Resolution urging the Office of the District Attorney, the San Francisco Police
Department, the Department of Telecommunications and Information Systems, the
Emergency Communications Department, and the Department on the Status of Women
to collaborate in order to consider and make recommendations on the advantages of
bringing 911 digital technology to the City and County of San Francisco as another
viable medium of combating domestic violence.

WHEREAS, Domestic Violence is one of the most serious issues faced by the criminal justice system and each year 3.9 million women are battered, stalked and/or killed by their domestic partners, representing about one assault every eight seconds; and

WHEREAS, An estimated 683,000 women are sexually assaulted each year representing about one assault every forty-six seconds; and,

WHEREAS, In 1990, the City and County of San Francisco became the first in the nation to look into a systemic response to domestic violence where the resulting investigation was published in a document titled San Francisco's Response to Domestic Violence: The Charan Investigation; and,

WHEREAS, The Charan report identified problems within the city's response to domestic violence, specifically the lack of consistency and coordination between the various agencies, and focused on five primary areas: 1) development of an oversight body, 2) communication and coordination between departments and programs, 3) protocols and policies, 4) resources including personnel and training, and 4) data collection and management; and,

WHEREAS, Although San Francisco has been successful at creating specialized units and programs addressing domestic violence, gaps in services and lack of communication between departments have created serious problems; and,

WHEREAS, City departments over rely on the exchange of critical information via paper whereby increasing the risk of human error; and,

WHEREAS, Due to changes in business practices by the San Francisco Police

Department, the San Francisco Sheriff Department and the Office of the District Attorney, a

domestic violence code is not being consistently used; and,

WHEREAS, The Office of the District Attorney continues to rely on paper incident reports to be delivered by the Police Department which perpetuates the delay in beginning investigations; and,

WHEREAS, There continues to be a pressing need for an integrated database system, one which tracks the disposition of domestic violence offenders in San Francisco, and one that immediately makes available the 911 audio recordings at arraignment in order to bolster bail applications, increase the likelihood that domestic violence defendants will be incarcerated pending trial and affording prosecutors greater leverage in negotiating pleas; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco supports the efforts of all city agencies that actively participate in making changes to San Francisco's domestic violence services delivery system; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges city agencies that participate in studying and adopting innovative approaches that will combat domestic violence to include studying advances in technology in order to enhance the City's ability to prosecute those who commit violent crimes and better protect crime victims; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, The Board of Supervisors does hereby urge the Office of the District Attorney, the San Francisco Police Department, the Department of Telecommunications and Information Systems, the Emergency Communications Department, and the Department on the Status of Women to collaborate in order to consider and make recommendations on the advantages of bringing 911 digital technology to the City and County of San Francisco as another viable medium of combating domestic violence.
