[Opposing California Proposition 8]

EXPRESSING SAN FRANCISCO'S OPPOSITION TO CALIFORNIA PROPOSITION 8 ON THE NOVEMBER 1998 BALLOT.

WHEREAS, Proposition 8 is a poorly crafted initiative that would hurt our children by taking millions of tax dollars away from the classroom and existing education programs to fund a new, unaccountable bureaucracy, with no checks and balances to guard against abuse; and

WHEREAS, Some of Proposition 8's provisions merely restate existing policies, such as zero tolerance for drugs and class size reduction (which is already in place, annually funded and working effectively in our schools); and

WHEREAS, Instead of improving classroom education, Proposition 8 authorizes each school to set different curricula with no regard to uniform state academic standards, and possibly in conflict with college entrance requirements; and

WHEREAS, The additional bureaucracy would include a new "Office of Chief Inspector" in which the new "Chief Inspector" (no education experience is required) would have a 10 year appointment (without legislative confirmation) and very broad powers, including the power to set her/his own salary and the salaries of all employees she/he wants to hire; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 8 also creates 8,000 powerful councils which have the potential to conflict with existing parent/teacher councils, meaningful and productive parental involvement and statewide efforts to improve student achievement; and

WHEREAS, Unlike existing school site councils, these new councils would be given the unprecedented authority to spend our tax dollars and decide what should be taught in our schools; and

WHEREAS, Establishment of a new "office of the Chief Inspector" and the 8,000 new councils would significantly increase the education bureaucracy; and

WHEREAS, This expanded bureaucracy would be funded by cutting existing classroom and other education programs; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 8's problems would be extremely difficult to fix because the proposition specifies that any changes would require another statewide initiative or an unprecedented 80% vote of each house of the Legislature and the signature of the Governor; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby expresses its opposition to Proposition 8 which would increase the size of the existing education bureaucracy, reduce accountability, force classroom education cuts, and ignore California's new, uniform academic standards.
