All persons must follow the Face Covering Requirements. More specifically, <u>people everyone</u>, <u>and especially those</u> who <u>areremain</u> Unvaccinated <u>must</u>, <u>are strongly recommended to</u> continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in public



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settings indoors, as further described in Appendix A to this Order where masking is not otherwise required by the Business, especially when indoors with people whose vaccination status is unknown. Also, everyone is required to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, regardless of vaccination status, in the following indoor settings: public transit; TK-12 schools and childcare; High-Risk Settings; health care and other longterm care facilities where masking is required by regulatory orders and rules; and anywhere else that federal or state health orders require doing so, as described in Section 3(b)(i) and Appendix A. to this Order. Appendix A lists exceptions and allowances in such settings when a Well-Fitted Mask is not required, including an exception in certain situations where a person is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination. People who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination are encouraged to continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when in indoor public settings where masking is not otherwise required. Everyone Face covering requirements in Schools and Programs for Children and Youth are covered in Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-33 and 2020-14, respectively, including as those directives are further updated in the future. When wearing a mask, everyone should consistently wear the best mask they can obtain, considering fit and filtration (and without using a one-way exhalation valve that is not filtered), when they are indoors with other people, especially with people whose vaccination status is unknown.). As provided in the definition of a Well-Fitted Mask, a well-fitting non-vented N95, KN95, or KF94 respirator is strongly recommended. A well-fitting surgical/procedural mask with a cloth mask worn over it to increase fit is also recommended. More information about fit and filtration and the best mask options is available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/ COVID-19/Get-the-Most-out-of-Masking.aspx. People should respect an individual's decision to wear face coverings even in settings where they are not required, such as crowded outdoor settings, and no Business or other person should take an adverse action against individuals who chose to wear a face covering to protect their health.

i. Other Federal and State Requirements. Under current federal law, when riding or waiting to ride on public transit people who are inside the vehicle or other mode of transportation or are indoors at a public transit stop or station, must wear Well-Fitted Masks. This requirement extends to all modes of transportation other than private vehicles, such as airplanes, trains, subways, buses, taxis, ride-shares, maritime transportation, street cars, and cable cars, and school buses. But any passenger who is outdoors or in open-air areas of the mode of transportation, such as open-air areas of ferries, buses, and cablecars, is not required by federal law to wear a face covering. Personnel and passengers on public transit are urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, and those who are not Up-to-Date on Vaccination are strongly urged to wear a Well-Fitted Mask or respirator when not otherwise required by the Face Covering Requirements. Under Cal/OSHA's regulations, employers may also be required to ensure employees continue to wear Well-Fitted Masks or respirators, particularly in indoor settings. Businesses and other entities must adhere to should also follow any additional Cal/OSHA regulations relating to



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COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace, including regarding masking, and more information can be found online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html. Nothing in this Order is intended to reduce any of those requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual's own choices to take more health protective measures.

ii. Additional Face Covering Recommendations.

- 1. Outdoor Crowded Gatherings. People who are outdoors in close proximity to other people who are not part of their Household are recommended to wear a Well-Fitted Mask.
- 2. Indoor Private Gatherings. It is safest when everyone participating in indoor private gatherings in Residences with members from different Households is Up to Date on Vaccination (including having a Booster as soon as Booster Eligible). An additional layer of protection is for people to Test negative before the gathering. And if not everyone at the gathering is Up to Date on Vaccination, or if their vaccination status is not known, everyone attending is encouraged to wear a Well-Fitted Mask at all times during the gathering while they are indoors. For clarity, anyone who is Unvaccinated must wear a Well-Fitted Mask in common areas of a Residence that are used as a shared rental with multiple Households.
- c. <u>Monitor for Symptoms</u>. Individuals should monitor themselves for symptoms of COVID-19. A list of COVID-19 symptoms is available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/symptoms-testing/symptoms.html. Anyone with any symptom that is new or not explained by another condition must comply with subsections 3(d) and 3(e) below regarding isolation and quarantine.
- d. <u>Isolation</u>. Anyone who has or likely has COVID-19, meaning that person (i) has a positive COVID-19 test result, (ii) is diagnosed with COVID-19, or (iii) has a COVID-19 symptom that is new or not explained by another condition, must refer to the latest COVID-19 isolation health directive issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/directives) and follow the requirements detailed there. There are special requirements for healthcare workers and emergency medical services personnel in healthcare settings.
- e. <u>Quarantine</u>. Anyone who had Close Contact must refer to the latest COVID-19 quarantine health directive issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/directives) and follow the requirements detailed there. There are special requirements for healthcare workers and emergency medical services personnel in healthcare settings.



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- f. Moving to, Traveling to, or Returning to the County. Everyone is strongly encouraged to comply with (1) any State travel advisories (available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Travel-Advisory.aspx) and (2) CDC travel guidelines (available online at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/travel-during-covid19.html).
- g. <u>Minimum Requirements</u>. Based on their risk preferences, individuals may decide for themselves to take greater safety precautions than required or even recommended under this Order. Also, nothing in this section limits any requirements that apply under this Order to indoor public settings, indoor Mega-Events, or that Cal/OSHA or other State authority may impose on any indoor setting involving gatherings.
- 4. General Requirements for Businesses and Governmental Entities.
 - a. <u>Vaccination</u>. Businesses and governmental entities are generally encouraged to require Personnel and patrons to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, meaning they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and have received a Booster when they are Booster-Eligible.
 - Complete Initial Series Vaccination Requirement for ListedCovered Indoor Businesses. The following Businesses (1) must require patrons and staff (as distinguished from the broader term "Personnel") to provide either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative Test (as detailed in Appendix B to this Order), (2) are strongly urged to implement measures as soon as possible to require those patrons and staff to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including requiring them to show proof of receipt of a Booster once they are Booster-Eligible, and (3) must comply with the other requirements detailed in Appendix B to this Order:
 - Operators or hosts of establishments or events where food or drink is served indoors—including, but not limited to, dining establishments, bars, clubs, theaters, and entertainment venues.
 - Gyms, recreation facilities, yoga studios, dance studios, and other fitness establishments, where any patrons engage in cardiovascular, aerobic, strength training, or other exercise involving elevated breathing.

Beginning on February 16, 2022, operators of such Businesses are allowed, but not required by this Order, and as an alternative to checking proof of vaccination status for patrons and staff, to instead accept proof of a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but people are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart).

For proof of a Test as listed in the preceding paragraph, self-administered



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antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing.

Such Businesses must comply with the requirement listed in Section 4(e) below to conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

Because testing and masking is not as effective as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination at preventing the spread of COVID-19, a Business may determine that the minimum requirements in this subsection are not sufficient for its operations to protect the health and safety of patrons, staff, or others.

ii. <u>Mega-Events</u>. Operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events are subject to the proof of vaccination or negative Test requirements for entry by patrons and staff set forth in Section 7 below.

And operators and hosts of <u>indoor or</u> outdoor Mega-Events are encouraged to consider requiring patrons and staff to provide proof that they are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (including proof of a Booster if Booster-Eligible) before entering the <u>venue or</u> outdoor area where the event is held.

b. Masking.

- i. <u>Mask Requirements and Allowances</u>. Businesses and governmental entities must follow the requirements for masking listed in this Order and Appendix A to this Order and may, but are not required by this Order, allow patrons and Personnel (or staff) who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series to remove masks indoors consistent with the requirements listed in Appendix A to this Order.
- ii. <u>Providing a Well-Fitted Mask</u>. Businesses and other entities subject to this Order are encouraged to provide a Well-Fitted Mask at no cost to people (patrons and Personnel) who do not have one upon entry inside the facility.
- c. <u>Encourage Activities that Can Occur Outdoors</u>. All Businesses and governmental entities are encouraged to remember that moving operations or activities outdoors, if it makes sense to do so under the circumstances and to the extent allowed by local law and permitting requirements, generally includes less risk of COVID-19 transmission as opposed to indoors.
- d.c. Personnel Health Screening. Businesses and governmental entities should develop and implement a process for screening Personnel for COVID-19 symptoms, but this



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requirement does not mean they must perform on-site screening of Personnel. Businesses and governmental entities should ask Personnel to evaluate their own symptoms before reporting to work. If Personnel have symptoms consistent with COVID-19, they should follow subsections 3(d) and 3(e) above. Businesses and governmental entities may be required to conduct such screenings for Personnel under Cal/OSHA's regulations. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html.

- e.d. Businesses Must Allow Personnel to Stay Home When Sick. Businesses are required to follow Cal/OSHA regulations allowing Personnel to stay home where they have symptoms associated with COVID-19 that are new or not explained by another condition or if they have been diagnosed with COVID-19 (by a test or a clinician) even if they have no symptoms, and to not to have those Personnel return to work until they have satisfied certain conditions, all as further set forth in the Cal/OSHA rules. Also, Businesses must comply with California Senate Bill 114 (Labor Code, sections 248.6 and 248.7), which provides that employers with more than 25 employees must give every employee up to 80 hours of COVID-related sick leave retroactive to January 1, 2022 and through September 30, 2022 (pro-rated for less than full time employees), including that employees may use this paid sick leave to get vaccinated or for post-vaccination illness. Each Business is prohibited from taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in any of the circumstances described in this subsection.
- f.e. Signage. In addition to any signage otherwise required in this Order or any directives issued by the Health Officer for specific Business or other sectors, the following general signage requirement applies. All Businesses and governmental entities are requiredencouraged to conspicuously post signage reminding individuals of the following COVID-19 prevention best practices to reduce transmission:

Get vaccinated and boosted:

Stay home if sick;

Wear a mask indoors if you are unvaccinated; and

Clean your hands.

Businesses and governmental entities are also encouraged to include in signage any custom requirements the business or entity requires of its patrons or Personnel regarding testing, vaccination, and masking. Sample signage is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19. Businesses or governmental entities may modify the sign described above to reflect the rules they adopt related to vaccination status, mask removal, or other restrictions, as long as those restrictions are consistent with Section 4(j) below.

Operators or hosts of covered indoor businesses listed in Section 4(a)(i) above and of



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indoor Mega-Events (as provided in Section 7 below) must conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements.

- g.f. Ventilation Guidelines. All Businesses and governmental entities with indoor operations are urged to review the Ventilation Guidelines and implement ventilation strategies for indoor operations as feasible. Nothing in this subsection limits any ventilation requirements that apply to particular settings under federal, state, or local law.
- h.g. Mandatory Reporting by Businesses and Governmental Entities. Consistent with Cal/OSHA regulations, Businesses and governmental entities must require that all Personnel immediately alert the Business or governmental entity if they test positive for COVID-19 and were present in the workplace either (1) within 48 hours before onset of symptoms or within 10 days after onset of symptoms if they were symptomatic; or (2) within 48 hours before the date on which they were tested or within 10 days after the date on which they were tested if they were asymptomatic. If a Business or governmental entity is concerned about a workplace outbreak among Personnel, it may get additional information www.sfcdcp.org/covid19-positiveworkplace. Businesses and governmental entities must also comply with all case investigation and contact tracing measures directed by DPH including providing any information requested within the timeframe provided by DPH, instructing Personnel to follow isolation and quarantine protocols specified by CDPH and Cal/OSHA and any additional protocols specified by DPH, and excluding positive cases and unvaccinated close contacts from the workplace during these isolation and quarantine periods.

Schools and Programs for Children and Youth are subject to separate reporting requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-33 and 2020-14, updated as of January 4, 2022, respectively, including as those directives are further updated in the future.

- i-h. Compliance with CDPH Vaccination Status Order's Mask Requirements. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in Acute Health Care Settings, Long-Term Care Settings, High-Risk Congregate Settings, and Other Health Care Settings—as those terms are defined in the CDPH Vaccination Status Order, available online at https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Unvaccinated-Workers-In-High-Risk-Settings.aspx—must provide appropriate face coverings as required by the CDPH Vaccination Status Order.
- j-i. Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures. This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to COVID-19 protections. Nothing in this Order is intended to reduce any other federal, state, or local legal requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual Business' or governmental entity's choices to take more health protective measures. Businesses or governmental entities may impose further restrictions that



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are more protective of public health than the minimum requirements <u>or</u> <u>recommendations</u> under this Order, including requiring patrons or Personnel to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, requiring them to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, <u>requiring them to have a negative Test</u>, or taking other more restrictive measures that are more protective of public health and meet their operational needs.

5. Schools and Programs for Children and Youth

- a. Schools. Based on the demonstrated effectiveness of measures that reduce the risk of transmission in school settings, including the requirement for universal masking indoors, the use of rapid testing, and vaccinations for children age five and older, the Health Officer strongly believes that schools can and should remain open for inperson classes for all grades. Largely because some children are not eligible to be vaccinated against COVID-19 at this time and Largely because many children are not yet Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or eligible for a Booster, schools must follow the health and safety requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-33, including as it may be amended in the future, to ensure the safety of all students and Personnel at the school site. All children who are Booster-Eligible (including under an emergency use authorization) are strongly urged to receive a Booster as soon as possible. Also, adult Personnel in TK-12 schools, including educators, aides, administrators, and other staff, are strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination.
- b. Programs for Children and Youth. Largely because some children are not eligible to be vaccinated against COVID-19 at this time and many children are not yet Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or eligible for a Booster, the following Programs for Children and Youth must operate in compliance with the health and safety requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-14, including as it may be amended in the future: (1) group care facilities for children who are not yet in elementary school—including, for example, licensed childcare centers, daycares, family daycares, and preschools (including cooperative preschools); and (2) with the exception of schools, which are addressed in subsection (a) above, educational or recreational institutions or programs that provide care or supervision for school-aged children and youth—including for example, learning hubs, other programs that support and supplement distance learning in schools, school-aged childcare programs, youth sports programs, summer camps, and afterschool programs.
- c. <u>Mega-Events</u>. Operators or hosts of indoor events held at schools or under Programs for Children and Youth that meet the definition of an indoor Mega-Event must comply with the rules for indoor Mega-Events specified in Section 7 of this Order. Operators or hosts of such outdoor events are urged to follow the rules for outdoor Mega-Events.
- 6. <u>Vaccination Requirements for Personnel in High-Risk Settings and Other Health Care</u> Personnel.



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- a. <u>High-Risk Settings</u>. Except for some Personnel as provided in subsections (a)(iii), (b), and (c) below, and for Personnel exempt under subsection (d) below, all of the following requirements apply in High-Risk Settings:
 - i. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in High-Risk Settings must:
 - 1. As of September 30, 2021, ascertain vaccination status of all Personnel in High-Risk Settings who routinely work onsite;
 - 2. As of September 30, 2021, ensure that before entering or working in any High-Risk Setting, all Personnel who routinely work onsite have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below; and
 - 3. No later than March 1, 2022, ensure that all such Personnel who routinely work onsite, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. And for the period between when such Personnel are Booster-Eligible but have not yet received one and when they become Up-to-Date on Vaccination (meaning one week after receipt of a Booster), the operator of the High-Risk Setting must ensure that each such person comply with the public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below regarding testing even though they have already received their full initial course of vaccination. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible.

And consistent with updated CDPH "Health Care Worker Vaccine Requirement" guidance (linked below in Section 6(b)), such Personnel who provide proof of COVID-19 infection after being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series (a "Recent Pre-Booster Infection") may defer Booster administration under this subsection for up to 90 days from the date of their first positive COVID-19 test or clinical diagnosis, which in some situations may extend the deadline for receipt of a Booster beyond March 1, 2022. Such Personnel who are not eligible for a Booster by March 1, 2022 must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the timeframe specified in this paragraph for receiving the Booster. Personnel with a deferral due to a proven COVID-19 infection must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of their deferral.



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- ii. As of September 30, 2021, Personnel who routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings must have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below. Beginning on March 1, 2022, Personnel who routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings must, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel who are required by this subsection 6(a)(ii) to receive a Booster may use the Recent Pre-Booster Infection deferral described above in subsection 6(a)(i)(3) and must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of the deferral described in that subsection.
- iii. For purposes of this Order, Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time are considered to routinely work onsite in High-Risk Settings. Businesses and governmental entities with such Personnel are required to (1) ascertain vaccination status of all such Personnel and (2) ensure that before entering or working in any High-Risk Setting, all such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series with any vaccine authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization, unless exempt under subsection (d) below. Additionally, as of September 29, 2021, all such Personnel must have received their first dose of a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen or their second dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine regimen authorized to prevent COVID-19 by the FDA, including by way of an emergency use authorization, or by the World Health Organization. Until such Personnel are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, they are subject to at least the minimum public health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv) below. And no later than March 1, 2022, Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time—including for example, but not limited to, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, police officers and other law enforcement, and attorneys who enter jail settings or other High-Risk Settings as part of their work—must, within 15 days of being Booster-Eligible, receive a Booster. For clarity, those who are Booster-Eligible on or before February 14, 2022 must have received their Booster by March 1, 2022, and those who are Booster-Eligible after February 14, 2022 must receive it within 15 days after they become eligible. Personnel



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who are required by this subsection 6(a)(iii) to receive a Booster may use the Recent Pre-Booster Infection deferral described above in subsection 6(a)(i)(3) and must be in compliance no later than 15 days after the expiration of the deferral described in that subsection.

For purposes only of this subsection (iii), Businesses and governmental entities that have Personnel who are not permanently stationed or regularly assigned to a High-Risk Setting but who in the course of their duties may enter or work in High-Risk Settings even on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time as provided above, may qualify for a temporary extension beyond the March 1, 2022 deadline for such Personnel to receive a Booster, until no later than April 15, 2022, if they meet both of the following criteria: (1) they determine that there is a critical staffing shortage (determined in writing by the chief executive officer or department head); and (2) they ensure that only such Personnel who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, are free of any COVID-19 symptom, who wear a Well-Fitted Mask, and who have a negative Test in the manner required by subsection (iv)(1) below may continue to work in the High-Risk Setting.

- iv. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must require any Personnel who are exempt or who are otherwise not Up-to-Date on Vaccination (for clarity, the reference to these Personnel means any person who is Booster-Eligible for but not yet received a Booster or who has received a Booster for the seven days after receipt of the Booster before becoming Up-to-Date on Vaccination) to comply with at least the following public health and safety measures:
 - 1. get Tested for COVID-19 at least once a week—and at least twice a week for Personnel who are in general acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, and jails—using either a nucleic acid (including polymerase chain reaction (PCR)) or antigen test; and
 - at all times at the worksite in the High-Risk Setting wear a face covering in compliance with the State Public Health Officer Order of July 26, 2021 ("CDPH Vaccination Status Order"), available at https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Unvaccinated-Workers-In-High-Risk-Settings.aspx.

Because of the COVID-19 risks to any exempt Personnel who are not Up-to-Date on Vaccination, the High-Risk Setting must provide such Personnel, on request, with a well-fitting non-vented N95 respirator and strongly encourage such Personnel to wear that respirator at all times when working with patients, residents, clients, or incarcerated people.

Regular testing and masking as required under this Section 6 are not as



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protective of public health as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination in helping prevent transmission of COVID-19; accordingly, those measures are a minimum safety requirement for exempt Personnel in High-Risk Settings. Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 may require additional safety measures for such Personnel. For example, factors a Business or governmental entity may consider in determining appropriate safety measures for exempt Personnel include, but are not limited to:

- a) Whether the Personnel will place other people at risk of transmission of COVID-19 because they are required to come into contact (including on an emergency basis) with other Personnel or with persons whose vaccination status is unknown, who are not yet eligible for the vaccine, or who are members of a vulnerable population (*e.g.*, the elderly, incarcerated people, and acute care patients);
- b) The type and frequency of testing available to the Personnel and whether the Business or governmental entity has the ability to provide testing to Personnel, without relying on public health resources, and track the requisite testing;
- Whether the Business or governmental entity can ensure compliance with the mask mandate whenever the Personnel are around other people in the workplace; and
- d) Whether the proposed accommodation imposes an undue burden because it is costly, infringes on other Personnel's job rights or benefits, compromises workplace safety, decreases workplace efficiency, or requires other Personnel to do more than their share of potentially hazardous or burdensome work.

Nothing under the Order limits the ability of a Business or governmental entity under applicable law to determine whether they are unable to offer a reasonable accommodation to unvaccinated Personnel with an approved exemption and to exclude such exempt Personnel from a High-Risk Setting.

- v. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must, consistent with applicable privacy laws and regulations, maintain records of employee vaccination or exemption status.
- vi. All Businesses and governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must provide these records to the Health Officer or other public health authorities promptly upon request, and in any event no later than the next business day after receiving the request.

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vii. This mandated vaccination schedule allows Businesses, governmental entities, and affected Personnel adequate time to comply with this Order. In the interest of protecting residents of High-Risk Settings, Personnel, and their families, Businesses, governmental entities, and affected Personnel are strongly urged to meet these vaccination requirements as soon as possible.

For clarity, this requirement applies to Personnel in other buildings in a site containing a High-Risk Setting, such as a campus or other similar grouping of related buildings, where such Personnel do any of the following: (i) access the acute care or patient, resident, client, or incarcerated person areas of the High-Risk Setting; or (ii) work in-person with patients, residents, clients, or incarcerated people who visit those areas. All people in San Francisco who work in a clinical setting with a population that is more vulnerable to COVID-19 are strongly urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receiving a Booster as soon as Booster-Eligible.

If a person covered by the requirements of this Section 6 to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination recently had COVID-19 when that person would otherwise have been Booster-Eligible based on the period since becoming Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, then that person should try to obtain the Booster as soon as possible at least 10 days after recovering and ending isolation. But to continue working in the High-Risk Setting that person does not need to receive the Booster until 30 days after recovering from infection and discontinuing isolation, unless a healthcare provider recommends in a note that the Booster be delayed for a longer specified period.

b. CDPH Requirements For Adult Care Facilities, Direct Care Workers, Other Health Care Workers, and Pharmacists. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in certain types of facilities and contexts, including those that provide health care, certain other care services, services in congregate settings, and the Personnel who work in those settings must comply with the following CDPH Orders and All Facilities Letters, including as they are updated in the future, which require Personnel of such Businesses and governmental entities to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster when Booster-Eligible, unless exempt under those Orders and All Facilities Letters by the deadlines listed in each order or letter:

- c. <u>Dental Offices</u>. Personnel who provide healthcare in dental offices are considered to provide care in "Clinics & Doctor Offices (including behavioral health, surgical)" under the following CDPH order and must comply with the requirements in that order: "Health Care Worker Vaccine Requirement", updated <u>January 25February 22</u>, 2022, available online at <u>www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Health-Care-Worker-Vaccine-Requirement.aspx</u>.
- d. Limited Exemptions. Personnel covered by this Section 6 may be exempt from the vaccination requirements under this section only upon providing the requesting Business or governmental entity a declination form stating either of the following: (1) the individual is declining vaccination based on Religious Beliefs or (2) the individual is excused from receiving any COVID-19 vaccine due to Qualifying Medical Reasons. A sample ascertainment and declination form is available online at www.sfdph.org/dph/covid-19/files/declination.pdf. As to declinations for Qualifying Medical Reasons, to be eligible for this exemption Personnel must also provide to their employer or the Business a written statement signed by a physician, nurse practitioner, or other licensed medical professional practicing under the license of a physician stating that the individual qualifies for the exemption (but the statement should not describe the underlying medical condition or disability) and indicating the probable duration of the individual's inability to receive the vaccine (or if the duration is unknown or permanent, so indicate). As to declinations based on Religious Beliefs, a Business or governmental entity may seek additional information as allowed or required by applicable law to determine whether Personnel have a qualifying Religious Belief. Personnel who qualify for and are granted by the employing Business or governmental entity an exemption due to Religious Beliefs or Qualifying Medical Reasons, as provided above, must still follow at least the minimum health and safety requirements in subsection (a)(iv), above. Nothing in this Order is intended to limit any Business's or governmental entity's ability under applicable law to determine whether they are able to offer a reasonable accommodation to Personnel with an approved exemption. Because testing and masking is not as effective as being Up-to-Date on Vaccination at preventing the



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spread of COVID-19, a Business may determine that the minimum requirements in subsection (a)(iv) above are not sufficient to protect the health and safety of people in High-Risk Settings.

- e. <u>Record Keeping Requirements</u>. Businesses or governmental entities subject to this Section 6 must maintain records with following information:
 - For Personnel who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, and also for Personnel where being Up-to-Date on Vaccination is required by this Order:

 full name and date of birth;
 vaccine manufacturer; and
 date of vaccine administration (for first dose and, if applicable, all subsequent doses required by this Order). Nothing in this subsection is intended to prevent an employer from requesting additional information or documentation to verify vaccination status, to the extent permissible under the law.
 - ii. For unvaccinated Personnel: signed declination forms with written health care provider's statement where applicable, as described in subsection (d) above.
- f. Compliance with CDPH Orders. In addition to the requirements set forth above:
 - Until any more health protective requirements in this section take effect, Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in High-Risk Settings must comply with the requirements of the CDPH Vaccination Status Order; and
 - ii. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel in adult care facilities and Other Health Care Settings—as that term is defined in the CDPH Vaccination Status Order—must be in full compliance with the requirements of the CDPH Vaccination Status Order.
 - iii. Businesses and governmental entities with Personnel who provide services or work in facilities covered by the State Public Health Officer Order of August 5, 2021, updated most recently on DecemberFebruary 22, 2021 and January 25, 2022 (titled "Health Care Worker Vaccine Requirement"), must comply with the requirements of that order, including as that order may be amended in the future. See www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Order-of-the-State-Public-Health-Officer-Health-Care-Worker-Vaccine-Requirement.aspx.
- g. <u>Cooperation with Public Health Authorities</u>. Businesses or governmental entities with Personnel subject to this Section 6 must cooperate with Health Officer or DPH requests for records, documents, or other information regarding the Business or governmental entity's implementation of these vaccination requirements. This cooperation includes, but is not limited to, identifying all jobs or positions within the organization and describing: (1) whether a given job or position is subject to the vaccination requirements of this Section 6, (2) how the Business or governmental

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entity determined a job or position is subject to vaccination requirements of this Section 6, and (3) how the Business or governmental entity is ensuring full compliance with the vaccination requirements set forth in this Section 6. Complete responses to these requests must be provided to the Health Officer or DPH promptly upon request, and in any event within three business days after receiving the request.

h. <u>Chart</u>. For convenience of reference, a chart summarizing which settings and Personnel are subject to which state and local vaccination requirements is available at https://www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/C19-07-State-and-Local-Mandates-Chart.pdf.

7. Mega-Events.

i.

- a. Compliance with State's Post-Blueprint Guidance. All Businesses, governmental entities, and other organizations hosting Mega-Events, including when held at schools or under Programs for Children and Youth as provided in Section 5 above, must comply with the requirements in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance for indoor Mega-Events, available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Beyond-Blueprint-Framework.aspx, and are strongly urged to follow the recommendations in the State's Post-Blueprint Guidance for outdoor Mega-Events.
- b. Vaccine Verification or Negative Test Requirements.
 - Patron Vaccination or Testing Pre-Entry Requirements. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events must require all patrons to show proof, before entering the facility, of either a) being Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including for patrons age 12 and up receipt of a Booster as soon as they are Booster-Eligible, Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or b) having had a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. For multi-day indoor Mega-Events, patrons are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart. For patrons aged 12 to 15, operators or hosts of indoor Mega Events are urged to enforce the mandate to show proof of a Booster as part of being Up to Date on Vaccination as soon as possible and are required to do so beginning March 1, 2022 unless the patron aged 12 to 15 shows proof of having had a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. Patrons age five to 11 (or their parents or guardians) must show for each such child either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility. Patrons age two to four (or their parents or guardians) must show for each such child proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility.

Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events may not accept a written self-



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attestation as proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Upto-Date on Vaccination. For proof of a Test, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative preentry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing. And consistent with State rules, operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events are required to cross check proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of negative COVID-19 test, as provided below, for each patron age 18 and up against a photo identification, unless photo identification is integrated into the digital COVID-19 vaccine record. Under no circumstance—including in response to a claim by a patron of an exemption of any kind—is the operator or host of an indoor Mega-Event allowed to admit a patron (except children under age two) who has not shown, as listed in this subsection, proof of either being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or of a negative Test. All patrons are still strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster as soon as eligible.

ii. Staff Vaccination or Testing Pre-Entry Requirements. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events must require all staff to show proof, before entering the facility, of either (1) being Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of Vaccinated with a Booster within 15 days of their being Booster—EligibleComplete Initial Series or (2) having a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but staff is not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart).—Staff can work at the Mega Event so long as they get the Booster by the 15th day of being Booster—Eligible. These requirements for staff are subject to any applicable requirements for federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation. Unvaccinated Staff must wear a Well-Fitted Mask at all times except while actively performing or playing or as otherwise allowed to remove the mask by Appendix A of this Order.

If a staff member covered by the requirements of this Section 7 to be Up to-Date on Vaccination (in lieu of testing and masking for those who with a qualified exemption) recently had COVID-19 when that person would otherwise have been Booster Eligible based on the period since becoming Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, then that person should try to obtain the Booster as soon as possible at least 10 days after recovering and ending isolation. But to continue working in the indoor Mega-Event setting that person does not need to receive the Booster until 30 days after recovering from infection and discontinuing isolation, unless a healthcare provider recommends in a note that the Booster be delayed for a longer specified periodAll staff are still strongly encouraged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination,



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including receipt of a Booster as soon as eligible.

For clarity, "staff" as used in this Section 7 does not include all individuals included in the broader term "Personnel." Individuals who enter or work in a Mega-Event facility for short periods of time (*e.g.*, individuals who deliver goods or packages) are not covered by the requirements in this Section, but anyone who is present for a single event or who provides setup or post-event services onsite for even part of a day is considered staff and is covered by this Section.

iii. Masking Requirements Indoors.

- a. Mask Requirements and Allowances. Recommendations. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events must follow the requirements for masking listed in this Order and Appendix Aare strongly recommended to this Order and may, but are not required by this Order, allow patrons and Personnel (or staff) require everyone, and especially anyone who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series remains Unvaccinated, to remove masks continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask indoors consistent with the requirements listed in Appendix A to this Order, especially when people are indoors with people whose vaccination status is unknown.
- b. <u>Providing a Well-Fitted Mask</u>. Operators or hosts of indoor Mega-Events are encouraged to provide a Well-Fitted Mask at no cost to people (patrons and Personnel (or staff)) who do not have one upon entry inside the facility.
- c. RecommendationsSignage for OutIndoor Events. All Businesses, governmental entities, and other organizations hosting outindoor Mega-Events, including when held at schools or under Programs for Children and Youth as provided must comply with the requirement listed in Section 54(e) above, are encouraged to consider requiring all patrons age 12 and up to show proof, before entering the event, that they are Up to Date on Vaccination (including having received a Booster as soon as they are Booster-Eligible) or have a negative Test, subject to any applicable conspicuously post signage at entrances regarding pre-entry vaccination and Testing requirements of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation, and to follow the recommendations in the State's Post Blueprint Guidance for outdoor Mega-Events.
- d. <u>Summary Chart.</u> For convenience of reference, a chart summarizing the requirements for Mega-Events is available at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/C19-07-Mega-and-Large-Event-Chart.pdf</u>.



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<u>reports</u>. The Health Officer will monitor this data, along with other data and scientific evidence, in determining whether to modify or rescind this Order, as further described in Section 2(a) above.

- 9. <u>Incorporation of State and Local Emergency Proclamations and Federal and State Health Orders</u>. The Health Officer is issuing this Order in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the emergency proclamations and other federal, state, and local orders and other pandemic-related orders described below in this Section. But this Order also functions independent of those emergency proclamations and other actions, and if any State, federal, or local emergency declaration, or any State or federal order or other guidance, is repealed, this Order remains in full effect in accordance with its terms (subject to Section 13 below).
 - a. <u>State and Local Emergency Proclamations</u>. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by the Governor, the February 25, 2020 Proclamation by the Mayor Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency, and the March 6, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency Regarding Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) issued by the Health Officer, as each of them have been and may be modified, extended, or supplemented.
 - b. <u>State Health Orders</u>. This Order is also issued in light of the various orders, directives, rules, and regulations of the State, including, but not limited to, those of the State's Public Health Officer and Cal/OSHA. The State has expressly acknowledged that local health officers have authority to establish and implement public health measures within their respective jurisdictions that are more restrictive than those implemented by the State Public Health Officer.
 - c. <u>Federal Orders</u>. This Order is further issued in light of federal emergency declarations and orders, including, but not limited to, the January 20, 2021 Executive Order on Protecting the Federal Workforce and Requiring Mask-Wearing, which requires all individuals in Federal buildings and on Federal land to wear masks, maintain physical distance, and adhere to other public health measures, and the February 2, 2021 Order of the CDC, which requires use of masks on public transportation, as each of them may have been and may be modified, extended or supplemented.

10. Obligation to Follow Stricter Requirements of Orders.

Based on local health conditions, this Order includes a limited number of health and safety restrictions that are more stringent or more detailed than those contained under State orders. Where a conflict exists between this Order and any state or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive provision (*i.e.*, the more protective of public health) controls. Consistent with California Health and Safety Code section 131080 and the Health Officer Practice Guide for Communicable Disease Control in California, except where the State Health Officer may issue an order expressly directed at this Order and based on a finding that a provision of this Order constitutes a



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menace to public health, any more restrictive measures in this Order continue to apply and control in this County.

11. Obligation to Follow Health Officer Orders and Directives and Mandatory State Guidance.

In addition to complying with all provisions of this Order, all individuals and entities, including all Businesses and governmental entities, must also follow any applicable orders and directives issued by the Health Officer (available online at www.sfdph.org/healthorders and www.sfdph.org/healthorders and www.sfdph.org/directives) and any applicable mandatory guidance issued by the State Health Officer or California Department of Public Health. To the extent that provisions in the orders or directives of the Health Officer and the mandatory guidance of the State conflict, the more restrictive provisions (i.e., the more protective of public health) apply. In the event of a conflict between provisions of any previously-issued Health Officer order or directive and this Order, this Order controls over the conflicting provisions of the other Health Officer order or directive.

12. Enforcement.

Under Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, the Health Officer requests that the Sheriff and the Chief of Police in the County ensure compliance with and enforce this Order. The violation of any provision of this Order (including, without limitation, any health directives) constitutes an imminent threat and immediate menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. DPH is authorized to respond to such public nuisances by issuing Notice(s) of Violation and ordering premises vacated and closed until the owner, tenant, or manager submits a written plan to eliminate all violations and DPH finds that plan satisfactory. Such Notice(s) of Violation and orders to vacate and close may be issued based on a written report made by any City employees writing the report within the scope of their duty. DPH must give notice of such orders to vacate and close to the Chief of Police or the Chief's designee to be executed and enforced by officers in the same manner as provided by San Francisco Health Code section 597. As a condition of allowing a Business to reopen, DPH may impose additional restrictions and requirements on the Business as DPH deems appropriate to reduce transmission risks, beyond those required by this Order and other applicable health orders and directives.

13. Effective Date.

This Order is effective at 12:01 a.m. on June 15, 2021 and will continue, as updated, to be in effect until the Health Officer rescinds, supersedes, or amends it in writing. The changes made in the February 14March 2, 2022 update are effective at 12:01 a.m.immediately on February 16, 2022. For clarity, issuance, and the January 26, 2022 update remains changes regarding masking in effect until 12:01 a.m. on February 16 indoor settings (other than for TK-12 schools) listed in this Order are retroactive to March 1, 2022.



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14. Relation to Other Orders of the San Francisco Health Officer.

At 12:01 a.m. on February 16, 2022, Immediately on issuance this Order revises and entirely replaces the prior update to Health Officer Order No. C19-07y (issued January 26February 14, 2022). Leading up to and in connection with the effective date of this Order, the Health Officer has rescinded a number of other orders and directives relating to COVID-19, including those listed in the Health Officer's Omnibus Rescission of Health Officer Orders and Directives, dated June 11, 2021. On and after the effective date of this Order, the following orders and directives of the Health Officer shall continue in full force and effect: Order Nos. C19-16 (hospital patient data sharing), C19-18 (vaccine data reporting), C19-19 (minor consent to vaccination), and C19-20 (test collection sites); and the directives that this Order references in Sections 3 and 5, as the Health Officer may separately amend or later terminate any of them. Health Officer Order No. C19-15 was also reinstated on August 19, 2021, and remains in effect as outlined in that order (including as it is amended in the future). Also, this Order also does not alter the end date of any other Health Officer order or directive having its own end date or that continues indefinitely.

15. <u>Copies</u>.

The County must promptly provide copies of this Order as follows: (1) by posting on the DPH website (www.sfdph.org/healthorders); (2) by posting at City Hall, located at 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Pl., San Francisco, CA 94102; and (3) by providing to any member of the public requesting a copy.

16. Severability.

If a court holds any provision of this Order or its application to any person or circumstance to be invalid, then the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.

Order No. C19-07y – Appendix A: Face Covering Requirements

[February 14March 2, 2022]

1. <u>General Requirement Recommendation to Wear a Well-Fitted Mask; Requirement in Limited Indoor Settings.</u>

People who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or are even The intent of this Order and the masking rules in this Appendix is to align with the masking rules and recommendations issued by the State of California and the federal government, with this Appendix providing additional information for specific situations to help Businesses, governmental entities, and individuals comply with those rules and recommendations and make informed choices to improve safety during the pandemic.

Everyone, including even people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (meaning they have completed their initial course of vaccination and have received a Booster once eligible for a Booster, as further defined in Section 1 of the body of the Order), are strongly recommended, for the time being, to continue to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in indoor public settings where they are not otherwise required to do so, subject to the exemptions and allowances in Sections 4 through 8, below. But anyone who is Unvaccinated is required for the time being to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in indoor public setting at all times, except as provided in Sections 4 through 7, below. Additional Face Covering Requirements may be imposed elsewhere in this Order or by state or federal rules or regulations.

Also, everyone is required to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, regardless of vaccination status, in the following indoor settings: public transit; TK-12 schools and childcare (through March 11, 2022, consistent with State rules, as provided in associated directives issued by the Health Officer); emergency shelters and cooling and heating centers; High-Risk Settings (as defined in Section 1(p) of the Order); health care and other long-term care and adult and senior care facilities where masking is required by regulatory orders and rules; and anywhere else that federal or state health orders require doing so, as described in Section 3(b)(i) of the Order and this Appendix.

Employees may be subject to additional restrictions or be required to provide additional documentation under state or federal laws and regulations, including Cal/OSHA's regulations. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html.

And as provided in Section 108 below, individual Businesses, governmental entities, or venue operators or hosts may impose requirements regarding masking, in addition to those in this Order, that are more protective of public health.

2. Ventilation.

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[February 14March 2, 2022]

Businesses and operators of other public and private facilities where people are allowed tomay remove their Well-Fitted Masks indoors are encouraged to allow people to remove their Well-Fitted Masks only if they use at least one of the following ventilation strategies: (1) all available windows and doors accessible to fresh outdoor air are kept open as long as air quality and weather conditions permit; (2) fully operational HVAC system; or (3) appropriately sized portable air cleaners in each room. For clarity, if windows and doors are closed due to air quality or weather conditions, then a Business or operator of a public or private facility should whenever feasible follow at least one of remaining ventilation strategies before allowing people to remove their Well-Fitted Masks under this Order.

3. Proof of Vaccination.

Businesses, governmental entities, and other venue operators or hosts are encouraged to require people to provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or are Up-to-Date on Vaccination (including receipt of a Booster once Booster-Eligible) before allowing people to remove their Well-Fitted Mask (to the extent they are allowed to do so in Sections 5 through 8, below). For clarity, even if a Business or other entity does verify that people are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, people who are Unvaccinated still must wear a Well-Fitted Mask unless otherwise exempted under this Order-indoors (subject to the limitations on mask removal set forth in Sections 5 through 7, below). And as provided in the Order, each Business, governmental entity, and other entity that is required to confirm proof of being Vaccinated with the Complete Initial Series is strongly urged to implement measures as soon as possible to require its patrons and staff (as distinct from Personnel) to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including requiring them to show proof of receipt of a Booster once they are eligible.

Except as required by more stringent Despite the easing of masking requirements imposed elsewhere in under this update to the Order or Appendix, in indoor settings where people who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series are allowed to remove their Well Fitted Masks, Businesses, governmental entities, and other venue operators or hosts may confirm the vaccination status of patrons (including, without limitation, guests, attendees, and other visitors) in any of the following ways:

- a. <u>Self-attestation</u>, by providing information to all patrons regarding vaccination requirements, such as by posting signs at public entrances and at appropriate locations inside the facility, and allowing vaccinated individuals to self-attest that they are in compliance before entry;
- b. <u>Verification</u>, by confirming proof of vaccination status using the methods listed in the definition of "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series" in Section 1(n) of the Order (e.g., checking the CDC vaccination card, a personal digital vaccination record issued by the State or other jurisdiction or entity, or documentation from a healthcare provider); or

c. Imposing another, more restrictive option, that meets their operational needs.

In the alternative, Businesses, governmental entities, and other venue operators or hosts maystill require all patrons to wear a Well-Fitted Mask in their facilities. And no person can be prevented from wearing a Well-Fitted Mask as a condition of participation in an activity or entry into a Business.

- 4. <u>Status-Based Exemptions. The following exemptions apply in the limited situations where Well-Fitted Masks are still required under this Order.</u>
 - a. Medical or Safety Exemption. A person does not need to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when they can show: (1) a medical professional has provided a written exemption to the Face Covering Requirement, based on the person's medical condition, other health concern, or disability; or (2) that they are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication; or (3) wearing a Well-Fitted Mask while working would create a risk to the person related to their work as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines. In accordance with CDPH and CDC guidelines, if a person is required by this Order to wear a Well-Fitted Mask but is exempt from wearing one under this paragraph, they still must wear an alternative face covering, such as a face shield with a drape on the bottom edge, unless they can show either: (1) a medical professional has provided a written exemption to this alternative face covering requirement, based on the person's medical condition, other health concern, or disability; or (2) wearing an alternative face covering while working would create a risk to the person related to their work as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.

A Well-Fitted Mask should also not be used by anyone who has trouble breathing or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the Well-Fitted Mask without assistance.

b. Children. In accordance with CDPH and CDC guidelines, any child younger than two years old must not wear a Well-Fitted Mask because of the risk of suffocation. When required to do so by this Order, Children age two to nine years must wear Well-Fitted Masks to the greatest extent feasible. Children age two to nine years may wear an alternative face covering (as that term is described in Section 4(a), above) if their parent or caregiver determines it will improve the child's ability to comply with this Order. Children age two to nine and their accompanying parents or caregivers should not be refused any essential service based on a child's inability to wear a Well-Fitted Mask (for example, if a four-year old child refuses to keep a Well-Fitted Mask on in a grocery store), but the parent or caregiver should when possible take reasonable steps to have the child, when required to do so by this Order, wear a Well-Fitted Mask to protect others and minimize instances when children without Well-Fitted Masks are brought into settings with other people. Parents and caregivers of children age two to nine years must

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supervise the use of Well-Fitted Masks to ensure safety and avoid misuse. Children must wear face coverings in schools as required under State health rules.

- c. <u>Personal Protective Equipment</u>. A person required by this Order to wear a Well-Fitted Mask does not need to do so when wearing personal protective equipment ("PPE") that is more protective than a Well-Fitted Mask, including when required by (i) any workplace policy or (ii) any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or other mandatory guidance. When a person is not required to wear such PPE and in an indoor public setting, they must wear a Well-Fitted Mask or PPE that is more protective unless otherwise exempted under this Order.
- d. People who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series. Anyone who is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series may be allowed by the Business, governmental entity, or other venue operator or host to remove their Well-Fitted Mask as provided in this Appendix and subject to the vaccination status verification methods listed in Section 3 above.
- 5. Activity- and Location-Based Exemptions.

The activity- and location-based exemptions in this Section apply to Unvaccinated people and also to everyone in the designated settings where this Order requires everyone, regardless of vaccination status, to wear a Well-Fitted Mask. To the extent allowed by state or federal rules requiring face coverings, under Face Covering Requirements and subject to any additional health restrictions a particular Business, governmental entity, or other venue operator or host may impose for a facility or other setting it owns, operates, or controls, people who are Unvaccinated—or everyone, regardless of vaccination status, in settings where this Order requires everyone to wear wearing a Well-Fitted Mask—are not required to wear a Well-Fitted Maskdo so in any of the following situations:

a. Indoor Public Setting While Alone or With a Member of Household. An Unvaccinated A person does not need to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when they are alone or with a member of their Household in a public building or completely enclosed space such as an office, and people who are not part of their Household are not likely to be in the same space. If someone who is not part of a person's Household enters the enclosed space, both people must wear a Well-Fitted Mask for the duration of the interaction unless otherwise exempt under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix. For clarity, Unvaccinated people must wear Well-Fitted Masks whenever they are in semi-enclosed spaces such as cubicles and common areas for shared living settings, such as hotels, shared rentals with multiple Households, dormitories, fire stations, lobbies, and elevators. A Well-Fitted Mask must be worn if the person is in an indoor public space where others who are not part of their Household routinely are present unless otherwise exempt under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix.

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- b.—Active Eating and Drinking. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask while actively eating or drinking. For clarity, Well-Fitted Masks may be removed while actively eating or drinking in both indoor dining and indoor settings other than indoor dining where patrons may eat or drink, such as live performances and movies.
- c. <u>Motor Vehicles</u>. An Unvaccinated person does not need to wear a Well-Fitted Mask when in a personal motor vehicle and i) either alone or exclusively with other members of the same Household or ii) the person is otherwise exempt from wearing a Well-Fitted Mask under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix. But a Well-Fitted Mask is required when alone in the vehicle if the vehicle is used as a taxi or for any private car service or ride-sharing vehicle. Persons sharing a personal motor vehicle with people outside of the same Household are strongly encouraged to roll down the vehicle's windows for ventilation.
- d.b. This Personnel motor vehicle exemption does not apply to use of any mode of public transit, taxis, limousines, or shared transportation networks.
- e.c. Showering, Personal Hygiene, or Sleeping. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask only while showering or actively engaging in personal hygiene that requires removal of the Well-Fitted Mask, including at a gym, fitness center, or other facility. People may remove their Well-Fitted Mask while sleeping in indoor public settings.
- f. <u>Live or Recorded Performance and Professional Sports</u>. Unvaccinated Performers at indoor live or recorded settings or events such as concerts, live music, film, television, recording studios, theater, opera, symphony, and professional sports may remove their Well-Fitted Masks while actively performing or practicing. Performers are strongly urged to be Up to Date on Vaccination or regularly tested, and are encouraged to wear a Well-Fitted Mask. Unvaccinated patrons and Personnel must remain masked while attending or working at the performance except when another exemption applies.</u>
- g. Religious Gatherings. Unvaccinated service leaders of indoor public religious gatherings, including by way of example but not limitation, choirs, may remove their Well-Fitted Mask while actively performing religious services. Service leaders are strongly urged to be Up to Date on Vaccination or regularly tested, and are encouraged to wear a Well-Fitted Mask to the greatest extent possible. Unvaccinated Participants in indoor religious gatherings may remove their Well-Fitted Masks to participate in religious rituals.
- h. <u>Personal Services</u>. Unvaccinated patrons of personal services such as facials, beard trims, facial piercing and tattoos, and facial massages may remove their Well Fitted Mask i) if otherwise exempt under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix or ii) only while actively receiving a service or treatment that requires temporary removal of the Well Fitted Mask. Where providing services and either the provider or the patron is Unvaccinated, and where they cannot maintain at least six feet of distance, providers of personal services

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must wear a N-95 mask, respirator, or procedural/surgical mask while administering the service.

- i. <u>Recreational Sports</u>. Except as otherwise exempt under Sections 4 and 5 of this Appendix, Unvaccinated participants in indoor recreational sports, gyms, and yoga studios may <u>not</u> remove their Well Fitted Masks except while actively engaged in water-based sports (*i.e.*, swimming, swim lessons, diving, and water polo) and other sports where masks create imminent risk to health (*e.g.*, wrestling and judo).
- j. Indoor Classes, Lectures, and Other Similar Gatherings. Unvaccinated lecturers and other instructors in indoor classes and speakers at gatherings in other indoor settings outside Residences (each a "speaker") may remove their Well-Fitted Masks while actively speaking. Speakers are strongly urged to be Up-to-Date on Vaccination (including receiving a Booster as soon as eligible) and recently Tested and to wear their Well-Fitted Masks to the greatest extent possible. Unvaccinated participants must remain masked while attending the event and Unvaccinated Personnel must remain masked while working at the event, except when the person is otherwise not required to wear a Well-Fitted Mask under Sections 4 through 7 of this Appendix.
- k. Smoking or Vaping Activities. To the extent that the County issues a permit for a Business to operate a facility in which people are allowed to smoke or vape (such as cannabis consumption sites, cigar rooms, and facilities allowing smoking steaming stones or non-plant based products for hookah), a patron is allowed to remove a Well-Fitted Mask i) if the patron is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, ii) when another exemption or allowance under this Order expressly applies, or iii) for Unvaccinated patrons, only while actively smoking or vaping if the patron has provided proof of having had a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but people are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart). For proof of a Test, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is thirdparty verification—the Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing.

6. Indoor Mega-Events.

Separate from the requirements in Section 7 of the Order regarding proof that patrons or staff are Up to Date on Vaccination or have a negative Test before they may enter an indoor Mega-Event, operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events may, but are not required to, adopt rules allowing patrons who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series to remove their Well-Fitted Masks as outlined in this Section. Once inside an indoor Mega-Event, any patron who is vaccinated (whether Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series

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or Up to Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster once Booster Eligible) may be allowed to remove their Well-Fitted Masks. Patrons who are Unvaccinated must keep their Well-Fitted Masks on except when an exception or allowance listed in this Appendix applies (such as while actively eating or drinking).

Staff may separately be allowed by the operators and hosts of indoor Mega Events to remove masks subject to the same rules as patrons for removing masks, but operators and hosts of indoor Mega-Events may be required to impose additional restrictions or obtain additional documentation in relation to employees or Personnel under Cal/OSHA's regulations. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html.

Because the State's Post Blueprint Guidance for indoor Mega Events and this Order require operators and hosts of indoor Mega Events to check for proof of vaccination or Testing status on entry of all patrons and staff, there is not an additional requirement to check vaccination status for removal of masks indoors under this Section except as provided in this paragraph. Hosts and operators of indoor Mega Events can satisfy the requirements for mask removal by patrons once the patrons are inside the facility at minimum by posting signs at public entrances and at appropriate locations inside the facility saying that if a patron is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, the patron may remove their mask in the facility, and Unvaccinated patrons may remove their masks while actively eating or drinking. Sample signage for this purpose is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19. Operators and hosts may adopt requirements that are more protective of public health, such as continuing to require universal masking or requiring additional, more stringent requirements that meet their operational needs.

7.6. Covered Businesses (Appendix B).

Covered Businesses described in Section 4(a)(i) of the Order and defined Appendix B (e.g., restaurants, bars, gyms and fitness facilities, theaters, clubs, and entertainment venues) are, for the time being, still required to check for proof of vaccination or Testing status for all patrons and staff before entry (or soon thereafter as allowed by Appendix B). Separate from those requirements, Covered Businesses may, but are not required to, adopt rules allowing patrons who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series to remove their Well Fitted Masks as provided in this Section. Because such Covered Businesses are required by this Order to check for proof of vaccination or Testing status on entry (or on first interaction as required by Appendix B) of all patrons and staff, there is not an additional requirement to check vaccination status for removal of masks indoors except as provided in this paragraph. Covered Businesses can satisfy the requirements for mask removal by patrons once patrons are inside the facility at minimum by posting signs at public entrances and at appropriate locations inside the facility saying that if a

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patron is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, the patron, once proof of vaccination or Testing status is confirmed, may remove their mask in the facility, and Unvaccinated persons may remove their masks while actively eating or drinking. Sample signage for this purpose is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19. Covered Businesses may adopt requirements that are more protective of public health, such as continuing to require universal masking or requiring additional, more stringent requirements that meet their operational needspeople are not required under this Order to wear Well-Fitted Masks while inside Covered Businesses. But, Covered Businesses may adopt requirements that are more protective of public health than this Order requires for their individual facilities as further provided below.

8.7. Other Businesses and Governmental Facilities.

Businesses, governmental entities, and other operators or hosts of indoor public settings besides indoor Mega Events, (including Covered Businesses (as referenced in Section 76) above), and other facilities where universal indoor masking is still required,) may, but are not required to, adopt rules allowing Patrons who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series patrons to remove their Well-Fitted Masks as. As further provided in this Section. These settings include places like grocery stores, banks, and public buildings. Operators of such settings that opt to allow patrons who are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series to remove masks have additional options for confirming vaccination status of those patrons, including self-attestation. They can confirm proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series using the methods listed in the definition of "Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series" in Section 1(n) of the Order (e.g., checking the CDC vaccination card, a personal digital vaccination record issued by the State or other jurisdiction or entity, or documentation from a healthcare provider). Or they can post signs at public entrances and at appropriate locations inside the facility saying that if a patron is Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, the patron may remove their mask in the facility, in essence allowing self-attestation by those people consistent with State rules. Sample signage for this purpose is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkitcoronavirus covid-19. They 8 below, they can also adopt requirements that are more protective of public health that meet their operational needs.

9. <u>Signage</u>.

All Businesses and governmental entities are required to conspicuously post signage as provided in Section 4(f) of the Order. That signage should include any rules specific to the entity or location regarding masking (such as a requirement that patrons be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up to Date on Vaccination, including a Booster when Booster-Eligible, and whether masks are required of all patrons regardless of vaccination status).

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<u>10.8.</u> <u>Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures.</u>

This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to indoor masking. Nothing in this Order, including this Appendix A, is intended to reduce any other federal, state, or local legal requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual Business' or governmental entity's choices to take more health protective measures. Businesses or governmental entities may impose further restrictions that are more protective of public health than the minimum requirements under this Order, including, without limitation, requiring patrons or Personnel to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, requiring them to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, or taking other measures that meet their operational needs (such as, by way of example only, mandating that people be Up-to-Date on Vaccination and only allowing a testing alterative if someone has an exemption to vaccination based on Religious Beliefs or a Qualifying Medical Reason.)

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1. <u>Covered Businesses and Events</u>.

For purposes of this Appendix B, "Covered Businesses" include:

- a. Operators/hosts of establishments or events where food or drink is served indoors—including, but not limited to, dining establishments, bars, clubs, theaters, and entertainment venues. For clarity, this does not include food or drink provided as part of a religious ceremony (*e.g.*, communion or kiddush).
- b. Gyms, recreation facilities, yoga studios, dance studios, and other fitness establishments, where any patrons engage in cardiovascular, aerobic, strength training, or other exercise involving elevated breathing. For clarity, fitness establishments and activities that are part of a K-12 school or operate as a Program for Children and Youth are covered by separate sector-specific directives (available at www.sfdph.org/directives) and are not subject to the requirements of this Appendix B.
- 2. Vaccination or Testing Requirement for Patrons of Covered Businesses.
 - a. Requirement. For the time being, Covered Businesses must continue to require all patrons age 12 and older to show proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series before entering any indoor portion of a facility, subject only to the Testing alternative in this Section 2 and any applicable requirements of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation. Boosters are not required. But Covered Businesses are strongly urged to require all patrons to show proof that they are Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including receipt of a Booster by patrons age 12 and older as soon as eligible, before entering any indoor portion of a facility, subject only to the exceptions below and any applicable requirement of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation.

For purposes of showing proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series, Covered Businesses may not accept a written self-attestation. The following are the only acceptable proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series:

- (1) the CDC vaccination card, which includes name of person vaccinated, type of vaccine provided, and date last dose administered, or similar documentation issued by another foreign governmental jurisdiction;
- (2) a photo or copy of a vaccination card as a separate document;
- (3) a photo of a vaccination card stored on a phone or electronic device;
- (4) documentation of vaccination from a healthcare provider; or
- (5) a personal digital COVID-19 vaccine record issued by the State of California

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and available by going to https://myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov or similar documentation issued by another state, local, or foreign governmental jurisdiction, or by an approved private company (a list of approved companies offering digital vaccine cards is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/vaccine-verification-sites.asp).

Covered Businesses are required to cross-check proof of vaccination status for each patron against a photo identification, unless photo identification is integrated into the digital COVID-19 vaccine record.

As an alternative to checking proof of vaccination status for patrons and staff, operators of such Covered Businesses are allowed, but not required by this Order, to instead accept proof of a negative COVID-19 Test taken within one day (for antigen tests) or two days (for PCR tests) before entry into the facility (but people are not required to be Tested more than twice each week so long as each Test is done at least three days apart). Patrons and staff who enter based on a negative COVID-19 Test must also wear a Well-Fitted Mask at all times except as allowed under any of the specific exceptions or allowances under Appendix A of this Order.

For purposes of showing proof of a Test as required in the preceding paragraph, self-administered antigen testing is not acceptable at this time unless there is third-party verification—the Covered Business must require proof of a negative Test as outlined by CDPH's guidance in the section titled "What can be used as proof of a negative pre-entry test in settings where pre-entry testing is required?", available online at www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Updated-COVID-19-Testing-Guidance.aspx#pre-entry-testing.

b. Exceptions and Clarifications.

- i. For clarity, individuals who are Unvaccinated (*i.e.*, who do not provide proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series) may, without being required to show proof of a negative Test, use the outdoor portions of Covered Business facilities (but not the indoor portions except solely as provided in subsections (ii), (iii), and (v) below).
- ii. Covered Businesses may allow Unvaccinated patrons wearing a Well Fitted Mask to come indoors to use a restroom.
- iii. Dining establishments and bars may require proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test to be shown at the time of patrons' first in-person interaction with staff (e.g., at the time of ordering) rather than at the entrance to the establishment, but only if all such patrons wear Well-Fitted Masks at all times after entering the indoor portion of the facility and before showing such proof. Dining establishments and bars are

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prohibited from serving any patron indoors who fails to provide this proof.

- iv. Theaters where concessions are sold may require proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test to be shown at the time of patrons' purchase of concessions rather than at the entrance to the establishment. Theaters are prohibited from selling food or beverages to any patron indoors who fails to provide this proof.
- v. Dining establishments and bars that serve food may allow individuals wearing a Well Fitted Maskpeople to enter the indoor portion of the facility to order, pick up, or pay for food or drink "to go" without showing either proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative Test.
- vi. Businesses may obtain proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series and proof of a negative Test in advance of a patron's arrival at a facility, *e.g.*, by email or through a reservation system, but must confirm identification and timing of the negative Test at the time of entry into the facility.
- vii. Businesses operating food courts in indoor shopping centers that offer seated dining are required to obtain proof of being Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test for patrons who eat at the food court, and such proof may be shown at the time of patrons' purchase of food or beverages rather than at the entrance to the dining area. Businesses are prohibited from selling food or beverages to any patron for consumption at the food court who fails to provide this proof.
- viii. Individuals hosting private events in their homes are not subject to the requirements of this Appendix B but are urged to consider requiring <u>all</u> guests age five and older to show proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a negative COVID-19 Test, particularly if the guests include people who may be medically vulnerable.

3. <u>Vaccination Requirement for Staff of Covered Businesses.</u>

- a. <u>Requirements</u>. Subject to the exceptions below and any applicable requirements of federal, state, or local laws requiring accommodation:
 - i. Covered Businesses must use their best efforts to ascertain either the vaccination status or proof of a negative Test of all staff who routinely work onsite. A sample Employee Vaccination Program Ascertainment Form is available at www.sfdph.org/dph/covid-19/files/declination.pdf.
 - ii. Covered Businesses must ensure that all staff who routinely work onsite provide proof that they are Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or proof of a

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- negative COVID-19 Test before entering or working in any indoor portion of the facility.
- iii. Boosters are not required for staff. But Covered Businesses are strongly urged to ensure that all staff who routinely work onsite provide proof that they are Upto-Date on Vaccination before entering or working in any indoor portion of the facility.
- iv. Consistent with applicable privacy laws and regulations, Covered Businesses must maintain records of staff vaccination or exemption status, and provide these records to the Health Officer or other public health authorities promptly upon request, and in any event no later than the next business day after receiving the request.
- v. Businesses and other entities must adhere to applicable Cal/OSHA regulations relating to COVID-19 health and safety measures in the workplace and should frequently check for updates to those regulations such as by checking online at www.dir.ca.gov/dosh/coronavirus/covid19faqs.html. At the time of the issuance of the current update to this Order, those regulations require employers to document the vaccination status of their staff (*i.e.*, no self-attestation).

b. Exceptions and Clarifications.

i. For clarity, "staff" as used in this order does not include all individuals included in the broader term "Personnel." Individuals who enter or work in a Covered Business facility on an intermittent or occasional basis or for short periods of time (*e.g.*, individuals who deliver goods or packages) are not covered by the requirements in this Appendix B.

4. <u>Signage</u>.

All Covered Businesses are required to conspicuously post signage as provided in Section 4(fe) of the Order. That signage can and shouldmust include any rules specific to the Covered Business regarding pre-entry vaccination statusor Testing requirements (such as listing a requirement for entry that patrons be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, including a Booster when Booster-Eligible, and whether a negative Test is allowed instead of being vaccinated).

5. <u>Indoor Mega-Events</u>.

The <u>vaccination or testing</u> requirements for entry to indoor Mega-Events, <u>which align</u> <u>with State health rules under the State's Post Blueprint Guidance</u>, are covered in Section 7 of the Order.

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6. <u>Minimum Requirements; Ability to Adopt More-Restrictive Measures.</u>

This Order establishes the minimum requirements related to vaccination requirements for Covered Businesses. Nothing in this Order, including this Appendix B, is intended to reduce any other federal, state, or local legal requirements or otherwise modify them in a way that is less protective of public health, or to limit an individual Business' or governmental entity's choices to take more health protective measures. Businesses or governmental entities may impose further restrictions that are more protective of public health than the minimum requirements under this Order, including, without limitation, requiring patrons or Personnel to be Vaccinated with a Complete Initial Series or Up-to-Date on Vaccination, requiring them to wear a Well-Fitted Mask, or taking other measures that meet their operational needs (such as, by way of example only, mandating that people be Up-to-Date on Vaccination and only allowing a testing alterative if someone has an exemption based on Religious Beliefs or Qualifying Medical Reasons.)





Dear Housing Stability Fund Oversight Board members, Mayor Breed, and Board of Supervisors,

In November 2020, San Francisco voters resoundingly approved Proposition K with over 73% of the vote, giving the City the legal authority to create a Public Housing for All program.

To make this program a reality, the SF Community Housing Act team submitted a detailed proposal to you on February 14, 2022, which recommends:

- 1) Commissioning a study on the financial sustainability of municipal social housing.
- 2) Commissioning a study on setting up an enterprise agency for municipal social housing.
- 3) Appropriating approximately \$5 million to cover initial staffing for this agency, once the studies in (1) and (2) are complete.

I am writing to urge you to fund these studies and initial staffing as part of the budget and research recommendations produced by the Housing Stability Fund Oversight Board, regarding how to use Prop I funds for social housing in FY 2022-23.

There are a number of benefits that a local Public Housing for All program can provide, such as:

- Deeply affordable housing focused on low-income households
- A financially sustainable mixed-income housing infrastructure with broad-based voter support
- Local regulation that centers San Francisco values on racial and economic equity
- Strong standards for environmentally sustainable construction and acquisition
- Good-paying City jobs with union labor
- Independence from discriminatory federal public housing laws

- Independence from federal defunding, due to minimal need for operating subsidies
- A public-sector infrastructure that scales to meet our housing needs, and serves as a pipeline for workforce training programs such as CityBuild.

For these reasons, I urge you to include the SF Community Housing Act proposal's recommendations in your budget and research recommendations for the next fiscal year.

Right now, this is in front of my house. On March 7, it will have been here for 3 months. They smoke drugs, generate tons of trash, BLOCK THE WHOLE SIDE WALK FROM CURB TO THE HOUSES THEY ARE IN FRONT OF! Repeat: there is no sidewalk access and police say they cannot do anything about it. So now you are not only failing people with disabilities, you are breaking the law!



The father and his four-year old son have to circumnavigate it in the street and track backwards in order to enter their home.



The police will do nothing. My supervisor, Hillary Ronen, will no longer respond to my phone calls or emails, 311 will do nothing. There is a Safe Sleeping Area across the street (see the green plastic fencing in photos). The people living in this encampment are an extension of the SSA. They were kicked out of the SSA because they did not follow rules. Hillary Ronen feels it is perfectly fine for these lawless people to now inhabit our public sidewalks and force our under-served neighborhood to deal with them. HILLARY RONEN promised tents would be in the SSA, not on our sidewalks. We have had out-of-control encampments on our street for the two years since they set the Safe Sleeping Area up as a result of the SSA kicking out residents onto our sidewalks.



How is this fair to the low income, poc, immigrant, residents in my community? It is, in fact, a progressive San Francisco generated slum, and is no less than environmental injustice. Dear Bureaucrats and Politicians,

It took David Campos and then Hillary Ronen six years to destroy my community.

We bought this house in 1994. It was a stretch. Since then, we have touched every square inch of it with love. Sadly, Campos and Ronen have exploited the community around it in order to advance their misguided ideologies and now the neighborhood is no longer livable. In fact, it is harming our health and well being. My husband, at 82, is gifted with tremendous health and vitality. Part of this extends from the fact that he walked everywhere. One of the reasons we moved into this neighborhood is that we could walk to everything and we rarely had to drive. Now, we put on our blinders when we leave the front door, rush into the car, and drive out of the neighborhood to walk, go to work, or go shopping. Why? Our neighborhood has become choked with encampments since 2016. The squalor from encampments and the sheer amount of trash on the streets from illegal dumping and littering generated by San Francisco policies that promote these conditions have

turned our streets into what can only be described as third-world-slums. There is no joy in walking in our neighborhood.

For years, we have contributed our talents to the betterment of San Francisco. My husband and I work in the arts. I have been an arts educator since 1997, teaching at The San Francisco Art Institute, California College of the Arts, City College, and now UC Berkeley Extension. I am an artist and work in my home studio. I have shown work nationally and internationally in museums and galleries. I have now opened an art gallery that champions older artists that are at the height of their artistic output. My fourth exhibition at the gallery will be on March 11. My husband is an architect and has run his own architect office for forty-eight years. He has been a leader on outdoor trips through the Sierra Club for over twenty five years. He is also an educator and has taught at the University of Oregon, the City University of New York, and UC Berkeley Extension. We have five children and seven grandchildren.

San Francisco policy, for six years, is at cross purposes with communities. In 2016, we thought that San Francisco's goal was to shelter and house the homeless. It has become apparent, however, that San Francisco's policy is to use our public sidewalks as a holding area for the un-housed. This has created intolerable conditions in neighborhoods like mine that have high populations of immigrants, low-income people, and people of color-- populations that lack the political and financial clout to successfully fight for the environmental justice they deserve.

I am a two time cancer survivor. Even thoughI have taken dance classes, danced professionally, and eat well, my genetic makeup is prone to cancer. My recovery and survival depends on not sustaining high levels of stress. Long walks in the neighborhood and yoga have helped keep me on an even keel. However, the deterioration in my neighborhood has put me in an acute and constant state of stress. I now have high blood pressure. I am angry all the time. I can't sleep through the night. Within the last month, the woman in the encampment in front of my house has yelled at me twice (including yelling at me yesterday). Their dogs bark through the night. I feel that I can no longer sustain the level of stress caused by living in the severely compromised conditions in my neighborhood. More infuriating, is that these conditions are perpetuated by the failed policies of Hillary Ronen and the city of San Francisco.

I recently walked to a doctor appointment at CPMC on Valencia and Cesar Chavez (about six blocks) and this is only a fraction of the squalor I had to walk through (three people I passed were completely zoned out on god knows what):















But worse is the complete abandonment by Ronen, the mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and the police, of myself, my husband, and my community at large. We have been dismissed, disrespected, and treated like we are a nuisance. We are expected to put up, shut up, and to tolerate the people taking over our sidewalks along with their trash, drug selling and usage, drinking, dogs, and bad behavior. We are supposed to embrace the poorly managed Self Sleeping Area that Ronen forced into our community and is now a half a city block of trash and graffiti. We are expected to keep our mouths shut when this same Safe Sleeping Area kicks out their unruly residents that then set up enormous encampments on the sidewalks in front of our homes. If we complain, like I have for the last six years, we are blacklisted. Hillary Ronen and her assistant do not answer my phone calls or emails. Even when I reported to her the brutal beating of my husband from a deranged person in June of this year, she said nothing. I have been complaining to the Mayor's office for years through 311. The office is supposed to respond within seven days. I received one email in all those years but it led nowhere since they did not follow up.

I ask you, how are we supposed to exist here when you have completely degraded our community? How do we exist in a place where we have become invisible? How do we exist in a community where the politicians don't care about our health and safety? This is not a rhetorical question. It is the same

question I have been asking since 2017 and every year after. How is it ok that we have to put up with sprawling and squalid encampments in front of our houses and businesses, under our windows, and attached to our homes? How are we supposed to co-exist with the mentally ill and substance addicted people who inhabit our sidewalks when we have no experience or training in public health? Why do politicians and bureaucrats not care that the majority of people in my neighborhood no longer feel safe? I have never received an answer. And, after all these years, things have only gotten exponentially worse.

It is crystal clear to me that people like myself and my husband are no longer appreciated or wanted in San Francisco. We are long-time San Francisco constituents who have, for years, brought value in their communities through service, education, arts, culture and the sustainment of small businesses. We are no longer seen as an asset. San Francisco has now shifted its business model to that of a homeless industrial complex. It no longer needs the mom-and-pop stores, the artists, the small businesses, or entrepreneurs, because there is plenty of money to be made off the backs of the less fortunate through the funding of nonprofits and city agencies that are perfectly content with the status quo.

Subject: Land Use Committee Hearing 2/28/22

In 1978, as a member of the AIA Board of Directors, I represented the AIA before the Board of Supervisors on the subject of housing policy with a focus on expanding development options in the low rise sections of the City. The process was successful and endured for many years. We are here again, many presentations later, hoping to bring the professional expertise of the City in this important arena of housing, to your service, working for the good of the greater community. This is a very complex matter that will have broad reaching impact on our collective ability to deliver quality, privately financed, workforce housing in San Francisco. Because the negative impacts are significant, we ask that the Committee consider a moratorium on the proposed zoning changes to allow a working group of industry professionals, including but not limited to the AIA, to further assess the impacts of this legislation. We request a delay of 6 months accompanied by a freeze on any new projects under this zoning be imposed throughout the City while this is resolved. This approach addresses the sense of urgency while maintaining your opportunity to get this right.

Group Occupancy, the zoning affected, is very different from the model called Group Housing being touted and **is the only zoning that supports privately financed**, **highly sustainable workforce housing in San Francisco**. Material efforts to misrepresent the nature of this housing undermines your ability to clearly understand the potential negative impact of changes to this principally permitted zoning. Once it is gone, we will be hard pressed to find another successful vehicle for this housing.

Our attached letter to the Planning Commission dated February 10 outlines the issues that impact this housing typology. Minor changes to the language proposed by Mr Peskin would achieve the majority of the benefits sought and not eliminate the housing opportunity. There is a potential balance that is not presented as written but may be amended to address concerns about the typology while maintaining the ability of the development community to provide needed housing.

361 Turk is the only new building being delivered in San Francisco that is based on the Group Occupancy zoning. It is a state of the art, Independent Living, housing prototype. It is available to tour at your convenience and demonstrates all of the elements identified in your amendments, including the allocation of community spaces exactly as presented in the proposed legislation. We encourage you to take the time to join us and walk the project. It is delivering 240 new housing units this summer.

We hope to share this with you in person later today.

President Tanner and Members of the Planning Commission

We appreciate the opportunity to again speak to the Commission in support of Group Occupancy and Workforce Housing in San Francisco.

The current zoning, designated Group Occupancy, offers the most innovative and flexible housing solution available in the City. As seen in the attached article, it is the state of the art in Workforce housing. As a demonstration of best practices under the current code, we invite you to visit the only GO housing of its type in the City at our project called TL361, nearing completion at 361 Turk St. Please visit the project before a decision is made. See what you are being asked to vote against.

Group Occupancy zoning, as currently written, provides a path to delivering workforce housing to small families that is privately financed and significantly more sustainable than other housing solutions available under any other zoning in SF. This is a complex typology and the modifications by Planning, none of which have been seen by the public, will eliminate this product currently being successfully delivered in the Tenderloin. The negative impact on housing delivery for the missing middle is significant but avoidable. Based on the proposed changes in policy, the housing being delivered at 361 Turk this summer could not be developed. The effect is to eliminate the product option from the City's very constrained pipeline for new housing.

The recommendations from Planning have not been adequately made available for review and we ask for a continuance to allow further study of the impacts and offer comment and alternatives to better address the expressed concerns.

Our team has been actively working with planning since 2013 to create new applications of the Group Occupancy code to address workforce housing in the City. Analysis undertaken by Forge in 2017, supported by Panasonic (largest builder of small space housing in the world) and IBM studied this housing typology. Through this ideation process we identified "independent living" models as the most beneficial to the largest demographic. Private spaces supporting a community focused living experience were preferred. This was counter to the assumptions of many who pressed the concept of co-living similar to the Planninig recommendations. Co-living, which has become popular in SF and promoted by Starcity, Common and others, involves having a sleeping room but sharing bath and cooking facilities with between 4 and 15 others. We rejected this college suite style, opting for privacy and independence but in association with significant shared facilities. It is an "opt in" program allowing flexibility and personal choice.

Only by being free to not join can you join freely in community.

The solution we identified delivers true **independent living within a supportive community** with options for all, especially those in mid income ranges who do not qualify for subsidy or agency and look to Affordable by Design solutions.

A viable independent living solution called for the combination of both in unit cooking and community kitchens. The ratio we found to be most effective is lower than the legislation is proposing but the model is similar. Our study indicates that when mixed, the use will be about 1/3 what the ordinance is projecting. Group Occupancy falls under congregate housing in the CBC which carefully



defines these requirements.. We suggest a correlation with the CBC on the requirement for community kitchens. For the ordinance, we suggest not more than 1/50 units. The managing operators we work with do not project greater actual use on a scheduled basis. It is important to understand that a large percentage of residents will never use the facility, a small group will use it occasionally and a few will use it often. As in many food environments, use is reserved with management. As an example, there are several "slots" for "dinner" preparation, and these are scheduled by both the managers and users.

Space allocation:

We agree with the space allocation proposed in the legislation. The project at TL 361 was guided by extensive input from Planning regarding the overall need and use of common space in support of small units. There were no guidelines but the results of responsible design show similar areas of allocation. TL361 is delivering a total of 15,000 sf of shared common area inclusive of this requirement. The total is approximately equal to the proposed 0.25 per foot of GO unit (14,400sf per this legislation). To make this more clear to Planning, it could be defined as all area and service area that is not used as mechanical or common circulation or hallways. It should be clear that this does not include outdoor area required to meet outdoor space requirements shown elsewhere in the Group Occupancy code as it stands today.

Energy and Sustainability Advantages:

California laws that govern utilities allow for a single house meter for projects that are considered to be congregate and have the opportunity for a length of stay of **under 30 days**. Per PG&E, there is only one project of this type in California today, developed by Forge and located at 361 Turk, which has been approved for this service option. The same is true for the Water service.

TL361 is the first multifamily project post 1970 which has successfully navigated and implemented this approach and is supported by PG&E and SDG&E. The cost and operational benefits are being realized in real time at this project.

Length of Stay (LOS):

As noted above, LOS is a key component that unlocks one of the largest opportunities to impact both cost of construction and sustainability. **By setting the time at less than 30 days**, and by designating the project as a **congregate housing** solution under CBC, TL361 successfully received approval for a single meter solution for both electrical (PG&E) and water service (PUC). This one item reduced the initial cost of construction by upwards of \$50,000 per key. It reduces the size of PG&E services to the building by 30% or more. It reduces the ongoing cost of energy and water to residents proportionally.

Current Group Occupancy zoning allows 7 days as a minimum length of stay. There currently is no outside limit of term of stay. Once someone is in place for more than 30 days, other housing rules apply and their occupancy becomes grandfathered. We recognize the desire for GO units to be available for longer occupancy and suggest an alternative that could address concerns and maintain the benefits. If it were possible to amend the legislation to provide that a tenant(resident) may, at their discretion, extend their agreement for a consecutive period. That extension, if our initial period is 15 days, would bring them under the current ordinances addressing the rights of residents under other San Francisco codes. If the legislation set the LOS at 15 days, as a whereas, all of the desired benefits unlocked at TL361 would be in effect and the residents could avail themselves of the protections under the housing code.

Key elements of GO zoning make it the most viable code for WF housing

There is a collection of overlayered codes that derive from SF Planning Code (and 2017 Housing for Families) California Building Code, PUC requirements, and Energy Codes. Together they provide a



platform that allows the delivery of privately financed workforce housing. Change any aspect of how these interact and the opportunity to build this housing is eliminated. Group Occupancy provides:

- Length of Stay: Less than 30 days: GO provides for a 7 day minimum stay. There is no upper limit. Because this is less than 30 days, it allows interpretation of the unit as "transient" for the short period. This links to both Electrical and Plumbing Code interpretations.
- It recognizes the reality that residents will deploy appliances in their units and codifies what is allowed. The definition links to the CBC code requirements and has material favorable impact on the cost of delivery. GO allows limited cooking defined by ZA and CBC as not including a traditional "Oven".
 - This dovetails with CBC as Congregate housing and with the PUC for energy load calculations, and provides basis for sustainable practices in water and power distribution and use. This element results in savings per unit estimated at \$50,000 per key.
 - CBC defines the number and area requirements for shared kitchen facilities. Planning expanded this interpretation in the most recent clarifications by the ZA in 2020. Although not codified, it indicates a distribution of 1/50 units.
- The size of units allowed under current ZA interpretations provides a mix of larger sizes that meet the defined needs of the 2017 Housing for Families study.

CBC provides:

- GO is defined in CBC as Congregate Housing. This sets standards for ADA, Cooking and food preparation requirements including space allocations per unit.
 - o ADA: Buildings may be categorized as either 11A or 11B. This has impact on the cost and delivery of the private bathrooms in each unit.
 - Under CBC, units may have either a private bath or a kitchen but not both. The
 definition of Kitchen is the same as GO: no Oven allowed. CBC is more flexible on the
 size of the refrigerator which we think is important to amend in GO.

Benefits of Group Occupancy Zoning:

- Deeper Affordability: BMR units in GO housing are governed by the Avalos legislation which lowers rents on a per unit basis by 25%. This effectively lowers the income requirements from 55% AMI to +/- 40% AMI. This concession by GO developers increases the affordability significantly and is unique to the current zoning.
- Units are restricted in size to 250-875 sf. This is exactly in the range projected by Planning in the 2017 publication on family housing. It is also the range of housing that meets criteria for Affordable by Design.
- Single Meter Electrical and Water service: This benefit is available to GO housing exclusively. The combined impact reduces energy use by 30% and water can be reduced by up to 50%. The combined impact on the cost per unit is a reduction of initial cost of approximately \$50,000 and a reduction in on going operating costs that benefit residents directly.
- A principally permitted use that, because of ZA interpretations in 2021 is size controlled to match the recommendations in the 2017 Housing for Families.

False Narrative: Proponents of eliminating Group Occupancy as an effective housing solution claim the typology does not support "kids". This is simply untrue and it is sad if the drumbeat of misinformation has been allowed to influence this policy process.

In 2021 the Zoning Administrator amended his interpretation of GO unit sizes to include apartments up to 875sf. This size falls into the exact middle range of 2 BR housing units as proposed by Planning in the 2017 Housing for Families with Children. Our proposed project at 450 O'Farrell included a mix of units that are specifically designed to meet the needs of small families as defined in the 2017 study and address the economic and social needs of the actual demographic to be served per the study. This shows that the current code, a principally permitted use, adequately addresses the defined need of the City. **The Planning recommendation is silent on this aspect of current code.**



Planning description:

The language provided by planning as Background is limited and does not adequately describe the history and nature of the existing product. We ask that this be further detailed for the Commission to make these decisions.

Background:

It is stated that the developers created a loophole in the interpretation of the GO code. As a developer **delivering** housing under this code we are not aware of any loophole. Forge worked diligently with Planning and their representatives Kate Connor and Carly Grob to craft a set of design parameters that are much aligned with the onsite requirements presented in the proposed legislation on items such as the kitchenettes, amenity and community spaces, shared kitchens and open space allocations. Based on the recent interpretations of the current code by the Zoning Administrator, there is a wide variety of unit sizes and users served. Although there is no current mix requirement, this does not preclude an approach similar to the Avalos legislation that brought GO under the Inclusionary Housing policies and applying that to a mix model. The statements made in the Background are misleading and should be revisited to reflect the actual condition. We agree that there is much to be clarified in the margins regarding GO including new rules of interpretation for BMR designations with MOH to make the application clear and more seamless. That work should be undertaken before such material change is contemplated.

This section talks about the use of the kitchenette to prepare meals by the residents. That is and has been the standard. Misrepresentations by proponents of this legislation claim that the kitchenettes are effectively non effective but in this section this is specifically how they are seen by planning policy. The ability to privately prepare meals in your space in a long term stay is an important aspect of the user experience in support of independent living and should not be abandoned. The descriptions of this existing situation appear to be conflicting within the text and confuse the issue.

Group Housing: A Different Form of Housing.

We feel the description inaccurately presents the difference between Group Housing and Dwelling Units. Dwelling units are described as a "complete unit" and include both a bath and full kitchen. This is consistent at the CBC level as well as all associated plumbing and electrical codes. There is no limit to the size of a DU and once they are above 1000sf, they become unaffordable to the majority of households in the City.

GO is built under the Congregate Housing per CBC. Per the current interpretations of the Zoning Administrator, they may have a limited cooking capability and a private bath and closet. They are limited in size to not exceed 875sf and, in that interpretation, were created to allow for small families consistent with the 2017 Planning study. GO is intended to be smaller, affordable by design, units. CBC sets standards for GO units to include community gathering spaces and kitchens where DU projects do not.

The ongoing assessment of the cooking capabilities of the kitchenette solution and the actual use of community kitchens is exaggerated in our experience. Proponents of the policy changes repeatedly misstate the impact and total cooking currently proposed in the only actually delivered GO projects. To require 1/15 full kitchens will create significant unused facilities that can be better tasked for other uses. The proposed increase in common area by the Department, effectively doubling that proposed in the legislation, creates a substantial burden on development. Dwelling Units have no common use area requirement. This burden of additional space per unit will undermine the feasibility of the projects. The area proposed by the legislation, as opposed to the Planning proposal, is consistent with the designs and studies done with Planning to create TL36. Note that CBC also stipulates the scale and use of common areas and shared kitchens.



If implemented without amendment, ALL of the sustainability benefits of the current code will be lost. The alternative proposals we identify will not negatively affect the apparent goals but will maintain the significant benefits available to the City. Please allow time to better understand the myriad of impacts such a sweeping change will cause and support a continuation for this Planning response.



We are fortunate to have partnered with the best and the brightest to ensure TL 361 and TL 145 provide comfort, technological quality and wellness not found in other multifamily developments at any price point. This combination of technology, innovative design and sustainable construction practices will be Forge's benchmark for all future projects, including an upcoming development at 601 Beech Street in San Diego."

The TL 361 and TL 145 projects have benefited from the support of San Francisco Mayor Breed's Office through her commitment to innovation in all forms of housing in response to the City's housing crisis. Innovation built on currently applicable city policies created

the opportunity, but real time efforts from the Mayor's office helped smooth the construction process and made this sustainable, climate, and social justice responsive project a possibility.

With the recent release of the City's Climate Action Plan and the Mayor's **ClimateSF** initiative, the sustainability measures and advancements incorporated into TL 361 and TL 145 align with the City's goals for increased climate resilience and provide an application of ESG in action.

A Bridge Investment Group representative said "We are delighted to have partnered with Forge on the TL 361 and 145 Projects. Our investment support has helped Forge and its partners create a new model that integrates environmental sustainability, social programs and key innovations with local governments and utilities that will serve as a new model for multifamily workforce housing in America."

The projects have been innovative since ideation. Forge worked with Gensler and Olson Steel to design and construct the TL 361 and TL 145 buildings using the Pueblo Structural System. The steel used in this system is approximately 30% lighter and uses between 90-95% recycled steel, resulting in a quicker building construction and a smaller carbon footprint when compared with traditional multifamily building construction.

Lighter weight concrete used as part of the construction further reduces the building's greenhouse gas impacts while remaining earthquake resistant. The cost and time savings measures are carried over to future residents through more affordable rents and the construction of more units in a quicker timeframe.

Forge and its partners also incorporated climate and health-conscious building systems as part of its efforts to construct environmentally sustainable developments. Both buildings include solar thermal water heating systems that reduce overall water boiler gas usage by 30% when compared with traditional systems. Moreover, the buildings incorporate a state-of-the-art HVAC system that provides the highest level of air quality available in multifamily units.

"Our HVAC system uses the most efficient MERV 13 antimicrobial filters on the market to create a pressurized hypoallergenic air supply for the building," stated Hannum. "This filters out wildfire smoke and industrial pollutants, which is becoming more important due to climate change, as well as viruses including COVID-19."

To further minimize the spread of viruses, Forge partnered with Homebase to develop Smart Apartment Homes for the TL 361 and 145 Projects, which will reduce contact with high-touch surfaces and provide a more seamless user experience. Smart Apartment Homes allows future residents to unlock their front doors, turn on lighting, adjust heating and cooling systems and more from an app on their mobile phone.

In addition, this technology will sense when residents aren't home so that adjustments can be made to temperature controls to reduce unnecessary energy consumption. The building's smart systems will also control elevator energy usage and the common areas HVAC system, while relaying building information to staff to further optimize energy consumption and cost savings. These systems will operate over a state-of-the-art Internet of Things model, which uses 5G to create a high-speed ethernet backbone for these systems and future residents internet use.

Beyond construction and technological innovations, Forge and Bridge also seek to build healthy communities through their partnership with Project Access, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that is the leading provider of on-site health, education and employment services to middle and low-income residents.

Project Access will provide the TL 361 and 145 Projects with fully operational resources centers that serve as a community hub offering high-quality tailored programming and services such as cooking and fitness classes, financial management and leadership training, business networking events, social events and volunteer opportunities. Through these programs, Forge, Bridge and Project Access will give residents the tools they need to become healthier, further educated and financially successful.

Forge is also driving government innovations that are changing how we think about how multifamily developments are structured. In partnership with PG&E, Forge has obtained approvals for the first single metered multifamily property in the country in 30 years. Instead of individual meters tracking energy consumption of the units, utilizing single meter for the building achieves a minimum \$40,000 in savings per unit and frees up space in the building for additional units by removing the storage space for the individual meters.

This single meter initiative is scalable, and Forge has obtained approvals to build a 34 story, 328-unit multifamily building in San Diego that will use this system to reduce costs and provide a state-of-the-art development for future middle-income residents in San Diego's Little Italy neighborhood.

"At the end of the day, it is not only about the steel, concrete or technology in the building," concluded Hannum. "We are forging a new path with the next generation of housing for the Essential middle-income worker, and it takes all these pieces as well as a commitment to wellness for our tenants to develop privately-financed, accessible housing that allows our workers to live in the city where they work. Can we redefine the urban lifestyle with these technologically advanced buildings? Yes, with great partners, I think we can."

Forge's financial Partners, Bridge Investment Group and Freddie Mac, are helping make this vision for technologically advance buildings at middle income price points a reality. Under their aegis, TL 361 and TL 145 will deliver a minimum of 51% of units to be rented to those earning a maximum of 80% of the area median income (AMI) thanks to a unique Freddie Mac Multifamily unfunded forward commitment.

This will help keep rents affordable for 240 residents in the highest-cost market in the United States. Furthermore, Forge used CrowdStreet, one of the leading Financial Tech Platforms, to raise the initial equity for the project allowing accredited investors to invest in the next generation of multifamily real estate.

A model apartment will be available on site at TL 361 development at 361 Turk Street in San Francisco in early 2022.





BOS File No. 211299 [Planning Code – Group Housing Definition]

Dear Chair Melgar and Honorable Members of the Land Use and Transportation Committee:

Our office represents the San Francisco SRO Hotel Coalition and numerous individual owners of SROs, as well as developers of group housing (collectively, "Owners"). The Owners object both substantively and procedurally to Board of Supervisors File No. 211299 (the "Ordinance").

The proposed Ordinance represents a dramatic change to the City's Hotel Conversion Ordinance, via a "back door" amendment to the Planning Code. It would prohibit weekly room rentals – which have always been lawful *and encouraged* in San Francisco. It is unclear whether the Ordinance's restrictions are intended to apply to *existing* group housing units or only to *newly proposed* group housing units, and we respectfully request clarification of this issue.

To the extent the Ordinance is applied to existing group housing units, it would take away the Owners' family businesses without compensation. Worst of all, the Ordinance would harm the City's most vulnerable residents: group housing occupants who cannot afford to rent a group housing unit on a monthly basis.

1. The Ordinance does not include an amortization period.

To the extent the proposed Ordinance applies to existing units, it would make the Owners' longstanding weekly rental businesses illegal as of the effective date, including their existing right to expand and alter existing units, *inter alia* by adding kitchen facilities. There is no amortization period. It is well-established in California law that an amortization period is required and must be "reasonable" in light of the investment in the use, and its remaining economic life, order to pass constitutional muster. The Ordinance would also violate the holding in San Francisco Superior Court Case No. CPF-17-515656 by eliminating Owners' lawful use without proper amortization.

2. The lack of notice violates Due Process rights.

The Owners were given no notice of this proposed Amendment or notice of today's hearing, despite their property rights being particularly and significantly affected by it.

3. Proper CEQA review must occur.

This Ordinance constitutes a citywide rezoning, which may have significant adverse impacts on the environment. The Amendment prohibits lawful weekly rentals, which will disrupt occupancy patterns and shift occupancy and housing construction to other parts of the City and region. (BOS File No. 211300 notes that SRO uses are presently concentrated in two neighborhoods: the Tenderloin and Chinatown.) The impacts of this disruption must be studied pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA").

If a Project's economic or social effects directly or indirectly lead to adverse physical changes in the environment, CEQA requires disclosure, analysis, and mitigation of the resulting physical impacts. (Bakersfield Citizens for Local Control v. City of Bakersfield (2004) 124 Cal.App.4th 1184; California Clean Energy Committee v. City of Woodland (2014) 225 Cal.App.4th 173.) Preliminarily, "an agency that proposes project changes . . . must determine whether the previous environmental document retains any relevance in light of the proposed changes and, if so, whether major revisions to the previous environmental document are nevertheless required due to the involvement of new, previously unstudied significant environmental impacts." (Friends of the College of San Mateo Gardens v. San Mateo County Community College Dist. ("FOCSMG") (2016) 1 Cal.5th 937, 944.)

The City has not properly studied the potentially significant physical effects of the proposed Ordinance, including, but not limited to, displacement of weekly group housing renters who would be unable to come up with security and rent deposits for the 30-day minimum (apartment-rental length) that would be compelled by the Ordinance. The unstudied, but reasonably foreseeable, potential environmental impacts resulting from displacement of hundreds and hundreds of tenants, who could end up homeless and living on the City's streets and public places, include, *inter alia*, the resultant public trash, human feces and urination, pollution of waterways, waters, and City public and private spaces, and the adverse impacts to the displaced human beings themselves from lack of water and livable accommodations, exposure, cold, suffering and disease. Such reasonably foreseeable potential adverse environmental impacts of potential tenant displacement resulting from the enactment of the proposed Ordinance requires CEQA review. See, e.g., Pub. Resources Code, § 21065, CEQA Guidelines, § 15378 [defining "project" as any activity that may cause direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect change in the environment]; *Muzzy Ranch v. Solano County Airport Land Use Commission* (2007) 41 Cal.4th 372 [holding development displaced by density limits is not too speculative of an impact to require CEQA analysis].

Because the monthly rental value of the group housing units that would be effectively converted to apartments by the proposed Ordinance will in most cases be beyond the means of the very low income, disabled, elderly and "transient" users the law is purportedly intended to benefit, units remaining vacant under the Ordinance will also foreseeably lead to significant reductions in the housing stock and increases in physical blight and crime – impacts that have not been properly analyzed.

Proper environmental review clearly has not been completed. If the Ordinance is enacted without further review in accordance with law, CEQA will be violated.

4. The Ordinance violates SB 330.

The Ordinance is prohibited by SB 330, the Housing Crisis Act of 2019, because it lessens the intensity of residential use. Under the Ordinance, group housing units can no longer contain their own cooking facilities, and fewer units can be built on a lot because much more space must be dedicated to shared amenities.

Conclusion

OWNERS HAVE PREVIOUSLY SUBMITTED FOR THE BOARD'S RECORD EVIDENCE AND ARGUMENTS, INCLUDING THE EXTENSIVE BRIEFING FROM THE TRIAL AND APPELLATE COURTS IN OPPOSITION TO THE PRIOR SRO AMENDMENTS (BOS FILE NOS. 161291, 190049, 190946, AND 191258; SUPERIOR COURT CASE NO. CPF-17-515656). WE REINCORPORATE THOSE MATERIALS AND ARGUMENTS HERE BY REFERENCE AND OFFER TO LODGE HARD COPIES UPON REQUEST.

The Ordinance is unlawful for a host of reasons, and it will cause serious harm to those who are most in need of our City's protection. We urge you to oppose this misconceived proposal.

Dear Supervisors,

On behalf of many of the City's key business associations, we respectfully ask that you postpone consideration of **File # 211296 - Amending the Family Friendly Workplace Ordinance** so that more input from the employer community can be considered.

As we work to rejuvenate our vibrant neighborhood merchant communities and bring back the days of a bustling downtown, we must make sure that City laws both protect employees and allow businesses to properly staff their locations to stay open and serve the communities they are located in. We appreciate the goals of this legislation and want to work together to ensure that it works for both employers and employers.

We ask that you consider the following issues that remain, and get input from more stakeholders before moving forward with the measure in its current form:

- Undue Hardship: Language added that "the size, financial resources, nature, or structure
 of the Employer's business" must be considered when assessing undue hardship creates
 an unreasonable standard for medium and large employers who serve essential needs to
 the communities they are located in. When held to this standard, businesses like drug
 stores, banks, and groceries may be forced to change hours or close when they cannot
 properly staff their locations.
- Frequency of Requests: There should be a limit to the number of requests made. The current law allows requests to be made twice every twelve months, unless the employee experiences a major life event, in which case the employee may make, and the employer must consider, an additional request.
- Time to Respond to Requests: Seven days is too short of a period of time to ask an
 employer to respond to a request. We ask that you lengthen this time back to the
 current standard of 21 days which allows the employer to give the accommodation while
 having enough time to fill in employees for any gaps in scheduling that would be
 created.

- **Penalty Cap:** As recommended by the Small Business Commission, establish a reasonable cap on the financial penalties a business could incur per case For example: no more than \$2500 or the equivalent to 100 hours of the requesting employees pay.
- Small Business Definition: As defined in the legislation, any business that employs 20 more people would be required to comply. We ask that you amend the number of employees for businesses to be exempted to 100. This will allow our small businesses that make San Francisco so special to continue to operate without an undue burden.
- Telework: It is unclear if a covered employee actually has to work in San Francisco for some period of time or if an employee who works from a personal worksite outside of San Francisco is covered to this because the employer has an office in San Francisco. If so, the scope of employee base to which that could apply is virtually unlimited.

We appreciate the engagement from the Board of Supervisors regarding our concerns thus far, but some very real and serious concerns remain. We hope that we can continue this conversation and get to a measure that businesses can support as we work together towards a prosperous and healthy San Francisco in 2022 and beyond.

Hello Mayor Breed, District Supervisors, SFCTA and SFMTA

The first week of the Mayor's compromise plan under which the Great Highway is open to cars Monday through Friday until noon is now behind us. Aside from a couple of Critical Mass-like stunts by the no-compromise zealots, and a few issues with signage and the timing of the gate closures, the new arrangement seemed to go smoothly and to accommodate all interests.

However, the point of the compromise arrangement is to allow drivers to use the Highway during the week, when they are taking kids to school, traveling to and from jobs, etc. There seems to be little rhyme or reason to closing the Highway so early on Fridays, forcing people who are trying to get home to start their weekends to be caught up in the traffic mess that the closed Highway brings. Friday also tends to be "getaway" day, with many folks trying to leave town (including many who want the Highway closed to drivers), and cutting off this access route makes little sense. Indeed, the traffic conditions reverted to "horrendous" this first Friday once the Great Highway was closed, just as the work week was winding down.

That said, I ask that you adjust the closure hours so that the Great Highway is available to drivers through Friday's evening commute. Keep in mind, once it's dark, no one is using it but vehicles. Rather than closing it at noon on Fridays, let the closure wait until 6:00 a.m. on Saturday, consistent with Monday's 6:00 a.m. reopening.

Lower Polk Neighbors strongly supports making the current car-free space on JFK Drive in Golden Gate Park permanent.

One of our highest priorities as an organization has always been to improve our public spaces, particularly for pedestrians and cyclists in the neighborhood. Ours is one of the densest neighborhoods in the city, so we frequently have to get creative by reclaiming space from cars and making sure public spaces that people share with cars are designed to be safe.

Golden Gate Park is the jewel of San Francisco's park system. It's an incredible oasis that I and my neighbors use frequently. I was shocked to find out recently that, until it was closed to car traffic in 2020, JFK drive was part of the city's high-injury network where pedestrians and cyclists are particularly vulnerable to cars. It's amazing that a street in the city's signature park is also a place where pedestrians and cyclists are frequently injured or killed.

When JFK was closed to cars, and when the city rolled out it's network of slow streets, my wife and I sold our car and bought e-bikes. We weren't experienced city cyclists, but we were suddenly comfortable enough riding through the city on Slow Streets and on JFK. We ride down Page and into the park at least once a week. This is a case study in exactly how the city can reduce traffic, lower emissions and reach our Vision Zero goals. Giving people like me and my wife alternatives to car ownership is in the entire city's best interest.

I took up running during the pandemic, and trained for my first marathon in Golden Gate Park thanks to car-free JFK. You only have to look at the visitor statistics to see that my wife and I are far from the only ones. Early in the pandemic monthly visitors more than tripled. After leveling-off as the pandemic stabilized monthly visitors are still roughly double what they were before the pandemic. Survey after survey also supports this. Keeping cars off of JFK is as close to unanimously popular as anything can be in San Francisco. Closing JFK to cars has been an unambiguous success by any measure.

For all these reasons, I'm asking you to please keep JFK closed to cars permanently and help make Golden Gate Park what it's always supposed to have been: a natural oasis in a crowded city... an escape from the hustle and bustle of city life right in our own backyard.

 emissions in San Francisco. The City must take bold steps now to support significantly more
 low-carbon trips. Solutions like car-free JFK Drive strongly support the necessary shift

I am unable to attend BOS meetings during business hours. I am writing to submit public comment regarding the JFK drive item on the agenda for 3/1/2022

First I would like to clearly state that the drive should be open to cars. There are bike lanes and sidewalks for people who are not driving.

I had the experience of growing up on public assistance in SF. Yes it was hard to do so, but my single mother ALWAYS kept a car - a 1959 volkswagen beetle that she learned to work on with the mechanic to save money. The car was our family's ticket to see more than our little neighborhood in the City. Poor people drive, and generally do not live around JFK. Don't decrease their access. Public transportation is even less reliable than it was at that time, and not safe for children, so families need to drive if they do not live directly near the park. Period.

I still reside in the City, and appreciate the bike culture. I take advantage of the bike accommodations that have been created. I also notice the type of people who are embracing this typically the 20-35 year olds, and young white families on pricey E-bikes. This is such a small percentage of our City. The loud, **professionally organized** minority group should not dominate the decision making about JFK. And as a Board, I respectfully request that you provide priority for the poor, for SF families, for seniors, and for the majority of SF residents who do not have the privilege of residing near San Francisco's most amazing park.

Driving in the area is made unnecessarily difficult as well. Chain of Lakes is always backed up because people need to drive somewhere. This closure is not being considered IN CONJUNCTION with the closure of Great Highway but they have a compounding effect. Pushing cars into quiet neighborhoods is not worth the closure of this important Drive.

Every other week I take my mother, who no longer drives due to her age, from the Fillmore to her favorite pet shop and grocery store in the avenues. It is an exercise in frustration. She no longer enjoys taking the park route to view sights we always enjoyed due to the incredible back ups we now experience, no matter what time of day, or day of the week.

Additionally, some points I learned from the neighborhood group that I would like to emphasize are:

- Attractions such as the Entwined Light Show in Peacock Meadow, and the Conservatory of Flowers are **half mile walk each way**, from the closest park entrance.
- It removes dozens of free parking spaces used by families with young children, disabled, and seniors.

The Parking Garage is expensive.

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GOLDEN GATE PARK: JFK DRIVE DESIGN IDEAS

Hi Everyone, Golden Gate Park's accessibility is a 24/7 public asset---and data needs to guide its public stewardship. JFK Drive's design is an urban design challenge, knitting together a wide range of uses and users. Like the Hardly Strictly Bluegrass festival (see below info), design plans should facilitate access to all venues, events, activities and even someone's favorite picnic spot---especially for seniors and the disabled. Best, Howard Wong, AIA

ACCESSIBILITY PLAN

Major venues have an ADA path-of-travel plans that need to be redesigned. As an architect, I've worked on the Spreckels Temple of Music, Sharon Building/ Carousel, Conservatory of Flowers and old Aquarium---which have path-of-travel plans, linked to blue parking spots and public transit. JFK Drive has ADA parking for Music Concourse venues and beyond, which need to be restudied. A free accessible shuttle bus should access all points around JFK Drive, including lakes, fields, lawns, picnic areas, monuments, event locations.... ADA requires independent access for seniors/ disabled---as for the able-bodied. Need to put ourselves in other people's shoes.

EQUITY PLAN

At Supervisor Walton's request, SFCTA is convening focus groups of residents of Districts 3, 10, 11---to learn about their travel patterns to Golden Gate Park. Some black community members have called JFK Drive's closure a form of "recreational redlining". With no direct public transit, low-income families often drive to the park (with easy free parking). Moreover, nearly 30% of San Franciscans will be over age 60 by 2030, with their own unique challenges. A parking management plan is needed. More direct public transit is part of the solution.



MUNI BUS LOOP: Interestingly at night, Muni has a #91 Bus, which goes through Districts 3, 10, 11 and most of the city---connecting Golden Gate Park. Th #91 Owl - 3rd Street/ 19th Avenue, runs from 12 midnight – 5am nightly. If the #91 ran all day at frequent intervals, it would connect neighborhoods all over the city. Think Vienna's Ringstrasse Trolley or Melbourne's City Circle Tram.

TRANSIT PLAN

On February 25, 2022, SFMTA/ Rec-Park announced expanded shuttle bus service on JFK Drive---but it's not equivalent accessibility. The hundreds of activities, events, venues and personal favorite spots should have equitable access. An accessible shuttle bus loop could connect to Muni bus stops, ADA/ paratransit parking, touristy hop-on-hop off buses, taxi/ ride-share drop-off stops and parking lots. Golden Gate Park is multi-use, with the highest density at the two major museums, with nearly 10 million annual visitors---not to mention the gardens, lakes, picnic areas and fields—all having their own constituency.

It encourages families to ride bicycles, or walk, or use a scooter and see that they are useful for transportation as well as recreation. I have spoken to more than one person who has (re)learned to bicycle on the new JFK. They would not have done so if the space was not car free; neighborhood streets are too threatening for many reasons - mostly related to cars. While car free JFK is not enough, it is a critical part of network of car free and slow street spaces that will encourage mode shift.

Dear Supervisor Chan:

A February 24 Chronicle article by J. D. Morris says that you intend to assemble a new working group to determine the future of JFK Drive: "Chan said she hopes the new group could come up with a proposal by April or May that will address concerns about access to the park for disabled people while allowing JFK Drive to remain largely car-free in perpetuity." The focus of your solution for disability access is improvements to the Music Concourse Garage, which might require a ballot measure in November if public money were used.

But as described in detail in the MIG access report, that wouldn't be sufficient. The report concludes: "By removing free accessible parking in the immediate vicinity of the museum and by not providing equivalent free parking within a reasonable travel distance to the museum, the City is reducing program access and is not meeting its obligations under title II of the ADA. Alternative methods of accessing the museum, including passenger drop-off areas, the park shuttle service, and walkways within the park, all have identified barriers to accessibility and do not negate the need for accessible parking spaces." (Page 22. Emphasis added.)

MIG's assignment, and accordingly its report, was limited to the impact on disability access to the de Young Museum. But essentially the same facts, analysis and conclusions also apply to the City's title II obligations with respect to other places and programs on and near the eastern part of JFK Drive, including the Conservatory of Flowers, Dahlia Garden, Rose Garden, Stow Lake/Boathouse and nighttime events.

As many people, many times, have described to you, other elected officials and SF City employees, improvements to the garage wouldn't provide fair and equal access for disabled people, and therefore wouldn't cure the City's violation of the ADA and California access laws, caused by the 24/7 ban on cars on the eastern part of JFK Drive, because:

 They wouldn't provide access to the Conservatory of Flowers, Dahlia Garden, Rose Garden, Stow Lake/Boathouse and other places for people who can't walk far.

- They wouldn't address the need many people have to remain in their cars while viewing nighttime events such as the light shows. This problem would remain no matter how late the garage is open. (And what conceivable justification could there be for banning cars at night? This question has been asked many times but never answered by any elected official or City employee.)
- They wouldn't solve the problem of access to nighttime events because the garage closes at 7 PM.
- Many people don't feel safe or comfortable in an underground parking garage after dark. This is a problem with the current 7 PM closure time, and would also be a problem if the garage hours were extended.
- They wouldn't solve the access needs of people who can't be dropped off by themselves because they need help and/or are at risk of falling.
- Garage capacity is around 800 cars. Garage capacity plus the closed part of JFK Drive equals around 1,300 cars. ADA improvements to the garage do nothing about capacity constraints. In fact, ADA improvements might reduce the capacity of the garage. It essential to be aware that disabled people don't park only in blue zones; we park in regular parallel parking spaces that don't have obstructions. Banning cars from the eastern part of JFK Drive has removed around 500 parking spaces that were usable by disabled people. The garage is sometimes full.
- Remediating civil rights violations isn't a matter of ballot measures. Anyway, the ballot measure might not pass. And if it did pass, the improvements probably wouldn't be completed until 2024 at the very earliest. More likely 2026. (It takes San Francisco years to make basic street improvements and install/replace curb ramps.) Disabled people have already been denied equal access for two years. For how many more years should we be denied equal access?
- It's probably not structurally feasible to raise the garage ceiling, so the garage still wouldn't be ADA compliant.
- The garage has a very limited number of van accessible spaces. Even if more were added (which would reduce overall garage capacity), they wouldn't be able to replace essentially 500 van accessible spaces that were on the closed part of JFK Drive.
- ADA improvements alone would not reduce the high cost of parking at the garage. Nobody seems to be able to solve this problem, probably because the bond debt must be serviced from garage revenues.

Even though improvements to the garage wouldn't provide equal access for disabled people, it would be a good idea to explore increasing the number of regular blue zones and van accessible blue zones. Also, it would help everyone if the parking rates were reduced. Before convening a working group to explore these things and asking people to spend their precious time, it's essential to do some due diligence. For example:

- What are the specifics of the proposed improvements? Are they structurally feasible? Is there sufficient space for them? Costs? Availability of contractors to do the work? Permitted by the terms of the bonds? If not permitted, the bondholders would be unlikely to grant a waiver without being paid to do so.
- The following questions relate to the possibility of reducing parking rates. If the bond debt were reduced or eliminated entirely, parking rates could be lowered. What is the interest rate on the bonds? Are the bonds callable? Is there a sinking fund or another mechanism for paying some of the principal before the maturity date, or is all the principal due at maturity? Are the bonds widely held, or held by a few large bondholders? Are they traded much? Is there recourse against the City if the bonds default? It's understandable that if the bonds are callable, paying them off would not be attractive to philanthropists because it wouldn't be well-publicized, there wouldn't be much of a visible marker, there are "sexier" causes to donate to, etc. – although that was also the case when Warren Hellman and others paid part of the cost of building the garage. Perhaps if someone steps up the garage could be named after them. The outstanding principal is small compared to the City's annual budget, and apparently the City has a surplus. If the bonds are callable, would the City be willing to prepay them? How much are the ground lease payments to the City each year? Regardless of whether the bonds are callable, would the City would be willing to forgive the ground lease payments?
- Ballot measure: Would these improvements be funded by a tax increase?
 Voters are certainly not in the mood to pay higher taxes. Would they be funded by issuing bonds? If so, would the bonds be issued by the City? Why would the voters support this?

In your press release of several weeks ago, you put a great deal of weight on the public opinion survey by MTA that purports that the overwhelming majority of San Franciscans favor keeping the car ban. But the decision about JFK Drive is not a popularity contest – it's a civil rights issue. It would make no difference if 90% of people, including people with disabilities and seniors, were in favor of keeping the car ban or were against it. The ADA is a civil rights law, and civil rights laws have been enacted to protect an entire class of people who have experienced discrimination and exclusion, and who are being denied equal access and opportunity. The closure of JFK Drive to cars is a violation of title II of the ADA and of California disability rights

laws.

But if you are basing your decision on public opinion instead of civil rights, consider the following:

- Per MTA, only 38% of responses to its survey from respondents with disabilities favored car-free JFK, as did only 38% of respondents age 65 and above.
- Michael Cawthon's analysis of the survey database he received from MTA in response to a Sunshine request shows major flaws in the survey methodology and tabulation of the results, including duplicates, tabulation errors, filling in missing data, elimination of some responses that are probably valid, and the submission and acceptance of over 500 online surveys after the deadline. The late responses overwhelmingly supported car-free JFK. Paper surveys didn't ask about disabilities, so the number of people with disabilities who oppose banning cars is probably undercounted. Latinos, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders were underrepresented in the survey responses relative to their proportions of San Francisco residents, as were certain geographic areas. Several people have given you a copy of Mr. Cawthon's analysis; it's attached to this email also.
- On Friday, February 18, the Mayor's Disability Council devoted an entire meeting to JFK Drive and extended it until 5:45 PM (it usually ends at 4 PM) so more members of the public could be heard. There were ASL (as there always are), and Chinese and Vietnamese interpreters. Literally dozens of public commenters at the meeting described the hardship the car ban has caused them and asked that cars be allowed on JFK Drive again now, and there were many comments in the chat to the same effect. The mitigation measures described by MTA and Rec Park previously and again at Friday's meeting didn't change anyone's mind. Only two public commenters supported the ban. The comments at Friday's meeting are consistent with the many public comments and emails MDC has received during the past couple of years about JFK Drive, the overwhelming majority of which opposed banning cars.  You dismissed the Chronicle survey, in which respondents favored reopening JFK Drive to cars by around a 2 to 1 margin, as unscientific. The survey is flawed, but not necessarily more flawed than the MTA survey. Importantly, the Chronicle is strongly biased in favor of the car ban (it even published an editorial supporting the ban), yet the survey results came out in the opposite direction from the Chronicle's bias; its results have some value.

There are major safety and accessibility problems with crosswalks, street paving and curb ramps along JFK Drive, which RPD has acknowledged but says it doesn't have funding to repair. I and others have notified the Board of Supervisors and Mayor Breed about this, but nobody has responded or done anything. I request that you take the lead in securing funding immediately.

ADA improvements to the garage would do nothing to alleviate the hardships, burdens and hazards the car ban has imposed on many other people, including seniors, employees of both museums, frail people who may not technically be disabled, families with children, and people lugging equipment. Such improvements also would do nothing to address the congestion and pollution caused by the cars that would have been on JFK Drive and instead have been diverted to neighborhood streets.

Supervisor Chan, this baby cannot be split! Each Supervisor will have to decide whether to recognize and support the civil rights of disabled people to full and equal access, or to continue the current exclusionary ban, which is going on its third year.

Yesterday I received your email about fighting to keep a JFK car-free. I am a pedestrian and a senior who lives on the south side of town and you definitely DO NOT represent my opinion on the subject.

Keeping cars off of JFK means reserving Golden Gate Park for those who live nearby and prioritizing the needs of cyclists over people like me. Not everyone can ride bikes and prioritizing streets for bikes discriminates against those who need cars--especially since public transit is inadequate--to move around the city. This includes people with disabilities whose equal rights are federally protected.

The SFMTA continues to limit north-south access and egress in the city. This definitely hinders my ability to travel around town and especially to places on the north side. Twin Peaks, Arguello, the terribly congested Chain of Lakes, and the Great Highway are all major north-south streets and all have been closed, or limited, to cars. Not only does this discourage me from visiting the north side, it also increases traffic, pollution, accidents, and probably road-rage, on the other roadways which must handle the diverted traffic.

Spending other people's money--by telling them to park in the museum parking lot--is easy for you to say. But this may in fact be a burden many can't afford. And, of course, the deYoung's parking garage does not address the other issues I've mentioned.

The affluent tourists who are your main revenue target will hardly be affected, but the economically disadvantaged kids from our community who are the main beneficiaries of the TISC programs will be severely negatively affected.

Dear President Walton and Supervisors,

I may be unable to personally attend tomorrow's meeting and make my public comments orally, so I am sending my comments to each of you tonight and hoping they will be considered tomorrow and included as part of the public record. The short version of this email is: **No more taxpayer money should go to SFMTA** for the following reasons:

Everywhere you go, streets are broken up by MTA construction projects that do not get completed years after their promised completion. Between January 18 and February 18, 2022, I received from MTA approximately 38 notices to expect long waits and overcrowding on MUNI. Our streets and public transportation are a mess.

SFMTA is backing the movement for a car-free, Vision Zero San Francisco with everyone using bicycles or public transportation. They avoid responsibility for owning all they actively do to support it by saying they have no power to close the streets and it's Rec and Park or the BOS who decides, but not them. It is detrimental to commuters and the community to advocate car-free roads when there is not a reliable public transportation system in place and operating first, BEFORE roads are closed to cars. Road closures have caused more traffic and congestion to spill over into areas nearby. The removal of free parking spaces used by families with young children, disabled, and seniors has caused hardships.

The questions on MTA surveys did not include options for objecting to closed streets and were confusing to those who wanted to object, if those who objected even received a survey. MTA surveys were biased and targeted to a specific audience, and only a small percentage of directly impacted voters received surveys. SFMTA is neither transparent nor reliable and should be replaced by a competent, dependable independent agency with oversight by another independent agency that can issue sanctions when warranted. Our streets and public transportation are a mess. New leadership is needed, not more money allocated to SFMTA. Mr. Tumlin has destroyed texts he used doing City business, and SFMTA claims to have no public records to produce regarding certain specific items that should be made available to the public upon request.

SFMTA has over a billion dollars in its budget. It has not spent its money wisely in the past and should not be awarded any more taxpayer dollars towards promised improvements in the future. It would be wiser to cut their budget rather than to expand it.

The number of deaths that would be considered rare, and that we just have to live with, that can happen due to very unusual circumstances, like an allergic reaction, would be about 150 per year. So our Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS) per year records about 150 deaths through all the years up to 2021.

What languaged in 2021 is that by January 22 we hold already bit 182 deaths — we were already 30 deaths too many. And looking back on it, if we would've had a proper data safety monitoring board and proper human ethics committees in place looking at this, we would've shapped the US program in February and said, "Listen, there's too many deaths."

Now, as we sit here today, we're at over 21,000 deaths in the same system. So Tm telling you, rare would be 150 for all the vaccines combined, and per product 50. So typically for a drug, if there's five unexplained deaths within 30 days, it's a black box warning (the FDA's most stringent warning for drugs on the market, alerting the public and health care providers to serious side effects, such as injury or death). If there are 50 deaths within 30 days, irrespective of causality — because we can never really assess causality, just if happens temporally—if we get to 50 deaths, the product of offer market.

As we sit here today, we are at 21,000 deaths in our CDC vaccine safety reporting system. So I am telling you, death under no circumstances can be considered rare. Now, the correct way to describe this is that this is the most dangerous and lethal biological product ever used in human history — period.

Number two, is it a large signal? Yes. 21,000 deaths, that's more deaths than have ever happened in US human history with any product. This is the largest signum we've ever seen.

Number three: Is it temporally related to getting the vaccine [the effect has to occur after the cause]. It isn't just the elderly. It's waning to the point that you're seeing more and more people getting breakthrough infections, and more and more of those people who are getting breakthrough infections are winding up in the hospital.³
- d. World Health Organization Chief Scientist Dr. Soumya Swaminathan: "At the moment I don't believe we have the evidence of any of the vaccines to be confident that it's going to prevent people from actually getting the infection and therefore being able to pass it on."

- g. **Professor Sir Andrew Pollard who led the Oxford vaccine team**: "We don't have anything that will stop transmission, so I think we are in a situation where herd immunity is not a possibility and I suspect the virus will throw up a new variant that is even better at infecting vaccinated individuals."
- h. **Dr. Jay Bhattacharya, MD, PhD, Professor of Health Policy, Stanford University**: "Based on my analysis of the existing medical and scientific literature, any exemption policy that does not recognize natural immunity is irrational, arbitrary, and counterproductive to community health."
- National Order of Merit and 20 other major international awards):

 The vaccines don't stop the virus, they do the opposite they 'feed the virus,' and facilitate its development into stronger and more transmissible variants... what is the point of requiring a vaccine to protect others if that vaccine does not durably prevent onward transmission of a virus?¹²

We are aware of countless reports of outbreaks on fully "vaccinated" sports teams¹³, cruise ships¹⁴, and even the White House¹⁵. Several CCSF departments that have also experienced the same:

- The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) reported fifty-three (53) new cases in their newsletter dated Dec 27, 2021
- The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) reported sixty-six (66) new cases in an email sent to all staff on Jan 4, 2022
- The **SFMTA** said in an email that was sent publicly to all their email subscribers the following on Jan 7, 2022: "More than 100 SFMTA staff have contracted COVID since late last month."
- The **SFMTA** said in a High Priority email sent to staff on Jan 7, 2022: "The surge has led to an increase in missed Muni service. Currently, we are missing up to 15% of scheduled Muni operator shifts, which means that riders may have longer wait times. We've also seen increased sick leave being taken among mechanics, car cleaners and transit supervisors, compounding the issue."
- The Mayor of San Francisco said the following in a tweet on Jan 7, 2022:

THERE IS SIMPLY NO QUESTION THAT THE COVID-19 INJECTIONS DO NOT BLOCK INFECTION OR PREVENT TRANSMISSION OR PREVENT INFECTION.

This was summed up quite nicely by **Moderna Chief Medical Officer Tal Zaks**, who "warned that the trial results show that the vaccine can prevent someone from getting sick or 'severely sick,' from COVID-19, however, the results don't show that the vaccine prevents transmission of the virus." Recognition of this fact may explain why, in August of 2021, the CDC changed the definition of "vaccination" from "the act of introducing a vaccine into the body to produce immunity to a specific disease" to "the act of introducing a vaccine into the body to produce protection to a specific disease." However, this newly created CDC definition conflicts with the statutory criteria for a vaccine, which focuses solely upon immunity. In 1986, Congress passed 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-1, which established "a National Vaccine Program to achieve optimal prevention of human infectious diseases through immunization..." (emphasis added). Clearly, from both a public health standpoint as well as from a legal standpoint, immunization is the intended *sine qua non* of vaccination.

Since they do not create immunity, but are claimed to merely reduce the symptoms of the disease, the so called Covid-19 vaccines are treatments, not vaccines. Even the FDA has classified them as "CBER-Regulated Biologics" otherwise known as "therapeutics" which fall under the "Coronavirus Treatment Acceleration Program." 19

The FDA's "therapeutics" classification of the injections is consistent with representations made by Pfizer partner BioNTech to the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") in its 2020 Annual Report, where it stated with regard to the mRNA technology forming the basis of its Covid-19 injection:

Although we expect to submit BLAs [biologics license applications] for our mRNA-based product candidates in the United States, and in the European Union, mRNA therapies have been classified as gene therapy medicinal products, and other jurisdictions may consider

our mRNA-based product candidates to be new drugs, not biologics or gene therapy medicinal products, and require different marketing applications.²⁰

Similarly, in its June 30, 2020 Quarterly Report to the SEC, Moderna stated with regard to the mRNA technology underpinning its injection: "Currently, mRNA is considered a gene therapy product by the FDA."²¹

Thus, the medical community, the relevant agencies, and both Pfizer and Moderna — the manufacturers of the dominant injections — recognize that the so-called vaccines are therapeutics, or medical treatments. Since they do not achieve immunization, this conclusion is also consistent with Congress' definition of vaccines in establishing the National Vaccine Program in 1986: the "prevention of human infectious diseases through immunization." Accordingly, we herein refer to the Covid-19 "vaccines" as Covid-19 injections.

Even the mainstream media is telling us now that these injections do not block infection:

"People might mistakenly think the COVID-19 vaccines will completely block infection, but the shots are mainly designed to prevent severe illness, says Louis Mansky, a virus researcher at the University of Minnesota."

Dear Supervisor Chan, Budget and Finance Committee members, and Board of Supervisors at large,

Here are three reasons San Francisco should require City Departments to *minimize* use of liquid fuels *including renewable diesel*:

- 1: Environmental Justice: The vast majority of renewable diesel is made from food, and all of it is refined in an energy intensive, environmentally unjust process that creates continuous public health harm punctuated by acute exposures and explosion "accidents." As Marathon Petroleum Company and Phillips 66 switch over their Martinez and Rodeo refineries to "renewable" diesel, our neighbors in low income communities of color in Contra Costa County will be paying for San Francisco's fuel with their health.
- **2: Local air quality:** Anyone who has walked or bicycled by a MUNI bus when it leaves a stop belching exhaust can confidently debunk the claim that renewable diesel vehicles are "clean air vehicles." Less toxic than regular diesel perhaps. <u>Dirty, definitely.</u>
- **3: Climate emergency:** There is mounting evidence that the greenhouse gas reductions the California Air Resources Board attributes to renewable diesel are based on partial data which does not account properly for land use change (i.e. vast stores of carbon being released when rainforest and other biodiverse lands are destroyed for oil-crops).

Please do Not rubber stamp Resolution #220173 which would increase the current contract for purchase of renewable diesel by 26 million dollars.

Three reasons San Francisco should require City Departments to *minimize* use of liquid fuels *including renewable diesel*:

- 1: Environmental Justice: The vast majority of renewable diesel is made from food, and all of it is refined in an energy intensive, environmentally unjust process that creates continuous public health harm punctuated by acute exposures and explosion "accidents." As Marathon Petroleum Company and Phillips 66 switch over their Martinez and Rodeo refineries to "renewable" diesel, our neighbors in low income communities of color in Contra Costa County will be paying for San Francisco's fuel with their health.
- **2: Local air quality:** Anyone who has walked or bicycled by a MUNI bus when it leaves a stop belching exhaust can confidently debunk the claim that renewable diesel vehicles are "clean air vehicles." Less toxic than regular diesel perhaps. <u>Dirty, definitely.</u>

I am Raymond Nog of Copy Circle, 959 Tarava Street

I am a business Owner in the Parkside/Sunset/West Portal neighborhood.

I am writing to inform you of my strong objection, as well as my neighbors', to the proposed cannabis shop at 800 Taraval, as this is NOT an appropriate location for selling cannabis even though cannabis is legal. My reasons are:

- 1. This is a family-oriented and children-center neighborhood with multiple elementary, middle, high schools as well as several preschools. To name a few: St. Cecilia School, West Portal Lutheran, West Portal Elementary, Hoover Middle School, Lincoln Highschool, Dianne Feinstein, Happy Days, Stratford Schools, Meaningful Beginnings, and Step-by-Step, etc. Several of these schools are within 1-2 blocks of 800 Taraval
- 2. There are also multiple popular children and adolescent-focus businesses in the immediate vicinity. To name a few: a children dental practice, an orthodontic practice, One Martial Arts School, Five Animals Kung Fu Academy, Doc-Fai Wong Martial Arta Center, Sunset Jiu Jitsu, and Hapkido, etc.
- 3. All along 18th, 17th, 16th, 15th and 14th Avenues, etc. are single-family homes, many with multiple children. On any given day, hundreds of the neighborhood children and adolescents walk between their homes and schools and to their afterschool activities passing through this busy intersection of Taraval and 18th Avenue.
- 4. To approve a cannabis store in the middle of this children-friendly neighborhood is promoting cannabis exposure to our neighborhood children

and adolescents. Perhaps inadvertently also promoting illegal sale of marijuana by adult consumers to minors.

- 5. I am also very concerned about safety in my neighborhood, as there have been many burglaries and smash-and-grab robberies associated with cannabis stores.
- 6. Existing parking availability is already very bad for the established businesses within two blocks of 800 Taraval. The large delivery Safeway trucks load and unload frequently at that street corner. Adding a cannabis store there will undoubtedly create more traffic congestion and compromise pedestrian safety.

Given the above reasons, if there is a cannabis store at the corner of Taraval and 18th Avenue, many parents will not feel safe allowing their children to walk between homes and schools and to their afterschool activities and appointments. Families might move out of the area. Existing established businesses will suffer, and jobs will likely be lost.

When you blocked and eventually killed the Lennar housing project at 1515 South Van Ness, you also prevented them from planting trees all along 26th Street between Shotwell Street and South Van Ness Avenue. Those trees would have been six years old now. Instead of a tree lined street with 157 units of housing and below market rate artisan ground floor studios, we now have a blighted block with construction netting around a Safe Sleeping (referred as SSA herein). The SSA regularly kicks out residents who do not follow their rules onto the sidewalks in front of our homes.

There is now an encampment on the corner of Shotwell and 26th Street that started on December 7th when a woman was kicked out of the SSA. The encampment has completely engulfed a tree that was lovingly put there to beautify our neighborhood by the owners of this property with the help of the Friends of the Urban Forest and neighbors.

The encampment now stretches across two property lines and regularly sprawls over the entire sidewalk blocking any access. It is a site of lawlessness where drugs are used and sold. Their dogs bark day and night, and one of them lunges at passersby. They are a textbook nuisance. Numerous calls have been made to the police and 311 over the past few months by me and my neighbors, but we inevitably come up against a bureaucracy that has no concern whatsoever for the needs of this community. We are shut out, made invisible, and thoroughly dismissed.

This tree is part of our green space— our neighborhood canopy. This tree is now a metaphor for how you and the city of San Francisco are actively destroying any beauty in our community. It is a metaphor for the exploitation of the immigrant, working class, and POC families who you have forsaken. This tree is a potent symbol of who you are: a crass and uncaring politician that has degraded our community to advance your agenda. This tree is us, and it is a striking portrayal of how you absolutely do not care about our lives.

Dear Supervisors,

On behalf of the Golden Gate Restaurant Association, we respectfully ask that you postpone consideration of **File # 211296 - Amending the Family Friendly Workplace Ordinance** so that more input from the employer community can be considered.

We appreciate the goals of this legislation and want to work together to ensure that it works for both employers and employers, but as such this we are concerned, could put a huge burden on our smaller employers. In particular, having this be effective for employers with 20 or more will include many small restaurants, cafes, bars and retail establishments that do not have the ability to make significant schedule modifications. In some cases they operate with a few employees working each position and it is a requirement that the employees start their shift at the same time.

We ask that you consider the following issues, and get input from more stakeholders before moving forward with the measure in its current form:

- Small Business Definition: As defined in the legislation, any business that employs 20 more people would be required to comply. We ask that you amend the number of employees for businesses to be exempted to 100. This will allow our small businesses that make San Francisco so special to continue to operate without an undue burden.
- Undue Hardship: Language added that "the size, financial resources, nature, or structure of the Employer's business" must be considered when assessing undue hardship creates an unreasonable standard for medium and large employers who serve essential needs to the communities they are located in. When held to this standard, restaurants may be forced to change hours or close when they cannot properly staff their locations.
- Frequency of Requests: There should be a limit to the number of requests made. The current law allows requests to be made twice every twelve months, unless the employee experiences a major life event, in which case the employee may make, and the employer must consider, an additional request.
- Time to Respond to Requests: Seven days is too short of a period of time to ask an employer to respond to a request. We ask that you lengthen this time back to the current standard of 21 days which allows the employer to give the accommodation while having enough time to fill in employees for any gaps in scheduling that would be created.
- **Penalty Cap:** As recommended by the Small Business Commission, establish a reasonable cap on the financial penalties a business could incur per case For example: no more than \$2500 or the equivalent to 100 hours of the requesting employees pay.

We appreciate the engagement from the Board of Supervisors regarding concerns from the business community thus far, but some very real and serious concerns remain. We hope that we can continue this conversation and get to a measure that businesses can support as we work together towards a prosperous and healthy San Francisco in 2022 and beyond.
