2 COMMENDING THE NATIONAL COALITION FOR EFFECTIVE DRUG POLICIES FOR ITS
3 EFFORTS IN CALLING FOR AN EVALUATION OF OUR NATIONAL, STATE, AND LOCAL
4 GOVERNMENT POLICIES BY EXAMINING THE RACIAL SENTENCING DISPARITIES
5 BETWEEN THOSE WHO ARE INCARCERATED AND THOSE WHO ARE PLACED IN
6 DRUG REHABILITATION OR SENTENCED TO SHORTER TERMS; ALSO FOR CALLING
7 FOR A STUDY ON THE ADVERSE EFFECTS SUCH POLICIES ARE HAVING ON THE
8 POOR, WOMEN, AND FAMILIES.

9 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has demonstrated commitment to
10 finding alternatives to the failed National War on Drugs, including expanding our treatment on
11 demand policy; and,

12 WHEREAS, The sentence for those convicted of crack cocaine possession is 500
13 times that of persons convicted of powder cocaine possession, although both drugs are
14 pharmacologically identical; and,

15 WHEREAS, Approximately 96 percent of those convicted for crack possession are
16 Latino or African American; and,

17 WHEREAS, The United States incarcerates more citizens per capita than any other
18 democracy in the world with the largest number of prisoners sentenced for crimes involving
19 drugs or resulting from their dependence on drugs; and,

20 WHEREAS, With prison cells costing approximately \$20,000 per year, the State of
21 California spends more tax dollars on prisons than it does on public schools; and,

22 WHEREAS, The National Coalition for Effective Drug Policy has called for an
23 evaluation of our national, state, and local government policies by examining the racial
24 sentencing disparities of those who are incarcerated and those who are placed in drug
25 rehabilitation; and,




