SUBJECT: Community Living Fund (CLF), Program for Case Management and Purchase of Goods and Services, Six-Month Report (January-June 2022)

OVERVIEW

The San Francisco Administrative Code, Section 10.100-12, created the Community Living Fund (CLF) to support aging in place and community placement alternatives for individuals who may otherwise require care within an institution. This report fulfills the Administrative Code requirement that the Department of Disability and Aging Services report to the Board of Supervisors every six months detailing the level of services provided and costs incurred in connection with the duties and services associated with this fund.

The CLF Program provides for home- and community-based services, or a combination of goods and services, that will help individuals who are currently or at risk of being institutionalized, to continue living independently in their homes or to return to community living. This program, using a two-pronged approach of coordinated case management and purchased services, provides the needed resources not available through any other mechanism, to vulnerable older adults and adults with disabilities.

The CLF Six-Month Report provides an overview of trends. The attached data tables and charts show key program trends for each six-month period, along with project-to-date figures where appropriate.

KEY FINDINGS

Referrals & Service Levels

- ❖ The CLF Program received a total of 109 new referrals, a higher volume of referrals than in the prior period, but lower than broader trends over the history of the program. Approximately 62% of individuals referred were eligible, and 36% were approved to receive services.
- ❖ A total of 283 participants were served with most (199) receiving intensive case management through the Institute on Aging (IOA). Although consistent with the last two reporting periods, these service levels are nearly 20% lower than IOA

enrollment trends over the past two years; more so over the lifetime of the program. Of the total served, 98 participants also received services from Brilliant Corners through the Scattered Site Housing and Rental Subsidy program.¹

Demographics

Trends in CLF referrals are relatively consistent with slight shifts over time:

- ❖ About 61% of referred individuals were older adults aged 60 and up, a decrease from the last period, but more consistent with overall program trends to date. In 2011 and 2012, individuals referred were more equally split between older adults and younger adults with disabilities (aged 18-59), but older adults have typically represented the majority of referrals over the past several years.
- ❖ Trends in the ethnic profile of new referrals remain generally consistent with prior periods with some minor changes. Referrals for White individuals remained steady, making up the largest group of referrals by ethnicity (36%). Referrals for African-Americans, Asian/Pacific Islander, and Latino individuals each accounted for about a fifth of referrals (22%, 19%, and 18%, respectively) — representing a return to prior levels of Latino referrals, after a dip in the last period. Referrals for those identifying as an Other race decreased slightly (2%), and referrals for those with Unknown race decreased to 3%, more consistent with historic rates.
- ❖ Referrals for English-speaking individuals remain the most common, making up 72% of referrals in the current reporting period. The second most common primary language remains Spanish (14%), and referrals for Chinese speakers account for 7% of referrals. Approximately 11% of referrals overall speak Asian/Pacific Islander languages — consistent with the last period, but higher than historic levels.
- ❖ Males represented a little over half (55%) of referrals this period, consistent with historical trends. About 3% of those referred identified as transgender or gender non-conforming, a slight increase from recent periods.
- ❖ Referred individuals most commonly identify as heterosexual (67% of all referrals; 85% of referrals with a documented response to the sexual orientation question). Persons identifying as a sexual minority, including gay/lesbian/same gender-loving, bisexual, and other identities, accounted for 12% of referrals — a higher proportion than historical levels. Nearly a quarter (22%) of referrals were missing sexual orientation data in their application for CLF services, consistent with prior periods.
- ❖ The most frequent zip codes for referred individuals in this period included 94102 (Hayes Valley/Tenderloin), 94109 (Polk/Russian Hill/Nob Hill), and 94103 (South of

Market), which accounted for 16% of referrals, 12% of referrals, and 11% of referrals, respectively.

- ❖ Referrals from Laguna Honda Hospital represent 13% of all referrals. This is lower than both recent periods (in which these referrals account for about 20% of all referrals), as well as trends over the entire program history. Between 2010 and 2016, 35% of referrals on average came from Laguna Honda Hospital. This pattern likely reflects broader trends in the Laguna Honda Hospital client population and availability of appropriate housing to support safe discharge and stability in the community. Many Laguna Honda Hospital residents need permanent supportive housing but there is a waitlist for this type of housing.

Service Requests

- ❖ The most common services requested at intake remain consistent with prior periods. These include case management (68%), in-home support (68%), assistive devices (45%), and housing-related services (44%). Notably, food was requested slightly more frequently than in prior periods (43%).

Program Costs

The six-month period ending in June 2022 shows a net decrease of \$99,967 in CLF program costs over the prior six-month period, with decreased costs in case management, program operations, and the Scattered Site Housing program operated by Brilliant Corners.

- ❖ Total monthly program costs per client² averaged \$2,228 per month in the latest six-month period, a decrease of \$67 per month over the prior six-month period. Excluding costs for home care and rental subsidies, average monthly purchase of service costs for CLF participants who received any purchased services was \$189 per month in the latest reporting period, an increase of \$81 per client from the previous six-month period.

Performance Measures

DAS is committed to measuring the impact of its investments in community services. The measures below are used to evaluate the performance of the CLF program in meeting its goal to support successful community living for those discharged from institution or at imminent risk of institutionalization.

- ❖ Percent of participants with one or fewer unplanned (“acute”) hospital admissions within a six-month period (excludes “banked” participants). *Goal: 85%.*

With **91%** of participants having one or fewer unplanned admissions, the CLF program exceeded the performance measure target. DAS will continue to monitor this measure and evaluate the goal threshold.

- ❖ Percent of care plan problems resolved, on average, after one year of enrollment in the CLF Program (excludes “banked” participants). *Goal: 80%*
On average, **61%** of service plan items were marked as resolved or transferred. This performance, relative to prior periods, reflects adoption of a revised, more streamlined service plan tool in IOA’s database. Challenges in this performance area during the reporting period include the lengthy timeframe needed to address some care plan interventions and lower enrollment levels, which allow a slimmer margin for underperformance. CLF will continue to develop strategies to address care plan completion, including enhanced oversight and staff training on documentation.

Systemic changes / Trends affecting CLF

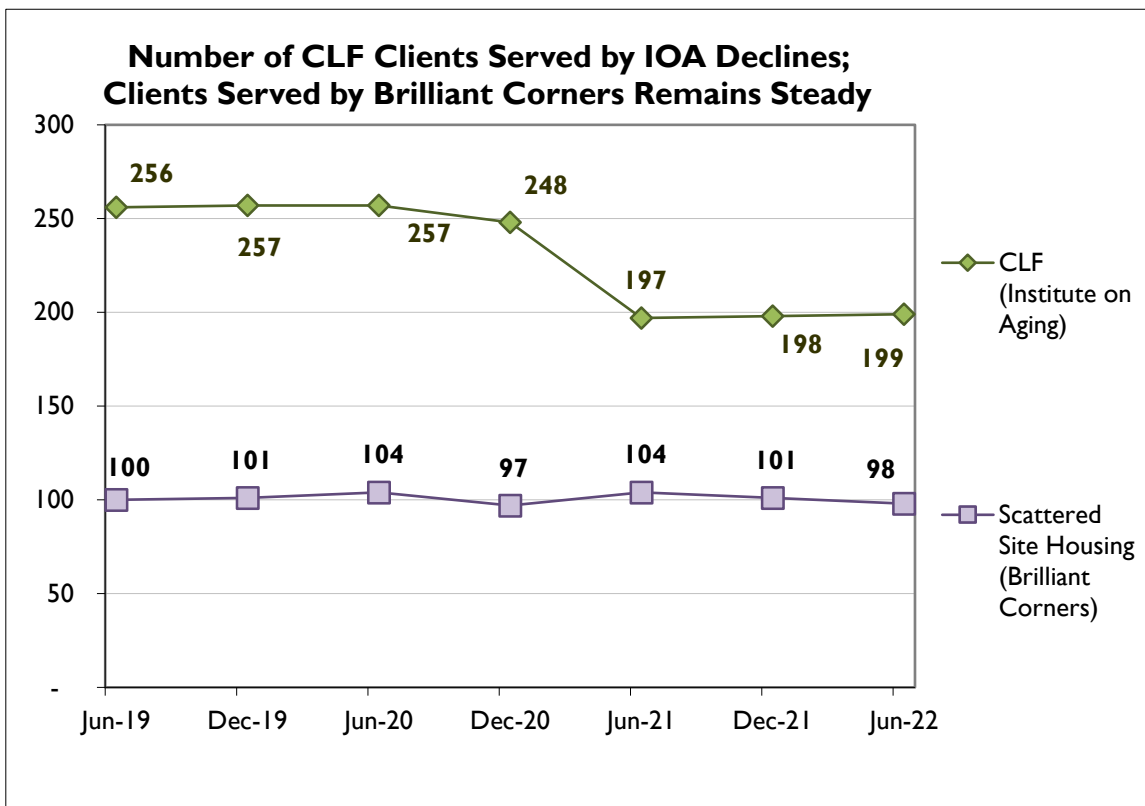
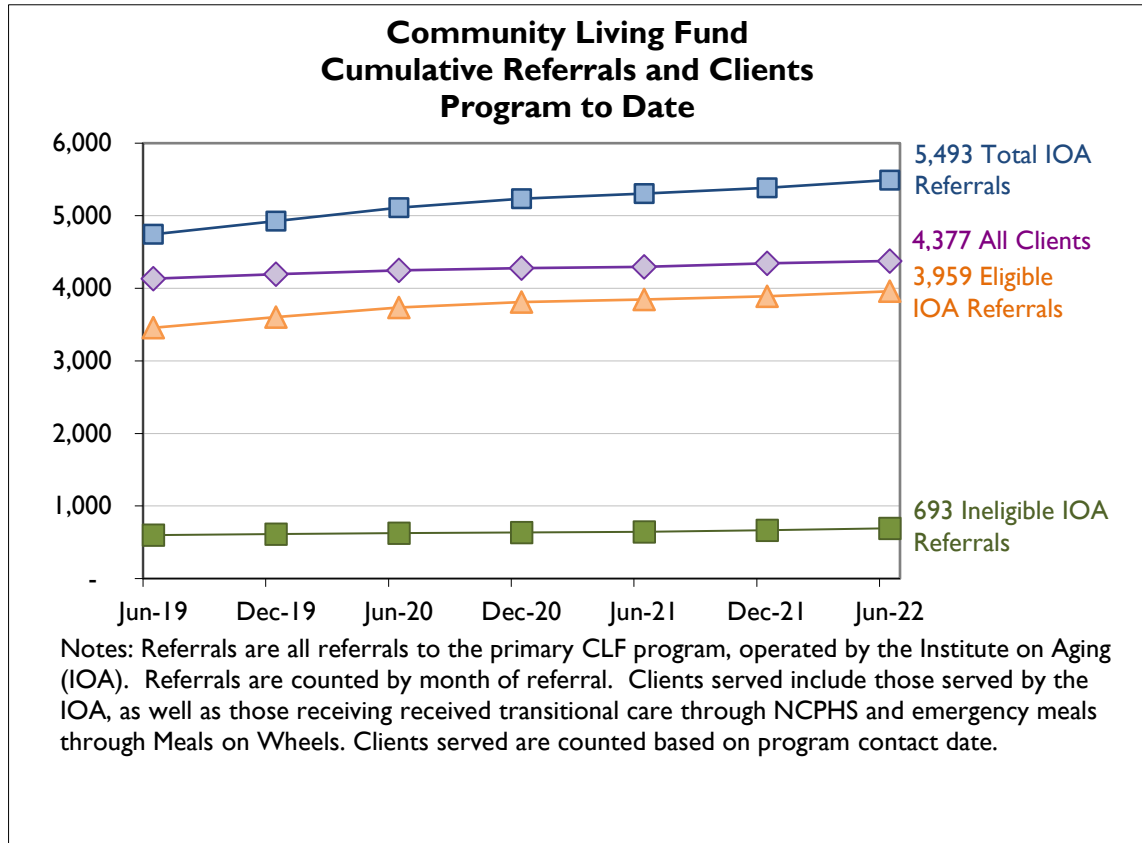
- ❖ As of September 2022, there are 35 referrals awaiting assignment. On average, these individuals have been waiting for 97 days. Approximately 86% are waiting for intensive case management; the others have been referred for a purchase of service (and have separate community case management). This waitlist is longer than the waitlist in the prior period, a return to historic waitlist trends. Consistent with the prior period, in a reversal of historic trends, individuals waiting for purchases of service have spent *less* time waiting on average than those waiting for intensive case management services (an average of 66 days waiting compared to 103 days waiting).
- ❖ During this reporting period, there were three (3) CLF participants transitioned into Scattered Site Housing units managed by Brilliant Corners. Of the three, two were discharged from Laguna Honda Hospital (LHH) and one was transitioned from a residential care facility for the elderly. The CLF program facilitates monthly Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meetings hosted at IOA to review prospective referrals from Laguna Honda Hospital, or those in the community who are at imminent risk of institutionalization, for clinical appropriateness of independent community living. CLF-eligible individuals who have no appropriate housing alternatives and meet Scattered Site Housing criteria are considered for these units.
- ❖ CLF is committed to fostering a culture that embraces the diversity of participants and program staff, and aims to serve a population that is representative of San Francisco. During the reporting period, the CLF program continued collaboration with Self Help for the Elderly and developed new outreach materials with language capacity that are utilized during community and outreach events. CLF also continued its participation in the Asian and Pacific Islander (API) Community Partnership meetings and was invited to do an in-service presentation to the Filipino Service Providers Network in May. Furthermore, the CLF program has been working collaboratively with community partners that attend the LGBTQ+ Community Partnership meetings to help build understanding about CLF services and to find new ways to decrease inequity in the access to care and services. The efforts of CLF to

increase its visibility and the participation of API and LGBTQ+ individuals showed some positive results as referrals from these communities had increased slightly compared to previous years.

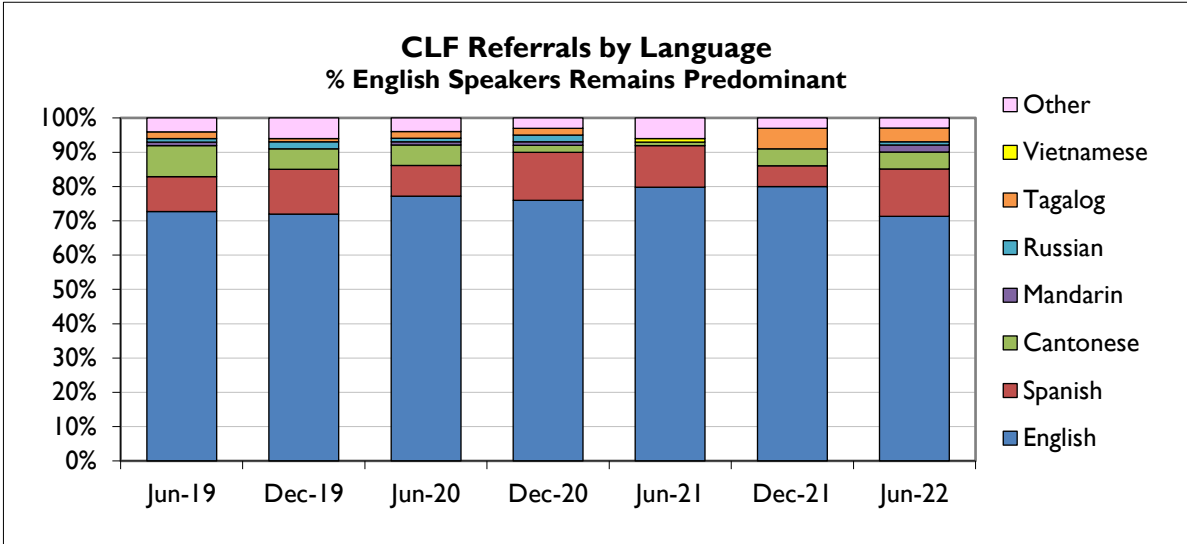
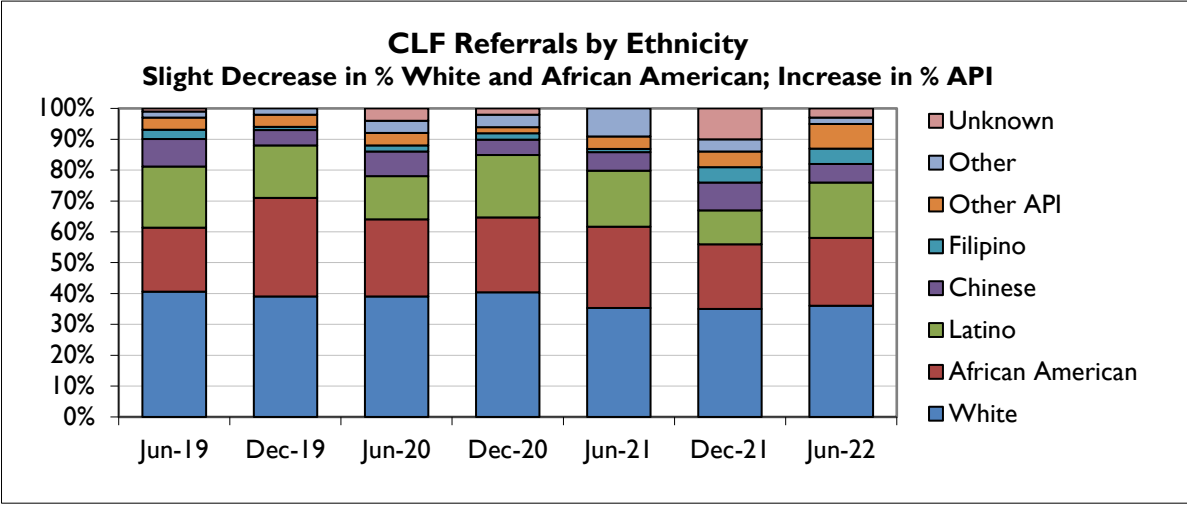
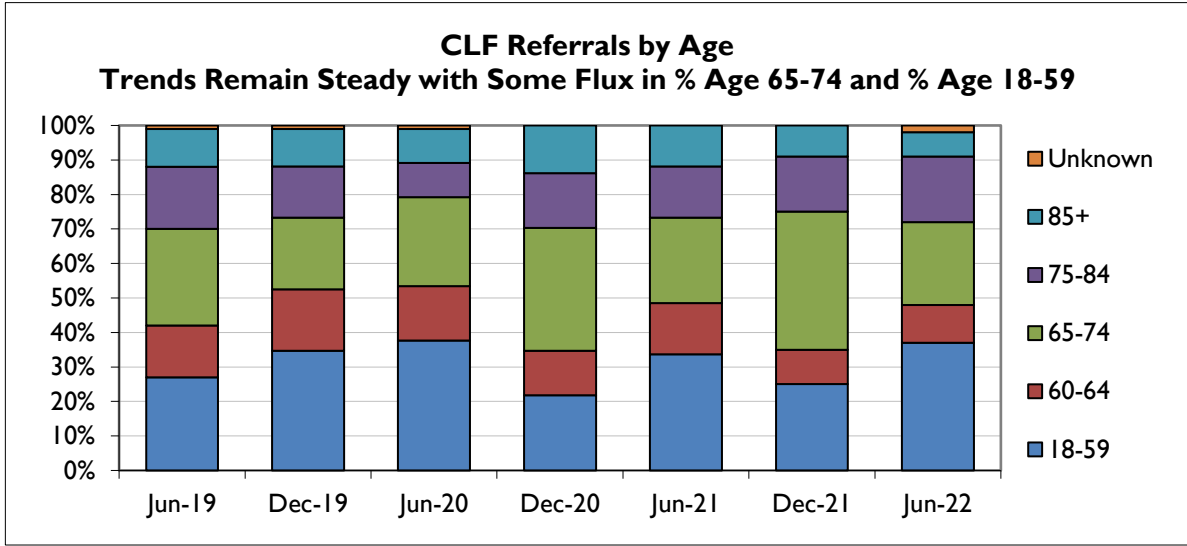
- ❖ The Institute on Aging (IOA) Pandemic Policies and Planning (PPP) Committee continued to monitor the pandemic, providing ongoing recommendations and COVID-19 protocols during this reporting period. IOA followed updated guidelines offered by the Department of Public Health and CDC regarding the Omicron sub-variants BA.5 and BA.4. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and supplies were made available to CLF program staff to prevent disruption in care and expand in-person services. In some instances, the program also purchased PPE for participants to help them access community services that resumed in-person visits during this period. While most services have been conducted in the field, virtual options continued to be available for vulnerable community members who still express concerns about risks of exposure. Moreover, CLF has worked in collaboration with Laguna Honda Hospital and other inpatient facilities to support the provision of services. The safety and well-being of the participants and program staff remained to be the program's top priority.
- ❖ During this reporting period, the CLF Rapid Transitions Team continued its collaboration with In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS), Adult Protective Services, Homebridge, and the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) to assist individuals who transitioned from Laguna Honda Hospital or Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital to Shelter-in-Place (SIP) hotel sites since March 2020. The team has not received any new referrals since December 2021. CLF is now focused on assisting the current eight (8) participants enrolled in the program who are still at a SIP site and anticipates continuing support for at least another 6 months as SIP sites are expected to close.
- ❖ CLF continues to support the DAS Public Guardian (PG) Office through the PG Housing Fund by providing housing subsidies and move-related cost assistance to individuals conserved by the PG who also meet CLF eligibility criteria. CLF helps these participants remain stable in licensed Assisted Living Facilities (ALF), supportive housing, or other similar types of housing. During this reporting period, CLF worked with the PG Office in assessing how the program can support new referrals as the need for these services remain prevalent and resources in the community that support this level of care are still scarce.
- ❖ In September 2021, CLF reestablished utilization of the California Community Transition (CCT) program to leverage Medi-Cal funds to increase its capacity to serve more participants. During this reporting period, 3 new applications were submitted to the Department of Health Care Services. CLF currently has a total of 7 participants that have been connected to CCT services, with 4 more that are pending for services. IOA expects to see an increase in community transitions that are supported by CCT services as more CLF members learn about this program.

- ❖ In early June, the Community Options and Resource Engagement (CORE) team was assembled to help facilitate Laguna Honda Hospital patient discharges to independent living while the hospital completes its recertification process with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). The CORE team includes city agencies and community service providers that can support safe transition of individuals to the community, namely DAS, DPH, HSH, IHSS, CLF, Homebridge, SF Public Authority, and Brilliant Corners. The CORE team meets bi-weekly to develop a comprehensive community care plan for individuals ready to discharge.

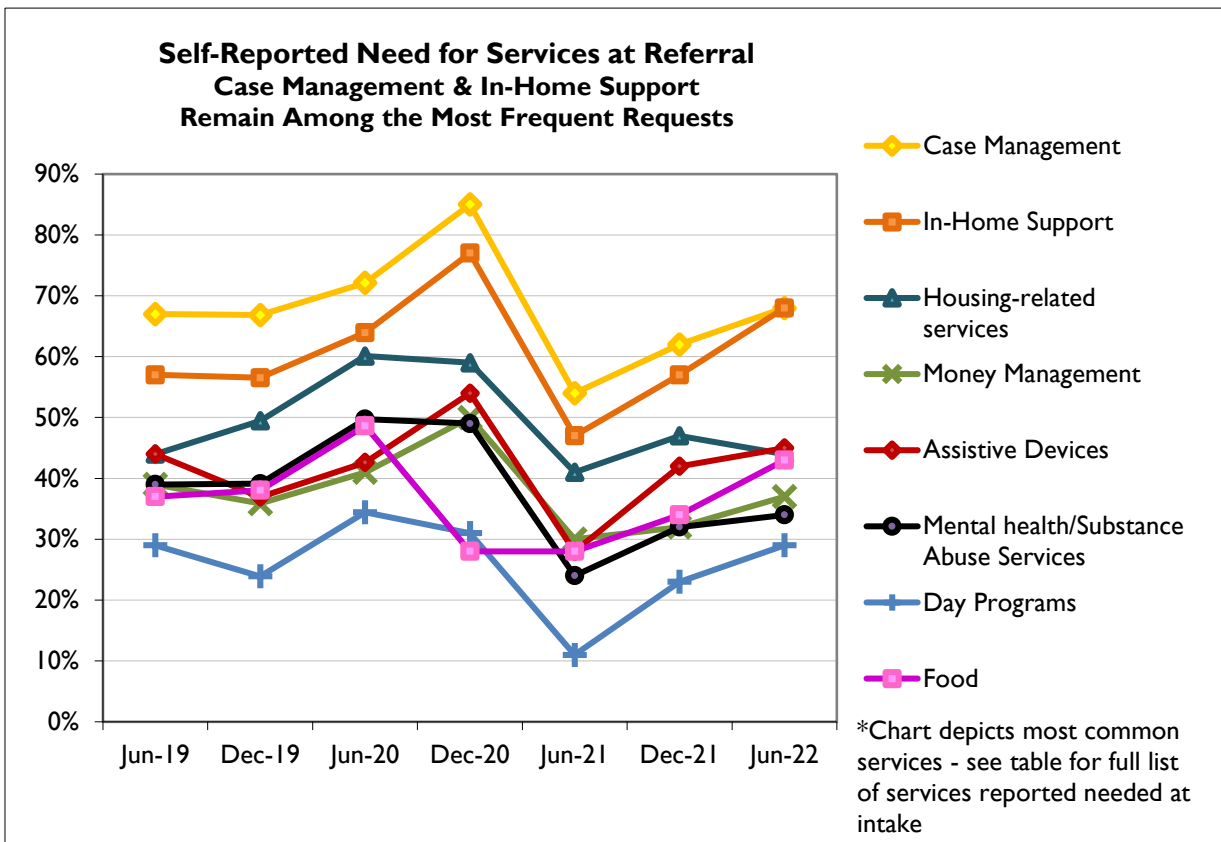
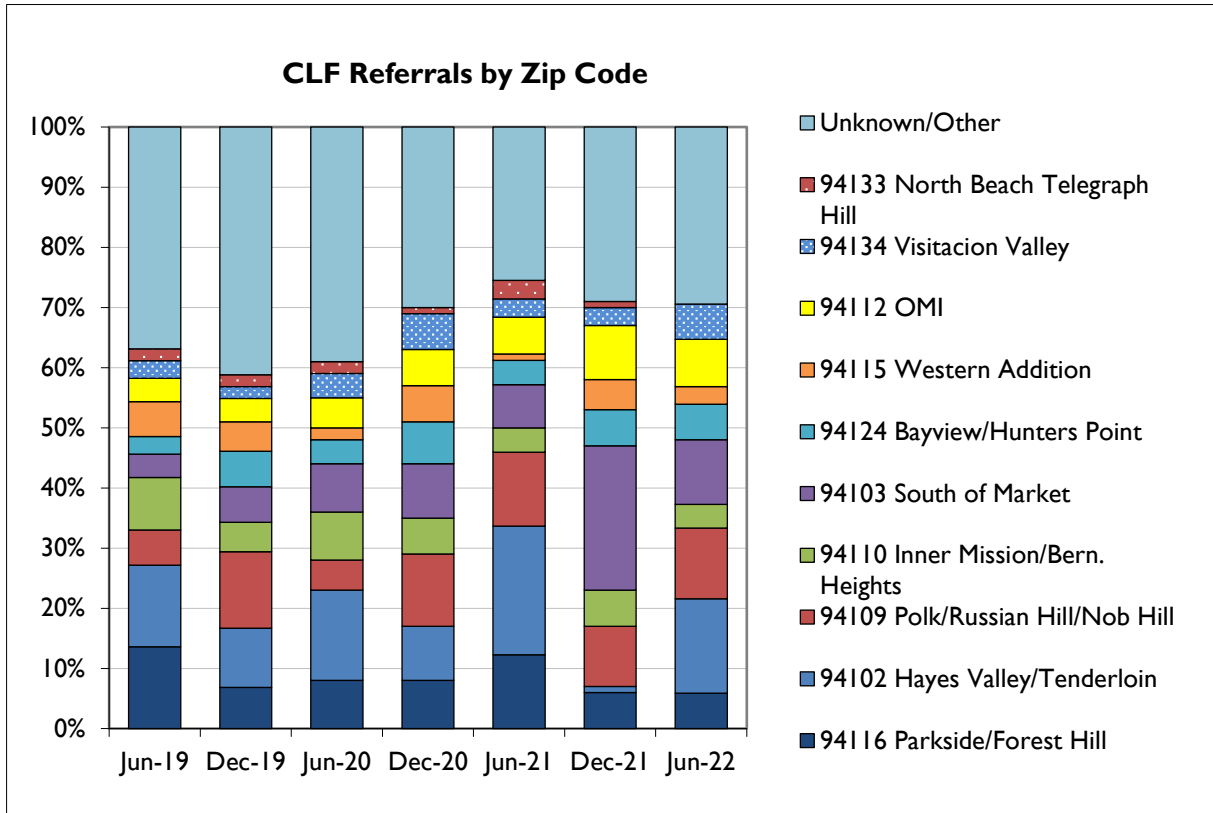

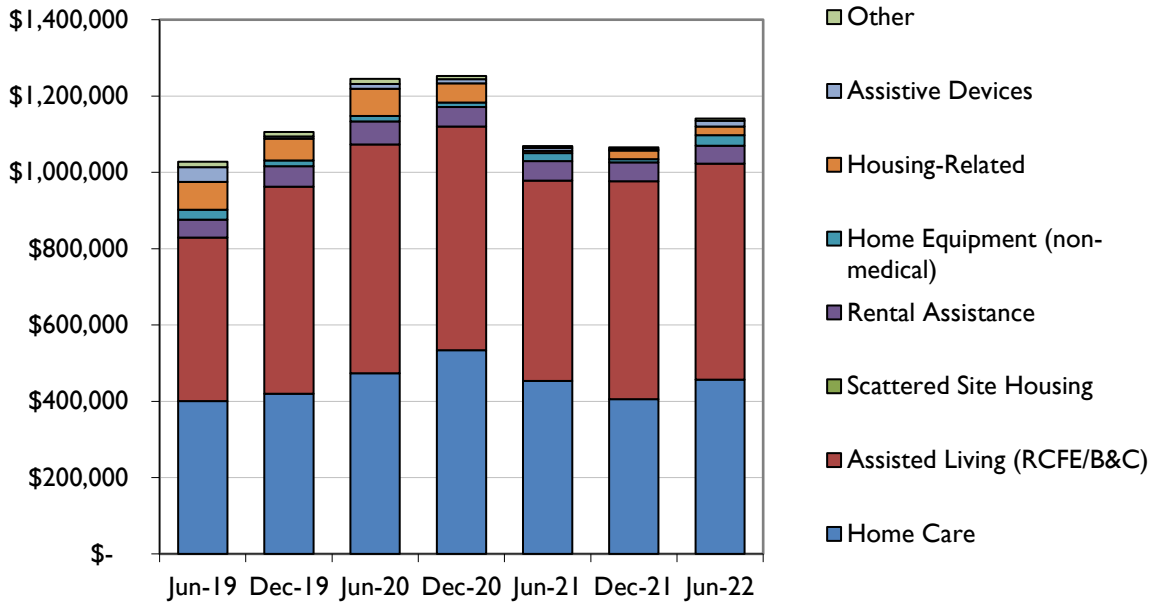

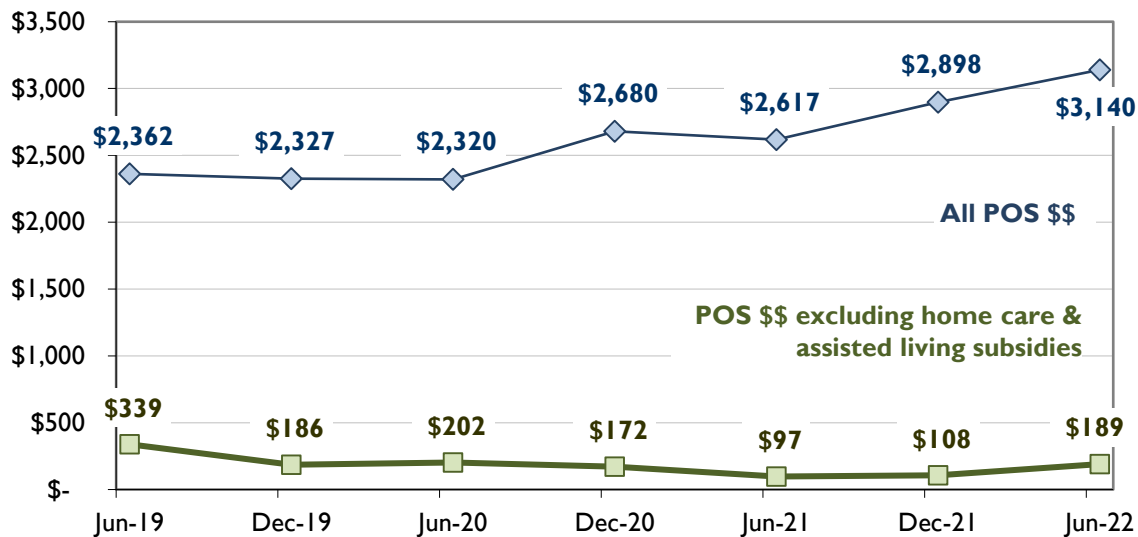

Expenditures at CLF return to 2019 levels; high Home Care and Assisted Living costs continue to drive spending

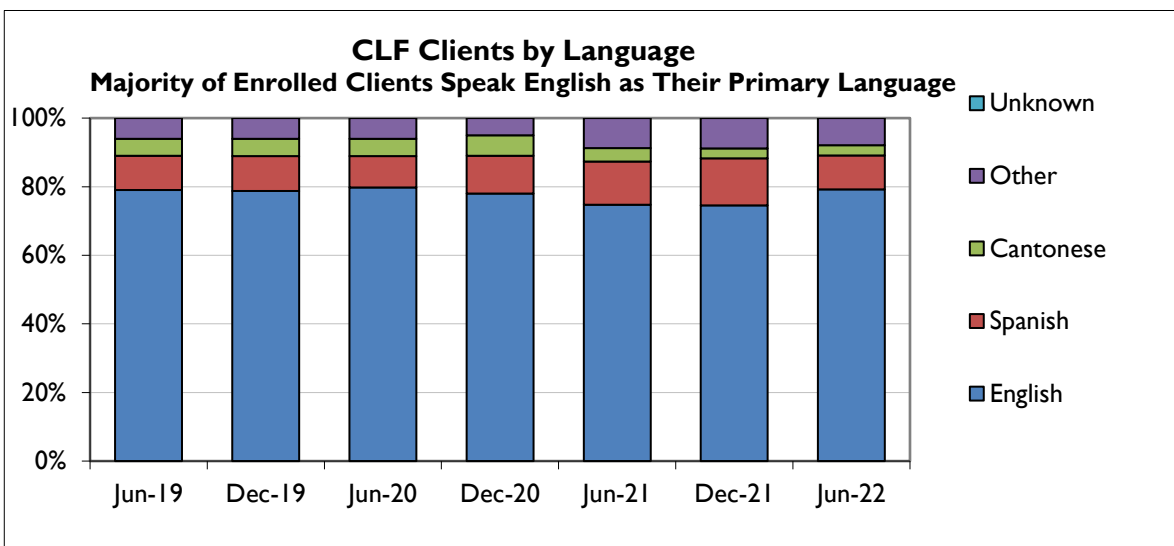
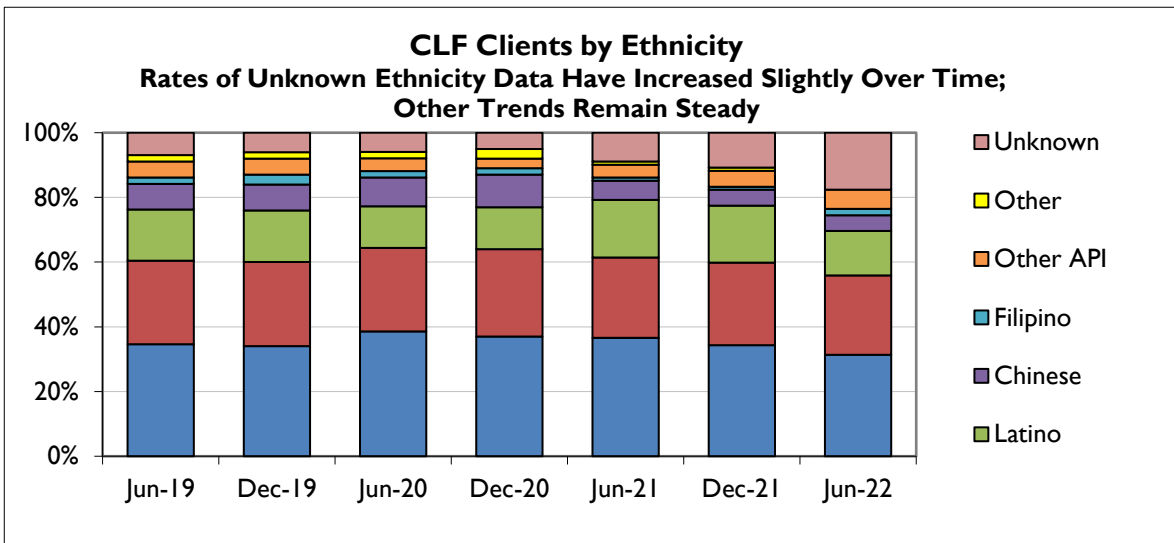
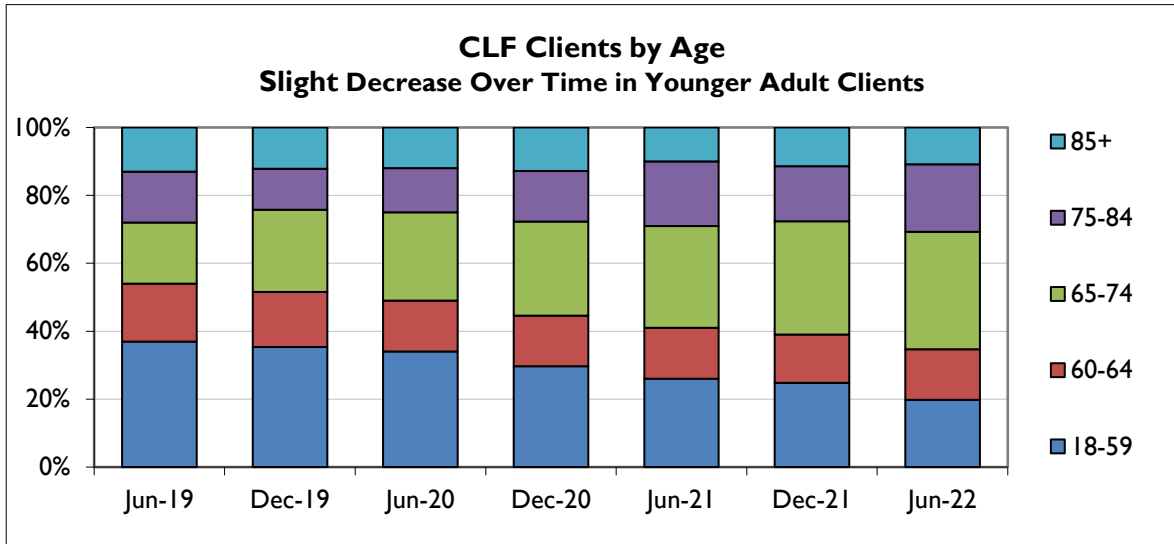


Average Monthly Purchase of Service (POS) Cost Per Client for CLF Clients with Any Purchases:
Rates higher than prior years due to increase in Home Care and Assisted Living; spending in other areas remains low

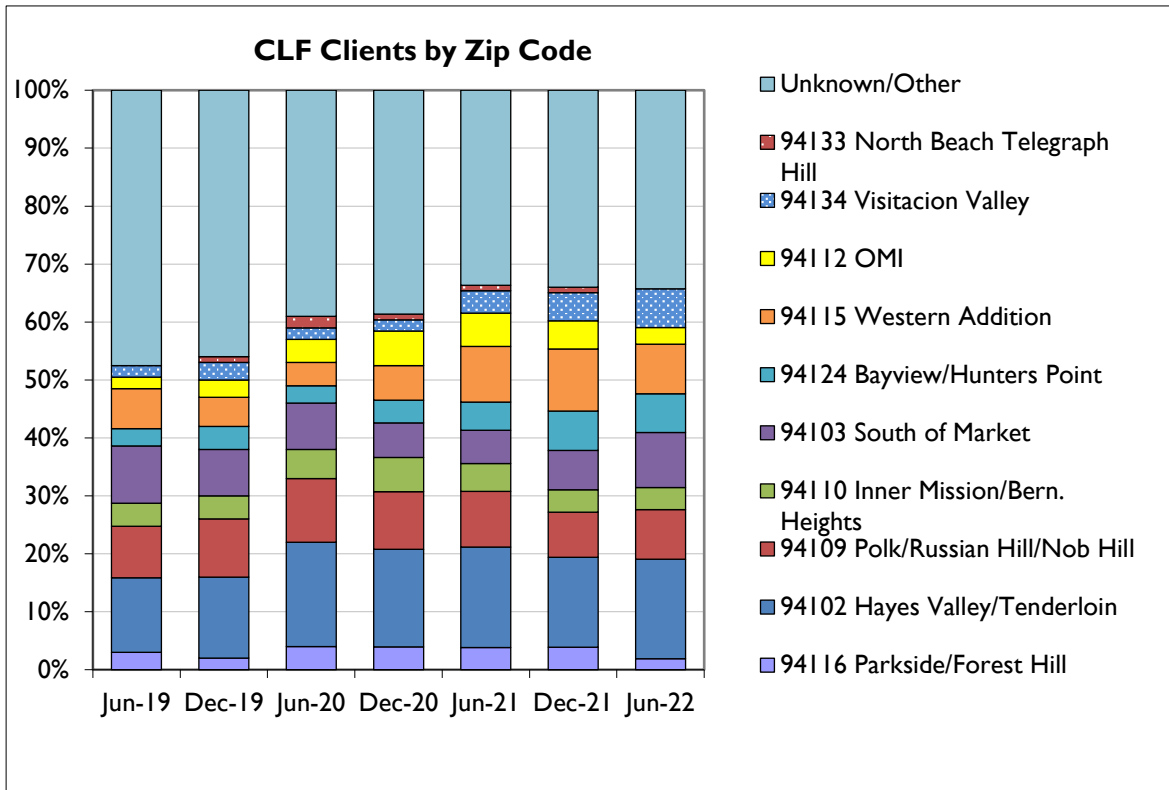

The ALPR - GTMS has been effective as a fail-safe should the Automated Vehicle Identification (AVI) readers malfunction and fail to read the transponder which the Airport affixes to certain types of permitted vehicles. The technology assists in dispute resolution in the event that the operator challenges the transponder data (i.e., number of trips the operator has made to the Airport) collected from the AVI.

The technology is also effective in tracking permitted operators that are not issued transponders, such as TNC vehicles and long distance bus carriers; tracking unpermitted operators who solicit passengers for rides; and assisting public safety agencies in investigations.

The technology enables the Airport to assess trip fees on permitted Commercial ground transportation operators. Specifically, in 2021, the Airport collected a total of \$ 22,373,523 in trip fees from ground transportation operators.

Thank you for all your office's attention to the needs of our district and investing in the Tenderloin Linkage Center. We have become aware that there is no plan to open a new center before the existing center closes and no plans for continuity of care. As Tenderloin organizations and organizations serving Tenderloin residents, we are deeply concerned with ensuring that those currently being served by the Tenderloin Linkage Center do not face interruptions in care. The closure is imminent, and the Department of Public Health has announced that three new hubs will be opening. We would like your administrations to switch gears and ensure that the city opens a hub in the Tenderloin at an existing or new site, has an opening date for a new hub in the Tenderloin, and a plan for continuity of equivalent level services for clients currently being served.

We believe the closure can be coordinated in a way that does not unnecessarily harm our constituents and neighbors by abruptly shutting down life-saving services with no replacement(s) or outreach plan to inform folks of location(s) for new services. In particular, we want to avoid a scenario where shutting down the Tenderloin Center puts people in heightened danger of fatal overdoses and other fatal health risks. Currently, over 400 people visit the center daily and have access to showers, bathrooms, referrals to service, and respite off the street. We also want to make sure that every current client of the Tenderloin center has reasonable notice about both the closure and the location, services, and hours of where they will be able to go.

Under no circumstances can we safely and responsibly shut down the Tenderloin Center without a replacement. As Tenderloin organizations, we are prepared to help make that happen. Please respond to this letter in writing with an opening date for a new Tenderloin hub and plans to work with the Tenderloin community to craft a plan that outlines continuity of services.

Dear Supervisors,

As mothers who have kids suffering from addiction in San Francisco, **we are urging you to Vote No on extending the lease for the Tenderloin Center.**

While the City has tried to justify the TLC and “wellness hubs” as low barrier access to services that “saves lives,” the outcomes are debatable. The Tenderloin Center is far less effective than the city’s other overdose prevention programs, accounting for just 5% of overdose reversals. It has brought major unintended consequences, including magnifying the open drug scene which in turn exacerbates the addiction crisis.

Even if you ignore these factors, there is no possible justification for the TLC—or any such “wellness hub”—when there are so many higher priority gaps in treatment, and clearly not enough budget to fund them all. We have been alarmed to discover how many groups have testified to the gaps during the recent **Board of Supervisor hearings (Public Safety Conditions at the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at San Francisco General Hospital 7/28/22, Treatment On Demand 10/27/22).**

Do we really have the budget for: Market-rate pay for frontline workers? Security staff for the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at SF General? Dual diagnosis programs? Step down housing? Trauma-responsive low-barrier programs? Language, age and culturally appropriate programs? Until the City has budgeted for all these critical needs and clarified the risk mitigation for the “unintended consequences” of “wellness hubs,” it would be morally outrageous and legally risky to fund them.

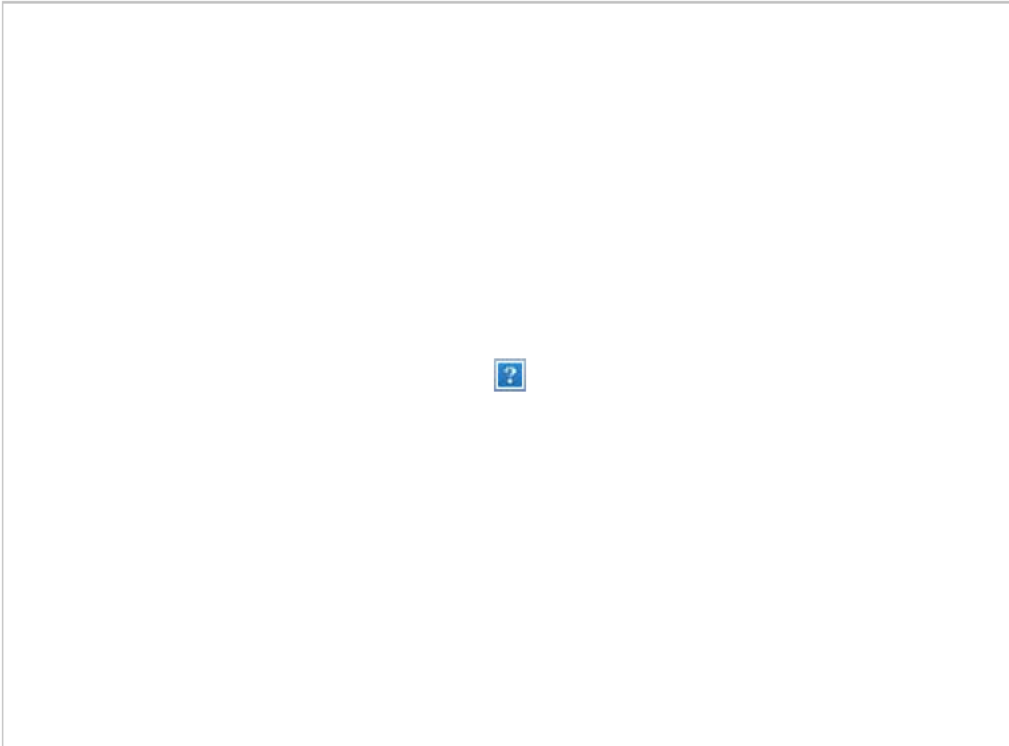
In summary, here are our top 3 reasons to Vote No on extending the TLC contract:

3 Reasons to Vote NO on Extending the TLC Contract

1.

While the main justification for the TLC is to reverse ODs, the site has reversed just 5% of overdoses to date. (It’s unclear if these are incremental or

would have been reversed by EMS or the community. It's also unclear if people try riskier drugs in the TLC, because it's "safe" and then they are more likely to OD than they would otherwise.) In contrast, the City's effort to engage the community in reversing overdoses has been extremely effective, far less expensive and easier to scale. (Data source: Tenderloin Emergency Initiative)



2.

As someone from the Treatment on Demand Committee testified during a recent BOS hearing, "we need to assess our programs and make sure we are not making the problem worse." Indeed, instead of reducing open drug scenes, by all appearances the TLC has magnified them.

a.

The capacity of the TLC is far too small to support all users; this in turn justifies people congregating next door in UN Plaza to use there, which in turn draws in dealers, and creates a party scene so outrageous that it's been the subject of international media attention.

b.

The party scene around the TLC draws more people in; kids of our members including teenagers buy drugs outside the TLC freely. One teen said, "Anything you want, you can buy in the Tenderloin." The City's ambiguity about illicit drug use makes it unrealistic for the police to

monitor and manage.

c. The TLC has negatively affected neighboring businesses.

3. Compared to the the mission-critical treatment needs as expressed in BOS hearings recently, the TLC and “well-ness hubs” are at best a luxury; examples:

a. Treatment gaps in criminal justice referrals are failing our most vulnerable people; this lack of treatment after (or instead of) incarceration runs completely counter to San Francisco’s aspiration to provide “equitable” treatment for marginalized communities. Here are some of the issues mentioned by the offices of Criminal Justice and Public Defender at recent BOS hearings.

i. There are only two clinicians while there are 850 clients at present needing to be placed

ii. Paperwork is complex and slows the process down – 2-6 months before a client gets placed into treatment

iii.
Too few appropriate facilities creates more risk of failure (“appropriate” includes language, culture, age, dual diagnosis)

iv.
Gaps between treatment create high failure risk (e.g., discharge → residential treatment; residential treatment → step down)

b.
Working conditions at the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at SF General are stressful and dangerous.

i.
High acuity conditions (volatile patients) and low security presence create stressful and dangerous conditions; security guards per patient ratio is only 1:19 (compared to 1:4 at UCSF)

ii.
Hiring experienced staff is difficult due to below-market pay and difficult working conditions

iii.
The staff shortage requires nurses to work overtime and do ancillary work; nurses have made over 50 complaints in a few months about risks including violent and suicidal patients

c.
Staff shortages at the City’s BAART clinic is preventing users from entering this normally low-barrier treatment modality

i.
[Mayor Breed one year ago said the City would have around the clock hours at BAART](#)

- ii. Since then, **BAART intake still has not expanded its hours** (6am-10am, M-F)
- iii. Even with these limited intake hours, **BAART has canceled several intake appointments** of people in our community (and how many others?), **leaving treatment seekers on the street, due to staffing shortages**
- iv. Meanwhile, the DPH had a hiring surge in April and still didn't staff these BAART intake positions

As Governor Newsom said in vetoing SB57, the risks posed by SCSs can outweigh the benefits. Not once has the City listed the “unintended consequences” and risk mitigation from these sites. We do not believe the City has the resources to manage these risks especially when other cities including Vancouver, Calgary and Harlem have already shown they attract more dealers and users, affecting the city’s resources and community. Instead of funding “supervised consumption,” let’s use this moment to create a visionary new model that unambiguously uplifts people suffering from addiction.

And, according to the last 6 months of San Francisco medical examiner reports, there were even more overdose deaths April through September of 2022 (310) than April through September of 2021 (301).

So we must ask the question, does this model even work?

Or does it simply promote more use and more dealing?

If the City decides to move forward with this model without answering these questions for San Franciscans, any new site will face the same failures for clients and community members we have witnessed at the Tenderloin Center - and at SOMA Rise.

We urge you to close the Tenderloin Center, and to not open any additional such facilities until the City has a comprehensive plan to improve client outcomes, and to thwart the open-air drug markets and related crime and safety issues this model creates for communities.

Honorable Chair Shamann Walton:

I strongly urge the Board of Supervisors to REJECT Item No. 17 on the agenda for tomorrow's regular meeting, retroactively approving the San Francisco Mental Health Plan ("MHP"), because one of the assurances within the contract is FALSE.

In the Plan document, Attachment 2 to file No. 221054, "DRAFT Standard Agmt 22-20129," Exhibit E, ¶ 6.B., p. 12 of 17, p. 161 of pdf, states, "The Contractor [DPH Community Behavioral Health Services] agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state law, including but not limited to the statutes and regulations incorporated by reference in Sections D, G, and H . . ." DPH Community Behavioral Health Services ("BHS") has NOT complied with all applicable state law. Specifically, one of the incorporated sections, ¶ 6.H., p. 16 of 17, p. 165 of pdf, states, "The Contractor shall comply with all State and federal statutes . . ." It then lists among these, ¶ 6.H.(1), p. 17 of 17, p. 166 of pdf, "Division 5, Welf. & Inst. Code, to the extent that these requirements are applicable to the services and functions set forth in this contract." Chapter 2 of Part 2 of Division 5, Welf & Inst. Code, deals specifically with the MHP. § 5651 thereof requires BHS to comply with the terms of the MHP, and subd. (b)(4) thereof states that the MHP shall include a provision "[t]hat the local mental health advisory board has reviewed and approved procedures ensuring citizen and professional involvement at all stages of the planning process pursuant to Section 5604.2." This provision is included by reference in the MHP and BHS has NOT complied with it. The Behavioral Health Commission has NOT reviewed and approved ANY procedures ensuring citizen and professional involvement at ANY stages of the planning process pursuant to Section 5604.2. I have been attending their meetings since May of 2018. In that time, I have missed only one regular and one special meeting, among

those posted to the public, and they have never even discussed any procedures ensuring citizen and professional involvement in any stages of the planning process of the community mental health system in all of that time. Far less have they ever approved any.

Therefore, the Board of Supervisors should REJECT the MHP. Because of this defect, the California Department of Health Care Services (“DHCS”) reserves the right to terminate the contract. ¶ 2.C.(2), p. 3 of 17, p. 152 of pdf (“DHCS reserves the right to cancel or terminate this Contract if DHCS finds that Contractor fails to comply with contract requirements, [or] state or federal law . . .”). DHCS *shall* impose sanctions upon BHS for noncompliance with the terms of the MHP and with state law. ¶ 5.I., p. 11 of 17, p. 160 of pdf (“The Department shall . . . impose sanctions on the Contractor for violations of the terms of this contract, and applicable federal and state law . . .”). Sanctions may include temporarily or permanently suspending enrollment and marketing activities; requiring BHS to suspend or terminate personnel or subcontractors; imposing temporary management; suspending default enrollment of enrollees who do not select BHS for the delivery of health care services; and imposing civil monetary sanctions. *Cal. Welf. & Inst. Code* § 14197.7(d)(1)-(d)(2) and (d)(4)-(d)(6).

If the Board of Supervisors does not REJECT this item, I will inform DHCS that you approved it despite this warning. Regardless of whether the Board of Supervisors rejects this item, I will inform DHCS of this defect in BHS’s assurances, and their failure to abide by state law and the MHP.

I did not appear at the hearing before the Budget and Finance Committee on Nov. 1 on this item because I did not know about it at that time. I informed Dr. Hillary Kunins, Director, and Elissa Velez, Regulatory Affairs Manager, at DPH Community Behavioral Health Services, as well as the Behavioral Health Commission, of this omission via email at appx. 1:47 pm on Friday, Nov. 4, and none of them had anything to say.

To the board of supervisors - I have been a pollworker for 17 elections. Tonite I was just refused by the HR dept, after having applied to be a pollworker for the Nov 8 election about a month ago. I have a medical exemption against being vaxxed and I included my doctor's letter. Last week I was asked to update it because it was over a year old (by one month), but my medical condition does not change. So after a couple days of trying to get the updated letter from my doctor's office to the HR dept, I got the rejection letter from the HR dept tonite, saying as an unvaxxed person, I would be a health threat. Because that was their answer, I'm wondering why they even asked me to update the medical exemption letter.

I'd like to know where is the proof that any unvaxxed person is a health threat?
