[Transcontinental Chinese Railroad Workers Day - May 10, 2025] 1 2 Resolution recognizing May 10, 2025, as Transcontinental Chinese Railroad Workers 3 Day in the City and County of San Francisco. 4 5 WHEREAS, The nearly 2,000 mile Transcontinental Railroad, which shortened travel 6 time across the United States (U.S) from six months to one week, was completed on May 10, 7 1869, when the Central Pacific Railroad Company and the Union Pacific Railroad Company 8 linked railroad tracks with a golden spike at Promontory Summit, Utah; and 9 m six months to one week, was completed on May 10, 1869, when the Central Pacific 10 11 Railroad Company and the Union Pacific Railroad Company linked railroad tracks with a golden spike at Promontory Summit, Utah; and 12 WHEREAS, On July 1, 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signed into law the Pacific 13 Railroad Act of 1862, which authorized the Central Pacific Railroad Company to build a 14 transcontinental railroad that would link the U.S. from east to west; and 15 WHEREAS, Work began in 1863, as the Central Pacific Railroad Company started to 16 build its tracks in Sacramento moving east and the Union Pacific Railroad Company started to 17 build westward from Council Bluffs, lowa, where railroad lines were already operating from the 18 eastern part of the country; and 19 stern part of the country; and 20 WHEREAS, For six years, the workers of both companies toiled to lay down the rail 21 beds, tracks, and other necessary infrastructure; and 22 WHEREAS, Because of difficulties in recruiting a sufficient number of workers, nearly 23 12,000 Chinese immigrants were employed by the Central Pacific Railroad Company and 24 made up more than 80 percent of its workforce; and 25

1	WHEREAS, Chinese workers were given the most difficult, dangerous jobs and were
2	paid lower wages than other railroad workers and nearly 1,200 Chinese railroad workers died
3	from work accidents, avalanches, and explosions while working in the Sierra Nevada
4	Mountains; and
5	WHEREAS, Chinese workers, who once set a world record when they laid 10 miles of
6	track in one day, were thought of as indispensable by their foremen and were respected for
7	their work ethic and discipline; and
8	WHEREAS, In 1865, then California Governor Leland Stanford testified to U.S.
9	Congress, "Without these Chinese Railroad Workers it would be impossible to complete the
10	Western portion of this great national enterprise"; and
11	WHEREAS, In 2014, the U.S. Department of Labor inducted the Chinese railroad
12	workers into the Labor Hall of Honor, noting that they faced prejudice, low wages and social
13	isolation, but, in spite of these challenges, they courageously took a stand to organize for
14	fairer wages and safer working conditions; and
15	rking conditions; and
16	WHEREAS, The Chinese workers' fight against unfair labor practices set an example
17	for the millions of Asian Americans who came to the United States after them; and
18	WHEREAS, It is fitting that the early contributions of the Chinese railroad workers
19	continue to be remembered and honored by San Francisco every year in May during Asian
20	American Pacific Islander Heritage Month; now, therefore, be it
21	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors recognizes May 10, 2025,
22	as Transcontinental Chinese Railroad Workers Day in San Francisco.
