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3 **Resolution authorizing the Office of the Mayor and the Department of Homelessness**
4 **and Supportive Housing to solicit donations from various private entities and**
5 **organizations to support the expansion of temporary shelter and other homeless**
6 **services to support people experiencing homelessness, notwithstanding the**
7 **Behested Payment Ordinance.**

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9 WHEREAS, The mission of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive
10 Housing (“HSH” or “Department”) is to prevent homelessness when possible and make
11 homelessness rare, brief, and one-time in the City and County of San Francisco (“the City”)
12 through the provision of coordinated, compassionate, and high-quality services; and

13 WHEREAS, With the enactment of Resolution No. 319-18 in October 2018, the
14 Board of Supervisors and Mayor London N. Breed declared a shelter crisis and affirmed
15 San Francisco’s commitment to a continuum of shelter and service options for people
16 experiencing homelessness; and

17 WHEREAS, As of the 2022 Point-in-Time Count, there were approximately 7,750
18 people experiencing homelessness in San Francisco on any given night, 56% of whom
19 were unsheltered; and

20 WHEREAS, In April 2023, the city released the five-year strategic plan “Home
21 by the Bay: An Equity-Driven Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness in San Francisco”
22 which calls for 1,075 new shelter beds to meet the goals set out in the plan, including the
23 goal to reduce unsheltered homelessness by 50%; and

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1 WHEREAS, The Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-2025 HSH budget included funding for
2 approximately 594 new shelter beds over the next two years, or 55% of the strategic
3 plan goal; and

4 WHEREAS, As of September 8, 2023, HSH had 2,952 temporary shelter or
5 crisis intervention slots, with a 91% occupancy rate; and

6 WHEREAS, While HSH continues to expand shelter, prevention, housing and other
7 resources, we know that more resources need to be made available to address the crisis
8 on our streets; and

9 WHEREAS, In the past, HSH and the Office of the Mayor have established
10 successful and innovative public-private partnerships to expand shelter and other services
11 to meet the critical needs of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness; and

12 WHEREAS, The Mayor's Fund for the Homeless (Administrative Code, Section
13 10.100-106) was established as a category eight fund to receive all private donations,
14 grants, gifts and bequests of money, to assist people in need finding long-term housing and
15 overcome barriers to employment by supporting outreach services, shelters, navigation
16 centers, flexible housing assistance, housing and other resources; and

17 WHEREAS, HSH, as the designated administrator of the Mayor's Fund for the
18 Homeless (Administrative Code, Section 10.100-106) is required to report regularly to the
19 Homeless Oversight Commission on deposits and expenditures from the fund, as well as
20 furnish an annual report to the Board of Supervisors showing such gifts received, the
21 nature or amount of said gifts, and the disposition thereof (Administrative Code, Section
22 10.100); and

23 WHEREAS, HSH works with philanthropic organization, private companies and
24 community stakeholders including homeless services providers, often through grant
25 agreements; and

1 WHEREAS, The Office of the Mayor and HSH seek a waiver of the City's Behested
2 Payment Ordinance (Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, Sections 3.600 et seq.)
3 to the extent it restricts the Mayor, Executive Director of HSH and officers and employees
4 of the Office of the Mayor and HSH from soliciting financial support or in-kind goods or
5 services, from persons or entities that would be considered interested parties, to support
6 expansion of temporary shelter or other homeless services; now, therefore, be it

7 RESOLVED, That under Section 3.620(f) of the Campaign and Governmental
8 Conduct Code, the Board of Supervisors hereby waives application of the Behested
9 Payment Ordinance as to the Mayor, Executive Director of HSH and officers and
10 employees of the Office of the Mayor and HSH so that they may solicit donations from
11 private organizations and philanthropists to support the expansion of temporary shelter and
12 other homeless services to support people experiencing homelessness; and, be it

13 FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver serves the public interest by
14 supporting the Office of the Mayor and HSH to explore innovative opportunities to expand
15 the availability of resources to support people experiencing homelessness, specifically
16 temporary shelter and other homeless services to support bringing more people inside and
17 off the streets; and, be it

18 FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver does not create an appearance of
19 impropriety.

Proposed Legislation Details

- Authorize the **Office of the Mayor and Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing** to solicit donations from various private entities and organizations to support **the expansion of temporary shelter and other homeless services**.
- In the past, HSH and the Office of the Mayor have established successful and innovative **public-private partnerships** to meet **critical needs of people experiencing homelessness**.
- The **Mayor's Fund for the Homeless** is a category eight fund established to receive donations for homeless services, with existing reporting to Homeless Oversight Commission and Annual Reporting to the Board of Supervisors.

Shelter Crisis

- According to the 2022 Point-in-Time Count, there were **~7,750** people experiencing homelessness, **56%** of whom were unsheltered.
- As of September 2023, HSH had **2,952** temporary shelter or crisis intervention slots, with a **91% occupancy rate**.
- Home by the Bay: A Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness in San Francisco, calls for an investment of resources including **1,075 new shelter beds** to meet the Plan's goals, including a **50% reduction of unsheltered homelessness** in 5 years.
 - FY 2023-25 budget funded **~594** new shelter beds, **55% toward strategic plan goal**.
