2	Access for Students.]

4	Resolution urging the San Francisco Unified School District to consider
5	Tagalog/Filipino language access and studies as a necessary part of the school system
6	curriculum.
7	WHEREAS, The Filipino-American community considers bilingual access to
8 9	Tagalog/Filipino and English essential to a well-rounded education within the San Francisco
10	Unified School District; and,
11	WHEREAS, Only one Tagalog/Filipino language immersion program exists in the
12	United States at Bessie Carmichael Elementary School for children in Kindergarten to first
13	grade; and,
14	WHEREAS, Balboa High School, Lowell High School, and Mission High School's
15	Tagalog/Filipino language programs have been discontinued; and
16 17	WHEREAS, 12 percent of students attending public schools in San Francisco are of
18	Filipino decent; and,
19	WHEREAS, There is deep concern that the exclusion of Tagalog/Filipino classes at the
20	elementary and high school level is discriminatory and detrimental to preserving the culture
21	and identity of a student's Filipino-American heritage; and,
22	WHEREAS, The Filipino-American community has called on the San Francisco
23	Immigrant Rights Commission and the Mayor to urge the San Francisco Unified School

1	District to provide equal access to students of Filipino decent to programs which celebrate and
2	honor their culture; now, therefore be it
3	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco
4	urges the San Francisco Unified School District to include Tagalog/Filipino language classes
5	for elementary and high school students in its curriculum.
