2	services and the crime of trafficking of a minor for sexual servitude.]
3	Pacalution urging the California State Logiclature to approve AP 41. Human Trafficking
4	Resolution urging the California State Legislature to approve AB 41: Human Trafficking
5	Act, which establishes the crime of trafficking of a person for forced labor or services
6	and the crime of trafficking of a minor for sexual servitude, providing various
7	sentencing enhancements for these offenses. The bill would also impose state-
8	mandated programs and require restitution to trafficking victims.

10	WHEREAS, Over 20,000 immigrants are victims of human trafficking in the U.S.; and
11	WHEREAS, Mostly immigrants are held as captives, forced to work in sweatshops,
12	prostitution rings, farm labor and private homes; and,
13	WHEREAS, Trafficking victims include immigrants who are lured to the U.S. by false
14	promises of jobs and then forced into sex trade or indentured service; and,
15	WHEREAS, Exploited immigrants rarely report crimes or testify against enslavers in
16	court for fear of reprisal to their families or themselves; and,
17	WHEREAS, Over the past five years, forced labor operations have been reported in at
18	least 90 U.S. cities; and,
19	WHEREAS, Forced labor operations have surfaced in 13 California cities; and,
20	WHEREAS, The 2000 Federal Trafficking Act criminalizes human trafficking or forced
21	labor, making them a federal crime that must be handled by federal agents; and,
22	WHEREAS, State and local agencies lack the basic training on identifying human
23	trafficking crimes; and,
24	WHEREAS, AB 41 would address and improve law enforcement training and tracking
25	of human trafficking incidents; and,

WHEREAS, Current law holds that human trafficking is only illegal for foreign and interstate transport; and, WHEREAS, AB 41 would extend current laws to include new provisions pertaining to intrastate human trafficking for forced labor or services as well as sexual servitude defining them as punishable felonies and provide for monetary restitution to survivors of human trafficking; and, RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the California State Legislature to pass AB 41, reflecting federal interstate human trafficking law by criminalizing intrastate trafficking.
