WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, Mayor London N. Breed declared a local emergency to exist in connection with the spread of the novel coronavirus COVID-19; and WHEREAS, The Mayor transmitted a copy of that Proclamation Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency to the Board of Supervisors (the "Proclamation"), and on March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred in the Proclamation and in the actions taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; the Proclamation and the Board's concurring motion are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 200228; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the Health Officer declared a local health emergency under Section 101080 of the California Health and Safety Code, and the Board of Supervisors concurred in that declaration on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, During the local emergency, as authorized by State and local law, City boards, commissions, and advisory bodies have met remotely with very limited exceptions, and members of the public have observed and participated in meetings by phone or through online platforms; on December 17, 2021, the Mayor issued the Forty-First Supplement to the

Proclamation, authorizing certain exceptions to the remote meeting requirement in anticipation of a return to in-person meetings by February 28, 2022; the City later experienced a drastic increase in COVID-19 cases due to the highly transmissible Omicron variant; given the current public health indicators, the City anticipates that it will be able to safely hold in-person meetings of some City policy bodies beginning on March 7, 2022, which is also the current date for City employees to return to in-person work; it is in the public interest to require City boards and commissions created in the Charter that are not advisory bodies to begin to hold in-person meetings and allow members of the public to attend starting on March 7, 2022; it is also in the public interest to allow members of such bodies who are particularly vulnerable to COVID-19 to continue to appear remotely if necessary; and

WHEREAS, In the Thirty-Fifth Supplement to the Proclamation dated February 21, 2021, the Mayor authorized the extension of certain emergency contracts related to the City's response to the pandemic for an additional twelve months; the City previously contracted with a number of hotels to house individuals experiencing homelessness and individuals at heightened risk of contracting severe COVID-19; the term of these agreements authorized under the Thirty-Fifth Supplement is nearly expired, and due to the need for additional time to wind down the program and locate suitable placements for the individuals staying in these locations, it is in the public interest to authorize the extension of such hotel agreements for an additional limited period; and

WHEREAS, On February 10, 2022, the Mayor took additional steps to meet the emergency by issuing the Forty-Fifth Supplement to the Proclamation, ordering two actions to meet the emergency; the Forty-Fifth Supplement is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in Board File No. 220163; and

WHEREAS, Government Code, Sections 8550 et seq. and Charter, Section 3.100
provide for the concurrence by members of the Board of Supervisors in such emergency
declaration and in action taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; now, therefore, be it

MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors concurs with the following actions taken by the Mayor to meet the local emergency included in the Mayor's Forty-Fifth Supplement to the Proclamation, dated February 10, 2022, as such actions are described in full in the Forty-Fifth Supplement and summarized as follows:

Action 1: Revising and replacing Section 1 of the Forty-First Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation to make the following changes for public meetings of City policy bodies other than the Board of Supervisors. Decision making boards and commissions created in the Charter ("Charter Commissions") must begin holding in-person meetings on March 7, 2022. Charter Commissions must allow the public to observe and provide public comment at such meetings and must also provide the public the opportunity to observe and provide public comment remotely. Commissioners with a COVID-related reason, including being a member of a population at heightened risk of severe illness from COVID-19 or being required to quarantine due to COVID illness or exposure, can appear remotely at in-person meetings of Charter Commissions. All other City boards, commissions, and policy bodies must continue to meet remotely subject to limited exceptions as authorized by the Mayor;

Action 2: Amending Section 1 of the Thirty-Fifth Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation to authorize the Executive Director of the Human Services Agency to amend existing agreements for the use of hotel rooms to house individuals experiencing homelessness or individuals at heightened risk of developing severe COVID-19, to extend the term of such agreements up to August 31, 2022, and requiring that any further extension to be approved by the Board of Supervisors.
