9	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
10	Section 1. Findings.
11	(a) Ordinance No. 132-10 established the Neighborhood Community Justice Task
12	Force to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors regarding the creation of
13	neighborhood-based restorative and community justice programs.
14	(b) Rule 2.21 of the Board of Supervisors' Rules of Order requires the Clerk of the
15	Board to determine and identify each year every subordinate body that has not met at least
16	once every four months, and to ask the City Attorney to prepare legislation repealing the
17	ordinance or resolution that created the body.
18	(c) The Clerk of the Board has determined that the Neighborhood Community
19	Justice Task Force has not met in more than four months.
20	Section 2. The San Francisco Administrative Code is hereby amended by deleting
21	Article VIII, Sections 5.70 through 5.75, as follows:
22	ARTICLE VIII:
23	NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY JUSTICE TASK FORCE
24	SEC. 5.70. ESTABLISHMENT.

$\frac{The}{T}$	e Board of Supervisors hereby establishes a Neighborhood Community Justice Task Force
<del>("the Task</del>	Force") to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors regarding the creation of
neighborh	ood-based restorative and community justice programs. The Task Force will focus on one
neighborh	ood or commercial corridor at a time ("the Neighborhood"). The first focus of the Task Force
will be the	Haight-Ashbury neighborhood, and subsequent foci will be chosen by resolution of the
Board of S	upervisors. With each subsequent neighborhood or commercial corridor focus, the Task
Force men	abership will change in order to maintain community-based decision making, and to
appropriat	tely fill those seats that have location-based requirements, as described below.
<u>SE</u>	C. 5.71. MEMBERSHIP.
<del>(a)</del>	Voting members of the Task Force generally shall be drawn from residents and
<del>businesses</del>	of the Neighborhood, as well as individuals with an understanding of the needs of homeless
and youth,	and the practices of restorative and other alternative justice models.
<del>(b)</del>	The Task Force shall consist of seven voting members, appointed by the Board of
Supervisor	<del>'s as follows:</del>
	(1) Seat 1: A person who is currently a tenant in the Neighborhood.
	(2) Seat 2: A person who is an owner of residential property in the Neighborhood.
	(3) Seat 3: A person who is an owner of a business located in the Neighborhood.
	(4) Seat 4: A person who has expertise in and practical experience with restorative

	(5) Seat 5: A person recommended by a neighborhood-based organization that
provides o	utreach or drop-in services for youth.
	(6) Seat 6: A person recommended by a community-based organization that works
with home	less individuals.
	(7) Seat 7: A person nominated by the Supervisor in whose District the Neighborhood
<del>is located.</del>	If the Neighborhood is located in more than one Supervisorial District, the Board of

1	Supervisors, in selecting the Neighborhood for consideration by the Task Force, shall determine which
2	District includes the largest physical portion of the Neighborhood, and the Supervisor for that District
3	shall nominate the candidate for Seat 7.
4	(c) The Board of Supervisors may be resolution modify the Task Force membership set forth
5	above for those Neighborhoods subsequently designated for consideration, in order to best reflect the
6	demographics and specific needs of the Neighborhood.
7	(d) Representatives from the Small Business Commission, Human Services Agency,
8	Department of Public Health, Department of Children, Youth, and Families, Tenderloin's Community
9	Justice Center, Police Department, District Attorney, and Public Defender, shall serve as non-voting
10	members of the Task Force. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall invite the Superior Court to
11	send a representative to participate as a non-voting member of the Task Force. All City departments,
12	commissions, boards, and agencies shall cooperate with the Task Force in conducting its business.
13	SEC. 5.72. ORGANIZATION AND TERM OF OFFICE.
14	(a) The term of office of voting members of the Task Force shall be one year. The terms of
15	office for all seven seats shall start from the date the last of the seven voting members of the Task Force
16	is appointed and sworn in.
17	(b) Voting members of the Task Force shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors
18	The Board of Supervisors anticipates asking the Neighborhood representatives in Seats 1, 2, 3, and 7 to
19	step down when the Task Force finishes its work in connection with their Neighborhood and the Board
20	selects a new Neighborhood for consideration.
21	(c) In the event a vacancy occurs during the term of office of any member, the Board of
22	Supervisors shall appoint a successor having the same qualifications for the unexpired term of the
23	office vacated.
24	(d) Services of the voting members of the Task Force shall be voluntary and members will
25	serve without compensation.

1	(e) The Human Services Agency shall provide administrative support for the Task Force.
2	SEC. 5.73. POWERS AND DUTIES.
3	(a) The Task Force shall hold meetings and hearings:
4	(1) Conducting a needs assessment for the neighborhood, minimally entailing
5	focused service needs assessments for specific low-income populations, including homeless people, and
6	an assessment of availability and use of public spaces;
7	(2) Conducting an evaluation of public safety in the neighborhood, both documented
8	and perceived; and;
9	(3) Exploring and evaluating restorative and other justice models, keeping in mind
10	the specific needs and problems of the Neighborhood.
11	(b) The Task Force shall hold a minimum of two public hearings in the Neighborhood to
12	receive input from the community regarding restorative justice and other alternative justice models,
13	and the jurisdiction, organization, and procedures for a neighborhood-based justice program.
14	(c) The Task Force shall, using input from the public hearings and its own deliberations,
15	develop recommendations on:
16	(1) The jurisdiction, organization, and procedures of a neighborhood-based justice
17	<del>program.</del>
18	(2) Ways in which restorative justice practices and principles, and those of other
19	alternative justice models, should be incorporated into a neighborhood-based justice program.
20	(3) Social and health services that should be provided in conjunction with a
21	neighborhood-based justice program.
22	(d) No later than three months after the date that all seven voting members of the Task Force
23	have been appointed, the Task Force shall submit a progress report on its work to the Board of
24	Supervisors. No later than nine months after the date that all seven voting members of the Task Force

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1	have been appointed, the Task Force shall submit its recommendations, including recommendations		
2	regarding legislation and appropriations, to the Board of Supervisors.		
3	SEC. 5.74. MEETINGS.		
4	The place, date and time of meetings of the Task Force shall be prescribed by rule of the Task		
5	Force; provided, however that the Task Force shall hold a regular meeting not less than once every		
6	month. All meetings shall, except as provided by general law, be open to the public.		
7	SEC. 5.75. SUNSET.		
8	The Task Force shall terminate by operation of law on July 1, 2015, unless the Board of		
9	Supervisors by resolution extends its term.		
10	Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days from the		
11	date of passage.
