Homelessness and Supportive Housing Fund (Housing First Program) FY2025-2026 and FY2026-2027 Expenditure Plan

This expenditure plan for the Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) Fund for FY2025-26 and FY2026-27 is submitted to the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Section 10-100.77(f) of the San Francisco Administrative Code. The Administrative Code requires the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to submit this expenditure plan if annual proposed appropriations from the Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) Fund exceed \$11.9 million. This plan must include estimates of the amounts to be spent for various purposes, as well as an explanation of who is to benefit from these expenditures, how many people will benefit, and how the proposed benefits will be provided.

<u>Planned Expenditures:</u> The budget for the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing includes proposed expenditures from the Homelessness and Supportive Housing Fund of \$22,955,710 in FY25-26 and \$23,284,740 in FY26-27 (see Attachment). The proposed expenditures are divided into two general categories: housing and services. The proposed FY25-26 expenditures are supported by \$22,955,710 in projected FY25-26 HSH Fund revenues and \$6,442,314 in projected FY25-26 General Fund revenues. The proposed FY26-27 expenditures are supported by \$23,284,740 in projected FY26-27 HSH Fund revenues and \$6,522,056 in projected FY26-27 General Fund revenues.

Beneficiaries: The Housing First Program is funded by the Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) Fund. The beneficiaries of the proposed spending under this plan are homeless and formerly homeless County Adult Assistance Programs (CAAP) clients of the Department of Human Services. HSH estimates that approximately 1,267 units will be made available to CAAP clients through this proposed spending plan. Since the beginning of the Housing First Program in May 2004, a total of 6,205 homeless and formerly homeless CAAP clients have been placed into Permanent Supportive Housing (data through April 30, 2025).

How Benefits Are Provided: Access to the Housing First Program is provided to any CAAP client listed as being homeless with their assigned CAAP worker. CAAP clients experiencing homelessness are referred to Adult Coordinated Entry Access Points to be assessed and prioritized for housing referral based on various criteria, such as levels of vulnerability, length and history of homelessness, and severity of housing barriers. Until a housing placement is made, shelter is offered by the CAAP worker for the time between monthly homeless verification appointments. Each time the CAAP clients experiencing homelessness see their eligibility worker for a monthly homeless verification appointment, their worker checks to see if housing is available and if so, will offer an opportunity to apply for housing. Additional outreach is done to CAAP clients experiencing homelessness who have been utilizing shelter for long periods. As housing opportunities are available, CAAP clients experiencing homelessness are referred to HSH Coordinated Entry staff that provide support through the screening and placement process. When a CAAP client is placed in housing, HSH staff makes arrangements with the CAAP worker for benefits to be adjusted and routed correctly and notifies both the CAAP and CalFresh Division of the Human Services Agency of the client's new address.

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Dear Clerk Jalipa and Members of the Board of Supervisors,

My name is Lauren Valles, and I write to you today as a member of the San Francisco Young Democrats to express my strong support for the proposals introduced this budget cycle to fully fund behavioral health treatment beds for San Franciscans with the most acute needs. The San Francisco Democratic County Central Committee (DCCC) has already passed a resolution in support of this critical investment.

I commend Mayor Lurie for securing a grant to fund 73 new behavioral health treatment beds—an important step forward. However, the Residential Care and Treatment Bed Workgroup has clearly identified a need for at least 135 additional beds to address the crisis adequately. Stopping short of that full need would mean leaving vulnerable residents without the care they deserve.

During my time as a community organizer in last year's local election, I met a neighbor named Jesus. He shared the story of a friend who sought help at one of San Francisco's existing behavioral health sites. Due to limited capacity, mismanagement, and lack of oversight, his friend tragically passed away. We cannot let this become a recurring story in our city.

This is a pivotal moment for the Board to lead with both compassion and urgency. I urge you to follow the SF DCCC's lead and fully fund the treatment beds our city so desperately needs.

Thank you for your time, your service, and your commitment to the wellbeing and dignity of all San Franciscans.
