3 **Resolution approving the FY2014-2015 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)**
4 **Program; authorizing the Mayor, on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, to**
5 **apply for, accept, and expend the City's FY2014-2015 CDBG Program entitlement from**
6 **the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in the amount of**
7 **\$16,627,564 and to expend program income and reprogrammed funds in the amount of**
8 **\$3,463,354 for a combined total of \$20,090,918 for a period beginning July 1, 2014,**
9 **without an expiration date.**

10
11 WHEREAS, Under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as
12 amended, and related Federal Regulations, the City and County of San Francisco is eligible to
13 apply for and receive a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); and

14 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco anticipates receiving approximately
15 \$16,627,564 in FY2014-2015 CDBG Program funds from HUD, and has approximately
16 \$2,574,746 in anticipated Program Income and \$888,608 from previous CDBG grants and
17 program income from prior years, for a combined total of approximately \$20,090,918; and

18 WHEREAS, The Citizen's Committee on Community Development (CCCD) has
19 prepared recommendations for FY2014-2015 CDBG funding as set forth in a proposed
20 Expenditure Schedule, a copy of which is located in Board File No. 140420; and

21 WHEREAS, The proposed grant does not require an Annual Salary Ordinance
22 amendment; and

23 WHEREAS, The funding agency (HUD) does not allow use of grant on indirect costs;
24 and

1 WHEREAS, An Environmental Review Record has been prepared by the Mayor's
2 Office of Housing and Community Development (MOHCD) and approved by the Certifying
3 Officer for the proposed projects and activities set forth in the Expenditure Schedule with the
4 National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other applicable statutes and authorities, in
5 particular those cited in 24 CFR Part 58 §§5 and 6, a copy of which is located in Board File
6 No. 140420; and

7 WHEREAS, The Certifying Officer shall follow the provisions of NEPA to confirm and
8 ensure that all projects funded under the CDBG Program are in compliance with applicable
9 federal regulations and requirements; now, therefore, be it

10 RESOLVED, That the Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco is hereby
11 authorized to apply for, accept, and expend the City's 2014 CDBG Program funds from HUD
12 and expend an estimated \$3,463,354 in Program Income and Reprogrammed funds, all in
13 accordance with the purposes and goals for the funding as generally set forth in 2010-14 Five
14 Year Consolidated Plan and the Expenditure Schedule; and, be it

15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby approve the
16 purposes and goals for FY2014-2015 CDBG Program funding as set forth in the Expenditure
17 Schedule for recipient agencies and departments; and, be it

18 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of
19 indirect costs in the grant budget; and, be it

20 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into and execute
21 agreements between the City and County of San Francisco and various agencies consistent
22 with FY2014-2015 CDBG Program and the Expenditure Schedule; and, be it

23 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Mayor is hereby authorized to submit documentation
24 and certifications as may be requested or required by HUD, and to take such additional
25

1 actions as may be required to apply for, accept and expend the FY2014-2015 CDBG funds
2 consistent with this Resolution and the goals of the FY2014-2015 CDBG Program and all
3 applicable legal requirements; and, be it

4 FURTHER RESOLVED, That all actions heretofore taken by the officers of the City
5 with respect to the application for, or the acceptance or expenditure of, FY2014-2015 CDBG
6 funds, Program Income and Reprogrammed funds are hereby approved, confirmed and
7 ratified.





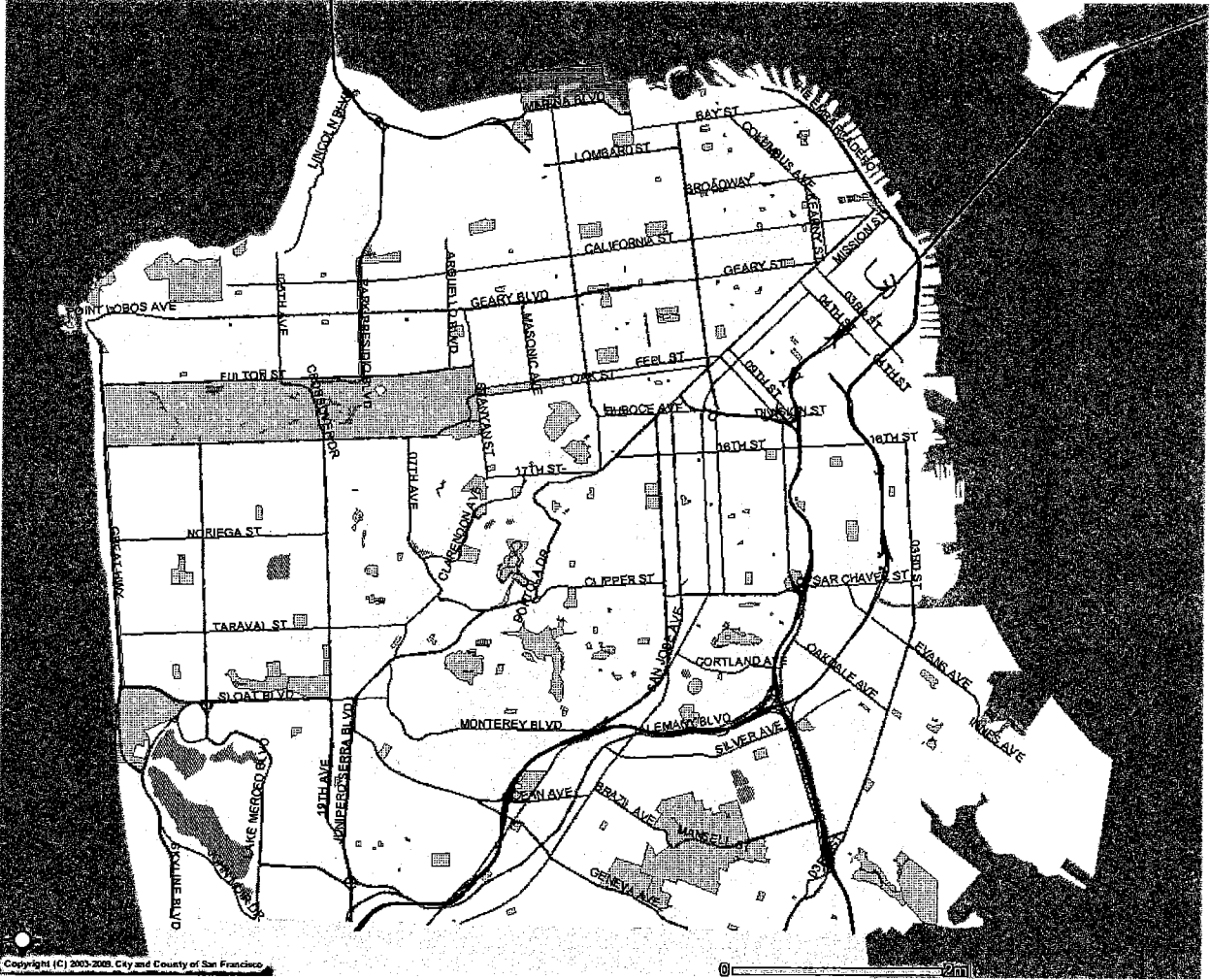
