| 7 | WHEREAS, In 2021, California lawmakers allocated \$485 million to the Foreclosure |
| 8 | Intervention Housing Preservation Program (FIHPP); and |
| 9 | WHEREAS, FIHPP is intended to fund nonprofits to acquire and stabilize market-rate |
| 10 | residential buildings between 1 and 25 units at risk of foreclosure or in the foreclosure |
| 11 | process, in order to prevent the displacement of tenants and create new homeownership |
| 12 | opportunities; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, Since 2021, the California Department of Housing and Community |
| 14 | Development has been working with nonprofit housing providers, Community Development |
| 15 | Financial Institutions and others throughout the state to build out the FIHPP program; at the |
| 16 | same time, nonprofit housers have been building capacity and identifying eligible projects in |
| 17 | anticipation of the funds coming online; and |
| 18 | WHEREAS, In late 2023, the state announced plans to pause efforts for FIHPP |
| 19 | implementation, and earlier this year, initial budget projections for the coming fiscal year |
| 20 | slashed the program's budget from \$485 million to \$237.5 million; and |
| 21 | WHEREAS, It is broadly accepted that the cornerstones of housing affordability are |
| 22 | known as the Three P's: Producing new affordable homes, protecting existing low and |
| 23 | moderate income households, and preserving existing buildings with the goal of preventing |
| 24 | displacement of low-income households and stabilizing communities; and |

| 1 | WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted a new Housing Element in |

| 3 | WHEREAS, San Francisco's Housing Element Appendix A (Housing Needs |
| 4 | Assessment and Assessment of Fair Housing) lists the FIHPP program explicitly as one |
| 5 | source to help us meet our affordable housing targets, noting that FIHPP will provide "\$500 |
| 6 | million through June 2026 in loans and grants to nonprofits purchasing and rehabilitating |
| 7 | buildings at foreclosure auction, in the foreclosure process, or at risk of foreclosure;" and |
| 8 | WHEREAS, In a May 2022 hearing at the Government Audit and Oversight Committee, |
| 9 | City leaders acknowledged that the City faces a multi-billion dollar funding gap to meet its |
| 10 | state-mandated affordable housing goals under the Housing Element; and |
| 11 | WHEREAS, In June 2023, several affordable housing nonprofits confirmed that eligible |
| 12 | applications to preserve more than 300 homes, for a total of \$124 million, had been submitted |
| 13 | to the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development for City acquisition, |
| 14 | demonstrating the great need for additional funding for housing acquisitions; and |
| 15 | WHEREAS, Support for the budget request to retain funding for the Foreclosure |
| 16 | Intervention Housing Prevention Program (FIHPP) would allow affordable housing providers |
| 17 | to intervene in the sale of unsubsidized housing that is at-risk of or in foreclosure and maintain |
